## EASTER DOINGS.

Easter Monday is always a busy day in the ranks of the Exercise, for it is a favourite occasion for the holding of ringing meetings, and last Monday was no exception to the rule. Favoured with a perfect spring day, which in itself was sufficient to draw people from home, ringers found congerial occupation in many parts of the country in Coregathering for the transaction of their annual business meeting, and incidentally of enjoying the exercise of their art.

But in addition to the meetings there was more than one performance of note. It is some time since the College Youths were credited with a long-length peal, but 7777 on tower bells for the first time gres now on to their books, this length having been rung in Stedman Caters at Bed dington. Then there was another record in eight-bell and Surprise ringing, the Middlesex Association scoring four peals in four Surprise Methods in four towers and three counties in onc day. Mr. William Pye was the conductor and had round him a band which past experience had proved to be absolutely reliable when a question of endurance was envolved. They were all, as it were, old campaigners and, we may quite well imagine, made few "bones" about the task. Indeed, the last peal on a tenor of over a ton was rung in six minutes more than three hours, so that it looks as if it was after all quite " a holiday job.'

The principal performance of the day, however, was the record peal at Ashton-under-Lyne, where in the famous tower of St. Michael and AlI Angels, the r34 rears' old record at Shorcditch was eclipsed, and Mr. Sam Wood and his confreres added the Treble Ten record to that of the Treble Twelve which they achieved three vears agoIt may be asked by many what is the use of all these records? They are surely a personal triumph for those who make thenl. But they are also more than that. They are evidence of the perfection of fitness which is necessary in men before anything of this exacting nature can be undertaken, and pronf that among those who stand pre-eminent in our art there are those who, in mental and physical prowess can be ranked in the forefront with those who seek to excel in other paths. A long peal is not a qualification for service ringing, but it is only by assiduous long practice and the regular performance of their duties in the belfry that fits men to share in performances requiring the attributes of so much grit and endurance.
There is one other matter which we cannot pass by without rotice, and that is the dedication which took place on Sunday of the new trebles at Newcastle Cathedral. The completion of the work adds one more to the twelvebell towers of the kingdon, and marks in its special way still another phase of the growth of the art.

Secondly, those on the first ten bells of the peal are not all exactly alike, altheugh in substance they are the same. They are as follows:-

As Thomas Mests died in 1844, it appears from the inseription that the egghth bell was cast betare lis death, and the otbers afterwards by his wons, Clarles and George Mears. With regard to the tenor, the original ono after the fire in 1840 was enst by Thomas Weets in 1842, and was hung in the towar in the antumin of that year, two years before the others wero cast. She was a lithe heavier than the present one, but as slice did not barmonise with the other eleven bells, put up two vears later, she whs recast in 1849, as the inscription reeords.

## RESTORATION OF WYE BELLS.

## PROVISION MADE ROR PFAT OR THEN.

The fine tower of the Church of Ss. Gregory aud Martin, inear Ashford, Kent, used to contain a ring of eight bells, cast by Pack und Chapmars of Lombon, in 1774, and wip to six months uro, were hanging in their original oak frantwork, the condition of which, however, wbioubly neceded attention. Expert opinion was ealled in, and it was found that the old framework was unsafe, and must be removed, and the substitution of a stoel fisme of approved modern pattern was advised. The mather was kemly tuken up by the parishioners, and tenders were inviled from thres selected fimis, it being eventually decided to entrust the work of restoration to Messrs. Jelm Whruer and Sons, of the Spitalicle Foundry, and to have the new sted frame constracted for tell bells, so that the two new trebles can be added atis some future tine, as circumstances permit.

The dodication of the restored bells taok place, as briedy announced last week, on P'alm Suoday, and thus lorought the work to a successful conclusion. The conlract included the retuning of the bells tupath Canon Simpson's five-tone principle, the recasting of the 61 h bell, the fitting of alt the bells with the "Warmer "self-aliguing, self-lubricating, oil bath and oil ring design of bearing, End the erection of the uew izdepencent allosteel belf frume, which is fixed to the corners of the tower by diagousl steel sutoff, the main gitders, as

It liad been left, howerer, for a band of the Middlesex Aesociation to scord fle first four peats in one day upon rings of eigith, aud they clid it it as complete a manter possible by ringing ibem in four diferant methorls.

The ime accupied in actual ringinc was close upon twelve bours-a procligigus day's work for ordinary mortals. But then, us ringers, the men who to弓k part are havdly ordinary mortals. Nevertineless, four Surpriso peals in four methods in ona day is a perfornates of great merit, boilh ins a fent of physical and mental anduratice. ## A MAGNIFICENT OHURCT.

It is seldom that such munificence is shown, as has been displayed in connection with Stu. George's Ghurch. The magnificent pile is considered onte of the finst built in England suce pre-Reformation times. It wats the gift of a parishioner, Mr. Gearge Farn, and the erueiform buidding is in the 'lransition style, decorated and perpendicular, with cennml tower and spire, rising to al height of 267 fest. In the tower is a fine pral of ten bells with a tenor of 30 ewt. In addition to the church, Mr. Fenra has presented a wicarage and two sets of schools to the parish, his total gifts amounting to $£ 140,000$.

## IANDBELLS FOR NATIVES.

The Bislop of Acert (West Africa), who has recentiy been in England, is now on his way hack to his diocese. He is taking back with lim a peal of eight handbells (by Taylor) for the trse of the native boys. Two boys who lave been over with him have been faught to handle the bells, so it is hoped that they will be of some interast to the peuple af those parts.

## SMAIRT WORK

The long peal at Ashilou-urder-Lyme was staried about seven oclock in the morn ng, and, occupying 9 hrs, 24 migs., came round about laklf-past four in the aftermoon. Before 5.30 o'clock, the full particulars of the sucecsful performance were in "The Ringing World "Offce, the Elitor having arranged to get early information of the event. Wea wonder how long it would have taken the news of the 12.000 at Shoreditch to reach Ashton 134 jeare ago, had the guthest means of converitug the intellifence been adopted?

## FOUR SEVENS.

The parformane in Laneashire rather dwarfs the acomplishment at Beddiugtou, Surreq, where 7777 Stedman Caters was rung loy the Callege Yauths. Nevertheless, this was an exceedingly creditable achictement, and the more romarkable on acoonnt of the curiosity of length. and ithe fact that this number had not, so far as our information gots, bern rung on oburch bells before. The composilion was one by the late Fenry Johnson, who composed it at the special request of Monday's condector. who Jans had it in his possession with the clesire to call it for nearly 30 yeats. After the peal the band were entertained by Mr. Dawe, who was warmly thanked for his hospitality. Haring now rung the four fives, four simen and four sevens, we suppose he will turn bis attention to the four eights.

SIMPLBX SLNGLE.
This singhe which we problished a forlnight ago is not new. As at tatter of furf we quite expected to thent thig, for such a simple variation of ancall in Plain lab was almosh sure to have been alirlated upon by investigators. Mr. II. W. lussell of Wurgley, Glos., says he pricked the single oul msore thith 20 years ngo, end it was rang in Bob Donbles by tho Stinchoonbe ringers. At that time ditey coukl ring iz plain fanse, but did not kuow how a bols was matie-dais single being the result of efforis the find oul. When the way to make a proper bob was ascertained, the single was dropped, except when a variation was wanted.

## NEW TREBLE TEN RECORD.

GREAT PERFOLRMANCE AT ASLTON-UNDER-LANE.

The peal wis started ith 7 n.m., anel thus was coneltiderd just bofore half-past four in tha afternoon.
In viow of the succeas achioved it, is interesting to recnll provious big performances of 'lteble 'len. Theso principaly centred th the rivalrs of the Colloge Fouths aud Ctmberlatids more than 130 years ago, and all took plane at Shoredich.

Isaiat Bray 5, James Patrick 6, WIn. Enst 7, Abralum Smith 8, Malachi Caunon g, Allen Cratm 10. Composed and called by George Grass, sent. Mr. Samuel Wood, the comprosto and conductor of the peal at Ashion-under-Ly ne, is no stranger to long leugths, and if he is at home in one thing nore tinam sanother it is T'reble Bobs. At Mottram-inLongdendafe, as long ngo as 1883, hu monducted 16,608 of Trable Bob Major, rung in 9 hrs. 48 mins., while, as all the world knows, he composed and conducted the record peal of Kent I'reble Bob Maximus 112,240 changes in 8 turs. 39 mins.), on Laster Montay, 1911. Mr. James Mellor is the only other member of Mondar's band who was in all threc of the puals.

## ATREMTV ON ETGE SURPIRSE MINOR IRECORD.

But even then thero was a connection, though a very sinister one, with religious purposes, bacauso that terrible massacro was the last insi jated under the authority of tho Toman Church of that day.

Alduessing specially the ringers present, the Dean enid they were stilled people, who had givan up no litile time and trouble to perfect themselves in anolle and diffenli art. Sut what he wanted them to recolled was just this: While it was of the tulmost importance that bell ringing should be conducted scientificalls, that there should bo no want of harmony, no jangling in the bells on the part of the ringers, yot the whole purpose of bell ringing, all that systematie care that they wok to made their ringing a sucess, was to be subordinate to the main object of bells being in the church tower at all mamely, to summon people to come to divine worship. To learn bell ringing thereby dis an art, withont reference to this great main purgose was to lose sight of the whole object for which bells were in their towers. He conld not holp thinking, standiag ns he dik under that, great tower erectud by Pand of Caen, shartly
after the Norman after the Norman Conquest, of the beatiful story of and who sold ti great mainy sheep and goats in order that he might buy a bell and present to to the Abhes, and when he Jeard the sound of the bells us lie staod on the opposite hill, known as Verulan Fills, he stid. "Hear tuow sweetly my goats and my lambs do bleat." Ilis uife, inspired by his example, gave her slame amd presented another bell to the Ablicy, so that the two bells cane frons that one family. and she saisI in mast beauliful words, that he would tanaslate: "I an sure that this conjunction (thr two bells) does not lack the Divine farour which naited the and my husband in holy weclock and in the true bond of mutual love. : And so that worthy couple spent their money in this way in giving to that Abher Chureh those two bells, tho metal from which, for all he knew, might still be in the bells that some of those present had been dinging that day. What ho desired to imprint upan their minds with regated to thoir boll ringing was, by all ments keep lip their skill and practica, by ull means be glat when they wera successful in rimging a peal, but remember that the quarterpeal that they rang on Sundey morning on evening was the true end and object of theit skill: remember that to go into the belfry merely for tho snko of being proficient in bell ringing was a lower idea of bell ringing than any tate Cliristian Mission should have. Ho did wot think the members of that Association had that idea. Ifo thought they had the true iden before them of the main object of being proficient in that Art-to summon the people in the most clecorous and beatiful waty possible to come and worship God in His sancturry, and when they lind done their ringing, to go and take part in the service themselves, and mot be reen walking away from the church as if thair offiee harl teen falfilled when they had ramg they bells. Surely bell ringers had souls that were precious in the sight of God?
