## NOW THAT THE WAR IS OVER.

In every phase of fife we are confronted with "atter the war " problems, and ringing will have its own special diffeulties to face in the reconstruction which must follow, if the leeway of more than four years' di..organisation is to be made up within a reasonable period. Before the war broke out, ringing had attained a remarkable level, not only in achievements, but is the widespread naturc of its practice. It was going ahead literally by leaps and bounds, and the rapidly increasing record of peals gave proof of extraordinary growth in the efficiency of the Exercisc. The claims of the nation through the war period reduced ringing almost to stagnation, by withdrawing a large proportion of the men from the towers, as well as by making the indiscriminate use of bells absolutely out of place and out of keeping with the feelings of the public. In the result, many bells have hung idle in, their towers for months on end, change ringing has been abandoned in many places, and in not a few even the bells themserves have been allowed to get into a state of meglect.
But the fact camot be ignored that in very many towers up and down the country there has been a great set-back. Presently, when the men cone back; there will be an acquisition of strength, that will be invaluable to ringing, but it is time the varions associations, as we have so often urged, thok steps to siir their branches into activity, so hat the-returning members may be secured and not alluwed to deifl awaylbeause through the years of severance interest may have been lost. The sound of the bells will, in itself, be enough in most cases to draw our warrior ringers to the belfry, when they are bacle again, but the towers ought to ix ready with their invitation and welcome "when the bons come home," so that there can be the excuse for the returring ringer if he does not retrace his steps to the belfry.
The re-establishing of the hands, however, is not everything. There must be the effort to raise the ringing itsolf to the high stamdard it reaclied hefore the war; many belfries will need attention, and more peals will want overhauling. This fiater question should be immediately looked into by the ringers who are now at home. Where the bells require restiration, it is folly to let them hang neglected, while, it witl probably be an easier matter to mise funds in the nearlfuture, when war memorials are on the tapis, than may he later. Doubtess, too, the beit (wunders. will pelcome immediate inquiries, for we imagine it with help them through the difficuit period which must othiswise ensue whem war contracts cease. There is much to be dont ; let the Exercise be up and doing.

## RAISING AND LOWERING.

To the Editor
Sir-I was very pital to seb Mr. Lawrentes letter in the . Ringine World, recommending the rilsing and lowering of hell $l_{\text {s }}$ in coneortant notes of the seddo. In spite of Mr. Richardson's eriticism, I am fimty comvinced that this is the best sulbstitule for the real thing. In its simplust form the applicabon of this principle would consist in ringing Leils up or dowa in pairs. Even that is musical, as far ss it goes Whether ringing two hells or more, the endeavour should always te mude to sequal them in order, not togel her. After raising and lowerints in this manner for a few weck on and, any three or four ringers should havo acquired the necessary proficiency to heeps sucin si small number of bellg in their proper places, but tite advantage of thas usiug alteryate bells is, that when two or move do clash together, no nctual discord is produced. The motes either fall in chords or arpeggios: the arpeggio should be the ringors' aim. Very fine effects may sometimes be mroducer in this way: for example. Whe somorots Lures of the 8ilh. 10th and tenar and. Bow Chireh thits fraised and lowered would give forth magrificent musiu.- Tours truly.
