## THE CENTRAL COUNCIL MEETING.

The Central Council Meeting at Gloucester next Tuesday week wilh be the first held in the provinces for five years, the last one held out of London having been that at Winchester in 1914. Last year's gatheing in the metropolis broke the biatus which was caustd in the series by the war, and-was, in a sense, little more than the picking up of the threads of the work which the Council had in hand when the sterner demands of the conflict caused the abandonment of meetings after that of 1915 . With the revival of the Council's activities, the Exercise hoped to see a larger scope given to its work, but unless something practical comes out of the adjourned discussion on "The means most likely to conduct to the greatest utility and efficiency of the Council," there is nothing in this year's agenda to suggest any widening of the Council's usefulness or of the interest in its doings.

True, the most commonplare agenda may provide the most unexpected developments, and we hope that out of the discussion upon inself, the Council will find a means by which its future value to the Exercise way be enhanced. At present it is liping largely upon its pa-t, and before it can hope to be considered by the rank and fie of ringers as anything more than a figurehead of the Exercise, it must do somethirg to remove that indifference to its existence which prevails among the majority of ringers. No one can deny that it its earlier days the Council did much valuable work, but to retain the confidence of the Exercise in it, even as an advisury body, it must show continued activity and unceasing worli of practical interest and utility.

Except for the Peals Analysis Committee, whose labours are substantial and really appreciated by the Exercise, there is not one of the old-standing committees who have reported any real progress for years. We know we shall be told that the war has caused delay, but a good deal of what is now beld up from this cause might bave been given to the Exercise before war broke out. It is the eternal dallying from , ear to year that in the past has made the man in the belfry so indifferent to the Council and all its works, and he looks upon the various pions resolutions discussed by the Council and placed upon record as so much waste of breath and ink. Now this is :ot as it should be. The Council fills a distinct place in the organism of the Exercise, which nothirg eise at present in existence can oecupy. It is the connecting link between the associations which cover the country, and should be foremost with proposa's to advance the arr. We look to the Council to realise its true position and the services which it still can render to the Exe cise, and we hope that out of the discussion at the next meeting, something really practical will result.

fror over ter months the most cuitionl and fatefil peried of tice war was experienced, and a further mall for men bronght ringing achiviLias to a very low obb; but when on. Novemiver 11th the clouds werr lifted there were only vary few of our towers from whith the messenge of victory was not rung aut by the bells. Our district meetings wore very successful, and at most the attendance vory good. We owe debt of gratitude to Mr . H. E. Wills for his kind invitations in an Groydon, und the good recontion which we received from our Sttrey neighbours and comrades. Mas such cordiality be the forertmaner ne many more such mectings for our mutuel enjoyment and arvintage! Tho number of peals recorded show a slipht increase on the jutevinus Fear: 11 being rung, seven on tower hells and four on landhells. Fortytwo quarter peals were reportot.
It is with regret that we have to reoord the resignation of Mr. H. C. Chandlar, who has acted as honorary secrebrary of the South ancl West District for the past twelve years, an office in which he did most useful worle for the Association, whirh we feel sure bas been walled by us zll, and wilt be remenbered with appreciation. ## RINGING FOR THE KING AT BIRMINGEAM.

 ROCKED IN FHE CRADLE OF THE STEEP(LEJ.'On the occasion of the visit of Their Majesties the King nnd Qucen to Birminglam on May 21st, the bells of tho Cathedral were rumg th official request, and the ropes were manned by a company of the St Martin's Guild. Ringing commenced at 9.30 , and was conhibned in rarions methods, and with intervals for luncheon, ete., until 5 o'cleck
Punctatalls at 10 oeluck as the King stepped on to the platform at Now Street Station the bells were "fired ' as at royal salute, and with gocd effect. We have since heard that the wast concourse al people crowding the route of the royul procession, which passed clcse to the Cathedral, was partly interested and partly alanued af ithe evolutions of the weather vane on the domo, which oscillates and wobbles to an almost unbelievable extent. However, while we dil not break the pane we almost succeded in breaking aur hearte, turl were quite suosessful in breaking three ropes, an eleetric lamp slade and many blisters. You can have it with us that the betfry of St Phisip's, Birmingham, on a hroiling hot, daf, and with about seren hours' ringing to be put through, is not to be veeommended ns a healt resort. We know of many places to be preferred.
However, such a day has $i t_{\text {se }}$ compensations, and it may safels to said that everyone was happy-especially after liunch. Lanchoon wnarranged at Ye Olie Toyal Hotel, and a capital spread was enjoye iny a company of twenty. Also a capital view of the royal processint was obtainel-lietler than many folk had paid guineas for.
At 3.30 the brilliant idea was conceived of taking the lanedells m on the dome, and ringing there a touch of Stedman Cingues what time the tower hellg were also being ring. Agreet! The cupola carried above the dome by six pillars, ade the spaces between them pillars are jusp wide enough for a natg to stand therein. Six spacesis men. Wwidently built for this very thing.
After much toiling and heary breathing, too soon after lunch, the handbell men arrived at the ton, and almost immediately the tower Irells ' let her go.' There are doub less some towers that swing mar thath this one when the kells are going-but doubtless not much After a while we got our sea legs and 'Go, Stedman Cimues' who crtled. A very decent couple of courses. wore brought round at wh: first time of asking, bat what tho music sounded like it is diffent to descrite. The tower bells rumbled below like the bourdon pernt of at inger and not orer-tuneful organ. Tenor 29 ewt. in D. Flamil bells, size 17 in $R$.

In the writ thapel there is a magnificent marble statue of the former by Sir brancis Chanlirey, which is generaliy regarded as that sealybors masherpiece. Infleet, it is said titub during his lifetme sir francis would allow no one else to touch it, and always made a point of risume the church from time to time to dust and clean it. There is also a monument of Foulton. the founder of the world-famous soho foundly. and a bust of Wm. Murdeck, one of the introducers of gas lighting. 'The old house of the latiter, in Queen's Mead Road, reputed to be the first house in Greati Britain to Ge ilhuminated by gas, is still standinte, though in a very rifunidated condition.
It is a very singular coinciflence that three sucin remarkutile men Hs Boulton, Watt and Murdeck. should be living at the same time in the same parish. James Watt cied on Augist $25 t h, 1819$, and his centemary will be celebrated in Birningham in Ereat style. It is proposed to establish a Watt Museum, to which will be brotelit many interes! inds relies of tho 'Steam Man.'
The bells are in light rint of eight, fenor about 12 cwt . in $F$ shurp. and none too pooi. However, they go well, and were kept busy it varions methods during the afternoon and evening.
