## THE POWERS OF THE COUNCIL.

Last week we touched briefly upon the decision of the Central Council to take the opinion of the Associations which are affiliated to it upon the question of whether or not the Council shall have power to enforce its decisions. First of all, it is agreed by everyone that the Council cannot take to itself power of this desctiption; its power, if power there is to be, must come from the associations to which the Council owes its own existence. It is therefore only right that in this matter the Council should go straight to the associations for their mandate or refusal--indeed, there is no other course open. The subject is important and, therefore, we trust it will be brought officially to the notice of the affiliated societies, and not left, as practically all questions are upon which the Council seeks the views of the associations, to the representatives. This would be fatal to obtaining a conclusive reply, qu te apart from the fact that some associations were not represented at the meeting at all. Even as it is, there are some organisations who will not hold an annual meeting between the date of the Council meeting and the last day for receiving replies. Among these will be those who hold their meeting on Whit-Monday and others whose gathering falls in May or early June.
But apart from this drawbich, which could be got over by adjourning the subject for another year, let us look at the broad princ ple and see whether it is really practicable. Except for the loyalty which every member is expected to give to his association, we are afraid there is nothing by
 infringements of regulations are out of the question; suspensions for infractions of the rules would be laughed at. The truth is, the link between the ringers and their associations is still of a very weak kind and easily snapped, and unless that is strengthened, action by a still more distant authority is quite unlikely to have any coercive effect.

This, however, brings us to the even more crucial point: Has the Council any decisions to enforce? It has specified certain definitions for a peal, but these have been established for centuries; it has stated the requirements when record peals are to be attempted, but these have been more honoured in the breach than in the observance; it has laid down the law as to what are and what are not regular methods, but the divergence in the Council on this point is such that the members would hesitate-at present, at any rate-to enforce a decision one way or the other, On these subjects, however, the Council can, if it likes, uphold its views by excluding all else from the analysis, but where, outside them, is there anything to enforce?

## QUEEN ALHXANDRA AT THE DEDICATION GERLMONY

The bolls of st. Clement Dines, striand, which, owing to ite endmsinsm of the Rector, the Rev. W. Penningtor Hickford, Have now bent rehung in a now frane by messrs. Mears and stanbank were rededicated on Thusslay lasl week, and wers thus ones more in their place is fime for the peawe tolebrations. The bell had beal proctically silent for nearly seven years on accourt of the weaknese of Whe frame, which after more than 300 gears' use, bad shown serious signs of collapse. Tle Vicur, with characteristic energy, set apout bthe restoration of the peal, so that the roices of the bells should not bo missing when peace was celebruted, und with little more than $\begin{gathered}1 / 1\end{gathered}$ hours to epare he won the race against time. The expense of the work is considerable, but it is interestine to note that contributions ure coming in from ringers and ringiug organisations in many parts of ile conntry, so that the Exoreise will be able to claim a share w the renovation of this historie peal.
The dedication service, like those other services it which ringero have been interested at 'St. Ciement Danes, was given special significanee, oud was both beatiful and dignified in its details. The ceremony was performed by the Chaplain-General of the Forces, anc was attended by Queer Alexandra, who passed the churelt to the sound of the bells when sha entever this countrg to become the brirlo of the late betover King Lerlwand. Insite the chanch a fashionable congrogation asseubleri. A number of fower-girls bearing great bubches of carmations and sucet peas, limef the entrance and forme a chamming guarl of honour; and through thele ranks pased Queed Alexandra, bestowing gracious spiles on all as sho passed inte the charwh to take parsi, ill the service.
For some time the clear young voices of the ehoirboys mingled with those of the congregation in chanting appromitate hymns of praise and

Mr, A. I'. King, who spoke in frvour of paper being reat to thes Conucil on matlers of interest, which the mombere could afterwurls criticise, if whes desired, Eatil the Council had a power to enforce their decisions, and never would get power to enforce them, but las would bell them what they hat got and did not exercise, perliaps, tu the full, and that was inftence. When they went back to their agsociations they could always exercige an inflineme, and that whis evel so much bettor thun frying to onforce zules.
Gunon Elsea asked if the Commil thotight that auy commitee they athpointed cotal be better than the Standing Committee? He ngreed that they wanted in some way to improve their procedure, but they wero faced with the diEFculty that a great jroportion of their limo was laken up by reports. They oucht somehow to linall the fime spent on these in order to have more free time for the disenssion of other subjects. He thought the Standing Conumittee was the proper body to consider the matter, and he stiegester that Mr. Drake should altor his motion so that this might he done.

The Rev. H. Jrake accepted tha suggestion.

The Ther. F. LiI. Eewards then opened the subject of a moposil for the revival of the ancient Poace Bell on Fridays at noors. Furing reFerred to the Angelus, with which those who lave been on tho Continent are farmiliar, and whif is heard in many places in the norming, at mid-day, and in the oveniug be sadid this call fo tho faithful to recite, on hearing the bell, the words to the Virgin, "Rail, Mary, full of grace, mate a spiritual appeal, whield was of distinct value. Il stood in the first place is a conetant withess of the Ohriqtian faith and tho presenes of the Churistian Clitureh. It wonled not perhaps, luve the sane siguificance in England, beanue to the minde of most Inglish peonle the devotion to the Virgin Mary atseciated with if would not nppeat. The ringing of the Angelus enme gratinally into use, the ensliest reference to it being that a bell should be rung in tho ovening $h_{s}$ a signal for people to put out their lighis and say their evening mayotg and retire to hod, it lueing thus mints a curfew and partly a call to praver. In the 13 th or 14th centurias the same thing was introdtced by the ecclesinstien\} authorities in tho, motninge. in ovar that people shombe le directeti to say certai: prnyers. The mid-day bell, which still survived in the Protestant cantons of Swizerland, where to a large extent the moming nur evening bells have fallen into alisuse, or been deliberatelp suppureses originaled iat the same way as the others. In 1458, Uhe Pope. In universal crisade of praver, ordeved a bell to be rung at mici-ing all tha charches of the work and in France the bell beenme known 5 the Ave Maria of Peace. He suggested that, it wontr] constitule anost beatifu! and appropriate memorial to oul" fallen beroes if they could restove in this country. he did not say the Angelns pure ant simple, but the mid-day bell as it was orifimally inticduced, with its original intention amplified, hy reference to those we shond evel bear in giateful remembrance for the sacrifice they had made in ute cause of Fing and counfry. Nothing could le mole appropuiate thand that the belf rung in menory of these who had given their lives in the war should be at the same time a eall to prayer for the cortinuance of the pace they dien to win. It would be most approminte if it could Jo done on Fridass nt noou.
The mover: "That this Counsil gives its hearis sumport to the move mont alreafi locally initiated, to reatore the ancient nsage of tho peare bell in this comtry as it nerpelutal memorial to the mon who Juve sacrificed their live in the grent wal, and as a call to phater tor the neace of the land.'
