## KEEPING TOUCH.

A very useful and quite practical suggestion was put forward by a correspondent in our last issue on the subject of keeping touch with young ringers who migrate from their native towers. How often is it lamented that when a promising beginner has been brought on, force of circumstances has taken him away from the tower where he learnt to ring a bell! He bas been lost, not only to his parent belfry, but to the Exercise, for lack of machinery to keep him in touch with ringing when he has moved from one village or town to another. There are many reasons which may deter a young ringer from going into a strange belfry, for he has not had the opportunity of realising the spirit of fraternity that exists among the members of the Exercise and the welcome which would await him-in most towers.

How best to introduce him to the new circle is a question which may find many answers. Some may say tbat if the man is worth his salt as a ringer he will find his own way to the bellry; but among those who take up the art are men who, conscious of shortcomings in their qualifications, would have a reluctance to enter a strange belfry. Yet, with encouragement, they might be capable of development into valuable additions to the Exercise. It is the first introduction to the new tower that is the necessary link for the continuation of the beginner's ringing career, and it ought not to be difficult to suggest some simple machinery by which this could be secured. If the invitation, as our correspondent suggested, could come from the tower nearest to which the stranger has gone to reside, it would give a greater feeling of welcome and comradeship than if the advances were made from the opposite side, and for that reason the method put for ward by Mr. Bennett is a good one.

There might be objections to the publication of a book of names and addresses of secretaries by the Central Council, inasmuch as this would rapidly get out of date with the frequent changes that are made, but it might be possible to get some leisured member to undertake to keep an up-to-date list, and to forward information of removals to the right quarters. Or again, such a thing might be possible by being passed directly througl the General Secretaries of Associations. Anyhow, the method, as long as it is efficient, matters little; what is wanted is somenne to take the initiative in setting up a workable scheme by which migrating ringers-ard it is particularly the young ringer that has to be catered for, because the old ringer will always seek out the belfry wherever he goes-can be retained in the Exercise, and thus save the wastage of much good material.
