## THE COMING COUNCIL MEETING.

The agenda of the Central Council meeting, to be held next Tuesclay week at Northampton, contains no very striking items, and yet it provides material enough to make a session quite long enough to satisfy the desires of the most enthusiastic member. Three only, out of a considerable number of Committees, have, up to now, published their reports, and it seems as if the effort to get some of the Committees to record their work before the general body meets is rather a hopeless task, although it must be admitted that in a few instances there is very little indeed to be said. One of the reasons for this may perhaps be that the Council's Committees never actually: meet, but do all their work by the more laborious process of correspondence. If they have any business, would it not be better that they should meet and discuss it? There should be no insuperable difficulty in this being done on the day before the meeting of Council in whatever centre the Council proposes to sit.
The Council's own future is not the least important subject which the members will have before them, in continuation of the debate which has already taken place at two meetings. Last year the Council invited the affiliated associations to express an opinion upon whether the cen tral authority should be invested with compulsory powers. but even in this matter very fow societies have yet communicated with the honorary secretary, although others, besides those griven in the epitome last week, have, we know, passed at opinion. Certain it is, however, that nothing like all the affiliated bodies have had the matter brought officially before them, and it is these haif-andhalf methods that rob the Council of much of its value to the Exercise.

If the Associations could be brought to give a direct vote upon whether the Council should be continued or not, we do not hesitate to say that the decision would be in the affirmative by an overwheming majority, vet the societies show very litule energy in assisting the Council with its work. The mere fact that the honorary secretary has io make numerous appeals to get in the small affiliation fee from many Associations in time to chable the representatives of those organisations to vote at the Council meeting, shows how little some societies concern themselves with the interests of the Council, and another illustration is to be found in the fact that although asked for twelve months ago, and reminded again earlier this year, several Associations have not yet complied with the request to send in their roll of honour. Ringers grumble often enough about the Council : here, surely, the boot is on the other foot.

## LONDON CHURCHES.

## PROPOSED DEMOLITIONS.

The City Clutches Commission, appointed by the Bishop of London propose, in conneation with the reorgnnisation of the eccleasiastical parishes and Church finance in the City, some drastic sleps, including the removal of 19 Cily churches. whose capital site value alone is quatad as being near one and three-quarter milion pounds. Ringerand ringing are intimately associntex with some of these churghes, and in connection with somo of them it $\mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{s}}$ gratifying to learn that fifo Commission recommend the retention of the towar. This is so in the ense of St. Michael's, Cormhill ( 12 bells), nati also St. Migrus the Martyr (10). St. Dunstan in the East and St. Botolph. Aldrate (8). Churches which it is proposed to sweep awny entirely include All Hallows. Lombard Strest (10), and SE, Stephen. Coleman Streel (8).
There is alrealy considerable opposition to the removal of some of the churches proposed, and among the influential advotites for saving St. Michnel's, Comhill, is the Lord Mayor of Tondon, whed bats:
My impression is that the list of threatened churebes is far too lengihy. I cerfainly hope that the proposals will not be carricd out in their entirety, as such a sweeping demolition would change the face of the City, and rol us of many historical landmarks. Some of the churches might possibly be damolished. but the whole sabject. should first be catefully ronsidereal by a committee of oxperi arehitects and archoolorists. I am very sorty to see St, Michad's, Cornhill, figuring in the list. The church is a vory beatiful edifice and athracts a good songregation every Sunday. The best of the frou churehes should certainly be preserved, bit there aro Wren churehes and Wren churches. I have mot yet had time to study all the facts, but I can see no special obfecion to the vemoval of such a ehareh as St. Catherivo Coleman, near Fenchurcly Street. It has no particular historical assomiations, and I beligye its average Sunday congregation is three.'
Mr. F. Alex. Young, writes;-We Landouers cannot spare one of our City churches, not even St. Paul's. They ale akin to the very atmosplere of Citr life, the whole are of prime interest and many are exceptionally beatifut specimens of the English Renaigsanee. Wren overehadows his cotemporaries, but it must not be forgolten that for the plre artisiry of archilectute, he was surnassed hy Inigo Jones who immediately preceded him and by Nicholas Hawksnoor. bis own most famons pupil who followed him. Hawkemoor's outstanding wort is undoulbedly St. Mary Woolnoth. Both interior and exterior are excentionally fine, and the dotail in perfect "seale" with the composition.
Itrust it will be remombered that the Sunday uses of these churches is fecondary nowadays to their value in giving olpportumity to Gity workers to enter them raily for silent prayr and meditation, and to them nses for concerten serwicgs such as we had at St. Clement's lagi year.
I would remind you that St, Clenent's and St. Mary-le-Stand. were only gaved by fonkh fight 30 Fears ago. What would tho Enst Strand look without them?
1 trtast that Church folk un and clown the country will feel that the two million pounds is dearly boughte at such a lase. Indeed, after stich. nothing wout de safe.

So fer as t.le bells are moncerned. there is an opportunity for tho Central Comnei] to use its infuence to see that, where towers win 1001 are demolishent. the bells are trangferred if possible to eome olluer belfig. whare they can continue to be of use. Buh. unless tha Council decita on a line of action when they meat at Whitsur, it may lies teo late.

## THE OSCILLATION OF TOWERS.

How it is AFFECTED BY THE TFFIGHT OF TITE BELL To the Bditor
Dear Sir, -I heve twice been askod diring the lact twelre mothts We expross au opinion as to the effort of lowering the bells in towere where tha osciliation of the towers was considerable, alk, I thintr it miglat bo desimble to stake the general principles upon which I bateet my replies to these inquiries.
The experiments which I made bufore the war uppeared to justity the two following assumptions:--
(1) That the average tow could be regarved as an olastic structures.
(2) That it was not fir wrong to regard tha monent of imertia of a sertion of a tower about a neutral axis as being fairly constant at difierent heights, un to the point of stispension. of tio helle,
There is much room for furl her investigation into the trath of these assumptions. But I see no danice of buing able to carry out such investigations in the near fintite. With these two assumptions the Inchaviour of a tower under applied horizontal faces, die to the rovolution of tho bells, is that of a vertical cantileror of uniform sectiou. Then if $y$ be the defiection of a towror al: a heighti $x$, dae to a hotsrontal face F , appligd to tho tower at height $h$, we have tho following equation:-

This ateows that the deftection of tho tower (and consurventily the clifictuty of ringing caused by that deflection) varicg directly as the cuthe of the height on which the bells aro hang.
So much for the effect on the ringers. Now for the effect on the tower.
Suppose the lolal licight of the lower to be t. The deflection of the fop of the tower enuals the cleilention at tho haighe Jh phe (t-bit) $x$ incliation at height $h$. From equations (2) and (3) this ecpuils

To take concrete example, suppose a tower 100 feot high with the bells lung at 80 feet. If the bells be lowered 20 feet the deffection of the tower at the point of euspension of the bolls is rednced in tha ratio $\left(\frac{60}{80}\right)^{3}$, a reduction of 57.8 pen cent. In other wards, if the bells be dropped by one quarter of their height, tho diffionties of pinteing duo to the oscillettion of the tower would be redued hy nore that helf.
Again, considor the effect on the tower. The dofection of the tor of the bower wonld lue refluced is the ratio.
