## THE COUNCIL'S BUSINESS.

Apart from the routine business and the discussions that are likely to arise out of the various Committee's reports, there are several items of interest to which the members of the Central Council will be asked to give their consideration at the meeting at Northampton next Tuesday. It is to be hoped, therefore, that valuable time will not be frittered away at the morning session, as has been done at many past meetings, by discussing at length points of trivial importance. Among the matters that will claim chief attention will be, as already mentioned, the future of the Council itself, which will, presumably, be dealt with on the report of the Standing Committee, for at the last meeting it was resolved that this Committee be instructed to consider the procedure of the Council and take such action as they think fit. This reference gives the Committee plenty of scope, and one of the matters to wbich they might give attention is the provision of a time table for the business. Generally, however, we hope a definitely enterprising policy will be decided upon.

Of the resolutions down for discussion, two at least will commend themselves to the Exercise generally, and we should like to see the scope of the motion authorising the Council to compile and keep up to date an official list of the first peal and longest peal rung in each method and on each number of bells, extended (if it is not the mover's intention already) to include the record of the progressive lengths, in the various methods, wherever it is possible to obtain it. Such a record would be invaluable in generations to come, for the longer ils compilation is left the more diffcult the task is likely to be. The resolution suggesting that steps be taken to get an exhibit in the Victoria and Albert Science and Art Museum is also an excelient one, and one which there is little doubt the Council will at once adopt.
The motion on the question of the definition of a Surprise method will give the 'professors' their opportunity, although circumstances may force the discussion on this topic to be rather one-sided. Much more divergence of opinion is likely to be shown upon the suggested alte'ation in the date of the Council's meeting. It is true that the Tuesday after Whitsun is inconvenient to members whose own society holds its annual meeting on Whit-Monday, especially when the Council meeting is at a distance; but we doubt if the proposal to hold the meeting on the Tuesday after the first Sunday after Trinity is likely to commend itself very highly to the majority of the C uncil, as it would rob the members to whom working days are important, of the advantages of the Bank Holiday, which provides the opportunity of a more extended visit to the district where the meeting is held.

A MAGNIFTODNT HEOOHD.
In the anmual report of the Hon. Sectotary of the Sulisbury Dion cesan Guild, the Rev. F. LI. Edwards writes: One feabure in this report should ever be mshrined as a proud qna glorions memory in the traditions of our Guild. We publish this year the fimal edition of our roll of homour. Qur nomad membership numbers a litule under 750. No less than 525 of our ringers responfed to the country's call to amms-the great majority of these in the days of volunday enlistment. Fifty-six of that number gave their lives in the great. cause. I'wo six-bell tower of LFchett Minster contributed twenty. men to the King's forces. We wonder whether any association in the kingdora can show a finer record. As long as the thurch in this diooese is served by laymen with such a splendid spirit of devotion to duby she may face ell the difficultes of these anxions diys with triumphant confidence.

In accordance with the resolution passed at the last annual meeting, muffled limging took place at Dorohester Devizes and Salisbury, in mentory of those nembers of our Guild who made the suprome sactrfice in the service of onr King and country. Our Diocesan Memoril has been luft in the hands of a committee who are in consultation witt the Bishop on the subject. But the grandest. and most worthy memorial of all will be that of the living hand week by week if we succeed in restoring to this Diocese, the ancient. Peaco Bell as a perpetual tribute to the fallen and a solemn call to duty.

## DEATH OF MR. DAVTD BREARLEY <br> SHEFFIMLD DISTRIOT LOSES A PIONDER:

A grast blow, by the hand of death, wis inflicted on the Exevcise Ienerally, and on the Sheffielal aren paticularly, by the death af David Brearley, who sucmmber to a shampatack of pheumonia on Palm Sumaty. He was ist the weckly 1 ractice at Bolsterstone on the Tuesday and alpout his business on the Werluesday before lis death,
Rorn at Bradfold on the $131 h_{1}$ A midi, 1655, Mr-. Brearley first came into totch with ringing on the six bells in the church there, but lifs ribeirg as well as his busines life was centred at, Bolsherstone, where he worked hard to get the present neal of eight installed. in the year 1892, awd where he raised and tinght a band to ring them, and kept
compang together whell the difficulties were great, fine encouragemond of those in affice non-existent aud the raw material hard to get hold of. But he stuck it; he climbed the hill from Deepcar, Sunday and practice nighte stormy or fair", out of sleer love of the art, and now has left it, full of a right obirit, and bis memory will not be effaced during the lives of the youngest of his pupils whose respect for him anounted, to affection.
Mr. Brearley's nctivities were by no means confined to Bolsterstone, be being one of the band who determined to raise the practical stendard of ringing in thie neirhbourhood, sad entered into method ringing with all hin energy with what success his peal recort amply demonstrates. His peal book contains ovar 190 peals, of which gome 30 were in the Surprise Methods (London, Dambridge, Yorkshire Peterborough and Superlative), and a good number of Double Norwich Major and Royal. He also took parto in a 10,464 of Bob Major nad 11,232 of Kent
Treble Bob.
$A_{A}$ a builder and contractor ho was widely known and lighly respected. In the yens 1902 he was placed head of the poll for the Triman District Council, polling 50 per cent, more votes than the second. Taking a full shave of gommittree work, as well as duties of ohairman, magistrate, otc., his business ablities found full seope and his nature Whe unspoiled by quccess. He was the same David Brearley in 1920 s when the writer rang his first peal with him in 1890.
He was laid to rest in Bolstergione Churchjrard, the whole country. side being present to pay their- last tribute, the church weing erowdea. The Vicar (the Ret. F. M. Brooks) officiated, and the organist and choir were in attendance. The mufticd hells added theis plaintive tomes to the last sad bites, and a course of Grandsire Triples wis rume ver the apen grave after the commitial,
A mafflerl pen was aticmpted furing the eveniter, but was lost, a guarterneal being accomplished under the conductorship of Ilr. George Lewis. $A$ muffled peal of Superlative was rimg at Norton by sone of those who had rung many good peals with him, and one of Treble Aob wos later rung on his own peal by a majority of lis pupils. so we lenve him to a well-earned rest. ## SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUILD. GUEST心 OF THE BISHOP.

When a few weeks ago the Bishop expressed a wish to enlertaia tho Salishury Diocesan Guild in the Palaco Gronnds at Salisbury it wis felt that guch an honour was one which would justify the management committee in arranging to hold the aumual meeting in the city. This meeting, which took place on Saturday, May 8th, will in
deed pass down to hislory as a reritable " red-letter ' day. By trinn, cycle and motors of various sizes and degrees of comfort. thr members anrived in the mother cilv, some unfleraking a journcy of over 60 miles in order to be present, for this huge diocese. barly gerved by railways, is uphards of 100 miles luelween its extreme proints. However, obstacles only exist in order that man's ingenuity may overcome thern, and overcome them they did to a remarkable decrob, for moariy 400 were present ut one time during the alternoon.
Ftre new president the Eand of Shaftesbiry, took the chair at the business meetiag held in the Church Fouse and a capital chatman he marle. In finanking the menbers for his election he made an exvellont eperoch on the uses of bells and the impressions ihey left on blicemind of hlay aremge matn. Tle surprised not an few by the infomation of the dificulties the himself had experienced when endewonning to overcone what he termad the s wild, wilful, wnyward action of a bell when in the louds of a nowice, and the ease with which, it can be manipulated by the quadified ringer. He strongly urged a to work till eftery lower in the diocese was aftilited to the Guilif.
luling fo the mublication in the report of the final roll of honour and roll of service. Jic stated that to be president of a suild of between soren and eight hundred menbers, of whom no less than five hundreal and twenty-five that joined some branch of H.M. forces-the greater part of them woluntarily-was an lonour anvone miglat be proud or, unt one far which wowis semmed allogrother inedeguate to express the feelings while to the memory of the fifty-six who lad given their bives he paid th most elaquent and sympathotic tribute.
The officels, with reag slight alterations, were reselecemt, and the Master (Majol Hughes D'Aell), in replying on their luelalf, gave goms' good advice to the ringers on the necessity of combined practices for Ligher methods, open leads, and improved striking. These remarks were giren in such an eirmest, homely manner that they wemb fighi home and cloubtless improvemeat will result, He apologised for (we fact that the finest peal of eight in the city was tmapailable, and mmarked that the verg traciesmen who offered obleotion to their beiteg rung ware those who were bevefiting by the visit of 400 peopla to the city that day. Again his remarks went "home, for before the mecting was elosed, word was passed round ihat St. Thomas' bells would be avaidable from 2.30 till 5.30 .
The enggesteta alteration to rule 2 brought forth a lengthy diseussion, aml it whs left to the officers to re-daft this rule according to the wislies of the menbers.
Then came the Guild service in the Cathedral. And what, service it was! One of those servicos which so beatifully solonilid in ils rlignils and simplicity, mosl assuredy left its mark on many a ringer whose home is in some remote rillage of old Wessex. As the ringers took their seats Dr. Alcock gave an exhibition of his skill on bule organ. "I'lhen came the procession of chorr and clemby. How many ringers' Guids lave ever been oo fortunate to have ussembled for their benefit, a Bishop. two Archdeacons, Ganons bolh resifentiary and honorars, fhe Chancellor of the Cathedral the Precentor, and clergy holding less important posts? Yet such was the procossion which the riugers rose to meet.

In the main, the Guild's service was incarporated with ordinary emensong. The first lescon was read by the Earl of Shaftesbury, and the second bs Archdeacon Oarpenter. Besides fhree hymas from the service. the char gave a beatiful rendering of one of S . Wesles's anthens, which was listened to with rapt admiration.

Then caune the sermon by the Bishop. Hea prefaced his discourse by remarking that owing to the threateming nature of the weather lie had deemed it wise to have tea in the Church House, but trusted the ringers would make full use of the Palace Grounde. Josing his sermon on tho text, 'I magnify my' office,' he preached a most helpful discourge poining out that in many ways people nowaday were anxious La magnify themselves rather than the office or place they filled m the work. The one was phire selfishness, while the olther showed such at love for the thing they undertook that all ideas of solf were effaced, and only the matter in hand or the interestg of ihose who assisteil to carig out such matter were thought of. These lessons he brougla hone to his hearers in many ways, not the least being the way iu which such lessons were ospecially applieablo to ringers.

The service over. most of the visitors wenderl their wity back to floe
 pents amongst so many ringers? - others on simbtrsbeing bent fand ao the parry gradually hroke up. Tias weather. Whough dull, forlumately kept finc ald day.
Ringing oll such days as tlese camot by any stretely of imasination be called ' great,' but the opportunity of meeting widely separatoi ringing friends is so pery great that these big E.fluerings aro gatid: juslified. It was in this why that the ringers by wisithag Snlisbury, took their share in the 7001 h nimiversay of the fomming of the proment. Calhedinn.

Dear Gir,-In wiew of the Central Conncil meoling on Whit-Tuedar nud of item 9 on the egenda, I should be glad if you can had space for this letter re the dafinition for a Surprise Method.
If we exanino auy Major method with Plain Boly coursing order we shall find as loarl onds the following simple transposition rowe, whit not necessarily ip, the order here given:-

The proving value and the face value of ach soparabe row ate identical, and it would bo instructive to learn the true reason why it is sugfested that any one of the last six rows may be used for the first lead end of a Surprite Methorl, but not the first row.
It will be obvious to ever'yone that second's place could not be made at the end of fitst leads rihen the simple transposition row is 12436597, otierwise rounds would turn up; it is equally obvious that when ine simple trensposition row at first lead end is 13054768 there is no altermative but to make second's place if a method is to be oblained. Either of the remaining five rows can be used as iflst lead end, with or without second's place, but they are still simple trensposition rows just as much as the two first mentioned.
It should be understood by everyone that 7th's or 2nd's place next the treble, or any other bell, does not alter the coursing onder of the bells, but on the other hand epery other interal place is a bob pure and simple, and the coursing order is altored according to the bob or bobs used.
A brief consideration of these facts by these interested will, I think, be quite suffaient to upset any attentpt to tamper with tue definition for a Surprisa Method that has now lepell recognised for a mumber of years.-Yours faithfully,
