## MORE ENCOURAGEMENT WANTED.

A lew weeks ago we urged upon Associations the importance and value of making greater efforts to interest the six-bell ringers, pointing out that in many cases very little is done to encourage the men in these towers to advance in the practice of Minor methods. It opens a field for much useful work, and needs to be approached in a broader spirit than that displayed in the policy of holding an occasional district meeting at a six-bell tower. In one or two notable cases combined practices at six-bell towers have become a regular part of association work.
There is, of course, every reason why the men of sixbell towers should not only be welcomed to belfries with rings of eight orsmore bells, and encouraged to become proficient on the higher numbers; but it should also be recognised that eight, ten or twelve bell ringing is not in itself the be-all and end-all of ringing. There are hundreds of six-bell towers throughout the country where men have little prospect of going, as a matter of regular. practice, beyond the range which these limited rings offer, and the object of every Association being to encourage the art of change ringing, this limitation ought to be more fully recognised and greater opporfunities made of raising the standard of the methods rung. There are many sixbell bands who have nothing to learn in the way of striking, and who set an example which not a few companies ringing on higher numbers cotld well aflord to emulate, yet so far as encouragement in their own branch of the art is concerned, they receive none from their parent Association, or at most only a kincf of patronising approval.

A real active policy, generally adopted, and not acted upon, as at present, in a few isolated cases, is required, and good results would soon be apparent. Even the eight and ten bell men would, on their part, find a new interest if they would seriously tackle the ringing of the mulkitudinous methods which are now practised on six, and extend these operations to the performance of spliced extents. The gain would, therefore, be mutual, and we hope to see Associations before the summer is out planning measures by which they will be able to extend practical and regular help to their six-bell towers, and especially to those who are backward in the campanological sense. It is often said that those ringers who desire to get on will make their own opportunities of doing so. This is true, for they succeed despite all the discouragements. How much more, therefore, might be done by giving these men full encouragement and a greater incentive to progress? For every one who now gains proficiency by self-made opportunities, hail a dozen might be set upon the high road to success.
