## PRESERVATION OF TOWERS $\overbrace{}^{\circ}$ BELLS.

In the letter of the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings which we reproduced last week, there are two things upon which the society dwells with emphasis. The first is a plea for the preserlvation of old bells. With this, all ringers will agree in principle, but it is seldom one finds more than one, or at any rate two, realiy old bells in a tower when augmentation or lestoration takes place, and these are seldom bells of any quality in point of sound. Usually to retain them in a ring would be to spoil the whole, and the best way of preserving such bells is to take them out of the ring altogetter and place them elsewhere in the Church for safe keeping, where they can be admired for their antiquity by future generations. In many cases, of course, the old bells have to be sacsificed towards the cosi of the new, and it would be an act of practical utility on the part of the society if in these cases it provided the necessary funds to save these ancient belts.

The second point of the society's letter is the question of bell frames in which, as we pointed out last week, they give it as their considered opinion that teak or oaks are better than iron or steel. The question of wood being better for sound is an empty theory which has never been proved in connection with a bell frame, and seeing that when a bell is struck by the clapper, the sound bow is well above the frame, it will be seen that the material of which the latter is made is most unlikely to have the slightest effect. But the question of sound is of little importance compared with the safety of the tower. One advantage which is urged by the society is that a wooden frame has more resilience, and for this reason transmits strains more gently to the bearing points. Now, if resilience means anything in this connection, it means springiness in the movement of the frame, and it has been proved by scientific experiment that when a bell swings in a spring frame the cumưlative effect is a much heavier thrust or blow on the tower caused by the synchronising of the period of the spring in the frame and the period of the force due to the swinging of the bell. It has also been scientifically proved that the more rigid the frame and the more soliclly its base is fixed so as to tie the tower walls, the less is the strain on the walls and the less the power of disintegration. The natural sirinkage of wood, the warping which must almost inevitably take place, and the consequent loosening of tecons, in course of time turn a wooden frame into a battering ram such as no weil-constructed iron frame could ever become, and we should like to see these facts made as widely known to Church anthorities as the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings has endeavoured to make its own questionable ideas. This could be done through theCentral Council who could also offer to any needing advice I the services of their Towers and Belfries Committee.

The actual risging is a real part of the serriec-the organist's music for the singing, the attendance at the altar, and minister's prayers, and all who attend to give their heip are part of the same. . . . It is just as possible for riagers to worship by the peating of bells as thowe who minister by other duties in the church.
After referring to the important decisions made by mersbers of the National Assembly last February, which were decidedly to the advanagge of the ringer as a voluntary church uorker, the speaker reminded his hearers that ringers are ministers of the church, and in their daily life, apart from their ansociations with tower and beils, shouk live ur to an ideal, ever if one care short of the standard attempted; and he asked them to heln the ministers by their prayers and their work.

## BELERY GOSSIP.

The publication of 1 eat periormances has now heen brought un la dute, and we trust conductors reapmsible for seadiag in reports wil] in firture do so immediately after peals have been rung, so that we may keep abreast of them. 'lhosy who ring peals on Saturdays should sead in their reports to reach this offee not later than the following Monday.

The same remarl applies to meetings. If serretaries will send in brief reports to reach our office on Monday or firsis post Tuesclay we will do our best to find room for then in the following lwiday's issue.
On Sunday falls the annivirsary of one of those great feats mbeli characterised the rivalries of the College Fouthe aud the Cumberimeds in the hatter part of the eightenth contury. This particular men was 12,000 of Treble Bob Roysl rung at Shonediteh on March Zith, 1784, by the Cumberland Youths, and was the culminating perforniance in the competition batureen the two societies. This Treble Ten record stood for over a century, and the wording of the tahlet in the belfry is intenesting.

Saturdisy, March 27th, 1784, the Sowiety of Cumberland Youths Fang in this steople a compleat prant, consisting of 12,000 olianges of Treble Boh Ropal, with 60 courses, and was performed in 9 lirs, and 5 mins. The lemgih of time and the muaterly manner in which it was rung will remain a surviving bonour to the pertomers. It is allowed by all compatent judgea in the noble art to be the grantest Herformance over done on bin bells. The performers were: Geo. Gros 1, James Barnard 2, Tranels May 3, Thos. Reores 4, Lsajah Bray 5, Jimes Patrick 6, Wm. East 7, Abratam Smith B, Malachi Cannon 9, Allen Grant 10. Composed and oalher by George Gross, sen.'

Fohn Tichborte, a prominent Cumberland at that fime, wrote the following linas on the peal, whioh are still pregerred:-

Come, ringers all, and view this chumh, within the sleejle door
Twolve thousind Oxfond Treble Foh was rumg in eightw-follr,
Ir hours nine and minutes fipe, the Cumberlands did compleat,
And on the twenty-sewenth day of March, the College Youths they beat.
Suecess unto the Cumberlands wherevar they do go,
That they may always have success to beat their lasulaty foe !
The peal, which this porformanca eclipsed, wes 11,080 by thu College Youths on the same bollis on Hasy 19th, 1777.
Another annifersary which Sonday next prorides, is that of I0,00h Grandsire Caters at New Collego, Oxford, on March 27th, 1815.

A\& Warsop, Notts, where Lliefe is a proposal to awgent the existing four bells to eight, there is a chatge ringing band who practise 29 rariations of four-bell ringink. We are asked whether any other band with only four bells can ring more methods than this.

And, by the way, alihough he is no nowioe, Bert Latugdons performancs in putting the 11th brough the peal in 3 lts .50 mins. was by no means a bad achievernent.

In this column last weak, reicrence wat made to the weight of St. Mury's tenor bell at Notingham. The ariginal weight was 34 cwit $2 \mathrm{grs}$.8 lbs., but owing to the remowal of the enuons, she is sligitly less กоस.

The figures of the peal of 10.260 Grandsire Caters rung in that Iower in 1778 sre still in existenco, but the fatut that fber are nou in W. D. Croft's handwriting makes it rather doulntful if be did compose the yeal. Tradition rays thet loth the Leicester and Nottiugham peals werts the work of a Leicestor man.

## THIPDE CONTIZOVERSIAL POINTY

## To the Editot

Dear Sir,-Your article list week in which you refer to bell frames and also bell tunitge emholdens me to offer a few commonts. I regret that they are somewhat controversial, but on the other hand many may, on reflection, think that there is sonething in the pointi I ondeavour to make.
Thetse are three molern ideas which are generally asocopted at their statemeat value, viz, that it is bad to wedge up frames to tower walls; that iron are infinitely superior to timber frames; that Simpson's method is the last word in bell tuning. Your article indeet admits to the fwo latter, and some correspondence in support of the first appeared remently in your columns.
I beg to Les allowed Lo muke the statement, that though there is an underlying tiuth in all three, I mm certain that each can be met with a direct negetive. I firmly hold this view now, after baving been formerly of a difterenc opinion, I am supported, too, by several of my ringing friends. The iollowing points вге purposely put with brevity
(1) That if the tower be a strong one, ilje frame is the fetter for being wedged up, but with judgment, of course.
(2) That a properly designed hardwood frame is to be preferred to iron. It is efually stmong and rigid, and by very far the more durable.
(3) That any material 1uning on Simpson's principle is offensive to a musical ear; inasmuch as if substitutes a brassy and nasal value for that beautiful liquid and harp-like tone which is the characteristic; of a yood English bell. -I am, youts faith fully

The chureh is situated on a hill, aud the tower, whinh is over 1 , and years old, can lue seen, and the hells haard for miles. The ringers, now sower in number, are all members of the North Notts Association, and there are three honorary mambers. Change ringing is indulged in as far as iour bells will memoit, and 29 pariations of the 8 ehanges are rung. The tower hand are indebted to Mr. . . Morris, of Leiceeter, who arranged most of these methods.
