## THE PEALS OF 1920.

The peals analysis for the year 1920, compiled by the Committee of the Central Council, appears in this issue, and is again full of interest, for compressed into the compact tables and the concise report of the Committee is a wealth of detail which covers a twelvemonth's activities of the peal ringers. A study of the principal table reveals many features of a satisfactory nature and encouraging to those who are watching for the recovery of the art after the years of war. First of all we thave the fact that the number of peals ruag in the year was 423 more than in 1919, which is an increase of something like 40 per cent. The average point value of the peals has not increased, but there is one view from which it may be argued that this is not a matter for regret. A detailed comparison of the figures with 1919 shows that there was a hundred per cent. increase in the number of Surprise peals rung, the total being 128 in 1920 against 64 in the preceding year. That being the case, there must have been a large increase in the number of peals in the simpler methods, and it is ouly logical to assume that this indicates many ringers taking their first steps in peal ringing. There are very few instances indeed where peals of any particular class showed a drop last year; but one of the most noteworthy is Stedman Caters on tower bells, which fell from 47 to 37 , aithough this is exactly compensated for by a rise of ten in the number on bandbells. Possibly, some of the falling off is accounted for by the increase in the number of peals of Cambridge Royal. Compared with 1919, the peals in 1920 on twelve bells were 46 against 33 ; on ten bells 156 against 116 , on eight bells go5 against 680, on six bells 270 against 162 , on five bells 94 against 57 .
Amogg individual Associations we find Norwich and Ipswich, who rang most peals (79) in 1919, again rang most in 1920-exactly 100 more, with 2490 points against ro89. Kent, who were third in total number in 1g19, were second with 114 peais in 1920. In lotal number of points Norwich and Ipswich is also first for last year and the Middlesex Association is second, their 65 peals having produced 1696 points. In point value for peals, Durbam and Newcastle, helped by their handbell peals of London Surprise, have a fine average of 33 points for each of the 21 peals rung. This is a much higher average than any Association gained in the previous year, when the College Youths had the best average with 26.54 for ${ }^{2} 4$ peals rung. With three times as many peals, however, Middlesex is second with an average of 26 , which must be looked upon as a very high standard, for out of their 65 peals, 22 were rung in plain or treble bob methods.

tion with no fewer than 179 peals in the year is an achievement which merits attention, and shows a rapid revival throughout this big area. Norwich and Ipswich have for some years enjoyed the reputation of ringing the greatest number of peais, and this indicates that they have in their ranks a very considerable proportion of men of peal ringing ability, for, except at Leeiston, there is no prolific peal scoring bad at any one tower. One other thing cannot be passed over without mention, and that is the labours of the Peals Analysis Commitee. Its work is growing heavier, but the task is discharged with the same accuracy and care as has always marked its efforts, and not only the Council but also the Exercise ought to be deeply grateful to the Committee.

## REPORT OF THE ANALYSIS COMMITTEE

The tualysis of peals rung in Lgen stows in sulistantial iucrease in the toial，which was orily three less than the cotal of 1908．It is stilt a long way（ 888 pealis）behind the record of 1913，but it was not to be ：xpected that thatt buge fizure should sa soon be reacted once more．
of the $1,47 \mathrm{peals}, 1,301$ were rung ou tower bells，and 170 on hand－ hells．Our instrnctious from the Council are to arrange the Associa， yions in alphabetical order（cf．＇Ringing Worlh，＇Vol．xiv．p．241，and Tol．xv．，p．315），and we accordingly precent the Analysis in that form．
The Norwich and Ipswich Diocesan Association has the largest uum－ her，both of peals and points，viz， 179 and 2,490 ．Of these peals， 153 were rung ons lower helis，and 26 on bandbells．The only other As－ sociazion to reach a total of thiee figures is the Kent Country Associa－ tion．114，all on tower bells．The second highest number of poin1s nelongs to the Middlesea Association， 1,696 ， 56 peants on tower and 4 on handbells．Thie Winchester Diocesan Guild rang the greatest num－ her of handbell peals， 32,27 of these being Graudsire Triples．

Thero nre still instances of extraordiflary dilatoriness in reporting peals．one，0．g．，rung on January 14 th ，was not published till May 7 th！With the welcome enlargement of＂The Ringing World．there can he no further excuse for this．It is not too much to asks that those who seud reports of peals should seo that any errors，either their own or the printer＇s，be immediately corrected．One zinger，for example，allower a y peal，desesibed as＇＇Stedman Trinles－Holt＇s Ori－ ginal．＇to be uneorsected，and his exenso was－＇Printer＇s perror，not grime：We would point out that，by not correcting the error，he
made it his own．Among other evidently incoreect statements wat find a peal of Minor，which is sidi to consist of two 520＇s of St． Clemenl＇s and fwo 520＇s of Pluis1 Bolb：＇This can hardly be a ＂printer＇s error．＂One peal was published as rang at Brimhton by the Surey County Association，which we strongly sukpect should bolong to the Sussex County Association，bul no conrection has been made by the conductor or by either of the Associations，and，therefore，it is includeqi in the Surrby peals．Whan the Analysis was completed， two more peals were published on Maveln 18th；one，a peal of Grand－ sire Doubles，＂first peal of Doubles iy all except the conductor，＇ whose name was not given，rung as long as September 18th；the Other，a peal of Treble Bob Minor with two conductors，rung on November 27 th ．It is to be holnod that those responsible are not so ailatory in their business as in this matter．In accordance with the Council＇s instructions，these peals are not included in the Analysis．

Our Chairman＇s letter to＂The Thinging World＇of Jamary 14th has given rise to the suggestion haid the Aualssis Committee shoula deal with the question of the unines to he given to peals in two or more already mamed Methods spliced together，such as the so－called Worcester Treble Bob Major．＇The letter，of course，only referred to the names given to Minor Methnds．several of which have been rung under two or more names，and the Committee hope to receive the help of Minor ringers in the matter．The other question seems to lye out of the province of the Committee，but it is one with which the Council or the Methods Committee anisht be asked to deal．With regard to＂Worcester，ther name is already given to \＆Minor Method． and the Committee think it would be better to keep to the nomencla－ ture，already to be found in Foltaustall（pp． 583 and 588），and Snow－ don＇s＇Treble Bob，＇p． 18.

## DEATH OF MR. FERRIS SHEPHERD.

## ONE OF DEVON:S PIONEWRS.

The death of Mr. Ferris Shepherd, wemri, book flace at Hershum, Surrey, on Friday last. For some time phat he had been a gecat suffever from asthma, and duriug the past winter his strength gave way. During dite two last monthe he was ohliged to keep to lis bed, and glowly, but swely, in spite of a good constitution and care ful nursing, his strengtiz ebbed away.
During lis illness, which he hove with great patienee, he matntailaed a cheerfol spinit, and displajed fuibs eodurance to tho gnd.
Mr. Farris Shepherd came Prom 4 good old family of ringers, well known throughout Dewon aud the West of Elygand. Born of sipht 30 th, 1857 , he commencel ringing early in life, and lis linst peal was If peal of Grandsire Trinles at St. Sitwolls, Eveter, in whicir tre rang the 4 th. Change ringing in Dovonshice was practically untrown in those days, and the attitude cowards half-pull ringers and riaging was very hostile it many places. This opposition continued for many years, but step by step, by sheer hard work aud by the influence of the Dewon Guild, a small inmber of workers, of whom Mr Shepherd wis oae, gradualiy mude chauge ringing more widely bnown. In 1884. Mr. Shepherd conducted a peal, in which his three brothers ulso took part, In 1887 he conducted tho tirst peral in Dorset, and shortly alter the eight at St. Sidwell's, Exoter, was increased to lem, be conducted the first peal of Catert ever rung in Devonshire. The forst peats of Grandsire Caters and Stedman Triples an 'lamiton were conducted by

From 1879 to 1904, M-. Shephord raug nearly 70 peals in the West of England, mostly for the Devon Guilu. Of these the conducied over 30 , and wheu one comes to woigh these facis-scattered districts, the few change ringors, the opposition to half-pull ringing, and other difinculties-stuch a record is very worthy of a ringer who spont une best part of 25 years in teaching lrunds the art, of change ringing throughout a county such as Devons. On October Eth, 1902, Mr. 3coptherd took part in the first peal on the bells of Exeter Cathedral, and when he left Ereter for Ireland in 1904, he was presented with a beantiful nddress, togethes with a handsome gold chain atd rendant by tha Devan Guild.
From 1904 to 1909. Mr. Shepherd was vesizent at Arklow, Ireland, and during his stay there l'ang in numier of peals, mostly at Arklow with Mr. J. W. Washbrook. For the lash twelve Jears deceased lived at Fersham, Surrey, and, together with his sons, took up ture vinging, in addition to the, other branches of the art. Always cheerfu! in disposition, his delight was fo trail yonng hands, and many a bend owe their earty staps in ringing to his untiring energy. itis total nunber of peals was 113 , inchaing three bandibell peads, one of wirh was rang by himself and his three sons, Just over twelve months ago be ran his last quarter-peal. the bund comprising four Woodrow's and foul Shepherd's. Fre had long desired to ring a quarter-peal with Mrs. W. Shepherd. wife of one of his sons, and this event prattically brought his ringing life to a rloze. The funeral took place on Wedneslay, ot Hersliam.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

Of all the anniversaries that ringers might well colebrate, that of the first recorded peal might well take precedence. This was Grandsire Bob Triples (probahly what we now know as Plain Bob), and Was rung on May 2nd, 1715, at St. Peter Mancroft, Nowich. The peal board is still in existence.
On May lst, 1842 , the first peal of Cinques in Yorkslire was rung at Leeds, and May 7th is the anniversary of a 12,312 Grandsire Caters in 7 hours 44 mins., at Painswick, 104 Years ago.
Our recent reforence to James Barham, of Leeds, Kent, has led Mr. T. E. Slater, of Glemsford, Sultolk, to send us some interesting purticulars. He has a cony of Jamee Barham's book, in which are recorded 96 peals by this great ringer with the Leeds Youths, and 20 with the Lenkem Soclety. His last peal was ming on July 8th. 1817, at tha nge of 91 gears.
Mr. Slater sends us a quorstion from the ' Bury Post' of 1788 , which will put an previous clajms by ledies into the shade. The firsit peal in which n member of the gentler sex took part was, according to this, Fung 133 years ago. Under the heading of 'Eury News,' the paragrand states; A few days since was rang at Nowton, near this town, on a set of handbells, a compleat peal of 5.040 changes bisob Major, in 3 hours and 14 minutes, the tenor of wich was rang by a
girl only 13 years of age.

The band at. St, Catherine?s Church, Gorseinon, Sontt Wales, hare prosented the hev. D. A. Jones with a silver hell inkstand as a mark of then eatem, upon his leaving the marish. Mr. Jones has been one of the ringers at St. Catherine's Chuwh, and the ringers have much apprewiatetis his fellowship.

It is now quite certain that 13 years is not the earliest age at which a lons has mus a tower bell peal. At the age of 11 yeare $41 /$ months, Frederick James Bowley rang the reble to a peal of Grandsire Doubles ${ }^{5}, 150$ changes) at Kirby Muxlee, on July 6th, 1920, having been a servine tinger before he was nine. He bas a younger brother also nged nine, who can ring the treble. Another who scored a pead while he was eleren was Mr. James F . Duffield, who rang the treble to a peal of Rob MLajor, at Pullatm, Norfolk, on Feb. 10th, 1912. We have some recullaction, howeper, that a son of Mr. J. W. Wasthroot rang a pmal aven vounger than this.

Sir Oliwer Ladge teils ws that his son Raymend, from the obser world, said that tine vicious are sent to a place which $\mathrm{j}_{\mathrm{s}}$ " not helf exactly; where " they gravitate nyether, but get so boted." To which a theologian bas returted, "One might venture to say that it is exactly hell. It is net pecessary to believe int these revelatipus in onder to derm a lesson lirony them.
Ringers can get a better idea of the jnfiuity of God whan most people. We know that we can only undersandid our Art by strictly limitiag it. We begin with changes on at very fiew bells, and never go heyond those on twelve. Yeh we know that there are an infinte number of changes, which dre nuite beyond our power to conceive, and yet hiki everything else) are held in being by God, the Absolute and Infinite. We can inagine how much nove glorious aud beautiful the whanges on sixteen bells would be either to listen to ar to ring, than any we now uso. We can imagine all the uninteresting clanges in the one octave rendered attractive by what is missing being added in the other octave; or we ann imagino now principles by which fill uninteresting changes are eliminated. And all this is only a step ont of our reuch. What are the possibitities of Infinity?
On the other hand, how noending may be the tedium of dulaess. Think of P Plain Changes on 16 bells; on of a parody of Stedman in which all the bells behiud make places instead of dodging. Or iwagine men who know about the best there is of change ringing, and are capable of appreciating it, deloberately spending all their lives in discussing the possibilities of changes on four hells only. Would they not feel to hored and have made their own bell?
There is nothing that can prepare a ringen's leart for the worshipping of the God of ouder and of whage. like the har mouy of well-sturuck changes, leading to their fore-ordained eud ith a musical order. But if aftor having thus received boldmess to enter into the holiest,' be turns rway and " neglectg so great salwation," has he not in similar manner made his own hell? Nay", hut we will "drat near with a hase heart in full assurance of fajth," and hear those flings "which it is not lawful for a man to utcer.' JEELBFF'T DRAKE.
