## CENTRAL COUNCIL BUSINESS.

A perusal of the agenda of the Central Council shows that there is a full day's work for the members when they meet in London on Whitsun Tuesday. There is more than sufficient preliminary and routine business to occupy the Council until well past the luncheon interval, especially if the members, as they are sometimes inclined to do when they enter fresh upon a meeting, spend their time in discussing trivialities. There are no less than seven committee reports to be considered, as well as the election of officers and of eight committees to take place, and there are, in addition, motions of some importance set down for debate. In dealing with the early business, therefore, the members will be well advised to have an eye upon what is still before them, and we hape the Council will take the opportunity also, of officially visiting the Cenotaph and depositing a wreath there in memory of the one thousand ringers who fell in the war, as has been suggested in these columns.
Of the three motions already down in the agenda for discussion, there are two which we think will commend themselves wholly to the Council; we refer to that suggesting the setting up in every Diocese of a recognised authority to give advice on matters concerning church bells, and that which calls attention to the need for, a Ringing Defence Committee. With regard to the former, some few associations already have, we believe, a 'committee of advice,' altbough we are not quite sure that their function bas been exactly what is intended by the resolution now to come before the Council. In principle the proposal bas everything to commend it, but to make it successful in practice, if carried out, the Associations who appoint the Committees will have to exercise the greatest care in their selection. In this matter the best ringer, or the most popular member, may not necessarily be the best adviser on a technical subject of this kind, and incompetent advice would be worse than noge at all.
To the recent proposal to put ringers under the jurisdiction of the Parochial Church Councils, as well as sporadic attempts made in various districts to get Church bells silenced, may be attributed, we presume, the suggestion for a Ringing Defence Committee, and that there is need for such a body in the ringing organisation seems fairly obvious. One of the objects of the Council itself was, we believe, to look after the interests of ringing in this as well as in other respects, and there is no doubt that a small, alert committee, prepared to grapple at a moment's notice with any threataned attack upon the position of ringers or ringing would be a great advantage. We hope that the Committee, if appointed, will include at least one member with legal knowledge and experience appointed from within the Council, or co-opted from without.

## HINTS FOR BEGINNERS.

## 边HE DASIESH WAT TO CALL PEALS OF GRANDSIRE

Anong tha correspondents who have written to ask me to helps them is one who inquires which is the easiest way to call a peal of Grandsire Triples. A good deal, of coums, depends upon the capabili= ties of the conductor and the amount of provious practice he has had is calliag lemohes. Given ample prachice in tesuch.calling, a peal ought really to present few difficultios, and yet it is almost inevitably the case that the beginner at peal calling finds the fask a big one. It is, I supnose, hecause of the added impritunce of the occasion, and the greater vesponsibility involved, not only by the loager lenglt that is to Jny attempted aud the extra mental strain, but by reason of the fach that in error hear the finish may render valueless, perhaps, |hree hours' efforts of eight men, while there is with some people just ithat touch of excitement to be contended with which comes when thes are put to ary real test. These influences combine to make the calling of a peal no easy undertaking for the beginmer, and, simple us it may bo for the old hand, I for one do not belittle the job of " first as conductor,' even if it is only a peal of Doubles. Indeed, the correct counting of the six-coores rung in a peal of this kind, where every "part emt " is the same, is a thing which in itself requires no menn mental effort.

When it comes to calling peals, then any method by which the young conductor can bee eertsin of his pround as be proceeds, is nt great advantage. In my view the easiest course for a begimner to purate is ta select a peal with as simple a calling as possible, learn by hearf the phuces in which the observation bell will come af each enll, and then rimg tho observation bell. There may be some conductors who may not agree with me in this, but my opinion is that this methon (for beginners) is the safest as well as the easiest. If one calls ly the bells ' before'-and I have in mind Folt's tea-part, to which hegimers ase so partial, and which has one bell geven tims luefore in ench part-there is it danger, muless one takes special precantions by making check observations, of evror in the number of limes this "hal] is bobbed 'befores' But if the conductor is ringing the observation bell he las only his own position to look for, and not that of two other bels, which mould he uecessary if depending on the other systems.
With regard to the eelection of a meal, the one divided into tbr lacgest number of parts is usually the easiest to remember, geverally becanse there are fewer calls to memorise. One of the best peals for The beginmer is Parkors twelwe-part, for while there are more calls
in tho 420 changes comprising eacit part of this peal wain there urt in the 504 changes of one part of Holt's ten-part, there is only, olle form of calling to remember, wheress in Foits there is a diferent calling (reckoned by the order of the places in which we observation tell falls at the bobsj for mach half. Some ringers, of course, have a mure retentive memory then others, and wauld be ablo to fackle at the frst attempt something more involved than either Ifolts ur Parker's peal, but as $I$ have beou asked for the easiesti way, 1 buve eried to answer my correspondent from that wiew only.

While on the subject of conducting, I will deal with the inguiry ol another correspondent, who asks: "Supnose I wisk to conduct a touch from any bell expepting tenork and treble, and use calls ass if ringing the fonor, would the touch come into round g by continuing riaging tili the rall-bell was at home, or would there bo a dungen of the tenots coming up the wrong widy or the other bells leing mis-phaced: The bells in mind are a peal of eight, and the methods rung Plain Bab, Grandsire, Oxfond and Kent Treble Bob.' A simpla answer to this question would be "Sometimes, but I am affaid such a repay would not be of much assistance to my correspondent. Often the substitution of some other bell for the observation lsell will result in the touch coming round right enough, but in Sejor it will in most cases part the temors and upset all the music, whala there is just another little frick that may be plaged upon the anwat" beginutwTake Bob Major as an example. There is a familhar tauch al $2<4$ (two courses) got by calling the tenor $W$ and $H$ twicte. Suppose you attompt to get this fouch by substituting, say, the 2nd as the observadion bell, you will find that before the bells run ronnd you will have rung three courses, and that yon will have had repetition. The proper length can be got by bagiming the calling at a Home, but thr coursing order of the big bells and the music is turnel? topsy-turve. Then with Grandsire Triples; it is not always nossible to clacge the obserwation bell. Suppose you want to call a tanch in which the 7th is the observation bell and no call brings it into the hunt, you cannot substitute the Znd for the 7 th , can you? And even if the obsercations bell does go into the hunt you could not nse the 2nd as a substitute unless you begin the culing in a different place, making the first call that which brings tha observation out of the bunt.
These are only some of the difficulies which prestat theruselves when one desires to stibstitute one bell for another, nad use the same calling. If my correspondent desires to ring some bell other than the observation bell, I should recommend him to practise calliug by transposition; but that, of course, is a different matter, and one which I will deal with at some future date.

Walter Wnshbrook raig his first peal (Grandaine) at 10 years and 3 months; James W., sumr., his first (Grandsire) ot 10 yeare and 6 months; and Harry Waslibrook bis first (Stedman) at 11 years. Jas. W. Washbrook, juns. (Mr. Washlurool's only surviviag son), conductod Holt's ten-parts at the age of 12 years.
This, we thick, will settle the controversy as to the youncest ringer of a tower bell peal, but it does not in any way detract from the morit of the performance of those other young men who have rung peals at ar osriy age. In addition to those whom we bave already mentioned, Mr. John T. Kentish rang his finst tower trell pend at the ago of 13, in September 1891, on the treble, and a few week later rang an inside bell to Grandsime Triples. The two sons of Mr. A. W. Osborne, of Reading, inlmo began farly. Horace rang his fist neal at 12 years 6 months, and Leonard when barely 12 years of age,

Mr. Bert Langdon informs us that ha has not, as we tilought he had, conducted a peal of Stedman Triples, Oaters and Cinguc - "in hand "from every pair of bells; but le anforms us that Mr. G. N. Price, lato of Oxthey, has doue so. Ta also remiuds us of the interesting fact that Mr. Harry Ti. Pasmome has called peals on handbells in Grandsire, Stedman, Plain and Theble Bob on 8 , 10 and 12 bells, and is addition contucted the first Surprise peal rung " donflehanded,' viz., Superlative.
The old peal of six at Mangolsfeld, Gloucester, with tevor 102 cwf., have been recast into a jeal of eighi bs Messrs. Wamer and Sons, and will be reopened on Saturday, May 14th.
