## A DEFENCE COMMITTEE.

Although carried only by a majority of one vote, the decision of the Central Council to form a Ringing Defence Committee was, we believe, a right one. In the course of the derate the discussion rather ran off to a minor issuethat of replying to newspaper attacks upon bells-and it was only by the timely intervention of the Hon. Sec, of the Salisbury Guild that the meeting was brought back to the questions that really mattered most. To set up a central committee to reply to the sporadic attacks which appear in local newspapers in various parts of the country would have been an almost futile action, for these attacks, which may or may not have any reasonable foundation, can usually best be replied to by the incumbent of the church in question, because knowledge of the special facts are essential to an effective answer.

The important point in this matier is to have ready for action a small committee authorised to deal with any wider and general menace to ringing and ringers which might arise fron Parliamentary or official civic action. Such menace might come upon us unawares at any time, and while Alderman Pritohett's lega」 opinion was reassuring when he said that bells could not be suppressed except by Act of Parliament, it is just the risk, as the Rev. LI. Edwards pointed out, that something might slip into an Act which could be construed into a limitation of the use of bells, that presents the danger which ringers as an organist d body ought to be prepared at any moment to combat.

Whether the Literature and Press Committee of the Council, whith in the past has been more conspicuous for what it has not done than for what it has accomplished, was the best Committee to which the duties involved could be delegated is a matter for question. Perhaps the proposer and seconder of the resolution, who hase been added to the committee, may instil more life into the committes, but we would urge that they should not sit down and wait until an attack is sprung upon them. Tiney should prepare some kind of machinery for obtaining eally -information of probable attacks, and dealing with them when they do arise. It is for the Committee to decide how best this can be done, but we would suggest that one of the first ste sthey should take is to find some Member of Parliament who would keep a wary eye for any proposals affecting bells which might be introduced into the Legislature, just as, we feel sure, they may depend upon Canon Baher to watch ringers' interests in the National Assembly. There are one or two Associations which bave Members of the Commons or of the Upper House actively interested in lhetr ringing afolirs, and the services of these could (Continued on page 346.)

doubtless be enlisted. Then, too, we would suggest that the Committee might put themselves in possession of the strictly legal position in which riagers and bell ringing stand in relation botb to the public and the Cburch. Such information, ready collated, would be valuable in an emergency, and might be extremely useful to pass on to incumbents who have to deal with local hostility. In any case, it would be well if the Exercise had a central authority which could supply definite knowledge on a very complicated subject whenever there was need for it. Other directions in which the Commitree may begin at once to do useful work will doubtless suggest themselves to the members, but we put forward these ideas in order that ringers generally may realise that the newly appointed body need not necessarily be a 'wait and see ' Committee.

## THE FREEMASONS' PEAL.

CEREMONT AT ST. CLTMENT DANES.
Many ringers, inchuding members of the Central Council, attended :he service at St. Clanent Danes Ghurch in the evening after the Donncil meetiag on Whitsun Tuesday, when the bandsome marble tablet recording the first Freemasons' peal, was unveiled and dediomed. The Rector (the Rev. W. Pennington Bickford) had arrauged a most beautiful musical service, and the church presented a festal sppearance with the Whitsunide decorations still in place. The Rector concucted the service, and the lesson, which was Longfellow's frmiliar symbol of the belf in " The Golden Legend,' was read by Canon Coleringe.
During the singing of a hymn, tho clergy and choir, accompanied the Bishop of Willesden and Aderman J. S. The kandsome lablet which has beeu given by Bro. G. R. Fardon, the composer aud conduetor of the peal, has the masonic emblem of compasses and square at the top, surmounting the motho ' Nisi Dominus "rustra." It records the peal of 5003 Grandsime Caters rung on Thursday, Derember 4th, 1919. by the Ancient Society of College Youths and the Ancient Free aurd Accepted Masons of Lugrand, as a peaco pesi to celebrate the conclusion of the Great War.' It was the first peat erer rung by Freemasons, and the mames, with the rank and lodge of each ringer which appeared in "The Ringing World" at the timel are set outt, the nane of the Rector, who is Chaplain of St. Tlement Fanes Lodge, being also added.

## A LINCOLNSHIRE TRIP.

Pleasant recollections will remain with all those who, on WhatMonday took part in the outing organised by the Gainsborough Tarish Church Riugers' Guild. Clipton, ole of the assistant clergy, and Mr. Farndon, schoolmaster), travelled by motor charabanc, and first made for Netitlebim, via Harpswell Hill. ## A NOTTINGHAM MEMORIAL PEAL. <br> DEDIOATION OF BASFORD BELLS

In the tower of the old Parish Chureh of St. Leodigarius, Basford, Notes, there now hangs a melodious ring of bells, eigh in number, which havo bean installed as a mernorial to the 220 gallant dead of the distriat who fell in the war. The hells were cast at the famoun Loughborougin foundry, aud ars tumed on Messrs. Taylor's scientatic systam of perfect barmonical tuning. It may be remarked that thas is the first peal in the immediute viciaity of Nottingham that if 60 tuned on this perfected system, and the superiority of these beautrful bells over the mediocre peals which are to be beard in ant around Nottingham is most marked. The three old belk which formerly humg in the tower, although possessing claims to considerable antiquity were so false in their harmonic tones as to be distressingly ummusios in effect, and the music of the new peal will be ibus more noticeabio and appreciated by the parishioners. It may be mentioned in passing that these three old holls, two of which are melted down and incorporated in the new peal, were all casi in Nottinytham, and fle oldest bell of the three, dating probably from about 1490 , was almost cortanty cast by the founder, Richavd Mellour, who was an Aldarman and Mayor of Notingham in the years 1499 and 1506. This oldest bell has twe retained on account of its particuinrly interestios history, and now forms an important archeologien feature of fle charch.

The tenor of the new ring of eight weighs about 15 cwt., note $F$ natural, and the total weight of the bells and fittings, etc., is ove: 10 tons. The fiftings in which the hells are hullg are of modern desiga, and contair all the many improvenents that have been introduced by Mesers. Taylor, perhaps the most jmportant being tha patent bali bearings in which the bells swing. The frmmetrork is of strong and massice construction, of cast iron on stout steel foundatiou, all dosigned with a view to the strain placed on the structure of the towar beinc reducerl to an absolute minimum. Needless to say the work has been carried ont in a pantur which fully uplofis the grent re. putation of tho Loughhorough firm.

A few years later, when the bells were recast, he applied it to the back four succespfully. He subsequently very kiurly gave me pernission to protect and atopt the ider in a slightly diferent form. We hase used the prineiple is a fow cases recently, and the result has been perfectly tatisfactory, bul anj credit atbaching to the idea ought to be given to Mir Wheadon, ta whom I am glad to take this opportunity of tenderjng my best thanks. The differeuce in the two metbods is as follows: Al Dartford the buffers are fitted to the stem of the clapper just nader the ball, and in those we have fitted they are in the ball just whow the slriking part.-Yours faithfully,

The interment took place on Wednesday, Fume Ilth, and the bearers inclurled one of his old ringing company, Ar. F. Smith, white Mr. A. Symonds and bis son, Stedman, were among the mourners. The deceased leawes a widow and wo sons to mourn their lose.
In the erening, after the funcral, it quarter-peal of Grandsire Triples (1. 260 cliages) was rung. with deeply muftled clappers, as a last mark of respect: M. Symonds 1, W. R. J. Poulson 2, S. H. Symonds (conductor) 3, F. Leeks 4, F. Borehrim 5, W. W. J. Roper 6, L. Leeke 7, A. Symonds 8 .

## KINGTON MAGNA RINGERS'EXCURSION.

Fortified by this refreshment, the change ringers of the band brought round some woll-struck six-scores, conducted by A. I. Dowding. About 8 p.m. the bells were yuag down. and a late visit was paid to the meighbouring village of Marston Magna, where, with the Rector's kind permission, a little more ringing was done on six very melodious bells, tuned on the fire-fone principle. The return iourney was then commenced, home being reached about 10.30 p.m., after am expedition long to be remembered.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

Now that the postage rales have been further increased associmuns will find it cheaper, as wolf as being, us it always has been, wore effective to advertise their meetings in "The Ringing World."
The memorial to the late Mr. Henry White, of Basingstoke, which was unveiled and dedicated at St. Michael's Church, in the presence of a large gathering of Winchester Guild singers, bears the following inscription: * To the glory of God and in grateful memory of Henry White, sexton and captain of jell ringers in St. Michael's tower, legs1918, who laboured with untiring zeal for the improvement oi bell ringing and the cultivation of the art of change ringing. Died Sept. $27 \mathrm{th}, 1918$, aged 61 years.'

The pol rung at Wallasey, on June Fth, was a well deserved tribute to Mr. G. H, Rogers, who has done much for the encouragement of ringing in the district in which he resides. About 12 years ago the bells of St. Hilary's had fallen into a very dilapidated combustion, so much so that to ring them constituted a danger. Br y. Rogers, beside being a large subscriber, personally made a house-to-house collection, and eventually obtained sufficient fund to have the bells rehung. Al though not an ardent peal ringer, Mr. Rogers has done much * parl work, in the tutoring of inginners, and has endeavoured to inoculate the spirit of progress and unity amongst all those ringers with whom he is in touch.

Messes. Taylor and Co., of Loughborougl, Lave completed the restoration of Honk's Kirby bells, and added two trebles to make the octave. The old six have been rotumed, and are bung in iron frames on steel girders. The bells were dedicated on Thurging in last week by the Bishop of Coventry.

It is much hoped that when the Oxford Guild war memorial tablet is unveiled in the Cathedral cloisters on the occasion of the annal festival at Oxford, on July 23 rd , it will be free of debt. Contributions should be sent to the hon. General secretary as som as possible. Bewdley bells have a long history. There is a record of them bevalag been rung in 1589 at the rejoicings for the wreck of the Spanish Armada, and in 1697 they were rung for the first time for the "fifth of November.
A new ring of bells was purchased in 1660 , and were lang in the old chapel. built of timber, that stood on the site of the present church. In 1745 this chapel was pulled down, and the existing tower built. In 1780 the bells wore reata and rehung and there they have remained to this day, equal to some of the best in the county.
A most interesting fixate history of the bells of the Collegiate Church. now the Cathedral of Southwell, lase been waiter, aud publisted in celebration of the bicentenary of the bells.

Belts are first mentioned in this ancient foundation iretwon the Years 1050 and 1060, when there was a gift of two bella by the Archbishop of York, and at intervals through the centuries the bells am mentioned again until 1721, when Abram Rudball, of Gloucester, fer cast the peal. The bells were again recast and increased to ten in 1897 by Messes. Taylor and Co.

The history of the bells, which is full of interest, can be obtained from G. E. Padgett, printer, Southoulh, post free, price Gu. Last Saturday the bicentenary was celebrated at Southwest by a visit of Midland Counties ringers.

NDXT YEAK'g MEWTING.
The President eaid the Standing Committee had considered the place of mext year's mealing. The interruption of the rota which bad been tollowed for many years had caused a break in their programme, but the committee suggested that they should next go to Lincoln, leaving for the following year some place west of the central Midlands.
Mr. Cotterill (Yorkghire Agwoiation) gave tho Council an invitation to go to Bradford.
The Rev. A. T, Beeston (Chester Diocesan Guild) proposed that the meeting should be at Chester, which had many aftractions, and where is and been previously suggested thoy should mest. Mr. J. Geo: (hon. member) seconded.

Mr. A. E, Parsons (Worcestershire) reminded the Council that when Chester wai previously suggetcod, Lincoln was also in the list.
On boing submitted to the meeting tho roting was as follows: Lin coln, 31 ; Bradford, 5; Chester, 19. Lincoln was, therefore, decided upon,

## COUNOLL IGNORDD BY ASSOCIATIONE.

The Council was then informed that two notices of motion bad been received too late to ho included in the agenda, but it was decided that they should be considered.
Mr. A. H. Pulling (Winchesier Guid) moved: That this meeting recommend all Guilds and Associations to hold their annual meetings within threa mouths previous to the Central Council meoting on WhitTriestaby." He proposed this, he said, as one means of endecvouring to get the general baxy of members of the Exercise interested in the work of the Counsil. At present they fook not a scrapn of notice of it. At many of the annual meetings not a word was spoken about the Central Councit, and, if they could judge from the reports in . The Ringing World they simply took no notice of it. The Associations novor submitted anything to the Council, but if they all had their meetings just before the Council it might be possible to get them to consider a little more of the Council'e tusiness. It was for that reaeon he proposed they should recommend the holding of anmual meet* ings within the three montis previous to the Council meeting. There was very titfle co-operation hetween the associations and the Council. The Council was a sort of Cabinet, The finging World' like "The Daily Mail," and Mr. Golrismith like Lovd Northeliffe (loud laughter). They might laagh, but if they had an Editor who was not out to do all he could to help them, but was opposed to them, he could break that Comncil up, and he could do it in quick time. They wanted to get the Exercise to take more jaterest in the Councit, and afthough be bardly oxpected they would pass lats resolution, he thought it was worth considering.
Mr. Cpre (Gloucestel and Bristol) said he would second the motion as a matter of form.
The Rev. B. H. T. Drake (Herls County) moved as an amendment. that the Secretary of the Council be chareed to send all resolutions carried at the meeting to the affiliated associations. As a delegate to that Conneil he had rentured to bring up questions at bis own association meetings, and had been mot at once with the answer, "The Central Council never so much as acknowlodge tus, boyond taking the 2s. 6d. from us, und never send us auy information of anything they have carried, but leave us to find out srom the ringing Press what is being done.' Would it not, therefore, be bettor and simpler if the gecretary were to send the resolutions that were carried to the constituent associations in order that they might know offeially whit had been done?
Mr. Biblyy (Chester Guild) said when he gof back to his asociation We would be expected at their first meeting to Eupply the members with a repori not only of the resolutions, but with minnute details of what hadil been done.

The President said he could not accept the Res. B. H. T. Drake's motion as an mmendment. It was a matter of which notice should ba ziven.

Alderman Priteheti (hon. member) said be gathered the object was to give publicity to the existence of the Central Council. He sug. gested the Standing Committee should draw up a specinl form of prayer for the Council to be used at association services, just as they had a praper for Parliament (laughter).
Canon Bager Bedfordshine Association) objected to the use of the term ' delegate ' in connection with the membent of that Council, He git he thought they were representatives. He would not be there If he wre expected to come as a delegate in the sense of being somebody to qote as he was told. A'member was elected freely, and should vole ag ho thonght best. He objected strongly to calling themseives delegates. He also objected strongly to tle suggestion that it was the business of that Council to interfere with the affairs and administration of associations. The Coutril had alwass kept most carefully of that in the past. The assotiations were perfectly free to manage their own busimess, without the interferenre of the Council, and for that resson he conld not support the resolulion, because it cer-
tannly meant interference with the way in whim associations and
guilds managed tbeir own business and fized the dates of their own meetings.
Canon Elsee (Lancashire-Association) asid he felt the mover of chas resolution had a desire only to geb the associations to take a living resolution had a desest in the work of tho Coungil, but at the same time he hoped the resolution would not be pressed. In bis own association they had just discussed at considerable length whether they shoutd change the time of their annual meeting, and after very careful contideration had come to the conclusion that. they had hatter uat change it. They had their meeting in the autumn. It wais quite true that not much tjme was given to the affairs of the Council, becaute there was always a great deal of local business to be got through, but as a matier of interest he noticed that Lancashire had sent its four members and one honorary nember to attend that meeting (hear, hear). He also saw wo Lancashire visitors in the room as well, so that they fid take some interest in the Council (hear, hear).
Mr. Pulling said he was prepared to withdraw his motion. Ho did not oxpect it would be passed, beceuse he knew they conld not interfere with the associations, but if only they could get the Exercise to wake up and look on the Council as the central body of rimging the Council would do some good.

## The resolution was then withdrawn.

## BELL RESTORATION FUNDS.

The other resolntion of which late nstice had been given was one by Alderman Chambers, of the Midland Counties Association, who had infimated bis intention of moviug "that it is desirable to establish in the area of each ringing agsociation a bell ratoration fund from which grants may be made for the restoration of any rings of bells within the area when local fund were insuffient to meet the cosi.'
Alderman Caambers was absent from the meeting, and the President said the Council had always refrained from interfering with the business of the local associations. He took it that practically every association had a fund of this kind, or was ready to make grants. and bie did not see that that Council could give instructions.
It was agreed to allow the motion to lie on the table.

## THANKS.

The Rev. H. Law James moned a vote of thanks to the President, which Canon Baker seconded, the resolution being carried with applause.
In responiling, the Prosident said he had intended moving that cuting his term of offiee there should be no votes of thanks to anybody, lenst of all to tha President. He thankad them, however, very warmly indeed. He was afraid, if in future yoars they were treated to discussions on varjous abstruse questions, such as they had heard in the past from Mr. Iames and ofhers, that he would have to call in to his assistance certain "assessors, to diract him (laughter), because there wete some things far above lis head. He was simply a plain, practical ringer, but it would he bis esinest endeavour to uphold the dignity of the Conncil as it was upheld by its founder, and in this lie was sure he would have the assistance of the members (spplause).
The megting then terminated.

## BLOCKING UPOFLOUVRES.

Dear Eir, -In reply to Mr. Eiwards, wooden boards covered with waterproof felt placed immediately behind the louvres will moderate the sound of the hells. It might be found sufficient to treat the lonmes in the tower in this manner first i those at the base of the spire could be hlocked in the same way aftermands, if necessary.- Yaurs faith-

Long Stanton.
Dear Sir,-T have had experience of blocking of louvres at tifee towers in this town. At St John's, which is a very low tower, with six bells bung on a level with the louvres, there was frequent comphant of tue noise when the bells were rung. I advied having shatters fitted up to the spring of the aroh. This was done as foll lows: The necessary wood comprised lin. tongued and grooved boards. These were nailed bightly together crossways, with two lagers of thick folt between and fitfed tight into the louvres. Our Vicar described the effect as like using a mute on a fiede, or the soft pedal on a pianoforte. We get little complaint now. \&t St. Helen's, which is also a, ratber low tower, and situmbed in a densely populated neighbourhood, the louryes were blocked up completely with match-boarding. There are scarcely any complaints now: in fact, the noise is so Woned cown that the bells can acarcely be heard a street away. At All Suints' (10 belles) the louves have leen bricked up to the spring of the arches. and to my mind there is scarcely any difference.

In regard to All Saints'. Hereford, as far as one can judge, without seeing the tower, I would suggest entirely blowing up the hatiom lourres with boards and felt, as at St. John's, woreester. If the mode outside is rery severo usc extra felt. All the music oi the bells mould then come out throusli the lonvies in the fpire-- Yours faithfully,

Dear Sir, 'Inertia' is a term used to denote the priuciple or law the material world, that all bodies are absolutely passive or inifferent to \% state of rest or motion, and would contiuue for ever ni rest, or persemere in the sume uniform and rectilinear motion, unless clisturbed by the action of somo extrinsic force. . . Inertia is uno of the inherent properties of matter, and unceasingly recalled a our abservalion in every incident of life.' It appears also to be one of the inherent properties of ringers, and gives a good deal of trouble to the Analysis Committee.
Those who reat tho committee's report will remember the notice of a geal published es rung by the "Surroy County Association : at Brighcom. and abtributed to Surrey, thousk probably helonging to Susses. The committee could get no answer to a letter to the confurtor alout it, and the secretary of one of the associations informed member of the committee that ho had not read the report! Evidenty there was need of some "extrinsic force " to disturls the state of rest. But where is it to he folnd? Similarly, no further informafon is fortheoming as to Mr. Page's clain to have conducted seven peals, though only four were published. Perhaps he perseveres ' in the sathe uniform and rectilinear notion - in flac matter of bis claim, whiah our ' extrinsie force ' was mot sufficient to clisturb.
Again. as to the meaning of 'Extivene, nsed as the name of a malhod we get no information, and shall be glad if some member of the Erercise cat provide the necesary ' extriasic force ' to disturb the inlerent property " of ringers, which renclers them ' absolutely pas aive or indifferent," and which is "uncasingly recalled to our observa. lim. - Fours faihfully.
