## TAPPED PEALS.

The concern of the Exercise in the question of peals tapped on handbells has risen above the phase in which these achievements are to be regarded as "freak " performances of merely passing interest. Hardly a week goes by but Mr. Morris accomplishes one or more of these peals, and both at the Central Council and at the Essex Association annual meeting the question of including them in the official records has been raised. The Council, or rather the Peals Analysis Committee, has decided not to grve them official recognition; the Essex Association recorded the first of Mr. Morris's peals " as an interesting performance," but none of the succeeding peals have been included. In the discussion which has taken place in our columns some very interesting points have been raised, and there scems to be a general consensus of opinion that Mr. Morris's peals cannot be classed with ordinary handbell peals.

Whatever technicalities may stand in the way of giving them a place in the official records, no one can for a moment gainsay the fact that, by whatever system these peals are accomplished, they are a far greater performance than the ringing of a pair of handbells to a peal. The mental concentration alone is stupendous, whether the performer accomplishes his object by transposing the figures as he goes, by merely coursing the bells, or by actually following the method separately with each.

Whether such performances promote the art of change ringing may be a question of opinion, for men who are capable of such achievements are rare, and much depends upon the use to which they put their talents. If, for instance, Mr. Morris can turn his knowledge, gained by tapping peals, ta use in instructing ringers in the methods which he taps, then undoubtedly his efforts promote the art. If, however, his system has no relation to change ringing as the ordinary ringer, knows it, and cannot be wetilised in teaching others, then the opposite view must prevail. The only other question that enters into the matter is as to whether the peals are "rung." It cannot be said that they are, if by ringing we mean sounded by their own clappers, but this would be a physical impossibility for one man, and the question of official recognition ought not to be governed, we think, by this alone. New departures cannot always be judged on old standards, and in ringing we must be prepared to march with the times. These peais by Mr. Morris are great achievements. They are unique, and therefore thaught to be freakish; but they ought not to be ruled out merely on that account, or because they are performances beyond the capacity of the majority of ringers.

After service, the first touch on the bells was rung ly the officials of the association, Messrs. H. T. Howeth (Master), E. Guise (hon: sec.). G. Condick, junt, (hon. peal sacretary), and P. C. Wiliams (aon. secretary of the Bristol Branch). The tone and " go' of the bella were pronouncod exellent, and there were a large number of delighted listeners in the churchyard and in the vicarage garden, mome of whom, at least, were fired with a new enthasiasm to get the ring of six completed with the least possible delay.

## BISHOPSGATE PEAL BOARD UNVEILED.

## ST. BOTOLPH'S RINGER-CHURCHWARDTN.

A very interesting eeremony recently took place in the beliry of St. Botalph's, Bishopmgatic, London, where a foard recording a peal rung on these bells was unveiled by Mr. Churchwarden A. G. Etenley Stone, O.C. The peal was ruag on St. Thomas' Dny, December 21st, 1920 , to celebrate the return to office of the common councilmen for Bishopsgate, and also as a birthday compliment to the esteemed member of the ward, Mr. H. Weber Brown, B.A., C.C. It aleo had referenco to the connection of Mr. T. Waller with the churchwardenship. The board records the name of Mr. Churchwarden Walker as one of the ringers of the peal, and he is most probably the firat churchparden of St. Botolph's to havo achieved this distinction an a ringer while in offoe.
The ceremony, which was a aimple one, opened with prayer by the Rer. G. A. S. Bullock, M.A., B.D. After RIr. Churchwarden Walker had explained the occamion of the peai, Mr. Churchwarden Stanley Stone unveiled the board, and in the course of a brief address, bajd that as bell ringing yepresented the sccular side of the church service, it was only fitting that one of the civil officers shoutd perform the veromony. At the present time they might one and all take a lesson from the way in which 'a band, of boll ringers cordially pulled together to achjeve thair nim. The whole world, Engiand included, was at present like a peal of hells oracked and out of tume. If a better state of things was to be brought about all closses should co-operate, as did the bell ringers. The loand records the peal of Grandsire Triples by the Ancient Society of College Youths, conducted by W. A. Alps.

Pridmore, a past churchwarden at Bishopsgate, in a short and interesting spepeh, said he had taken en interest in ringing ever since bis boyhoof days, when lis father used to tako him to listen to the bells of his native city of Coventry, and it was always a pleasure to him when in offee to do all he could to make the ringers comfortable in every way. Apert from its church and cermonial uses, bell riuging wac a useful and healthy art and hobbry

Mr. W. A. Alps, the conductor of the peal, in a few morde, ar pressed the thanks of the ringers to the past and present churollwardens for the rreat interest they had always taken in ringers and ringing generally.

The company present included a number of ringers, members of the congregation, and Church Council, including the ringers' dear old friend, Sir Edward Zohrab, Bart.

After a short toveh on the bells, a move was made to the Parish Room, where the churchwarders had provided fight refreshmenta. and a delightful hour or two were spent in socinl intercourse.

During the evening, a courso of Jondon and a course of Bristor were rung upon the lower bells, touchos of Stedmen Caters and Stedman Triples and tunes on the handbells. One of the ringera vary ably presided at the piano, and semeral also displayed their vocat abilities.

The peal was composed by Mr. Henry Jobnson, Birmingham, and conducted by Mr. F. D. Dawc.
To commemorate that oceasion, Mr. Richard Evans, Wrexham, had an illuminated record designed, ind in the centre of the addrees was placed a group photograph of the performers, only four of whom survive.

Dr. Harry Evane, a son of the late Mr. Richard Evans, has now prosented the record to the ringens of Wrexham Parish Church, and it is a concidence that the presentation corresponds with the 50th year. during wilich Mr. F. Ropland, a membor of the party, has been it hell ringer at the Parish Church. A plato bas been attached to the address to mark the occacion of the presentation, and it will now be bung in the belfry at the church.

## DEATH OF AN OLD ESSEX RINGER

We regret to recold the death, at the age of 60 years, of Mr. Eligha Radley, of Stisted, who passed avay at his residence oul August 23rd. The deceased had been a ringer a.E Stisted for over 40 yems, and for upwards of 30 years he was a member of the Essex Assaciation. He was an excellent ringer and conductior on six bells. He took part in the thres peals rung on Stisted bells, two of which he conducted. Ine was a safe ringer of Major, and during a short time he resided in Bocking he regularly raig there on the ring of eight.
The funeral took place on the following Friday. The Rev. E. M. Farrar (Rector) officiated, and the chief mourners were the widow and several relatives The deceased had no family. The bearers were bis follow ringers. There were alsa present: Mr. G. T. Bartram, J.P., C.C., Mr. G. H. Howard (Master of the Essex Association), Mr. H. F. Cooper (District Master), Mr. W. H. Hammond (Braintree), Mr. H. Fox representing Mr. Lionel Faudel Phillips, for whom the deceased last worked, and representatiwes of all classes in the village.
The Rector, in an address at the graveside, said the late Mr. Radley was a man of sterfing cheracter, and was held in the highest estecm in the perish, His loss would be keenly felt. Not only didide ring week by week the belis to summon the parishioners to worship, but be was a regular attendant himself at tije services, and was, in many respects, a pattern man for the willage.

PRESIDING RINGING MASTER aF ST. MARTIN'S GUILD ATPONNTED RECORDER OF LINCOLN.

INTMLESTING DRESENTATION BY WLRRAL BRANCE.

Each of us, he said, had a parif to play in God's great Universe, and unless each aud everyouc did his sthare the whole of God's plan for the neifecting of this world would be so much the longer delayed. Beli xingers were as much church workers as the choir or even the priest. He knew that the Chester Guitd, and, in fact, all other Guilds and associations, had done good work in getting the importance of the ringers' efforts rocognised, and every ringer in the country shoukd belong to some Guild or another, and so furtber their mork. Bell ringers had a specigl and unique gift given them by God, and they should dedicate it to God and His sarvice.

After the gervice, close or 50 ringers and friends sat down to an exsellent tea, following which the whal meeting was-beld, over which Mr. J. W. Milner (president of the branch) presided. He expressed bis pleasure at being amongst the mombers once again, having travelled some thousands of miles sinces be last attended one of their meetings. He said how true it was that we all had obligatione to fulfil, and parts to play. One of the most common mistaker, and yet the grentest that could be made, was to imagine that to have "ho work to do, or only intermittent work, was the height of happiness. The man who had no useful work was most miserable, and the greatest joy of life was not the gaining of money, but the eatisfaction of doing what lay hefore us in as efficient a manner as possible. That made al! worlx noble. Canon May had worked in that parish for qufte a generation, and it was a matter of profound thankfulpess that he lad no sad thoughts at jetiring, except the parting from so many friends. ## EXTENSION OF LONDON SUPRISE.

TO FIND THE GENTRE OF A GIVEN CBRCLE.
(Euclid Book IlI., Propasition I.) To the Editor.
Dear Sir,-I see that Mr. George Baker has been so kind as to noduce a method that he calls the linor of my method. He also ways that he does not think that anyone will have the audacity to pretend that the two are not the same method.
Though perhaps lacking the audacity to pretend, I fhink I have the ability to prove that they are not.
Mr. Baker says that it ouly needs eight changes to prove that they are. I will now show that it only needs four more ohanges of London Surprise Royal to prove that they are not.

Fhen I look at Mr. Baker's Minor figures, I find that be has selected the rows in which the treble is dodging in the middle place.
To be logical he must compare these four rows with the four iu which the treble is dodging in the niddle in my method. I give below I. Mr. Baker's mothod; II, London Surprise Minor; and II I my method, all with treble dodging in the Middle places. Four remders will form their own conclusions.

## CLATH TO ABSOLUTELT CORRECT METHODS.

Sir. - w wh to withdraw the extension to Royal which you pubs. dished on September 2nd, and substijtrite in its place, adsolutely true and correct extensions to Royal and Maximus.
As the Rev. IF. B. James points out, London consists of two hunts, (a) a direct Theble Bob lunt. (b) a plain hunt backwards; these occur simultaneolely on opposite sides of the treble's path, that is to say, if the bells above the treble are plain hunting back wa res, the bells below the treble must Treble Bob hunt direct, and vice versa; it is just here where we have all gone astray.
The bells commence by plain Inunting hackwart above the treble, and contipue to do so until the 4 th comes benind, when they chang into the direct Trehie Bob hunt.
In Royal the bells bolow the treble change from the Treble Boll hunt to the piain hunt at the same time as the bells ahove the treble make the reverse change, but in Maximus the bells below the treble doing Treble Boh work must wait until the treble has completed its fonge in 5-6 hefore ther change over to plain lunting. Compare Minor and Major with treble in 3-4.
In Minor. Maior and Royal, all the odd belln except the $\overline{3}$ ril cross the Ireble's path, the 3 rrd in all cases is unable to phss the treble; When we come to Maximus the 9th. as well as the Srd. is unabla to pass the treble, and as a result the tenor is forcoll to cross the trehle, dolging with it in 5-6, the Sth snaps and dodges in 7-8, crosses the trable in 6-7, and courses the tenor down to lend. Compare this with Minor where the Jrd is umable to pass the freble: as a result the tenor is forced to nross the treble, dndping with it 3 - 4 . Fhe 3rd anapa nad dodges in 5-6, crosses the treble in 4-5, and doursGe the tenor rown to lead.
The work of the End, umier the treble, in bolh Royal ant Mfaximus is the kef to the extension. in so far as the work nader that treble is mneerned: it comsists of niternating trehle bob lunt. abd plain hund Tomdan places must be minfa, next to. and under the twehle bumilin-
 twhiel the placen must, be made. next to. and under flie 2mit; and.
 rase of the bell which turna the troble from piolitut, the places must
be made noxt to and under that bell. This is why 4th's place from behind is made when the trebte lies its whole pull behind. See Minor and Major where fte abore rule holds good.
The Rev. E. B. James speaks of the Oxford Extension and the Cambridge Extension; this is a third, and may be called the London Extension. Another example of it, is the way Forkshire Surprice Major may bo grodused from Cambridge Surprise Minor, giving a method superior to Cambridge Surprise Major.
The work of 9 and $T$ in Maximus ealls for remark; there is no way of avoiding the long dodge which continues whilst the pivot bell hunts up to 9th's and down to leain
N.B.The pirot bell is the highest old number, 5 in Minor, 7 in Major, etc. When the freble is leading, the treble bob bell makes 2nd"s place, and when the trable ties ite whole pull fehind the pivot beil malces 4th's place from behind; it cannot get higher because of the belle dodging behind with the treble. The extension was firet produced on Srd September, 1921.
