## THE COLLEGE YOUTHS' DINNER.

Some features of unusual interest to ringers marked the annual dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths on Saturday. The gathering, as is customary, brought together a widely representative company of ringers from all over the south of England, and fully maintained the prestige that has grown up with it in a long course of years. This dinner, drawing together, as it does, old Iriends from widely separated districts who would otherwise have no opportunity of meeting, stands out as one of the landmarks of the ringing year, and last Saturday's gathering will remain memorable for the first public exhibition of Mr. John Carter's ringing machine. Needless to say, this marvellous piece of mechanism was the great centre of attraction, and while, through no fault of the inventor, some of the effect was lost by the diffeulties presented by the instrument to which it was attached, it was looked upon as a compliment to the oldest ringing society that the newest, and certainly the most wonderful of machines, connected with belis, should have made its first public appearance there. It needs a knowledge of the science of ringing to understand to the full the extraordinary ingenuity that has been displayed in constructing this machine, and many will agree with Canon Coleridge when he said, in effect, that it was the most wonderful piece of mechanism ever fabricated by human intelligence.

London ringers who were present heard with pleasure that there is a possibility of having in the not far distant future yet another peal of twelve bells within the City, for the Rector of St. Magnus made the announcement that, if it is at all possible, he proposes to augment his present peal of ten by the addition of two more bells. Ringers will specially welcome this information, because, although London already possesses eight such rings, access to some of the towers is not always readily attained, and as St. Magnus is one of the belfries in which the College Youths practice regularly, the carrying out of the scheme will be a matter of congratulation.
A suggestion which one hopes may bear fruit was made by the Past Master of the Society (Mr. C. H. Horton) that the social side of ringing might be considerably further advanced if another such gathering as that, and the one at Birmingham, could be inaugurated in some other part of the country, and he indicated the west. presumably Bristol. Had it not been for the war we believe that a commemorative dinner would have been arranged at Sheffield in honour of the memory of the late Mr. Charles Henty Hattersley. Sheffield would be an admirable centre for a gathering of north country ringers, and an annual festival of this character both in the north and in the west should prove popular.

Now, Sir, probably all your London readers, and many of your Provinoial rearlers, know of the twelve beris at St. Sapiour's, Southwarz, which is the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Southwark. Fet Southwark Cathedral is not mentioned in the paragraph as one uff the twelve-bell Cathedrals.

Can it be, Sir", that your paragraph is prophetic, end that Southwark Cathedral will never apyear again among tho twelve-bell Cethedrals of Elagland? If so, there ss very real canger of this prophery coming true.
Some weaks ago the bells weve pronoumced unsafe, and they cannot be rung again until "The Wizards of Whitectape? " have worked their spells upon them. This will cost $£ 60$, and the Gathedral Ohapter have no funds in band to pay for tho work. So the hells of Southwark are at present silent, to the great regret of many besities the present writer.- Yours obediently,

The tonor was not again turned in to a peal until the peal of Bob Maximus rung ja 1914.
Samuel Lamrence's peal book is well worth looking at, as the travelled a long way in those days, which was no easy task.
St. Chad's Society aro fortuately in possession of the handbells used by the Union Society more than a century ago. St. Ghad's bells were opened by the College Youths in 1798. when a pesl of Grandsire Cinques was rung in which Lawrence took part. Fie also rang in the first peal of Stedman Cinques.

Eratifying, as showing not only their continued juterest in the society, but also lyenars it was an acknowledgment of the part Ganon J. H. Ellison in the Clurch (applause).
Canon J. H. Ellison, in responding siaid at the meeting of the National Asserbly a fow montlis aso there was a proposal that the Council and of the country should come unter the Parocinial Church got up and said thoy could not possibly have that. Ther ham meen connected with the clergy for so long a time that they wished to go on working uncler tho clergy. That, ho thought, was a great comand the ringera, and which, bo hoped, would always continue to exist (applause). At the same time, upon the face of it, it seemed to indiCote an rather wrong iden on the pert the bell ringers of what the

Church of England was tho elergy of the Church of England. They wore not, they (the laymen) were equally as much a part of the Church of England, and in proposing that toast they were proposing their own health (laugbter and applause).

## THE LAYMEN'S PART.

The toast was : The Health of the Church.' Somebody had deseribed sealth as the power of adaptiog the looly to all the various changes which it had to meet in the course of the year. If health was the power of adapting itself to circumstances, then, he thaught, the Church had never heen so strong as it was at this moment, bscause at long lact the Church of England bad got, at all events, some power to govern itself, and to say in what way it wanted to be ruled, and in what way it wanted to go forward, thanks to the action of Parliament in giving thom the National Assembly. Up to the persing of that Act, the Church had not been able to take a single sfiep forwarg without the sanction of Parliament, and Parliament had been either too indifferent or too procecupied to make that possible. Therefore, for a Iarge number of yeara the Church of England had really not been enabled to adapt itself to all the changing circumstances of the age in which we lived. Everything elso had been changing, but the Church liad had to go on afmost exactly on the same lines, merely because it had had no power to adapt itself to the new circumstances. People somatimes spoke of the weakness of the Church, but bearing in mind the limitations upon its actions, dis answer always was that tho very fact that the Church of England was at the present time what it was, and was so great a fone in the comery, showed how enormously strong it was, and what tremendous reserbes of strength it had behind it if it could only use them, as he believer? it was goiag to use them through the National issembly. If the laymen manted the chuych to be really ktrong they must put their whole force into it, and thes $a_{3}$ ringers should grasp the rope firmly, if he might use the metaphor, and give a hard pull, resolving that the peal of the Ghurch should be strong and united. Havilag referred to what the Nationa? Assembly was already doing by way of remedying abuses and exablishing the Central Fund, Canon Ellison pointed to the diffoulties of frying to reconstruct the Ohurcli finances at a time when money was so terribly short, but added that the layman were throwing themoelres into the matter, and if the ringers rally wished lealth to the Church of England, they shauld also tirrom themselves into the work in their own Parochial Coumeils, and, by sending resolutions to the National Assembly, not only make the Church fulfil the wishes of her laymen, but show that the laymen realised that they were, as much as the cleigy, a part of the Church of Englazd (applause).

## REMINISCENGES OF ANCIENT YOUTHS.

Canon Coleringe, in an entertaining speed, submitted 'The $A$ neient Society of College Youths.' He said those gatherings carried lim back in mernory forty years or more, to a time when it was his privilege to meet the College Fouths in a somewhat low tavern at Southwark (laughter). That was in 1879, and be coula see now certain old members of the socioty sitting there in grat solematy, and bsing venerated by the joung men like himself. There wad Henry Heley at the end of the row, and next to him John Cox, who was a Cumberlant, but preferred to be with the College Youths when he conld (laughter). Next to him bat Murray Hayes, then Mat. Wood, then the gentleman they used to call 'Jimmy Delight,' because his mame wes James Dright; them came their dear old friend, still with them, Teis Horrex (applawe). The only difference be culd see in him was that that wight he was smoking a cigar, while on the occasion he referred to, 40 years ago, he was smoking a cloy pipe (loud laughter). Last of all, came George Muskett who. to his (the speaker's) huge astonishment, drank claret (laghter). He (Canon Coleridge) thought himself no small bear, as an Oxford undereraduato, to be admitted to such lofty society (lataghter). From thab day to this, whea he cande to their annual banquet, be felt rejuwenated, and he went back feeling young again, and hoping he would be fit to come again the following yenr (applase). Canon Coleridge then branched off iato the inevitable anecdotes, of which he has an inexhanstiblo store, and ma=h amused the company.

## A GREAT HERITAGE.

Tuining again to the toast list, tho speaker referred to the quotations from Slankespeare, with which the programme was appropriately besprinkled, and remarked that. the sentimente seemed to bim to apply parliculerly to the Collego Youths. The frrt was: He sits high in all the people's bearts." Was it not perfectly true that if there was one thing the people of England valued more than another it was the sound of the hells? Tiney dia not understand very much about the ringing of them, but they were greatly disampinted if the bells were silenced. Then, again, Bequeathed town from many ancestors." A great heritage was theirs. They were celehrating their 2841h amivergry that day. nud they land to look back to the herees of the past and romember that many of the youne men in the room that night would in time come to be looket on by those who followed

No donbt that the 'go of a bell hung on such bearings is ampty perfect for a time; but what will it be in a years' hence if neglectert? There is no doubt that simplinity is the great thing to be aimed at in everything connected with bell hanging.
While on the subject of modern "improrements (?) in connectiun with bells, will you allow me fegin to protest against tuning on the Simpan primeipla? Not only have many gool nla bells been sacrified for this fad, hut the result does mot apprar to be satisfinctory- ? have heard from several well-knoun peat ringels, in fliferent parts of England and they all tel me that the efect is a continuous howling gll throtelh a poal.
