## A NEW RECORD AND A PRESSING NEED,

One more record has been added to the annals of ringing. By their performance at Stoney Stanton on Saturday, that brilliant young band of the Midland Counties Association, who since the war have reached the highest standard in peal ringing, have settled, presumably once and for all, the longest length of Cambridge Surprise Major. Their peal of 12,986 changes is the limit obtainable in the method-until a composer can find something longer. We feel constrained to add this qualification, even though at the moment anything more than last Saturday's length is not, believed possible, for we have in mind what has happened in regard to other methods in the past. The success achieved at Stoney Stanton is a crowning effort on the part of a band whose performances have been of no mean order. and they will receive the hearty congratulations of the Exercise.

This peal raises once more the necessity, upon which we have dwelt from time to time in this column, for an official record of all compositions, in order to set at rest any question of disputed authorship. In the case of this record peal of Cambridge Surprise Major, three well-known members of the Exercise are said to have laid claim to the composition. Each has indisputably constructed this record length, and their compositions, we are informed, although not identical, are so far alike as to come within the definition of a 'variation.' The ringers of the peal made an effort to solve the riddle without arriving, we believe, at a wholly satisfactory result, and they have, therefore, appended the name of Mr. E. Hims, who appearsi to have been the first to publish it. If there had been in existence an official record of all compositions, this question could not have arisen, because the first author to register the peal would be entitled to the credit, in the same way as a person who patents an invention or registers a trade mark.

Before the Central Council meeting last year we advocated setting up such a reference file of peal compositions, and the proposal got before the Council in the shape of a motion, but it was loaded with another scheme to put the onus of proof of peals upon the Council. This latter portion of the resolution was alone discussed, and, being defeated, dragged the other part of the question down with it. There is, however, a distinct need for, and there would be an important advantage in having such a record of compositions in the hands of the Council, for we believe there are many peals rung to-day under the names of new composers which were produced years ago. The men of to-day, however, have no means of ascertaining whether their figures have previously

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

Noxt woek we shall publish the Central Council's Analysis of the peals rung in 1922.
A unigue performance is recorded in our peal columns. In a peal at Southampton two ringers took part, each of whom lost an arm in the latel war.
The conductor of the record peal of Cambridge Surprise Major on Satarday (Mr, Harold J. Poole) is still some months short, of the nge of 23 years.
I'lis performance stands out as one of the most remarkable of onr lime. A casual glance of the composition would be enough for most bob callers.

Although ini. Poole's peal ringing career only commenced in July, 1920. he has rung to diate 94, and has conducted peals of Stedman Triples and Catens, Treble Ten, Superlative, London and Oambridge Major, and Thoyal. He also rang in the 10,400 of Real Double Superlative, and a 13,440 of Bob Major, and has also rung peals of Double Norwich, Treble Twelve and Stedman Gingues. Not a bad collection in 23 yeans!
This record length is one not likely to he displaced in Cambridge Surprise Major, for, as far as present knowledge goes, this 12,896 is the extent of the method.
The Ancient Society of College Youths must have a valuable possession in the plate of their cerifioate engravedi by the great Bartalozxi. In view of the discovery, made after grent search by Capt. F. A. Yorke, a copy of the certificate lias beom sent to the British Museum.
Tho plate was probably engraved bewween 1790 and 1800 , but the figure of the century has been altered to keep pace with the times.
Twenty youre ego next Friday, viz., on May 11th, 1903, the record penl of London Surprise Major, 14,112 changes, was rung at King'a Nortion.
On May 10th, 1777, the Royal Cumberland Youths rang 10,200 Trehle Boh Royal at Shoreditch in 7 lirs. 40 mins.
Fifteen years later, on May 7th, 1792, the first peal of Graadsire Boh Maximus was rung at Southwark.

A long peal of more than a century ago, although not even at that tine a record, was the 12.312 Grandsire Cators at Painswiek on May 5 th, 1817.

The first peal in Dorset, Grandsire IMriples, was rung at Bridport O未 May 5th, 1887.
By an error it was indicated in our report of the death of Mr. 1 W. Grimes that lie took part in the Jong peral of Oxford Treble Bob at Debenlam in 1892. Mr. Grimes did not ring in the peal, although He was steeple keeper at the tower at the time.

Peals are never certain until thes last change rolls round, and it is certainly 'counting your chicken before they're hatched. "to write the report of it before the ringing begins. $A$ condactor in a tower in the South Eastern Counties, however, did this on the Royal Wedding day, lenving only the time to be filled in, in order to get the report into the local paper mext morning. In this case the peal came off.
Mr, Richard Newton, of Boston. U.S.A. and formerly one of the ringers at Manchester Town Hall, was martied at St. Paul's Cathedral, Boston, on April $9 \operatorname{th}_{\text {, Fo Mrs. A. Nelson. In the erening the bride }}$ and bridegroom were present at a dinuer of the staff of the Morchants' National Bank, and wore showered with rice and confetti and good wisles.
Mr. T. E. Sone, of Harwarden, Buffis Brae, Dunfermline, Fife, will le pleased to hear from any ringers in Scotland.

Owing to preksure on our space on account of the many peals rung for the Royal Wedding, numerous peals and reports, as well as letters to the Etitor, are unaroldably held over.

## LONDON RINGER'S SUDDEN DEATH.

We much regret to reoord the sudden death of Richard F. Forwart, which took place on April 24th. Deceasell was returning lome in the evening by tram when death took place. He had been employed for several years by the London County Council as a lam conductor, elthough he was a gurgical hoot maker by profession.
Mr. Forseard was a native of Cranbrook, Kent, where he learat to ring a bell, but it was only during the last two or three years that he had taken up change ringing. $H_{e}$ was making very good progress indeed, considering that his opporbunities for practising were limited owing to his duties. A member of St, Leonard's, Strontham, local band, he also mot the Ancient Society of College Youths whenever ho was able. All his peals have been with the tenor behind, and he was a reliable man in this position, whether on 8,10 or 12 bells.

Tlae funeral took place on Tucsday al Streatham Cemetery, and was attended by members of the Ancient Society of College Youths, who paid the usual mark of respect.

## DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN NORTH NOTTS RINGER

 AN APPRECIATION.The passing of Clarles Crawford, of Lavehans, and late of Ewst Markham, Notte, removes from the ringing district an juterestimg personality. His genialcountenance was an index to his heart. Eis tace was sunlit, and lie was a pleasing conversationalist. He came into North Notte in the early 'eighties,' at a time when there was a deartl of change dingers, wnd settled down at East Marklam as a farmer and miller. He was not there many yeats batore he com menced to work with assiduous perseverance to have the old fous bells rehung and wo ney trebles added to makg a ring of six, nud succeded in teaching his own band of riugers, afterwards conduct ing for them a peal of 5,000 changes. It is difficult to say how many peals lie lad rung, but he rang lis two first at Doucaster, under the conductorthip of the late Thomas Hattersley of Sheffield.
Aithough he was 67 years of inge, physically ho seemed to be en dowed with pedperua! youth. He rang his last 5,000 witli the writer on the South African Peace Day, May 31st, 1908, a peal of Kent Major at Gamsborough, He lad, however, rung several since, but ne record has been kept.
He would oycle 20 miles for a "bit of good ringing," and abay tell you he was guite a young man. The last time I rang with bim, after his long cycle ride, was at North Colinglams and Sutton-onTrent, when he loolsed the picture of robust health. We plamed many things for 1923, but ' Man proposes, God disposes.' The word seems to be divided into burce main classes: those who will not wor under any cincumstances; those who work only when duiven; ant those who work willingly and do too autuch. Charles Crawford belonged to the last class.

Yon might at times disagrec with his opiaions, but he never left you in doutat as to his mental whereatouts
To all bauds of ringers who visited East Marklaam his hearty we conse and hospitality awaited them. Eis left land nover knew what his rigltt hand gave arfay, and lee wos instrumental in helping many struggling villagers in their distress
He broke a blood-vessel on April 13th, lingered until the 17 h , talh ing most of the time of his demest, cherished ringing friends, past ald present celebrities, and then passed peacefully beyond the weil.
He was laid to rest on Firiday, April onth, in that peacaful, pi Euresque little gyaveyald of Tast Markhan, beneath the sound the bells he loved so well, aud there we leave him " Until the dr breaks and the sladows flec away.
