## THE CENTRAL COUNCIL MEETING.

When, last year, the Central Council was induced to fix its next meeting place at Salisbury, the members were promised that they would receive a hearty welcome in the ancient Southern City; and, judging from the programme which has been arranged by the Special Comnittee of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild, the social side of the gathering bids fair to exceed in its attractiveness any preceding meeting of the Council-and many most enjoyable functions, notably at Newcastle, can be recalled. For the first time there will be a recognised headquarters from Saturday until after the meeting. This, in itself, will be a great advantage in many ways, for hitherto the members have had to make their own meeting places if staying over the week-end. Then, in addition to the ringing which will be provided, there will be organised excursions, and the official ceremonies on Tuesday will include a welcome by the Bishop of Salisbury in the morning and a reception at headquarters by the Earl of Shaftesbury in the evening. These features will add to the importance as well as the pleasure of the gathering.

As to the business meeting itself, the agenda, which is not overburdened, provides a variety of subjects on which members will find opportunity to talk, but there is little that is likely to prove really contentious. Committee reports always form an important part of the morning session, and the report of the Museum Exhibit Committee will be awaited with interest, inasmuch as the Exercise is likely to learn upon what lines the exhibit at the South Kensington Museum is to be organised. Among the resolutions of which notice has been given the suggested recommendation that first or record peals should not be rung for a society outside the limits of that society's area, is probably the only one that may be seriously challenged.

There have been a few cases in the past where the first peal in a method for a society has been rung outside that society's area, such, for instance, as the first peals of Norfolk and Brighton Surprise for the Norwich Association, which were rung in London. Then, too, the record peal of Bristol, rung at Hornchurch in Essex, was a Middlesex Association peal. It may be an ideal to ensure that first peals and records should be rung within the area of the society to which they are credited, but it is another thing to get the principle accepted by ringers. There is, moreover, one serious obstacie to its general application. How can the Salisbury Diocesan Guild, for instance, ring its first peal of Stedman Cinq̧ues, or Treble Bob, or Cambridge Maximus within its own borders, when it has not got a twelve-bell tower? 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[^0]Guild may not have aspired to these heights of method ringing yet, but we instance the Salisbury Guild because the subject is to be discussed at Salisbury. The argument applies with equal force to other societies, and we see no reason why a society should be debarred from the first peal in a method obtained outside its borders if it has not got the facilities for ringing it within its area. Even if the word 'first' is to be taken as meaning the first cver rung in a method anywhere, we think the same argument applies, and the proposer may find some difficulty in disposing of this serious obstacle to his suggestion.

Much interest is centred in the College Youths' attempl next Monday to set up a new Stedman Cinques record. It is a buge under taking on a peal of bells wibh a tenor of 50 cwt ., and if they are successful the men at the back end will deserve gold medals, although thoy will probably appreciate some of the contents of the Coffee Pot better than medals when tho bells come round.
There will probably be many listeners, voluncary as well as involun, tary, and of this we may be certain, therg will be a good poal, or none at all.
By the way, the length is curious; it is the same whether read forwards or bakwards-15051.
Henes more power to the elbow (or should it be elbows?) of the twelve good men and true, who will ' ascend the tower of the Cathe dral Church of St, Mary, Southwark, on Monday noxt, and may they have the satisfaction of hearing the hells run home!
They will not be alone in their long peal effort. Members of the Chester Diocesan Guild intelld to start on a 17,280 Kent Treble Bob Major, at Over, Cheshire, on the same day.
The present: Treble Bob record is the 16,800 of Kent, ruag ab Mottram, in 9 hws. 40 minuteg on June 8th, 1906.
Before that the record was 16,608 , the 40 th anniversary of which performance in the Kent Variation heing, curiously ellough, to-day This was also rung at Mottram, the tine being 9 hrs. 48 mins.

On May 18th, 1846, Thomas Thurstans' 'masterpiece, the four part peal of Stedman, was rung for the first time. This was at St. Martin's, Birmingham, Fenry Johnson being the conductor.

In 1777, on May 19th, the College Youths rang 11,080 Kent Treble Bob Royal at Shorediteh in 8 brs. 2 mins.

Fifty years ago next Monday, Matt Wood conducted the first peal of Grandsire Triples in Scotland.
May 2lst also is the anniversary of a 10,061 Grandsire Geters at Wednesbury in the year 1861, and of the 13,054 Stedman Geters at Cheltenlam in 1888.

Tuesday is the anniversary of the 17,024 Double Norwich Major at Kidlington, which was rung on May 22nd, 1899.

Owing to the spire of St. Michael's Ohurch, Southampton, being unsafe, the peral of eight bells cannot be ruag. The bells are at present at the Groydon Foundry all ready for lianging, and will remain there till the defects of the spire are put right.

Of course, it was sure to come-a peal of Bristol Surpriso Major by that band of Leicester ringers who have been making history lavely. It was the first in the method by all the band. but we warrant it won't be the last. And there is that 19,000 odd by the Rev, E. Law James waiting to be rung!

Six members of one family in a peal of Cambridge Royai-the first by alt the band and by the association-is a noteworthy incident. The peal was rung at Gosforth. and the family party were from Whiter Bay, comprising six Goftons.

It was in the carly part of 1901 that Mr. Fred Dench produced his 12.896 Cambridge Surprise Major, not 1907 as stated in his letter last week.

Last week the report of a peal at Birling, Kent, was claimed as the first of Major on the bells. Mr. W. Short of Ment, writes that the opening peal at this church was one, in which he took part, of 5,088 Kent Treble Bob Major on May 19th. 1891, by the All Hallows' Society. Tottenham. It was rung for the Midalesex Association, conducted by G. B. Lucas.

## TEE PEALS ANALYSIS. POINTS FOR ILANDBBLT PEALS.

## To the Editor.

Sir, Tha publication of the report of the Peals Analysis Committec is an event which is looked forward to with much interest by ringers generally, and the information and details contaived therein bagr eloquent tribute to much thorough and painstaking work
Nevertheless, I must confers I was surprised whon I saw the umber of points awarded for the peal of Steclman Scxtaples rung on handbells at Birninghan. Here, oertainly. the Analysis Committeo liave not erred on tho side of gonerosity, and one certainly wonders upon what grounds the committee thought fit to award only 38 points.

I am of opinion that the allocation of points for handhell peals, as compared with tower bell pealg is a matter which needs a certain nmount, of overhauling.

To quote one instance: A peal of Stedman Cinques on handbells re ceives 32 points. whilst a peal of Grandsire Ginques reveives only 13 points. From the hand bell ringers' point of view, the latter is probably as difficult as the former.

I think, therefore, that points allotted for handbell peals should be on an altogether different hasis to those allowed for tower belt peals. Perhaps ye shall be favoured with the views of some of the more prominent handbell ringers on this subject - Tours, eto.,

## SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUILD.

## APATFY OT THE CTERGY.

Riugers of the Salisbury Diocessu Guid assembled in consiterable numbers at Marlborough on May 3rd for their annual meeting. Botlt towers were open for inging during bine day, and towehes in various methods were ring, while a party also visited Ogbourne St. George, where Messis. Gillett and Johnstor: have iccently relumg the bells:
At the busiucss meating, the Mastar (Major O. C. FIughes D'Aeth); who presided, remarked that as that was possibly the last occasion on which he should have the opportunity of addressing the members of the Guild in his presens capacty, be sloould like to say a few words on 4 subject which was very close to bis heart. In his report for 1922 he once more asked the clergy to take a little more active part in that particular deparment of Church work. He felt bound to say that in his journeys thout the dioceso he liad found what a irjend liad called a certain amount of apathy on the part of a certain number of the elergy. In foing to a belfry the generally asted whether the parson took any intorest in the ringing, and the reply he generally got was that they seldom saw the parson in the belfry. But as long as the Guild existed they had to remember that they wer. not morely a guild of ringers but a guild of Church workers, and that as suth they were entitled to-asy claimed- a certain amount of respect from some of the clergy. The clevgy did not as a rule go to the recognised practices and ofter up a prayer that their work night be blessed by God, and le feared that the time was coming when ble bands of ringers would become merely social olgenisations for ringing only without any thought of God. He was socry to say that in many churches, including same belonging to their own Guild, the ringers did not attend worship in God's house : they called others to prayer aud praise, but did not themselves attend the services. Suroly there must be something wrong in thatHe was sorry to complain, and though he had notheng to say against The clergy lue conld not help thinking that many clergymen paid fewer "isits to their belfries than to their dentists. Such things ouglat not to be. Turnilug to the other side of the picture the Master said ha knew of one charch not very far from Marltorough where there were seven ringers, six of whom were also in the choil. They not ouly thought of their bolls but of the church as well. He mould that thal were the gencral practice. The best ringing was as a rule to be found in churehes where the parson took an interest in his fingers. Ela did not like to see ringers walk out of ehurch when the sorvies commenced. Prayer should not be left to a laymun in the presence of the parson. If this apathy continued he was afraid they would tend to become a mere social club that knew not God. Fle trusted the clergy would forgive him if ho had said anything to rufle them. What lie fird said was meant to furfltor Elie good work of the Guild so that it might be not only a guild of rimgers but a guild of workers who could praise God it the end of the rope as well as in their places iv the Gluych sorvices.
Arising out of the minuter, the Haster said they felt rather abeslnod and somewhat anoyed at their last meetin咅 at Lome Regis to hear that the Dean and Chapter of their Cabladral had throwa cold water and completely extinguished the small spurt of energy which they tried to put forward in raising what they thought was a suitable memorial to the ringers of the diocese who fell in the war.
The statemont of accounts presented by the hon. secretary and fiensuler (Rgw. F. Li. Edwards, Kington Masma), showing a credit balatace of $5151 \mathrm{~F} .7 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$., was approved.

When the time came it would be with great sorrow that le would give up the mastership, because he loved tho work. in carrying out, which fo whs greatly indebted to the branch secretaries for their loysi support, not, of course, forgeling the hard work of their general secretary.

## DIOCESAN WAR MEMORLAL.

On tho question of the proposed memorial to ringers who fell in the war, the Hon. Secretary said that as members of the guild were aware they were not, allowed to erect the memorial in the precincts of the Cathedral. Samo time ago, howaver, ho had an interview with the Dean who spoke to him about a design he had in hand for improving the war memoriat in the Cafhedral to consist of the restoration of one of the ancient chapels in suck a way that it could be used for public and privato worship as a memorial chapel. In the course of that work there was to be constructed across the entrance to the chapel an onk screen, and there was a place on each side of the screen where it was desired some panelling should be introduced, and the Dean suggested that the guild should undertake to provide the panelling. The Guild liad in land a sum of wis collected for the purpose of a memorial, and if a further sum of about £20 could be raised the guild of riugers could be offeially associated with the diocesan memorial.

Tho meeting approved the suggestion, and referred the matter to [1e branches, and eppointed a committee, consisting of the Master, secrelary, and assistant secretary to receive their reports, with poter to act.

## KIVGTON MAGNA TOWER.

The Rex. F. Ll. Eduards remarked that they Thad als ancient fower to the church at Kington Magna which was in considerable need of restoratian, and they were endeavourfor in a village of 350 inhabitants to paise sufficient money to put the fower inlo effective repair so that thor could continue to wse the five bells without fear of ondangering the sufeb of the tower. The Guild had sometimes made tranta for such a purpose, and he would leave it to those present to say whether or not they would make a small grant towards his own church.
The Master observed that if there were nay bells rung anywhere in tho diocese if was at Kiugton Magna. The vitgers were nof only dingers, but they regnlarly mbtended the house of God. He suggested that the Guild nake a grant of $\mathrm{El} \mathrm{I}_{5}$.
Dlimatoly the moeling voled fove guinens lowards the object, and Mr'. Fetwards thanked the fuild for its moxpeoted act of generosity. FFST OE CENTRAL CODNCII TO SALISBURY.
The Master faid lie supposed that most of them knew thet tho dionese was being honoured with a wisit from the Central Council at Salisbury at Whitsmn. The oxeasion would be quite unique as ho beliover the Central Council had never before met in the beatiful cathedral of the citv of Salishury. The visil would cntail cer tain expense. The Guild proposed to Eake the Council to Wiltor House by nommission of the learl of Pembroke on Whit, Sunday, and they would afterwaide be laken to cortain eight and fen bell towers. The Wimborne bramel hat already made a coutrihution towneds the expmises of the visit, find he ventured to suggest. fliat the Guidd misht helo them in some way.

On the proposition of tha Rev. C. Cox the Guild decided to make a grant, not exceding e5. for the purnose.

Members afterwards altended a special service at. St Peter's Church, Where an appropriate address was delivered by the Rector (the Rev. D. Toste). The visitors foregathered for tea in the Sessions room at the Town Tall.
