## LONG LENGTHS OF ROYAL.

The attempt which is to be made on Boxing Day for a peal of ro,440 Cambridge Surprise Royal is a reminder that among the many long lengths that have been rung, peals of "Ten-In" are by no means numerous. Peals of Major, in which the changes ran into five figures, could be literally numbered by the dozen-there are records of more than a score over $\mathrm{I} 2,000$ in length-and yet we believe the peals of more than ten thousand of Royal could be numbered on the fingers of one hand. Stedman and Grandsire Caters have been methods over which for nearly two centuries ringers bave striven for records. No fewer than five times in the last thirty-five years the Stedman Caters' record has been broken, while half a dozen new records were made in Grandsire Caters during last century. But long lengtbs of Royal seem to have had little attraction for ringers during all this time; indeed, the record of 12,000 put up in i 784 by the Royal Cumberland Youths remained unbroken, as far as can be ascertained, until the Ashton-under-Lyne men rang a peal of 14,000 in the year 1914. The earlier record was the culmination of an interesting struggle for supremacy between the two great rival London societies, whicls began with a round ten thousand of Treble Bob Royal at Shoreditch by the College Youths in 1777 and ended with the Cumberlands' 12,000 seven years later. And that, so far as we are aware, was the end of record making with ten-in for a bundred and thirty years, although there was more or less constant effort on all other numbers, with the exception of Maximus, in which a 10,224 , rung at Painswick in 1833 , waited until 1911 before being beaten-also at Asbton-under-Lyne. As far as we can trace, and should it be otherwise we should be glad to be informed, all the long lengths of Royal and Maximus have been Treble Bob, and herein perbaps lies the explanation of the absence of attempts to make new records. Has it been due to the uninteresting nature of Plain Bob and the monotony of Treble Bob that ringers have been loth to set out upon those herculean tasks that have marked the progress of record peals in other methods? If this be so, the advent of Surprise Royal ringing, as a more or less regular feature of present-day practice, is likely to change this state of affairs. The limitations which may be found even in Cambridge Surprise disappear in some of the newer methods, which are not only more difficult, and therefore more interesting, but, having a cleaner proof scale, will lend themselves to the composition of longer lengths without parting the big bells. We look upon this long peal of Cambridge Royal, by whoever it is first rung-and the Leicester men were unfortunate in not pulling it off-as the precursor of an attempt, or, naybe, series of altempts, to set up a new record in Royal ringing.

## BELERY GOSSIP.

The Vencrable the Archdeacon of Swinton has accepted the invitation of the Bristol United Guilds to be present at their third annual dinners as 'guest of the eveling.' Musical items will be given this year between the toasts. There is, we are informed, a little surprise for the committee, which will he very much appreciated, being in the thatare of a return $f \mathrm{fr}^{\prime}$ ' Honour Bestowed.'
The Middlesex Association are, we believe, the forst society to ring a hundred peals of Bristol Surprise. To the fact that their leading Burprise ringers took the method up with such keenness is largely due the popularity which Bristol has attained to-day. Outside the three old Surprise Methods, no other has been practised to anything like the same extent as the Rev. E. B. James' creation. The Middlesex 'hundred,' it is interesting to note, includes the anly three handbell peals in the method, and the 15,264 at Kornchurch in 1912.
The new peal of eight at Neison, Lanes, installed by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, were opened on Saturday.
Seaford (Sussex) bells which have been recest, and rehung in a new frame, are to be dedicated to-morrow (Saturday).
The very first peal of Treble Bols on record was rung on December $27 \mathrm{th}, 1718$. This was a performance by the Uuion Scholars, and the peal was rung at St. Dunstan's-in-the-East, Cily. Following the custom prevailing at that time the society called the method after their own name, viz., Union Treble Bob, but, although the title clung to it for a while, other ringers gave it the name of Oxford, by which we know it to-day.

## "A MERRY CHRISTMAS."

An interesting fact about this peal is that the composition is preserved to us. It is a five-part, with a befove in every course, and two bobs Wrong and one Home in every fourth eourse.

The Christmas Holidays have been a favourite time for long peals, and among the noteworky peals have been the following: On Dec. 26th, 1831, 15,168 Kent I'reble Bob Major at Eliand; 1885, 8,064 Double Norwich at Leiston by College Youths; 1894, 9,312 Superlative Surprise at Crawley; 1901, 11,111 Stedman Cinques at Birmingham; 1901, 10,176 Kenl Treble Bob Major at Beeston, Notts; 1910, 9,728 Superlative Surprise (record) at Cleat, Worcestershire.
On December 27tin, 1904, 17,104 Double Narwich ai South Wigston; 1909, 10,176 Double Oxford Bob Major, Byierley Fill.
Miss Nancy Denyex, at the age of 13 yearrs, has just rung her first peal at Aldershot, where the local band, including four ladies, have just scored their 'first.' The methor was Bob iflajor. The band would like to know if they possuss the youngest lady who has ever rung a peal of Major on tower belis. Miss Denyer rang her bell excoptionally well throughout the peal, and the Ladies' Guild have every reason to be proud of the latest, recruit to their peal ringers' ranks. It will be noticed that a landbell peal rung in London by Gumberland and College Fouths last week, was rung under the auspioes of the Oxford Guild.
Wilh regard to the peal of Cambridge at Port Sunlight on November $26 t h$, it should have been recorded as the first peal of Surprise Major by a baud residing in the Wirral Peninsula.
) The peal of Doubles at Barlaston, Staffis, on November 24th, was rung in 2 hours 50 minutes, not 3 hours 50 minutes, as published.
The new trebles to make a peal of cight at Wesi Wycombe and the new peal of eight which Messrs. Taylor and Co. have placed in the tower at Newehurch, Lancs, were dedicaled on Saturday. No time was lost in putting the bells to the proft, for in each case $a$ peal was rung on them on the following doy.
A lettor from Mr. A. Craven with regard to Edinburgh surprise is unavoidably held over till riext week.

DEDICATION OF NEW PEAL AT NEWCHURCH.
A SPLENDID PRODUCTION FROM LOUGHBOROUGH FOUNDRE.
Un Saturday, December 15 th, the new peal of bells at the Parish Clurch, Newchurch, neal Warrington, were dedicated by the Ven. Archdeacon Howson (Archdeacon of Warrington). The service was, indeed, very impressive, aud there was a large attendance, which ineluded many bell ringers from various parts of the country, and Mi. Taylor, representing the founders.

The recast bells are a beautiful ring of eight, cast bv Messrs. John Taylor and Co., the famous Loughborough foundry. Tlie tenor bell is a fine-toned bell of just over 12 cwt.; in $F$ sharp, and the whole peal have been tuner on Messrs. Taylor's latest reinforced system of Larmonical tuning. Undoubtedly to the listener the peal sounds wonderfully melodious, quite a coutrast to the original bells, and upon all sides, as the congregation were leaving the churel after tire dedication ceremony, one heard nothing but praise for the wonderful tional results obtained.

Tllen with regard to the fittings, these contain all those improwements in bell haging which Messrs. Taylor have introduced in recent years, inchuding, of course, ball bearings in which the bells swing.
The shrong and nassive iron framework whioh carries the bells is so desiynoed by the bell founders that the least possible amount of strain is placed upon the tower walle, and this framowork is even a source of strength to the tower, as the main foundation pirders are arranged and tixed sa as to form a lrond to the tower walls. The ringers were entranced by the splendid 'go of the bells, sud everyone is to be congratulated upon the achievement of so magniticent a result.

The insoriptions upon the bells are as follow, together with the founders' mark-Recest by Taylor. Loughborough-on each bell :-
Treble. To the memory of their neplew, Rolsert Leigh, who died at Trinity Hall, Cambridge, Nov. 14h, 191 k , aged 22 years.

2nd.-'the gift of the Misses Leigh, Leigli Hall, Kenyon.
3rd and 4th bells blank.
5th,-Three bells, the gift of M. M. S. Marsh, High Peak, Kenyon. lu memory of her brothers.

6th.-To the memory of Ann Allen, Brooklya, Culcheth. The gift of her sister.
7th.-To the memory of Thomas Ellames Withington. The gift of his son and daughter, Arthur and Cecilia.
Tenor.- To the memory of the fallen in the war, 1914-1919. Rev. W. W. Whitterbury-Kaye, Rector. R. Grimshaw and R. Uverton, Churehwardens, 1923.
After the ceremony, the ringers and visitors were invited to the Schools for tea, orer which many reminiscences were recalled. However, as may be imagimed, the ringers were eager to return to the belfy, and the first touch of Superlative Surprise was rung on the lells by the following : Messrs. A. Barnes, P. Taylor, T. B. Worsley, A. F. 'Baily, J. Potter 7". Barlow, J. W. Washbrook and F. Openshaw. Many other methods were rung during the evening by farious ringers.
The Newclurch band consists of Messis. J. Leatherbarrow (leader), F. Reymolds, J. Yates, W. Fampson, J. Orms, G. Pounell, W. Gould and E. Leatherbarrow. There are two understudies, E.' Thomason and F. Thomeson.
On Sunday next a canol service is being held in the clurch, the special featare being the ringing of hymn tunes upon the bells,
"THE BIG BELL OF BOW.'
The famous tenor at Bow, Cheapside, is justly considered by musical experts, and by ringers generally, to be unexcelled for richness and purity of tone. It is also. porhaps, the most historicul and valued bell in existence. The "Big Bell at Bow' is versed in oursery rhyme, and well known in all parts of the world! It cannot, therefore, be mondered at, that, it is the ambition of many men to ring it for a
peal. Up to about in century and a half ago, the records show that it alseays required two and sometimes three ringers to achieve this, but in 1787, Philip Pilgrim was the first man to do so single-landed.
A lengthy searel of all the records show that up to the present moment exactly 21 ringers have accomplished this performance, which number includes two well-known ringing parsons. We venture to think, however, that none can appreciate the distinctive houour of doing so more than F. E. Dawe, who called a peal of Stotman Cinques from it on Saturday, December 8th, within measurable distance of his 62nd birthday!
Many peals of Stedman Ginques have now been called from the tenor, but Mr. Dawe was the first to do this wher lie called the famous 'Baclelor's Peal ' at St. Bride's, Fleet Street, City, on 7th February, 1891.
The earliest recorded mention of a bell ai Bow Charch is in 1334, when the city ordered that no one should wander about the streets 'after the hour of curfesp rung out at the Church of our Lady at Bow.' The Great Fire of 1666 destroved the old bells, and eight new bells were installed in 1669 . In 1762 the peal was recast and two trebles added, while later they were made into the ring of twelve which we know to-day.

If we are satisfied they must he and ther will look up to us now to show the resli of the ringing world how to ring bells, ander the leadership af Mr. Joe Leatherbarrow.-Believe mee. A PEAL AT 86.
RENARKABLE FTAT BY AN OLD RINGER.
Tlite ringer of the third bell in the peal at Kirkhurton Parista Churelt on December 8th, a report of which will be found on another page, accomplished a feat $w$ hich riugers in the Huddersfild distriot are proud to place on record.

Mr. Josoph Pickering was 86 years of age on Abefust lst lest, and we cannot do otherwise than pay a tribute of admiration to the old geutleman for his pluck and endurance in standing under a bell for 3 lirs, and 10 minutes for a peal of Kent Treble Bob Major. Thu writer is pleased to say that when he went to Kirkburton last Sur-
day evening to congratulate Mr. Pickering on his performance he found him at his usual place ready to take part in the Sunday Service ringing, which he had dore istermittently for the loug period of 71 years at this church.
Wonderful feats of endurance by old ringers are often retnted n these columns, but this, it is believed, wild constitute a record, as also in long service as a ringer al one church.

Mr. Pickering is the only surviving memher of the 'All Englend Company of Change Ringers, to which Mr. T. Stead, whose onituary was published last August, also bolonged.
Mr. Eickering helped to win a grod number of prizes in his day, and these include 12 first and 13 second prizes, of which he was justily proud. His first success in prize ringing was gained in a competition in 1862, When he assisted to capture tire fiftif prize.
Mr. Piekering acted as judge on many oceasinns at ringing competitions, and was appointed judge to the old Tuited Counties Association. He has taken great interest in local affairs, and acted as clasirman of the old Local Board, and for aine years as chairman of the Urban District Council, his connection with the Lwo hodies exlending over a period of 35 jears. Mr. Pickering was for 45 years cor'esponding secretary for the Kirkburton district of the Manchestor Unity of Oddfellows.
The finger of the scond bell in the peal at Kirkburton was the third generation of Armitages as service ringers with Mr. Pickering.
During the erening a dinner was sewed in the Masonic Hall, and a social eveaing followed, at which a pleasant ceremony was performed, a framed enlargement of his, own photograply being presenteniends. It is hoped that Mr. Pickering will be spared many years in as goad health as he ts at the present to carry on his godd work.

An alarming accident occurred at Oakham Parish Church on Sunday week while the bells were being rung for 10 o'clock Eucharist.
The bells were being raised in peal when the tenor, which weighs about a ton and was being rung by Mr. W. E. Eiggs, stopped suddenly, with a heavy thud. On going to see what had liappened the ringers found that the bell had broken at the crown. The top was still attached to the headstock, but the rest of the bell had become wedged in the frame. Had it come througl the floor, of course, the damage would have been much more serious.
