## AN ELY DECISION.

An interesting point was raised at the meeting of the Ely Diocesan Association at Bourn, and recorded in our last issue. It was the decision to endeavour to ensure that peals rung by bands of ringers visiting the Diocese should be rung for the Ely Association. The decision, at the suggestion of the Archdeacon, is to be published in the
Diocesan: Gazette '-an excellent way of bringing before the clergy any matters of general importance in connection with bells and ringing which might with advantage be more often resorted to by associations. The idea behind the Ely proposal is, it would seem, to get the incumbents to make it a condition of the use of their bells that the peal shall be an Ely Association peal. The idea may be good in principle, although even that is debatable, but we think the Ely Association will find that in practice it will be impossible of attainment, unless, at least, the rules are altered. What is to happen if a band of, say, cight non-members visit Cambridgeshire-as has been the case in the past-and are desirous of ringing a peal? Who is to elect them as members of the Ely Association. Obviously they cannot elect themselves, and if the decision of the Association is to be made effective, it may result in putting an unpleasant barrier in the way of visitors ringing peals in the area of the Association, and might conceivably cause friction.

The question, in a much modified form, was discussed at the Central Council meeting last year. It was merely that 'first or record peals shouid, if possible, be rung' for a society within the limits of that society's area,' but even this was held to be impracticable, and one member described it as " unnecessary, unreasonable, unworkable and unintelligible.' What then could be said of a decision which would have the effect of applyin practically the same principle to all peals? As ar rule, when one or two individuals visit a tower in the area of some association other than their own, they join the local association, if they desire to ring a peal, not only because the madority of the band are members, but because it is Felt to be, in a sense, an obligation. So, too, would a complete band, if it were possible, but in a case where the non-members outnumber the members there is, as far as we know, no provision for the minority to elect the majority.

We are quite sure the Ely Association has no desire to act in a dog-in-the-manger spirit, nor to set up unnecessary barriers to visiting ringers ringing peals in their area, lat the resolution passed at Bourn strikes a note which seems discordant. Even the argument that thie dilficulty of election could be got over by submitting the

However, a peal in the methor was guite successful on Saturday, August 30th, as duly reported in these columns, the pbentee's place being ably filled up by 'Walter,' one of the local team, so that 'all's well that ends Will,' or should it be 'Wal'?
The company were kindly entertained to tea, at the hotel ndjoining the tower, by the local men, the actual date coineiding with the EJra birthday of Mr. Wm. Elliott, of Kelvedon. After the performance we were able to discuss many matters of horticultural interest. such $\mathrm{g}_{\mathrm{s}}$ Sweet William-the William pear-with thoughts of other Wiltiams of the bell rope, who have, in the past, done yeomath service for the art. Hoth young Bill Nevard and his old friend Elliott, became anxions to change some of their Treasury Notes-real Treasury Bills-that the party might "wet their whistles," whilst the engine whistle of passing trains reminded those staving over Sunday, that the Miller of the Lee, and Beeson-on-Thames would be shortwinted if they canght their train up to town. Little Willic Gofton all the way from Monksleaton, was as wide nwake as ever, when rounds came up, although he travelled fill night for the penl, which lie makes his 'dozen' in this method in a list of 27 at 18 years of age.

## INTERESTING KELVEDON HISTORY.

Amongst mattors of local interest to readers of "The Ringing World may be mentioned : Miles Gray, the famous early 17th century bell founder. who cast Kelvedon's original ring of fivo (tenor 21 cwt.), in 1608, and Feeriug, also five, in 1624-300 years ago-and the bells are there to-day full of music.
Felix Hall, a fine mansion aud estate, where the hoy Keeble began his career as a gardener and seedsman before spending years of his manhood at Leytonstone.
Braxtel, the resting-place of William Nerard, grandfather of our Bill, laid to rest in 1872, in his $82 n$ year
Coggeshall, a noted six-bell tower, where carly Victorizn bell ringers met on Saturdey, a practice still kept up when the bells were increased to eight. At this church 2 crowd of 40 to 50 people assembled to hear tho first peal of Major rung upon them-5.184 of Kent Treble Hob on 25 th June, 1888, conducted by Sillitoe, with Nevard on the tenor. Bets were freely made that one man would never 'do the tenor,' but the peal was well finished, also a beefstenk supper afterwards at the Woolpack. David Elliot was the man who ordero. 1 this feed, unknown to the bancl, and lie lies in Kelvedon Churchyand, his headstone, having a carved bell upon it, recording his death on August 7th, 1888 , aged 72 years.
The Rev. G. P. Bennett was Vicar of Kelvedon when the church (and bells) whis restored in 1877: his son, H. Curtiss Bennett, aftermarils K.C., andi H. Temperler Hicks, were churchwardens. At the opening of the extended burid ground, Mr. F. C. Bennetht remarked, 'Who will be the first to occupy the new the late $\boldsymbol{H}$. Curtiss Benacti-a Metropolitan magistrate, of well-kyown leviency- who was the very one to be huried there soon after the opening cerernony.
Toseph Elliott, brother of the above David, was a chorister and luell ringer for over 60 vears at Kelvedon, and the recipient of a presentation in Match. 1903 . He died at 77 years of age, ana left behiad good reprosentatives of the Ellintt ringing family, in Wm. Fliott, whose hirthdav we celebratet, and a grandson.
Charles Elliotit, hrother of David nnd Joseph, who died in Australia over 80 years of age, was a very strong man, and a fine ringer in his day. Fe went to Australia whon the gold rush was geing on, and made, lost and remnde a small fortune. Wheu living near Bury St. Edannds, he beame possessed of a MS. hook, written with a quill pen alhout 1835-5. Most of the matter consists of extracts from 'shipway' and 'The Clavis.' From Charles the book was hander to Devid, and. witla a number of letters, it passed on to William's keping, and liere are two extracts. in Charles own handwriting: "St. Feter"s, Norwich, in 1778: 6,240 OI: T: B. Maximus' (in 5 parts), conducted $\overline{5} \mathbf{T}$, Thamas Barton' (with the figures as rung for the first time). A list of peals of bells in the county of Suffolk, roaghly 100 gears ago: "Four of ten, 20 of eight, and 55 of six."

The three brothers frequeatly corresponded on ringing matters, and the closing of oue of Charles' letters to Joseph reads: "I hope you will write soon and tell me what you think of all I have sent you, and tell me if you will come this summer- Four affectionate bruther, Charles. Good-maming, it is naarly ond w'clock.

## CLEOBURY MORTIMER BELLS.

A RESTORADION SCHEME.
Stremuous eftorts are being made in the little town of Cloobury Mortimer to raise funde for tho restoration of the Parish Church bells. It is estimated that about 8400 will be neerled, and a recent garden fete resulted in a sutn of aloout $£ 100$ being realised.
The church las been standing in its present position for abou 750 years, the date of tho olfi fower-a fine example of late Norman times-being somewhore Hetween 1160 and 1195 . Recently the bolls were inspected, and the report as to their condition was alarming, The bells, six in number, have been in existence since 1757, and in that year they were recnst by Rudhall, of Gloucester. The date of their first casting is unknown. The inscriptions are: 1, "Hark to our molody'; 2, Abel Rurliall cast us all '; 3, "Peace and good neighbourhood '; 4, *J. Atwood. Vicar'; 5; 'Richard Darset, Will Oseland, ch. war.': and 6, "I to the church the living call, and to the grave do summon all."

At a recent mspection of the bells, Mr. C. Elwards (Ringing Master to the Hereford Dinmesan (ruild) reparted that the original timbers ware all decayed and must he renewed, that the hells had never been quarter-turned since 1757 , and that the clappers had worn the bells so much that they ware liable to crack at any time. He further reported that some of the timber stayed and endangered the satety of the tower. Fe suggester? that steel givders should take the place of timber, and that there should be a new bell frame, and new fittings to the bells.

## CHESTER GUILD RINGERS' TRIP.

On Saturday, August 23rd, finw members of the Chester branch of the Chester Diocesan Guile, viz., Messrs. H. W. Wilde, J. Morgan, W. Thomas, A. F. Riclards, G. Jones, and J. W. At Bidiston, a touch of Double Oxfard kiner was rung. Fere the 'circle' of ropes ianearly reduced to a straight live, as the ringing chamber is on the gronid floor, and the organ is bwilt across the front of it. The beantiful ring of six at Rock Ferry was next visited, and tounhes of Oxford Bob and Plain Bob browelti round, after wheh a move was made to Port Sunlight, On this fine-toned ring, foucheg of Oxford and Komt Majot and Grandsire Triples wers ring, and afterwards tea was pertaken of. The final hatting place was Capenhurst, where Mr. E. W. Elwell. Guild secretary, joined in the ringing of Cambridge Surprive Minor. Double Boh and Plain Bob. Chester wat reached again about 9.30 p .m. after a most happy day. The band are very grateful to the Rectors aad tower keepers of the many towers visited for their kind help, and to the friends who 'made up" at various places. ## ARCHDEACON'S HELP.

Sir, In two of the reports of meetings which appeared in your last issue there were recorded certain actions which must have given gatification to miny of your readers, as they dide to me.

Whether this particular reguest is well-advised or not is of no concern in this fetter, What I an glad to see is that the Archdeacon invited the association to reach the clergy through the official diocesan organ, and that the suggestion was accepted. I em convinced that much gooll work in the cause of bells, ringing, and ringing organisations, could be achieved by the use of this channel of jmparting informafion to the nonoringrag clergy, and I would suggest to the officials of all our Guilds and Associations that they should make use of thege pablications, which ere to be found in evary diocese.
The second point was the action taken it the Suffolk Guid meeting. where Archdeacon Darling, who presided, undertook to briag beFore the oflaer Archudeacons and the Rural Deans of the Diocese the drogers of "clocking.' so that they may inquire, in their visitations, to what extent thin rangerous practice is in operntion, and eee that it is stopped. A personal action of this kind wilf go a great deal further Ihan any ammer of letters from association secretaries, whorn incumbents may look upon as interfering busy-bocies, because it will come with the force of authority of a 'superior officer.' The letter of an association secretary can be dropped into the waste paper basket and ignored ; but na Arcidencon cannot be treated in casactly the same way. I look upon this action in Suffolk as one of great jmportance, and I hope it may not be long before similar steps can be taken in every other diocese in the country.-Fours truly.

All ringers are welnomica. Briflstow is id miles from Ross. The worte is being entried out by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank.

## METHODS <br> To the Editor.

Dear Sir,-If Mr. Feeble will look at my lether again he will see that I did not write 'it is ridiculous to say that Dublin Duplex beyongs to Mr. Lindoff,' but that ' to say thati anyone is the "author" of thet method is, to one who knows anything about the matior, simply ridiculous.' And, further, as sufficient evidence that it was known long before Mr. Lindoff publisled it. I pointed out that it was pribied in 'The Bell News' as far back as 1899. The exact date is October 21st, and Mr. Keeble, or anyone else who has a file of 'The Bell News, can easily verify this statement.

But it will be much more interesting, if, inatead of wrangling about authorskip, real or imaginary, I explain what the method really is.
First, I want you to cxamine a course of Bob Major, preferably by ringing it in the tower.
It is founded, you will see, on the Hunting Caurse of sisteen changes, in which all the bells plain hunt, and which we call the rlain Principle. In this Hunting Course ihe Coursing Order of the thells is thr same throughout, and is 312468753 , efe.

At tho lead end, second's place is made, and directity this is done the Coursing Grder in I3246875I, etc. What las happened is that the Coursing Order of the Working (or Extreme) bells is the seme as before, but tho Treblo has made a step by changing positions with the third.

At the next lead end second's is ngain made, and now the treble changes positions in coursing order with the fifth.

Write out the coursing orders of the seven learls, and you get.

What has happened is that the Treble has sucessively cluanged positions in coursing arder with cacl of the workiag bells, until by completing the cyclical movement it returns to its original position, and the bells run round.
This cyclical movement of the Troble through the coursing order of the working bells is what we call a 'Constructional Shunt,' and is the foundation law of method construction.
You will see it consiets of a definite number of similar steps, each one of which is made by changing positions with the bell coursing next before it. Each step $\mathrm{b}_{5}$ itself will produce a lead end, which is to the previous lead end rs 3527486 is to 2345678.
If instead of making second's place you make кeventh's when the ireble is hehind you get exactly the same results. We call either of these an Extreme Constructional Shunt.

The simplest group of methods will be that constructed by

1. The Extrems with the treble before.
2. The Extreme with the treble behind,
3. The Extreme with the treble beforc, and slso that with the treble behind.
The lead ends of the first two will be 3527486; of the third 3527486, transposed by itself, equals 5738264 .
The next Construclional slant is made as follows: The bell which is coursing next beforo the treble makes any one internal place, crasses the treble's path, immediately makes another place ant follows up belhind the treble.

The reault is cxactly the same as with the Extremes. The treble has changed pasitions in cousing order with the bell next before it. If you make this Shunt once only in a lead the lead end will be 3527486, as with the Extremes.
This kind of Sluunt we call $\boldsymbol{n}$ Court Shunt. A Court Shunt can be made at either hand-stroke or back-stroke. The first we call a $P$. Court Shunt, the second an R. Court Shunt. A P. Court Slunt, will. by itself, as yon will fina, chuse one bell to lie still att lead or behind for four blows, otherwise the effeet is exactly the same as the R. Conrt Shants or' the Extremes. Fere is an example of each.

On eight ibells there are two positions in which you can make an R Court shunt with the treble going up, viz., 4th's and 3rd's, and 6th's and 5th's. And three positiong in which fou can make a $p$ Cours Shunt, viz., 3rd's and 2nd's; 5th's and 4th's, and 7th's and 6th's. But wherever you make any one the effect is always the same. Ther are also the corresponding positions with the treble going down.
When you have got these facts, you work out all the combinations of the Shunts, and you get the full extent of the methods on this plan.

But that is not all.
On any aumber of bells from four upwards there are two positions, and two only in which you can make Extremes, bat since with a greater number of bells the path of the treble is increased, tho number of positions in which you can make Cowrt Shunte is increased also.

With four bells there is one Court Shunt possible, thus :
On five belis there are two positions, on six bells thert

2341 are tlirce positions; on seven beils four positions, and so en in regular order. Thus you have only got to prepare a formulin in the form of a mathematical progression to gel the whole of the methods on this plan to infinity. And each of these has four variations.

1. Without Extremes.
2. With Extrome at Treble's lead.
3. With Extreme with Treble behind,
4. With botli Extromes.

If you count the mumber of Shunts in the lead cot have got the lead end. Thus, four Court Shunts and tro Extremes, is a total of six Slunt, transpose 2345678 by 3527486 six times and you have thu luad end.

And now for the method in question. It is constructed by two $\pi$ Court Shants, ie.e, 4 th's and 3 rd: and 6th's and 5th's (this by itself is Double Normich), and one $P$ Gourt Shunt between them.

These tirce Shuntr are with the treble going up, and the correspondiag ones are made with the treble going down. You have thus gix Slunts in each lead, and the lead end is, therefore, 4263857.
Now. if you add one Extreme that will make seven Shants in ali. Bnt snven Shunte will complete the treble's cyclical path through the coursing order of the working bells, and, therefore, the bells win come round at the lead end. Adding two Extremes will make oiglit Shunts, and 12345878 transposed by 3527486 eight times equals 357496 , which is the lead end.

Just one word about the name of the method. It has had at least four (if not more), but since it has been rung the mame under which it was rung must stand. But with this qualjecation Mr. Keeble says it was rung as Dublin Duplex. My recollection (which may be at fault) is that it was Dublin Complex. Whether it wrs one or the ather the second word must go. Duplex meang either double or nothing at all. If it does mean double then double is the right word and no other. And Complex won't do either. In conetruction the methor is the pery reverse of Complex. And though it is not the easiest of methods to ring, 'Complex' woald be onn' of the last words to describe the work. The real name of the method is Doublin Court Bob. To be strictly accurate it shonld bo Double Duhlin Courf Bob, but the combiation of syllables is rary awkward to the ear--Yours truly,

I have had the experience of being secuetary for Dorset. in the Belisbury Guild, when we had not a change singing band in the county, aud if we had not enrolled as many wound ringers ass we woulet, we never should have had such bands. And now $I$ gmi secretary in a county where there are so many clange yingers, that they fire quite suffient to make a Guid, and, to tell the truth, fo not see what use it is to lave round ringers in the Guild.
In botlu cases what we have done is to mark those who are change ringers with a star in the list, but to reckon round ringers just es much members as thande ringers. Also in the Suffolk Guilel, we are maw arranging to bave a certificete, which will not bo a mere certifiante of membership, but a certificate of praficiency, and will he available to mark different stages in a ringer's career, and will be something always to look forward to.

It seems strange that there should be any opposilion to round ringers being members, when thoy hring in both numbers and income, but there is a fear that they may become so numerous as to outnumber change ringers, and eatuse the Guild to be run for their amn benefit. This is never likely to take place. Round ringers are not so keen as a rule as to be wery willing to join the Guile at all. They will slways be few in number; and if by some change of character they were to join in large numbers, the change rivgers would always he the most intelligent and getive members, and be those who world keep affaits in their own hands.
Again, if round ringers ate not to be members, how are suclu bands ever to become change ringers? Apparently onls by the accident of a change ringer lappening to go and live in such a place. that means centuries before one can get a clance of making then all change ringers. Buts if one lias them already as members, it will not be manty years before there is change ringing in evers tomet.

## ANCIENTBELLS AND TOWERS.

CENTRAL COUNCIE AND S.P.A.B.'s REPORT ORRCULATRA

## According to a recent issue of "The Times," the Central Commitfer

 or the Protection of Churches hiare circulated the memorandum on eluroh bells agreved some two years ago between the Society for ihe Pratection of Ancient Buildings and the Central Council of Churci Bell Ringers.A letter accompanying the circular covers the ground Which has already been dealt with. It emphasises most strongly the danger that may pecrue to our ancient church towers ay the addition of mave bellg, unless they are lung under skilled advice. Ancient towern were not built ta contain the nore recent type of heary bell used for change ringing. The great majority of mediseval bells were not only fewer aed lighter than those of a later period, but it is highly doumlful if they were ever swung rount as in clange ringing mow that wo are beginning 10 see the effect of a large nuzber af ad ditions of heavy ringing bells, improperly hung and of unsuitahls degigned frames, placedin ancient towers, especially in tlye 19 th epmtury. Those concerned with ringing should hear in mind that, while some itncient towers cen stand such additions, there are many which cannot.'

The committme "suggest that diocesan enmmittees shomld not atvise the eratning of taculties for repairs to bells withont a refinite zuderstanding whethel or not luning according to the Simpson or Gpe-tone melthod is proposed : that no Simpson tuning shonld he adrised on hells dating from hofare 1700 , anti only under special circumstances on bells dafing from hefora 1800 .' No opinion is expressed on the desirability of tuning new holls acoording to the Simpson method, thongh it is pointed out that technical opinion is by no weans agroen Thise let merits.
The letlor ndids ihat the committep express serious eoncern at " information recnived as to tho enndition of certain ancient towers in the country which are of priceless artistic and architectural qaine. Tt is not, without reason that they would arge unon diocesan commithees the desirability of inspeeting and wateling towers and the nend of ohtaining reports by competent architects in as many asses as pos-
