## TO REACH THE OUTSIDERS.

A very gratifying state of affairs exists in the Suffolk Guild, for it is reported that, with one exception, every change ringing tower in the area is fully affiliated to the organisation. We wonder how many other associations can boast of an equally good record. The ideal state of affairs, of course, would be that every tower with a peal of bells should be affiliated, and it is towards this end that associations should ever be striving. That the majority are always working to achieve this result cannot be denied, but we are not so certain that more could not be done than is done to bring in the towers which for no special reason, except, perhaps, neglect or indifference, remain outside. We realise the difficulties with which associations are faced in their task, but no stone should be left unturned in the process of "converting ' those who remain outside the pale. There are some associations who use very little effort of the missionary kind; some who never make a point of officially visiting an unaffiliated tower, and simply wait until private influence or spontaneous desire prompts an application for admission.

There are, of course, other associations who carry on well organised efforts to reach these outside towers, but we should like to see a much more general endeavour to bring then into the 'fold.' Instead of leaving it to casual private invitation, as i often the case, a zealous official campaign might be inaugurated, and, just as a business man seeking a new customer does not give up trying at the first rebuff, so a persistent attempt-should be made. Let formal invitation be followed up by interview with ringers and clergy, and the importance of alfiliation with the county or diocesan body stressed. Pressure such as this, if continuous and tactfully exercised, would be bound to telt. We believe that the plan which is followed in some associations, of providing for the affiliation of the tower-as distinct from the ringersis a step in the right direction. This is usually effected through the incumbent or the Parochial Council, and where the church authority can be influenced to support officially the diocesan organisation it almost goes without saying that the support of the ringers would follow. We do not always emphasise sufficiently the fact that a ringer, in joining the association, is joining a body formed not merely to cater for his amusement or instruction, but established as a part of the Church's organisation in the diocese. It is the diocesan aspect, indeed, which would make the strongest appeal, if all associations were to endeavour to introduce the system of tower affiliation. We believe that in future our ringing associations will see the importance of such action as we advocate, instead of the 'go-as-you-please' methods so common to-day.

## BELFRY GOSSIP

The fine little handbells used in (lie peal at Leicester last weok went to France and Flanders with their intrepid owner, Sergt. Harry Stoneley, R.G.A., and werg under bombardment in the trencles many times. Often when thingeg got too hot, and E. Harry had ta run for it, bis little bag of handioell were invarinbly his first thought, and whatever else wis left behind, these never left lim.
The Royal Cumberland Youths will hold their annual meeting on January 17 th next.
As mentioned in the footnote to the report published last week, the peal at Torquay on November 29th was the fitst on the bells for 29 years. The bells have a long draught, and do not ga well. Tlas previous peal rung there ( it 1895 ) was by the Oxford Guild and the band included the Rev. F. E. Robinson and Mr. J. W. Wastbrook.

Ou December 12th, 1848, St. Martin's Society, Birmingham, rang s peal of 7,392 Stedman Citaques, which was composed and couducted by Fenry Jolnson, and wis the longest lengtly in the method up to that cate.
A peal of 8,008 Grandisire Cinguos was tung nt St. Stwiour's, Soutlowark, on December 15th, 1735, and long stood as the zecord lenglh iv this metlod. In this pen! ' Benjamin Aunable call'd bobs.'

The first peal in South Africa was zung twenty years ago next Monday, this heing Grandsire Triples at Woodstock

Yesterday, in the evening wns rung by our ringers at Sb, Mary's tower in this town 5,040 changes, being the whole peal of Grandsire Triples on eight bells; ilwe persons were Jamos Kervidge, aged 6i, Bth; Isaac Whitchant, 7th; Stephen Bond, 6th; George Bond, 5th; Stephen Kirby, 4iln: Robert Hogger, 3rd; Thomas Bennett, 2nd: George heston, treble, which was slone in three hours and eleven minules by the above said persons to the satisfaction of all thet lovers of that science.
The sbove is guoted from the 'Ipswich Gazette' of December 131h. 1735, so that the 189th mnniversary of this peal occurs to-morrow. There is no bonrd in the tower relntiug to this peal.

William Banister, best known of ibe famous Woolwich ringing iamily, called the first peal in Excler, a peal of Grandsire Triples, nt St. Fidwell's on December 18th, 1875. Mr. Banister was then at Plymouth Dockyard. It is inferosting to noto that the back eight bells of St. Sidwell's were hought from All Hallows' Chureh, Goldsmith Sireet, in 1767, when the latter churel, being much in debt, was glad to prise mondy in thim way.
The first peal of Canterbury Pleasure Major was rute at WrarnInm, Sussex on December 1741,1888 . Probably more Canterbury Pleasure Major has been rung in this tower than anywhere. A bind once started there for a 20,180 in the method, and rang a long way.
The handbelf pers at Northrepps, publishod last week, was rung for the Norfolk Ginild to which S . L. Ryshow was elected a member bofore starting

The peal of Stedman Caters on handbolls at Nuneaton wifa rung on November 29th, not the 22ud, fis publisheri.
St. Mary-le-Towar bells, Ipswich, will not, we learn, be available for some months, owing to thie extensive work that has to be done to the masonty of the fower.
The Bishop of Peterborough has granted aticense as Lay Reader to Mr. Fred Wilford, Master of the Petertorongh Diocesan huild. He was insituted on Gaturday by the Rev. J. P. Frond, R.D., who is prosident of the Northampton Branch of the Guild.

Mr. Wilford was one of the first advocates of services at ringers' mectings in Northamptonshire, where they lave sinco grown to he a strong feature of such gatheringe.

On December 9th, 1889 . the late Mr. James Molte called the first part of Day's peal of 16,608 Treblo Bob Majar, which was rung an laandbells.
The peal of Treble Bob Major 㫙 St, Martin's, Epsom, rublisied Inst week, was in the Kent, and not the Oxford Variation.

## THE LATE MR. W. J. SEVIER

RECOLLECEIONS OF MR. JOHN AUSTIN.
My first meeting with the late Mr. Sevier was whilst at Burton, when he thrned up at St. Pand's Church on an liaster Sunslay morning and at St, Modwen's at night, he being then on the road to banchester. The next ciay (Enster Monday), the anaual meeting of the Midland Counties Assuciation was hold ut Dufficld, and W. J. S. turned up, laving walked from Burton. Afterwards he made his way to Manchostol", as far as I know with liftle success, Eor shartly afterwartis lie was back in Gloucester. On my leaving Burion foy that city, the deceased was the first ringer I met, and he introduced me to Ibe St. Michael's Iuniors al their practice on 'Iharsday night, and from that time we were continually out ringing together. There is not fower reund ahout Gloucester which the deceased harl not visited. He would think nothitg of walking five or six miles for a practice, iurl oconsiomally wobld ge off for a bwemty or flifoy mile walk at the week-end to visit some tower which cuuld not he reached in the weck-finy. One Sunday evening, after ringing ui Thornbury the walked back to Gloncester twenty miley, and, an oue accasion, when on the road from Liondon, he walked from Reading to Gloucester, 75 miles in one dey.

As a ringer he was a good striker, and always realy, if flyere was a bell going badly, to lackle it. Athough he never mastered Surprise methods he was well at lrome in Stedman, Grandsire, Plain Bob, Trolile Bob and Double Norwich. Ho was always willing to go and assist; any band wherever his services were required. He was a memtier of the St. Michael's Juniors from the commencement until he left Gloucester.
Unfortunately the uews of his death came too late for the society to be representerl at. the funcral, or to sead a wreath. but as the Gloucester and Bristol Association was meeting at Barnwood, where Mr. Sovjer was a member of the hand in 1888, it was suggested that a muffed neal he rung as a token of respect. This peal was suecessful, and will be found recorded in the peal colarins. J. A.

The Lindon ringing societies would doubtless be only too pleased to make the nacessary ringing arrangements, wero you to approach them on the subiect, and I am sure that the result would be much apprectiated by all ringers who have receiving sels, as well as by all lopers of bells.

The ahiming of hulls is nol the true English method of using these beautiful instruments, ared is, at best, only a make-shift.
While on this subjerf, T ghould like to suggest that, on New Year's Eve, you would he giving us ali a great tront if zou would broadeast the ringing out of the old year and the ringing in of the new. By this T mean, the mufted ringing of the bells before midnight, the striking of the hour, aut then the open ringing to welcome the new yenr.

This is anrrierl ont at many churchos, it is very impressive, and you could doubtless easily arrange it, with the ringing nuthorities referred to above.

In fhe first place, the late Mr. Wasibrook was born in the parisin of Kidlington; secondly, it was at this tower where he achieved one of the greatest performances in the history of ringing; and, fingly, permission is always readily given for peals at any time within reason. It is waste of time arguing with people of the caliture of the great lillte WE, so with your permission I will sulnnit at proof that London Surprise Minor and London Surprise Major are one and the same method.

These people who used this foolish and pedantic term are now conrieted by their own Court of Appeal by using the wiong word. It is had enough for the "Glossary' to use tha term wrongly: but for ringers to use it in a sense which is both glaringly wrong. and differs from the 'Glossary,' is incexasble, as well as unworkmanlike.
The result is that these ringers, whose kowledge of language is not ertual to their knowledge of our science-(their pre-manence in this we readily acknowledge)-are mistanderstanding one another, and confusing us.- Yours etc.,
