## A NOTABLE PERFORMANCE.

The record of the peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus at St. Paul's Cathedral last Saturday is the record of a great performance. The peal appears exactly as sent by the conductor, without any footnote whatever, but if ever a peal was worthy of comment such an achievement certainly is. It was the first peal of Cambridge Maximus on the bells, which are the heaviest ring that have been rung ' all in 'to a peal. Moreover, the tenor at St. Paul's is the heaviest bell ever turned-in to a peal by one man, and congratulations will be extended to the band of College Youths who made the successful attempt. It is some years since the first effort was made to ring a peal in this difficult method on the noble bells of St. Paul's, and the real merit of the performance can only be fully appreciated by those who have had experience in ringing a method of this character on bells of such a weight.

Peal attempts at St. Paul's Cathedral are only very rate occurrences, and we believe there have been but nine peals rung on the befls in the forty odd years they have been in the tower. At first it was considered that the tenor was necessarily a two-men job, but in course of time it was proved that not only was it possible for one man to ring this great bell behind to Cinques, but it was demonstrated that the bell could also be turned in singlehanded.
Peals of Keyt Treble Bob Maximus have been rung in the past, and now at length a band of College Youths has added yet another great achievement to the many which have marked the history of the Anciēt Society, wbile Mr. Alf. Peck, who rang the tenor to the record peal of Stedman Cinques at Southwark Cathedral in 1923, has once more proved his marvellous capacity to undertake a giant's task. Others there may be who could equal what he has done, had they the opportunity, but their number is extremely limited. On such a ring of bells as those at St. Paul's, however, every man who takes part fully deserves a share of the credit, and last Saturday's ackievement will undoubtedly go down in ringing history as one of the most notable peals on record.

The performance recalls some other fine feats, such as Mr. William Pye's singlehanded task at Exeter Cathedral, when he rang the great tenor bell behind to a peal of Stedman Caters, and the achievement of a man like Mr. James George, who, when past $7^{\circ}$ years of age, can turn a bell like Southwaris tenor in to a peal of Maximus. Mr. James Washbrcok, in his prime, performed some herculean tasks, among then the peal at Wells Cathedral many years ago. Then, too, there should be included those who have previously rung St. Paul's tenor singlehanded to peals of Cinques or Maximus, and those great achieve-

 LIVERPOOL TOWER NOT STRONG ENOUGH．St．Barnabas＇e Church，Mossiey Hill，Liverpool，is not，after all， to have the peal of bells which did service for so many years in the old Chureh of St．Peter，Chureh Street，Liverpool．At ihe moraing Eervice，on Sunday，the Vicar of St．Rarnabas＇s，the Rev．J．Kirk ［1ike，pretaced his sermon with an announcement which，be said，he knew would be a disappointment to the congregation．It had been found that the tower of the church would not bear the strain of the bells．
Subsequently，in an interview with a representative of the＇Liver－ pool Daily Post，＇the Vicar said the ofer of the bells was gladly ac－ cepted by St．Barnabas＇s people，who never had any doubt but tlat the church tower was strong enough to carry them．An expert sur－ vey，however，had shown that this was not the case．＇Our disup－ pointment，＇arlded Mr．Pike，＂is very great，bul we have to accept frels，and mize the best of thom．Those lovers of the bells who have kindly contribated to the fund for their being lung will be com－ municated with at，an early date．＇

It was estimated that the cost of langing the bells would he 21，000．This was a leavy responsibility for the congregation，hut they accepted it．A subscription list was opened，and there was no doulst that in due time the money would lave been raised．

RINGER AND VERGER FOR 40 YEARS，
The funeral of Mr．Edward Lucas，of Slalford，Surrey，whase death，at the age of 69 years，oecurred on ilnatary $22 n d$ ，took place on January 26 th．The first part of the serviee，which wag hold in tho Parish Church，where Mr．Lucas was for 40 years a ringer and verger，was fally rhoral，and was attented by many who had known him in his official capacities．The music included his favourite hymn，＂The day Thou gavest，Lorll，is ended．＂

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

-The company rurg on Monday, Feb. 14 th, 1731 , a complete peal of 7,018 Grandsjre Cinques, being the longest that was ever lone, and in 5 hours and 19 minutes it was completed. Tlus the College Youtlis' record of a peal rung at. St. Michacl's, Cornhill, when 'B. Anuable calE'd bobs.

And it was February $14 t h, 1920$, that the grentest number of changes in a twolve-bell peal was rumg-13,001 Grandsire Cinques, al, Painswick, in 8 hours 45 minutes.
Tho 'four nines' of Grandsive Major ( 9,999 changes) was rung at Oldinm exactly one hundred pears ngo next Sunday. but from a note in Suowdon's 'Graudsiro' it would suppear that the ligures of this peal eventually proved false.

Next Monday is the annivorsary of two long peals, a 14,224 Bob Major at Aston, by St. Martin's Youbls, on Feb. 16th, 1789, and 8,448 Stedman Cinques at Prinswick in 1858. On Feb, 16th, 1790, n 6,000 Oxford Treble Lob Royal was rung at Cembridge.
Londou lost a peal of twelve bells on Wednesday, Feh. 17th, 1836, when Christ Church, Spilalfields, was destroyed by five.
The College Youk rang a peal of 10,000 Oxfort Treble Bol Royal at Sloreditel on Peh. 18th, 1777 -one of the series of increasing lenglis which were the outcome of the rivalry existing at that fome between them and the Cumbernads.
The first peal of what we now rall New Cambridge Siurprise wa rung at Hukdersfield on Folb. 181h, 1822, and, as far as we ara aware, no other peal in the methed was rung until that at Burton in 1887.

At Wamham, Sussex, the fist, peal of College Single Major was rung on Feb. 18th, 1889.

Henry Ealey, one of Lomdon's gratest ringerg of the last century, was born at Betlinal Girect on Fob. 19th, 1819. He took part in anay memorable perfommaces on lower zud handbells, ant rang, in all, 182 peals, of which lie condueted 155 and composed 105.

Lithle Bob' writes, with reforence to the ancient clated bells at Eythorne, that in North's 'Bells of Northamptonslife,' and 'Bells of Leicestershive, too, spenking of ancient dated bells, the author says: "Two, richly ormanented and dated 1323, are fa the tower of Sl. Mary's Church, Somercotes, Lincolnshire.'
At the amutal meeting of the St. Lawrence (Thanol, ringots tian uther day, the record of the atteudances was read, and it was found that the Vicar (ihe Rer. A. G. Wilcox, ML.A., Hon. C.T.) Inad wisited the tower 31 times during the year. Can any other tower bonst of such frequent waits from their Viear?

The peal at Long Melford, on Saturdny, is an interesting ling with forty years ago. It was rung on the 69th birthday of Mr. W J. Nevard, who rang his first peal in that lower on bis 290 b hirthelay, on Feb, 7th, 1885 . This was a peal of Bot Major, composed by the late Mir. Samuel Slater, nad eonductot by Mr. Fred Pitstow. ## BELL HANGERS \& ODD.STRUCK BELLS.

 To the Editor.Dear Sir,-I would like to crury the sulject of my brother's letier on 'false, bells a step further. Many ringers seem to think that there is a certain anount of chance in connction with bell langing as to whether a bell will strike falsely ol not. In my opinion this is not lhe case.
I consider that if, when the bell langs in 'down' position, the lip lics symmetrically und horizontally about a perpendicular dropped from lite axis of the gudgeons and midway between them, and the Knuckle joint of the clapper is fixed symmetrically about this perpendicular, then the bell will not bo false. Now, such a simple geometric construction as this contd as easily be applied to bell hance ing as to any other department of enginecring. Fet we find new bells not only striking falsely, but very falsely.

What is the reason for this? It is, I think, that come bell hangers, like a good many other actisans, do not always do their work thoraughly unless they are well looked after.
The bencfits derived from baving true striking bells are twofold. First, it is easier for roung bands to learn on therr: in the second phace it is easier to produce good striking with theat, theroby reducing tife liability of outsicle complaints of "noise of the bells."
It is quile common now, I think, to find the clause "the bells are to be in perfect tune in bell faunder's contracts, and I think it just as essential that 'the bells shall not strike falsely' should also be stipulated.'-Yours faitlufully,

## MORE EXFFRIMENJING REQTJRED. <br> To the Edilor.

Dear Sir,-The letter ircm Mr. E. P. Duffeld. in your last issur, criticising B Bell langets and oddentruct bells, provides matter tor reflection on the curious mander in which many rings of belis are left hy first-class bell hangers. 1 am strougly in sympatiay with Mr. Duffield, who objects to bells being left ly modern Iolitheres, whels are in many cases hopelessly false. I live vivid recollections of ringing a splendial tenor on a modera peal of bells, to a peal of Double Norwich. This bell was wery wide at back, while the soventla was equally elose at back, with the result that the long clodging lack and front involved much nnnecessary labour.
Ore fruitful cause of inafficient attention being paid to experimenting, particularly with regard to peals of ten and upwards, is, fa $\mathrm{my}^{7}$ opinion, the fact that in the great; majority of cases the tenor is simply used as a covering bell. It is obrions that the task of carering with an odd-stuck bell is much easial then jingilg it iu, and if some means could be devised to make balla clapper with greater precision, the whole Esercise would be laid wder a great dehe of gratitude.-Yours faithful
