## BRISTOL-AND SOME REFLECTIONS.

The anniversary of the first peal of Bristol Surprise Major, which occurs on Sunday, leads to the rellection that this is the only modern Surprise method which has become really popular. This first peal was rung at Brighton on February 22nd, 1901 , at a period when the hand of St. Peter's Church were leading the way in the introduction of new Surprise methods. The company had rung several others before this, and there was nothing at the time to lead one to imagine that Bristol would become any more fancied than were some of the rest that were being brought to light. But gradually the excellencies of the method began to be realised, and, offering something really distinctive in its actual practice, Bristol gradually came to be looked at by bands capable of Surprise ringing, and now is the only method in this category that in any way holds its own with London, Cambridge and Superlative in the number of peals rung.

We often wonder why so few bands ever ring anything beyond the four Surprise methods named. It is not because they are not capable; it cannot be because other methods are not worth attention, for, while they may not all be up to the standard of Bristol, it is quite certain that some have musical qualities equal to or better than the other three. It is no fair comparison to set the good points of the old methods against the bad ones of the new, or vice versa; and it is possible for a man who understands methods to pick holes in most of then. We must then, we think, look further than the methods themselves for the expianation. Is it that ringers do not trouble to go beyond what one may call these 'common' methods, because no one else rings them, and there would, therefore, be little or no opportunity to practice them away from one's own tower? If that be so it is rather a poor excuse for putting a brake on progress-for progress includes extending the variety of the methods we ring as well as the intricacy of them. We really think it must be the ultra-conservatism of ringers as a whole that causes this desire to remain on well-beaten tracks; otherwise we should see more bands following tne example of the Leiston company and adding other methods to their "repertoire." Even in the simpler methods the same argument applies. A band at Willesden rang a number of fresh plain methods last year -a most interesting series-and their experiment might have been expected to lead others to venture on the new ground. But we wonder whether, in ten years' time, any one of them will be in general practice, or whether Plain Bob and Double Norwich will still hold the field almost undisputed, as they have done in the past.

\section*{CONCERNING CONSTRUCTIONAL SHUNTS.}

\section*{By J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE,}

First if all, I want my reader to ring a course of Plain Bob Major. In the tower, if possible, if nat on peper, and in imaginanion. I want hirn to study carefully the different coursing orders in that ccurse. Fie will find that ail the working bells keep the same coursing orier among themsalves throughout \((2,4,6,8,7,5,3)\), but that the treble is in a different position in each lead. She starts between 2 and 3. In whe second load she is between 3 and 5 . In the third between 5 and 7. t each lead end she makes one step in coursing order until she has, in repular succession, occupied each of he seven possible positions. When she lias completed the cyclo she gets back agrain between 2 and 3 , nad the bells run reund.
Every method which has treble and working bells, contains at least one similar cycle; most methods contain two or more. For instance, in Deuble Bob you will find that the treble alters her position in coursing order twice in every lead; and during the course completes two full cycles.
The operations which cause these alterations in the position of the treble iu coursing order we call 'Constructional Shunts'; and my present object is to explain the various ways in which these alterations can be made. These constructional shunts will themselves prolueg a great number gad pariety of melthods, but many methods (ineluding pracionlly every Treble Bob matlod) contain other work, which js called 'Additional Shunts.' With them we are not at present concerned.
For the sake of elearness and to avoid laving to write largely in general terms, I am goigg to deal only with Major methads, which bave ono plam lunting treble and seven 'Extreme' or 'Working Bellsa' But all I say can, with the necessary verbal alterations, be applied to all methods on all numbers.
The warions Constructional Shunts are as follows :-

\section*{A. THE EXTREMES}
1. The Extreme Before. The hell the Ereble turns from the front wakes second'g place the bells above dodging.
2. The Extreme Belind. The bell the treble turns from behind makes seveath's place, the bells below dodging.

The rasult of all these semen Constructional Shunts is the game. It is to reverse the positions in coursing order of the treble and the bel immediately next before it. Each shunt is one step in the treble's cyclical path in coursing order. In the plait course on eight bells each shunt puts the treble from between 2 and 3 to batwoen 3 and 5; and brings up the lead end 13527486.

\section*{C.-THE SLOW WORK SHUNTS.}

One or more of the bells which the treble (hunfing up) leaves on the front, remain in the same position until the treble returns, when all the bells plain lunt. The slow work bells are the bells coursing immediately after the treble

These Construchonal Shumts inclutie ercry one of the operations by which the position of the treble can be altered in coursing order. They cas be used in combination, several shunts being made in a single lead. But, of course, the work of one must not interfere with the work of another. For instance, if you here a Slow Work Shunt you cannot in the same lead lasve an Extreme Behind, for the later would upset the Slow Work Shunt. You will also notice that several of these sliunts produce features that are not desirable in a finished method. P. Court Shunts and Slow Work Shunts cause bells to lie still for more than two consectutive Hows. Tho majority of the Conrt Shunts are not symmetrical about the treble's path. But there are means by which these blomishes can be removed, and they do not lessen tho ralue and use of these Constructional Shunts in producing good methods. However, we need not trouble about that now. What we are concermed with for the moment, is what Constructional Shunts are, and the work they do in producing a methad.

All these Constructional Slumts men be applied directly to Treble Fob methods, and there are in addition one or two variations whigh are peculiar to that Principle.

He was interred at Tyldesley Cemetery on the Glin inst., the service being conducted by the Rev. Stones, a former curate, assisted by the Vicar and curate, and the Rev. Ganon Elsee (tite president of the association). As the cortege was going to the church, 896 Grandsive Triples was rung with the bellis muffled by a feproseatative band, viz.: G. \section*{STAINDROP VETERAN RENGER}

DIES BEFORE HEARING NEW PEAL OF BELLS
Many of the older numbers of the Durham and Newcastle Association will read with regret of the passigg away, at the ripe old age of 84 years, of Mr. Daniel Shipp, who was one of the origina! members at the formation of the association in 1877. Fe was born in the village of Great Filbraliam, in the county of Gambridge, where, as a boy, lie usen to go up into the belfry to watali the riagers, and at home used to look over his elder brofler's shoulder as he pricked out the changes. He came to Staindrop in 1863, where he formed a band for change risging, of which he was the capiain for very many years, being succeeded in that offiee by his younger son, Mr. F. Shipp, who, assisted by his elder brother, Mr. J. W. Shipp, is ably carrying on the work started by his father. Fhere aro still two of the original baad at the tover, in the persons of Mesars. T. Leomard and W. E. Jolinson.

The late Mr. Shipp was one of the keenest ringers that the writer has ever met, walking or cyeling many miles to ring long after ablier men had coased to take interest in ringing. Fe tonducted the only 5,040 of Winor ever fung on the bells of St. Mary's, Staindrop, winich, at the time of his death, had been removed for restoration, as they were not considered safe to ring
Thece is to be a nem frame and new peal oi eight installed and dedicated on Palna Sunday by the Lord Bishap of Durinem. They will be rung for the fist time on Easter Day This new frame and peal of cight are by Messrs. Taglor and Co., Loughborough.
