## THE REVIVAL IN THE FYLDE

It is gratifying to read that at length there seem to be signs of real revival in the Fylde district of the Lancashire Association, where, for a long time past, apparently unavailing efforts had been made to create interest and enthusiasm in tinging. For years the officials, and particularly the secretary, have had an uphill and disheartening task, and less stouthearted men would long since have thrown up a thankless and discouraging struggle. Patience and preseverance appear now to be reaping their reward, and support such as that which was forthcoming at last Saturday's meeting must have been a matter of great satisfaction. Only those who have tried to build up an organisation in the face not merely of apathy, but of discouragement, if not of actual hostility, have any notion of the difficulties which have to be confronted, and only enthusiasm for the cause, coupled with great tenacity of purpose, can overcome the trials that confront the organiser. The report of last Saturday's meeting shows that at last Mr. Sharples is meeting with the success for which he has so long laboured.
Now that the district is really awaking to its own interests, there is hope that steady proyress in the Fylde may be assured. Among the large associations, the Lancashire is one of the most virile, but in parts the county presents no small difficulties of organisation, difficulties which patient labour is sure to overcone, and the lesson of the Fyide ought not to be lost. The one thing that astonished us is that ringers, professing even a limited interest in the art, should ever be so apathetic over the activities of their association. This apathy is to be found in many places, and is by no means limited to any one society. All associations suffer from it in some area or at some time, and strong and persistent efforts are re quired to overcome it. Unless the officials are themselves keen, bands will lapse and eventually break away from the parent organisation.
It is not easy to find a quick solution of the problem. Can the associations make themselves more altractive than they are? It is not enough to ask a man to join an association merely for the moral support which he thus gives to it, for, while we always argue that a ringer should seek what he can put into the art rather than what he can get out of it, we hold that the big organisations should make membership as attractive as possible. In many cases they do not do all that is within their power for backward companies-backward not only in the ringing sense, but also in their sense of duty to their association. Wherever there is a backward band, or one where progress is slow, the parent society ought to get right into that bellry, and not leave it until the company is well on the high road to success. There are a lew cases, perimps, where such help would not only be unweleome, but probably resented. Instances of this kind require tactful handing, but they can be oyercome, and discouragement need not come with rebuffs. But in the vast majority of cases sfeady and consistent help such as we have suggested would be glady acceptec, and in the long run the association would profit from the loyalty and support which it would gain.

Abhote, a former housemasier al Preshute House, and now suitugan Bishop-designafe of sherborne.

Uanon Absott, previous to the dedication, dolivered a very forceful address on the uses of the church's musjeal instruments, partjcularly bells. He said that in the early history of the chureb the belld wore considened so holy that only the priests, by virtue of their holy office, were allowed lo ring them. He spoke of this because he wanted the present-day ringers to realise the sacredness of their otfice as ringers.
$H_{e}$ then fledicated the beds, lazading them over to the care of the Vicar and wardens. Whi'n the Camon and clergy returned to the chancel, rounds were rumg by the local ringels.

After the service, touches were ramg by various bands, including ringers from St . Mary's, Marliborough; "St. Peter's, Marlborougla; Ogbourne; Ogbourme St. George; St. Catherituc, Collingboume; Hedwyn, East Grafton and other fawers.
The mombers of the Salisbury Diocesan Gujk were afterwards entertained to tea by the Vicar and Mrs. Barlett.
The five present bells have been cast from the old metal made up to the weight of the former ones, with shape, moulding, dates and inscriptions carefully reproduced. The recasting and fitting of the holls liave been ably carvied out by Messis. Gillett and Jolinston, of Croytlon.
Replying to a vole of thanks proposed hy the Rev. F. S. Arrowsrnith, the hon. secretary of the Marlborougti Branch of the Diocesan Gulld, the Vicar saicl how pleased he and Mrs. Bartlett were do welcome so many tingers and friends. He hoped to meat them agnin before long, whed a Guild meeting could he arranged at his chureh. On behalf of mil the subscribers and parishioners, lie wished to say low plensed they ald were with the bells-his ringerg liad told hims the "go' was perfoct-and he wished Mr. S. Roper, who was representing Messirs. (itlletit and Jolnstan, to ronvey their best thanes to Mr. Jolmston for nll the trouble his firm had faken.
The tone of the yegtoren tuelts is particulsrly goorl, the mellaw richness of the tone of the old bells having heen retained and improverl lay their having beun tuned on modern lines.
As a conlimuation of the dedicalion festival, " sperial service was hecld on the Sunday morning. at which the Mayor, aldermen, courcillars, aremeta and Corporation emplayes of Marlborongh wert present. Thr Marlhorough town hanri, taking their stand in the belfry, accompanied the hymis. Mathorough Boy Scouts were also preseni. Before and after this service the helis were rung by the local ringers.

## APPLETON'S 'FOURTH OF MARCH.' ANNIVERSARF OF FAMOUS BELLS GELEBRATED.

The time-honoured 'Warel the fontlit ky, being the day which saw Hhe commencenment of the Eamous riug of lem at Appleton 107 years ago, was celebrated this year on Saturday, March 7th, it being generally agread by those most concernen that it is worth movithg from the actual fourth in order to secure a day in the week which is convenient to mast prople. That being the hour of dinner, it then becamu apparent that a goorly number of wisitors laat heen in and aloout the villege during the day sufficient anyhow to test the campass of the Thatelied Tavern to the utmost. Many cane who had heen ofter before-notibly Mr. G. Philloth, who is on the way to leceping bis jubilee 'Fourth.' These renewed old friendships: otlers came for the frish time, and made new friends and rowed to come again.
The Master, treasirer ast seetelary of the Oxford Diocesan Guild -mparted the Rector (the Rev. F. C. R. Jourdani and the heads of thing Appleton Ringing Society. Messrs, G. Holifield and R. White. Dimer was well served by Host and Hostess Brown, the 'sperrit. ang nsual heing on the menu

## BELFRY GOSSIP

Ringers attending the anmual mecting of the Midland Counties Association at Leicester should note that a clange lias been made in the service arrangements. The service is to be held it the Chureh of St. John-the-Divine, and not, at St. Martin's, as previously announced.
The Rev. C. D. P. Davies, formerly hon, secretary of the Gemint Gouneil, nnd now secretsry of the Basingsloke District of the Winchester Guild, is this year president of the British Astronomical Association.
Mr. D. Cecil Williams, Mus.Bac., Fellow of the Royal Callege ol Organists, and the gifled organist of Millbrook Churclı, Souitampton, has just rung his 50th peal. Mr. Williams is a native of Wiales, and nearly the whole of his ringing has been done with the North Stoneham band. Is be the first. Mas.Bne to reacls the latfeentury mark?
A peal at Carisbrooke, Isle of Wight, of a hundrud and fiety ynarg ago is recalled by the "Hampshire Cluronicle" in reprinting itens from the issue of March 20lı, 1775. This was a peal of Grandsine Triples, rung in 3 hours and 25 minutes "by a Society Clab of the said island.' The notice adds, ' If three or four gentlemen ringers think fit to make a tour to the said islanal, the athave society will accommotate them with either tripples or bob major."
It is not uninteresting to read in the sane issum (althongh it may lave nothing to do with the belfry) that at Winchester Assizes in the same week eleven people were sentereed to death, the offences including stealing a mare, sheep stenling, burglary, theft of a sadile and house-breaking. Verily, they were 'good old days.'
One of the great performances in the Dauble Norwich method was rung at Erith, by the Kent County Association, on April 3rd, 1889. The 15,072 changes were rusg in 9 hotirs 24 minutes.

At St. Chad's, Shrewsbury, is a tatbet recording a pesl of 10.097 Grandsire Caters, performerl in 6 hours 50 mimates. The tablet was erected hy the Union Society to record an excellent peal of Grandsise Caters rung here on Tucsday, April 5th, 1808, which, if surpassed by future practitioners, will stand as $\pi$ menorial flat their predecessors were not deficieat in skill and perseverance.'
Nine years next Monday, Mr. Henry Dains, one of the foremost composers of his day. died at the ago of 78.
The anniversary of the death of another famous Cumberland Youth ocebrs on Tuesday-George Newson died on Aptil 711, 2896.
The langest peal on record was sonumenced on April 7th, 1761 , amit completed on Apyil 8th, when the Teeds Fouths, of Kont, rang the oxtent of Roh Major ( 40,320 elanges) in 27 hours. 11 is on record that 13 ringers took part in the peal. Telitving one atoollotr at interFals. Among ilhe riugers was James Barliam, who during lis lomg life rang 112 peals.
The peal rung at Appleton, on March 17th, was Graudsire Caters. and not Stedman, as published.
On Aptil 7th, $1741_{1}$, was rumg at the Paristh Clatuch of 5 BL. Sepulehre (Helborn) a compleat peal of 5,200 Oxiond Triple Thob, tenin.... This was the first complete poal of 5.000 Oxford Triple Boh, ten-in, that was ever rung, and compleated in 3 hours 57 mintites."

This was rung by the Eastern Scholars, and at one time it was suggested that the pal was false, prolathly on account of the following lines which were appentled lo the recort of a performance in May 1741, by the College Youths, who rang another peal in the sam metliod.

When merit's justly due, is litule praise then serveth,
A good peal needs no frame, a hat one none deserwell
The late Mr. Jnsper Snowthan analysed the qutestion in his "Histary of Treble Rol ${ }^{\prime}$ and came ta the ronclusion thet, atthongh the penl might have been a' had ' one, there is little reason to suppose it was 'false.'

On April Bth, 1912, 12,160 Bristol Surprise Major was rung at Kidu worth, Herts, is 7 hours 18 ninutes, anki on the same date ins 2922. 13,440'Bob Major was rung at the Well Foturdry, Loughloronglif by the Mirlani Counties Ascociation.
Recently, in recalling an anoionl peal rung hy College Youtha, wh mentioned liat one of the riugers, Rolmort Catlin, was a well-known London bell fotmaler. Here ate some old bell founders who joinerd Ito Ancient Society, with the dates of their election: Brian Elribilge, 1649; Pliilip Whiteman, 1683: Henry Bagley, 1686: Ahenhiam Runhnll 1699; Rohert Catin. 1722; Thamas Laster, I748: Thomas Prek 1752 Joseph Enyre (St. Neots), 1763: Willam Meara. 1775: iolin Hrinnt (Hertford), 1782; Edward Arnold (Lpicester'), 1785: Thomas Janaway (Chelsea), 1786; Thomas Mcars, 1790: Thonas Meare, junr., 180] Willam Dohson (Downhan), 1801

## BIRMINGHAM RINGER'S GOLDEN WEDDING

## MR. AND MES. THOMAS RUSSAM'S JUBILFE.

Ringers throughout the country will join in congratulating Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Russam, of Birmingham, upon celebrating their golden wedding, and wist them still many years of life and happiness together. Thay were married at St. John's Church, Birmingham, on Marel 29th, 1875, and they nuw reside at 114, Walford Road, Gparkbrook. Unfortunately, Mr. Russam is at present confnerl to hed. He was trken ill with influenza and bronchitis a few days after the recent Jolnson Dinner, and is not yet sufficieatly recovered to get up, aithough he is, we are pleased to say, slowly improving.
What ringer that has visited Birmingham does not know Tom Russum. He is onc of the links willy a past generation of famous men. and ono of the pilters of St. iturtin's Guild, of which le is one of tho vice-presidents. His ringing career has been even longer than his long marvied life, for it began as far brack as 1869 at Bishop Ryder's Clurch, whetre lio was also in the choir. He liad become interested in bells even earlier than the rate montioned, for as a lnd he used to elimb, with others of his age, to the belfry and wateh with wondoring eyes the old man (callen? Puffer ' Malin, because ho was also organ blower) pulling the rope for servies. They soon hail a desire to ring the hell themselves, and al hast it was almost a fighe as to who shathla have a pull. Whem the peal was put in in 1968, Thom Russam became a regular ringer.

He soon met the gizants of that thay, Jolunson, Chattell, lerks, Fallswortly, Bidhliestone, etc., and used to sil, so to spenk, ae the fect of the miglty, pieking up knowledge fion their conversation. There ware few instublian boaks on riaginy in those days, so tho learner had no easy job. In this connection Mr. Russanz is one of the few Birningham ringers who had the priwilege of going to 'Billy' Chattell's takery, where this wortliy used to dernonstrate the slow mork' in Stedman by a movel method of his own,
At that fime J. Banister (af Woolwich) was towerkecper at Bistop Ryder's, and it is to him bir. Rusam owes it that. log lad such a ouble fuition in the art. He always maintains that of all the ringers 'te has ever mel, he has never secn Banister's equal in the graceful handing esther of tower of lundbells. It was always his ambition fo bry ind imitate him, nut we may sny here that Mr. Russam has theen very sumesafut, for he is an oxcedingly praceful ringer, partiularly on hambluells. In those drys the Birminghan nen were very seeu on lrandmells, and the practices uged to conmence on the Monray and finish the fohowing Sunday evening, usually at a place town as 'Old Jom Nixan's.' The sninfithas thescented to the ringers A-Hay, for there is no bnat morecapable in ringing Stedman Cinques
is still among the nust veliable. He was one of those who rang in the handbell peal of Stedman Sextuples.
Mr. Russam bas spent a lot of time teaching both tume playing and tower-hell linging, the last of tlae lunc playing bauds to gu througlt lis lands being Cadbury's Moseley Institute. He was experi ardviser in connection wilh the purchase of 80 handhells from Barwell's for this band, and was instructor to them for fwo years. Thu: last tower-bell band he instructed was at Erdingtion Parishl Church.
Mr. Russam was tower-kecper at Bishop Rycler's for a Lime, aucl afterwards for many years al, Aston.
A jeweller's engraver by treate, Mr. Russam is nol blest witla very Fobust health, and therefore confines his ringing to the lighter cod but he is a remarkably 'safe" ringer, and a splendid etriker.

The performance to which he gives pride of place was not a peal at all, hut a touch of Stedman Cinques rung double-handed at. dinner givell at the Colonnade Hotel, Birminglam, Jy Sir Arthur Heywoor (then plaia Mr.) to celebrate Henry Johnson"s 80th birtluday. in 1889. The guesto were representative of all the ringers in Englant, and, as he says, to the हlory of St. Martin's company, the touch came off withouf a hitch, the striking being absolutely fautless.' It Whs unique innsmucl as scores of excellent rimgers in the room had never heard twelwe-bell ringing on haudbells before. Indeed, it was supposed to be the frst touch of Stedman Cinques ever rung pubicly. Mr. Russam was a member of the Birminghame and District Assnciation, and the Birmingham Amalgamated Society from their formation antil their decease. He was also a Holt Society man until ihat society was absorbed by the St. Hartin's Guild, and for the latter he liad the honour of calling tho first peal. (Previous to the amalgamation it was the St. Martin's Soctety.) He is now a member of tho St. Martin's Guild and the Stafortisire and Midlam? Countios Asa ciations, and a regular Sunday service ringer at St. Martin's. H, took pair in the first peal of Grandsire Cinques on liandbells, and the first double-handed peal of Sterman Cinques out of Jondon, this heing also the second ever rung. His handbell peals also inciude : 10,000 Grandsire Major. He rang in rhe ouly peal of Duffied Maximus ever rumg, and was one of the band chosen lo represent Dirminghan ati the opening of the ring of ten at Leominster in 1894.
He rang in the first peal of Stedman Cinques in which a lady took part (conducted छy Miss Patket. at St. Marlin's), and has himself coniucted a fow peals of Grandsire Triples, Boh Mnjor and Royd. Mr. Russam has not kept a record of all his peals, but as near as he enn gather luis peals on tower hells inclune Grandsire, Stedman, Plain gnd Trehle Bob, Douhle Norwich, Cambridge. Duffield. Formard and Frin; everything from Triples to Maximus. On landbells, Grandsire, Stedman and Plain Bob, the first named from Triples to Cingues, and Stedman from Triples to Sextuples, including everything from Triples to Cinques in the two former methods. His first peal in a Surprise methot was at Solihull, when he rang a working bell to Cambridge Royal at the first attempt. Reing lylessed with a good memory, Mr. Russam can fell many good yarns of the Birmingham ringers he lias known Abring the pasi 50 years and mare. and their little peculiarities, and when he is in remimiseent mood, his listeners will be kept in a roaring laughter. We lope Mr. Russam will soon be seen again in his place in St. Martin's helfry.

## A DOUBLE CENTURY.

## MR. C. F. BAILYY'S RECORD AT LETSTON

Mr. Charles F. Bailey, of Leiston, rang on Saturder his one humdredils Surprise peal on the bells of his own tower, all of which he has conducted. This is another most interesting record in this monderful family, and has been accomplished in thirteen vears ringing, if the four war vears are elininated. The first peal was rung on January 25th, 1908 , and in calling a peal of Bristol from the treble on Saturday. Mr. Bailey has now conducted a peal in this method from every hell. Hetween 1908 and 1913 the methods rung were Superlatipe, Cunbridge and New Cambridge anty, there being 15 of Superlative, 11 of Cambridge and four of New Cambridge. In 1914 theve werc two peals of Bristol and one of Guildfarti Surpise. Then came the war, and nothing more was done antil 1919. The total number of methods included in the eentury has, howerer. risen to 13. as follows: Stuperlative 22. Cambridge 23, New Cambridge 5, Rri22. Guildford 4. Lankion 15. Suffolk 2, Dublin 1, Norfolk I. Forkshire 1. Lancashire I, Ediuburgh 1. Ronhester 2. The numbers rung in the respective yeare lave heen: 1908. 4: 1909. E: 1910. 5: 1911, 7: 1912. 4: 191.3. 4: 1914. 3; 1919. 6: 1920, 11; 1921, 10; 1922, 12; 1923, 11; 1924,$13 ; 1925,4$.

## DEATE OF MR. F. W. RICE. <br> A WELL-KNOWN SUSSTK AND SORREY RLNGER.

We regret to anoounce the death of Mi. Frederick W. Rice, of liedtill, Surrey, who passed to his rest on Mawh 19ils. Tlie deceased, who was in his 64th year, succumbed to su attack of protiuronit, fullowing at brief illness.

For some years he liad been a membor of the luan at Reigeto Parish Chureb. He had always been most rugular ju his attendance at both service tud practice rouging, and his deall, which has come thus unexpectedly, will cause a great loss to the company.

Mr. Rice was an accomplished tinger, and will be best remembered athong the older generatian of the Exerase tor the part lye wook in the successes of the Crawley (Sussex) hand in the heyday of their prosperity, thirty years aga. A native of Warth (a parish adjoining Urawley), Mr. Rice began lais ringing with the ald hand at his own chnreh, hat he soon found they were mot masters of the art of change ringing. He, therefore, sought lis practice in heighbouring toxers, and, after a few years, lie was ainle to get a young band to replace the old oute in his uative parish. Hr, Rice rang lis tivst two peals At Warulant, wiz., Oxford Bob Triples, on November 20th, 1886, and Grandsire Triples on the following day. He had belonged to the old Crawley band for severul years, fand when a now hamd was formed, under the leadership of Mr. James Parker, he was glat to get back to a peal of eight. The Cratilet band made wonderful progress, and in most of their peals Fred Rice was to be found on the tenor, which bell he rang lo the long peal of Superlative, the then recoril of 9,312 in 5 hours 20 shinutes, on December 26ith, 1894. Only two or thice of this band now survire, the ringers laving ben Edward Jomlan, John Rice, Alferd Mids. William Ward, Frederick Dench, Robert Jordau, dames Parker and Frederick W. Rice. Allogether Mrr. Rice had rung 230 peals iu mathods ranging from Bob Minor so London Surprise Major, and amoug this long lengths, addition to the superlative, were 8.780 Cauterhury Pleastre Major and 10, 176 Kent Treble Boh at, Warilam.
Mr. Rice, who among thase who knew himz best. was romething of a character, spent a long and aetive career it the Excrcise. and lis enchey wes mainlained to the end, as, only a few days before lis death, ho conducted a 720 Boh Minor af Merstham.
Among the societies of which lie was a memher were the Sussex and surrey Associations, Winclaester Guide, and the Ancient Society of College Youtlis. His peals wrere as follown :-

## ANCIENT BELLS.

## Ta tie Editor.

Sir. Fontr correspondent " Freusens " is quile right in supposing that the founder's name uad thate does not appeat on the two ancient bells at Evethorme. I do not know of a single instamee ot the namu of the founder being fonne many pre-hatomation bell: though in some cases we fiad his initials on in shield with olher devioes. In verg care cases we find the dite-always in Roman maniezals, not Arabic.
The twa bells at Eycthome are inserihad in the usial style of the period, riz. : Lombardic capitals with "black-lotter ' lower type. ' Nabl bears also the following devices: (1) A shieh charged with a fig and a "black-letter" ' me ' at the tuase of Lhe flagelaff, which is erosacu bs a " T" placed slantwise; (2) the tisianl nedallion charged with it floviated cross and ' ihu nurei ladi lielp' in the four quartors, (3) it sheld changed with erost keys between a wheatshenf, a dolphin, a hell, and an ewer. Figs 25,26 natu 27 in StahlachmidL's "Clameh Bells of Kont.' These marks are common enougla on thedizeval bella and were used by of her lounders hesides Fenfy (not William) Jordar. donble turret, and is inscribed: +ANNO !MMOMOCODONOMOALO
 dated hell in Tingland. It is the larger of a mair lathging in an open i.e. 1296: " monog' staming for' 'monagiola," athd the "V' ius six being reversed. This bell is 21 inches in riameter, and $16 \frac{1}{2}$ inches high from lip to crowd: which is mord in proportion to the dimensions of uodarn hells than most of these ancient anes are; most of the lather heing ahont the same massuroment from lip to orown as thw dian meter at the montls. Their crowns are generally heusispherimal, nud their waists long and straight.-Yours, efc., J. R. JERRAM.

## THE CRITICISMS OF CRITICUS.

## TERMINOLOGY.-FOOTNOTES - MORF STORIES FROM HISTORY.

From lime to time we liave read criticisms of the ratser loose terguinology miployod it oun art, ant sometimes anc lias wondered how it las been brought about, bul recent corresponlence enlightens us ou tho point, and wo need poader the subject no longer. If in these colightencl days our experts grope round for words to express heil mennings and use terms which, when exumined, are really misapplied, there is great cxeuse for our forefathers who had not the adsantages of twantioth century educakion. The iatest illustration of our laxity of method in funding suitalile terms, lums on our old friead 'shuat.' We nuwer have stuck entirely to dictionary definitions of the words we use, amy more than the dietionary gives a slriatly accurate defintion of out use of terms, For ibstance, in standard' work lying ou my desk gives me many meanings of the word 'Job, adding, dunag lell ringers, a peal af several courses, or sets of changes.' lhut I and not, concernerk just now with what the dichionary says about pur curious 'lingro.' What I atu concerbod with is the manaer in which we select words and apply them to special uses, when a little consideration would cause fis to reject the term as inappropriate. Horeover, what makes our vocahulary all the worse is that in some
 as in the case of 'course.
Now we are getting, or, I ouglt to say, have got, the same thing in regard to "shumt." Formerly the use of this word in ringing indicated merely the insertion or omisgion of a call or calls to divert a copposition from one point to another. Now we use it for some eanstructional detail of a thethod, and it is given varying signifonance accoming to whether you prefix $P$ or $R$, or, may bo, $X, Y$ or $Z$. But Whether "slumt. or "step," or aby other old tiorm is the right one, what we watl is some fetinite sretem by which these words should cons into our vocabulars and not liave it left, laphazard, to every I'ont. Diek and Hary, to make confasion worse coufounded by sefecting any word which he just faucres answers his purpose at the moment. We shall havo to lame a Defnitions Roard to settle these Hfings, to tell us whether the terms wo select are appropriate to the nse we watt 10 make of them; whether they overlap or fall short; whether they are sease or nonsense. In all seriousness, however, I would appeal to the Central Council to do something to disentangle our focalalaty, and they miglat very well do it when they put in hand the terision of the "Glossary." to which I refrered last week.
We all like to be informed which man rings his first or his one Innelredth peal, which peat is the first in the method on the bells or nark a performance; but, without particularising and thus offending anyone's susceptibilities, there are only too often in the peal columns eritences of peals tung, apparently for the mosi inadequatc reasons, and we are burdened with details which can be of no interest to anyone but the writer of the report. It would be a goorl rule, I would put on a poal loan limit their footnotes strictly to what they matters it if the loirthday of they wele laving one erected. What bappens to fall on the clay before, or in the week after? It does not justif the infiction of three hours of ringing on the parishioners, nad hells would not be obtained for peals on that ground afone. A peal mports Thore wiso find an intmere the Toditor will back me up in this.

'I ne foticles show llat the ringers' appointments were considered a serions matter in those days.

Incidentally, Cheetlam'ss "Clareh Bells of Lancashire,' from whioh I have taken the above extract, tells an interesting story of the Oldan ringers and their rivalry with their neighbours of ashton-under-Lync more thati a century ago; indeed, the 'feeling ' between the two seems to have sprung up about the year 1783. Round about this timet tlae Oldham Fingers are creclited, so the story poos, with repeatenly, arrogantly and improvokedly saying that the Anton ringers were not able to ring them anywhere, and whon a deputhiont from Ashkon waited upon Oldham they were trested with something like contogpt. 'Instead of entering into a proper obligation to prove the superiol ability of the disputants, nothing was hearia on their fart but banter, scurrility and defamarion.' After this al claflenge was issued on behalf of the Astuton ringers 'to ring upon eiglit bells any set of ringers belonging to Oldam for any sum of moner mot lesa than eight and more flan twenty guineas.' The contest took place at Leeds on September 22nd. 1786. and was decined in farour of Oldham.
The Ashiton and the Oldhan ringers met again at the openiag of the new bells at Flixton more than 20 years after, wis. in danuary, 1808, but at the close of the ringing the judges were unable to come to a decision, and the prize money was divided. The verclict satisfed noborly, and a match for f40 wian arrauged at. Flixton, and came off on June 24 th, 1808 . When Oldhams were declated the winners. The conductos of the Ashtou ringers, Jonathan Wijd, was clarged with selling the mateh to the Olfliam men, ani so higlt was the sfafe of feeling at the time that Wild left Asfiton and went to live at Stockport, where lie remained 26 Fears. The accusation seens to have been unjitst, and Wild was allowed to come back to Ashton before hia death. After the Flixton match there was continned strife between Ashton and Oldiam ringers for more than twenty years, and it is said to have heen carried to such a pitch that if one of the Oldham ringers slrayed to Ashton and was recagnised, "they ran him out whe vilago
What would be said by the 'couscientious olbjector" in these days if the had a rate levied upon him for the upkeep of the church hells? Yet here are extracts showing that guch things wete done: On June 17in, 1659, it was 'Resolved yi ye great Bell which is now burst shall be maid nex this yeat with all the speede may be. That thirtysixe pounds be assessed vppon the parishoners of Bolton accordirg to the antient p'portiong for the wew eastiag of the said bell and the repairs of the walls and gate of the churchyard and levelling the flags of the ehurch.' In 1665, "resolved that fiftes six pounds he assessed rppon the inlabitants of the parisll of Bolton for the making of a nest frame for the bells, and ofler necessaries abous the church,' and again, in 1699 , "resolsed that an assessment of an lunrred and forty pounds bee assessed and raised for the casting of
the Rells at the parisl into five bells, reduced to $£ 110$
Another good (?) ofd 'custom' has fisappeared with the acivance of civilisation, and there may stiti be some who will heave s sigh Hhat they lived not at. Flixton when the bells were brouglat lome. A record of the arrital of a new peal in 1808 informs us that the bells. whicl wera brouglit to Mancloster by water, were taken on eigat decorateri carts to Fliston. 'A large concourse of peonle followed in an irrcgular procession,' and on arrival at Flixlan 'tlie tonor bell was taken inlo a field belonging to Ralpli Wright. Esq., and deposited in a small liole made for that purpose ant turned moutlo upwaris when Ten frineas worta of Douthle Strong ale was put in for the populace to Regale themselves with, and in fittle more than one hour The whole of the "Goorl old Stingo" dishppeared, and the whole of the hells were rleposited in the clurch. The anmonacement of the opening of the peal inviten "smatemrs of the art " to repair to Flixton' to fry their skill and pass their judgment upon the tone and fime of the bellas.'

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir - In connection witt your article in the 'Ringing World ' of Warch 20th, respecting the great hell at Moseow, it may be of interest to mention the approximate weights of other very large bells in the world, viz. :-
The great bell at Mingoon (Burmath) is 125 tons, said by some nuthorities to rival the giant of Moscow in point of size, in which case it must naturally be a thinner bell. Another Moscow bell is I25 tons. This is the largest bell in use in the world. Other giant bells are
 (Leningrad), 22 tons (like the bell of Moscow, this firse specimen is adorned with imperial portraits); Olmutz (Austria), 18 tons; Notre Dame \{Paris\}, 18 tons ; Vienna, 18 tons: Lens \{France\}, 15 tons: Erfurt Catheriral (Prussinn Saxony), 13 tons (this bell was rast at the end of the 15th century): Mor.treal (R.C. Cathedral), 13 tons; Gorlitz (Silesia), 10 tons; Bruges, 10 tous.
