## THE ANALYSIS.

In our pages this week atppears the Analysis of the peals rung during last year, and once again the Exercise is indebted to the Central Council's Committee for compiling, in a now well accustomed form, the mass of interesting statistics which the twelve months' peal ringing produces. The Analysis is probably the most interesting piece of reyular work which is done under the auspices of the Council. Originally it was compiled privately, by the late Mr . G. F. Attree, of Brighton, and later by Mr. Attree and Mr. George Baker in collaboration. Thens came the time when the Analysis grew in importance, and eventually it was handed over to the Council, and has since been carried on by them in the interests of the Exercise. For many years it has been recognised as a guide to the activities of our associations, and furnishes the only means which ringers have of studying in concrete form the records which run through our pages for the whole fifty-two weeks of the year. As has been so often remarked, the compilation of the Analysis is a stupendous business, calling for the expenditure of much time, care and effort on the part of those who are responsible, and to then the Exercise, as a whole, owes a debt of gratitude.

There are one or two features in the report to which we may direct attention. There was a slight reduction in the total number of peals rung in 1924, for while tower bell peals increased by fifteen, compared with 1923 , handbell peals dropped by no lewer than forts. There is, we think, no special significance in this falling off in the number of peals rung' in thand,' for this is a class of ringing which, much more than tower bell ringing, fequires that a band should keep together. Handbell ringers are not as easily made as tower bell ringers-it needs a special apti-tude-and the number of companies capable of peals is therefore much restricted, with the result that a falling off on the part of one or two bands makes a considerable difference to the sum total of the year.

The question of the allotment of points for the peals is a controversial question which is ever with us, and it would be interesting to know upon what basis the committee compute the values of new methods and new ways of method tinging. Probably the question will be raised when the report of the Analysis Committee comes formally before the Council at Chester. We do not raise the matter in any querulous spirit, but it does strike us that a ' spliced' method peal deserves more points than a peal in one method. The spliced Cambridge and Superlative is a case in point. To change two or three times in a course from one method to another (which is far different to going off into a method from rounds) surely

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makes the peal more difficult to ring, and it is upon the complexity of the peal and complexity alone, that puints are allotted. The same argument applies to spliced methods in peals of Minor. It adds greatly to the value of the performance, and it would not seriously complicate the calculation of points if this matter were taken into account. Then, again, one is tempted to ask why Leicester Surprise Royal is allotted more points than Middlesex? Surely, as a method, it is not of greater if of equal, complexity? It is little matters suct as this that defract from the value of the point system of reckioning peals, but as to the interest and importance of the Analysis as a whole there can be, in our opinion, no question.

## THE LATE M\&. CHANLES GOKDON

## A SURREY VETERAN.

As already briedy recorded, the death took place on Monday mornjug, the $4 t l_{1}$ instant, of Mr. Charles W. Gordon. Deceased, who was 74 yeats of age, hist learmt to pall a bell at Carshalton, when abont wwelve yeats ald, and rang his tirst peul there in 1875.
Whar Heddinglon bells weve installed in 1869 , he took part in the first ringing of then, an Whit Sumday, and during lis latst illness, proich oxtencled aver a proriod of six years, Je made a supreme effort to ring on that festival. He was the last houdation mentury of the sociely which was formed when the bells were installed.
Decoased was also one of the founders of the Surrey Assonation sud hud been a member ever since. Jor twenty years lie was a hell hanger al Messrs. Warther and Son's, and afterwards at Messrs. Gillett and lohnston's for a slott period. He kept Beddington bells in repair, which is mo doubt the reason they are in such goon order today. He always said that the bells had never cost the ehurch authoritits 5100 since they were put in, alihougl they never suffered from lack of exercisc. Orer 130 peals have been rung on them.

Gordan kept no proper record of his own peals, but he said the hiad rung between 60 and 70 , thoso previous to the formation of the Surry Association laving been rung for the College Youths, of whicla he was a memher. His last peal was on his 60 h birtinflay, when he rapg Beddington tenor to a peal of Trehle Bob Major.
During his last illness he was always eheery, and ane condit spend many ith hour in listening to some of his experiences. He lifid a wonderfully retentive memory, especially in remembering the number and weights af peals of bells, ele., no nutiver what county they weje ins. Thedhington has now lost the most entlusiastic member which the tower las lad for many a long day.
The funcral Laok place on Friday, May 8th. Before the selvice, ins Betdington Church, the bells were rung fully muffed to tonches of Grandsire Triples and Caters. The hurial took place al Bandon Hill Cemetery thetween the graves of the late Dr. A. B. Carpenter and Mr. Edgar Rennett), and after the coffin lind been lowered to its lasl resting-place a course of Granisire Triples was ring on handbells by F. F. Diarby 1-2, A. W. Clark 3-4, C. F. ## A SUSSEX VETERAN. <br> IDEATH OF MTE JOEN SMART.

We much regeet to record the death of Nr. Johis Smart, of Steynitug, sussex, one of the oldest and most respected ringers in the wonty. Ar. Smart lad reached the advanced age of 83 years, and died on May 12th last.
Ho. soart learned to ring at Lubborgh, Sussex, and removed to Steyning in the year 1872. He broughit up his sons ag ringers, and when the eldest learned change ringing in 1884 , the father followed suit, and quickly acquired a knowledge of methods on six bells. Then, whon steyuing got its peal of eiglt, he quickly progressed, and durנnk has career took part in no fewer than 119 peals.
Rinuing provicied him with one of the gratesi pleasmes in life, and hums among the most regular af the band, both on Sundays and al practice.
Iolin Smart was one of thoge cheery, self-cffacing men whom it was d-drliglit to know. He was keen or ringing, but was ever-ready to stand down if occasion arose, allhough nothing gave him greater delight than to score a peal. He will be muth missed among the ringur who widit Steyning, but his personality will remain an enduring memory with thase who, like the writer, were privileged to know lim inimately. His lasi visit to the bower was to ring for the lintwest festival on September 28th Iast yoal. Since then his health lind faidec, but right up to the time of luis death be lalked witly interest atoot his peal ringing days, ant thre different ringers he had mat.
He was laiki to rest near the old helfy tower on Friday last, when, as mu Sunday, touches were rung on moufited bells.

The peal of Superlatire Surprise el Sheffeld Cathedral on Tinnday, Muy 14 th, was the first peal of Surprise at the Cathedral since Nov. 19th, 1892, when a peal of Superlative was rung. It is also worlly af note that four of the ringers who took part in that putal are still members of the Cathedral company.
Leicoster Highway Holdap! A graphie account of this appeared recently in at local paper, when in correspondent was held up well after midnight in a dowupour of rain. It was eventually discovered that his was clue to young 'Tielh,' a budding ringer, having gone to the opruing of Hinckitey bulls and failed to return. No word being fortheming, his elder brother. "led ' was despatehert to find him. He didl lats lyy holding up notorists and other night prowlers, and eventually ran the erring one to 'earth' at Burwel], safely tucked up in 'hed 'l!!
Dr, and Mrs. Joseph T. Parker, of Favaham Royal, celeforated the jubilee of their wedding on April $25 t h$, when a quarter-peal on the hells of St. Mary's Church was rung by the lacal band. Men who laty trken prot in the famous 'Parker's Twelve-part peal of Grantirn Triples (ant its oncless variations) will wish the veteran composer and his wife " many of "em."

For the first time in the history of the Analysis of Pents, the mame of the Sussex County Association does not appear. Tlis is mot he cause no peals were rung, but because last year the associations war not affiliated to the Central Commeil. Consequently, the Sinssux puals are incluted among the 'also rans,' that is, the Independent Socieljes.
It is mather Jamentable, especially ras Sussex, in years gone by, oftem held pride of place al the head of the table. What is thone canmat he undone, but theze is consolation for the future in the knowlefge What Sussox has this year deeded to retirn to the fold.
To-clay is the ammersary of the 17.024 Double Norwich Major rung by the Oxford Diocesan Cuitd at Kidlington on Mry 22nd, 1898.
Tine Society of Sherwood Youths rang 'Mr. Holt's true peal of Grandsire 'Triphles,' on the new hells at Gainsborougle on May 2th, 1768.

The first tuce peal of Tweble Ten in ireland was rung at St. Patrick'â Cathedral on May 24th, 1901, ansl on the zethr of the same nonth the first Surprise pead out of Eingland was rung at Bray, Ireland.
On May 28th, the first peal of Stedman Caters (proved long alferwards to lave been false) was rung. This was at St. Johne, Hordydown, London, in the little steeple where the bells, now uningathe, are humg in three tiers.

The Bristol Surprise record wins made by the Middesex Association at Horneluzch on May 28t1, 1912, when a peal of 15,264 changes was rang in 9 hours 49 minutes.

The opening of the British Earpire Exhibition at Wembley was cele brated by two attenpts for peals of Maximus, via., Kent Treble Bols at Bow Chureh, Cheapside, by the London Contaty Association, the fttempt lasting 2 hours; anal Duffeld Maximus at St. Saviour's, South-
 ing of Wembley was eelehrated, it will he remembered, by a peal on the bolls ath. the Imperial lustitute by Cumberland Youthe.

We canuot present litis report without an allusion to the fact flat it is the first for many years which has not been signed by the leer． E．W．Garpenter．His colleagues，while lie was a memher of lie committee，know the painstaking nature of his work，and the care which he exercised to make the Analysis an exact and inlerasting re－ wotd．We desire to acknowledge in this report，not only the value of his work to the lexcrise generally，but the example of thorough－ ness in all things which he has given to us．We bope he magy have many useful and happy years thefore him．

Athough the peals rung in 1924 are fewer than last year，the difer－ ence is small，and it can he said that the activities of the peal riogers have been well maintained．Also taking the points value as a gruids the rquaty of the peals tuag is rully equal to 1923．the average beiug 16.740 points this year against 16.736 ．

The total number of peals rang is 1,860 ，being 25 less than last vear．The tomer tuell peals show an incrense of 15 ．the totnl heing 1,743 ，whiln the handhell peals have dropped to 117 ，being a nonsider－ able decterse of 40 peals．
