## PEAL POINTS.

The question of peal points and their value as an incentive to ringing, or a comparison of merit, is a constantly recurring one, and the annual publication of the Peals Analysis is generally the occasion for reviving comment. Does the allocation of points for peals serve any real purpose? Opinions are divided on this matter, but, under the present method of dealing with the points, it certainly seems that they carry no great weight as an indication of the relative merits of the performances, either in regard to individual peals, or to the work of an association.

In compiling statistics of this kind there are, of course, many features which cannot be calculated in arriving at a value to be represented by points, but which, nevertheless, are of importance in appraising the true merits of a peat. The only thing that is now taken into account is the presumed intricacy of the method and the length of the peal, and even so, despite a long-continued attempt some years ago to fix relative values, there is still only a more or less rough-and-ready method of allocating the points, by placing methods in groups. This allocation does, perhaps, approximate to justice; but, leaving out of account those considerations which must vary with every peal, such as the first in the method, or by the band, there seems to be opportanity to overhaul the present assessment of points. By those who bave had the experience, it is unanimously held, we believe, that 'spliced' method peals are unquestionably of greater value than a peal entirely in one of the methods. Again, it is held by competent judges that 'double-handed' handbell peals should be given more points than tower bell peals in the same method. This latter point has been discussed before, and, if we remember aright, the Counci! decided against it, but it is worth reconsideration. There is mo argument in saying that each ringer gets double the number of points for his performance, when the peal is rung on handbells, because, under the present system, the individual is not taken into account. It may be equally advanced that no account is taken of anything but the complexity of a method, but there is no question that there is an added complexity to the performance when one man rings two bells.

Another question is that of the existing allocation of points, and there are those who consider that some revision is necessary. To take two of the most commonly rung methods, for example. On paper, Grandsire may be as simple a method as Plain Bob, but given a band equally capable in either method, it is, we think, not above argument that they would lose more peals of Grandsire Triples than of Bob Major in an equal number of attempts, which (Combinurad on page 554.)

[^0]would prove that the former is the more diflicult to ring in actual practice. Yet in the analysis Grandsire Triples does not get as many points as Bob Major. Again, is it not fairly generally recornised that a peal of Stedman Triples is at least as difficult to ring as a peal of Steclman Caters? There are other instances which one could quote, but these are sufficient, we think, to show that a reconsideration of the points in question was necessary. The Council had really come to a stage where they had to decide whether the points should be revised or cut out altogether. The decision to do away with the peal points, by an overwhelming majority, shows how strongly the view has grown in recent years that peal points are in reality valueless.

## HOW HONG KONG LOST A PEAL OF BELLS.

 To the Edifur.Sir,-Referring to the remarks of Mr. J. E, Sykes as to the dificulty of ringing a peal in Hong Koagr, this would be quite a simple task, were bells and ringers availalile. From the middia of October to the midale of March, the colony enjoys climutic contitions second to noze the world over. Throughout thesc five montha, the temperalure hardly evar exceeds that of an English summer average, the humidity is low, and picaics and tenuis parlies may be arranged months ahead, an it harrly ever rains. During the remainder of the year, the climate is very hot and damp.

While I was resident te the colony in 1920-1, I interested a leading business man, who was a keen supporter of the Cathedral, in the project of putting a peal of bells in the tower. There are four of Mears' bells, lung deaul, there at present, and I abtained an estimate from home for a peal hung for ringing. But for the $2 \frac{1}{2}$ months which recessarily elapsed while the lettors were in the post, I fully believe Hong Kong would now be the proud possessor of the ouly ringing peal in the Far East. But in the interim, my friend, who had quite made up his mind to see the thing througlr, experienced lieavy financial losses, in common with many other business people, througls the slump which began throughout the Far East in 1920 . ## A MEMOIR FY TEL: LATE SAMUFL SLATER.

The subject of this memoiv was a distinguished campanologisi ; he was born at Biddestone on April 2end, 1800, and ligenn to practise the art of change ringing at a very enrly age. When only a bay, his father, who was then parochial schoolmaster of Bildestoue, and a yood six-bell ringer, made a stage for his san to stand on in the helfry so that he might he able to reach the tuft of the rope, and in this way, when only a boy, lie rang the scond bell in Bildestone stieple to his first 720 of Bols Minot". At the time he treighen only Contr stones, and the bell seven cwi. He took a great deligat in the ant of hell ringing, and soon became a proficient, liaving the gift of a superior ear. After be grew to manhood le used frequenily to wisit various towns for ringing purposes, and rang in four hourg his first leng peal on Jamary $14 t_{\text {th. }}$ 1819. on the Stownarket Cluarcin bells, this being a 6,160 Bob Major. His brother Thonas also rang in the same peal. This whs composed and conducled by folms tilmer. His semond and third peals wore Boh Major; one of 6,224 , and the other of 6.336 changes on the same bells, condmeted Ly John Fimer nind Jolin Naumton, of Ipswich, respectively.
About this time, Mr. Hobact, jutrow was appointed parothal schoolmacter of Monk's Eleigh. which post he held for some lime. Thtrongh negligent habits he was, hotever, soon dismissed, and be then removed to Findleigis, and found employment in a stonemason's yard, where he did the leitering of gravestones, ete, lueing an expest in such work. Here he lesided for some time, and upon bearing that tue Feclenlatl (Narfolk) company liad rung a peal of 8,000 changes on their owa bells of Oxford Treble Boh Major in 1828, the got up a bard shartly afterwards in orcler to tru and stipersede this Redenliall peal in number of changes. On the Hadleigh Chuvcl bells (tenor 28 cwt.), apeal containing about 9,000 clanges oi Bab Wajor. the composition of one Dawid Boys, a native of Hadleigh, was attemated, but pfter one of the bard mas so much fatigned that ther fisal to four hours, The ringing was, as far as it went, conducted hy Joseph fuewis, of Hramiford. Soon after this, Mu. Holat", returned to his native lown. anci took a livety interesi in vinging matters. and organised a hand.

I venture to bring luefore tile Exercise thig composite method for Caters, bolioving that, if it is given a fair trial, the advenced ringer will profer it to Stedman. It is on similac limes to tho Triple Methods publisicd in diagrammatic form gome time ago, but. las the advantuge that penls may be obtained by ordinary Stedmas bobs and singles.
It retains the valuable features of Trin in Eceping the heavy bells well together, and at home every 54 changes. In the course, they fall maturally into three different orders, i.e., 978,897 and 789, giving raried music throughout, and insteal of tiag monotonous repetition of the same slow work, it has two slows and one quicle. An examination of the diagram will show that the front work, while presenting very littlo more diffenty, is much more interesting than Stedman, and it shonld appeal ta those who at presont have litto to chaose from on aine bells. It may he practised on seven hells, but will aot give 5,040 changos, and it will not run on 11 holls.
