## NOMENCLATURE

The most contentious business before the Central Council was the report of the committee appointed last year to deal with method nomenclature. The subject, which may to some people appear to be a minor one, is, in fact, of some importance, for the haphazard methods of the past have led to endless confusion as weli as to the use of terms which, to say the least, have been out of place. The terminology used in ringing has always been quaint, and, to the uninitiated, amusing, yet little or nothing had ever been done to improve it. A few years ago, however, the Analysis Committee of the Council were called on to give names to certain hitherto umamed metloods, and, with a great opportunity to improve nomenclature, adopted a group of titles which not only maintaned some very unsuitable names, but actually accentuated their absurdity. It was the feeling created by this action which led cventually to the setting up of a special committee to deal with the baming of methods, their terms of reference being not merely to revise names already allowted, but to suggest lines of guidance for the cuture.

This conmittee admittedy had a very difficult task, but those who read their report will agree with the view expressed at the Council meeting that they have tackled it in a reasonable and moderate manner. First they had to face the fact that, in the past, the author of a method or the band who have been first to ring it have claimed the right to name if. It has been this freedom which has allowed many of the absurdities to grow up, for those who have had the opportunity of applying names have been guided by no principle, and simply christened their methods as fancy dictated. Another thing with which the committee was faced was the fact that certain terms have been so established by long usage that no tampering with them-however ludicrous they may appear to out-siders-would be permitted. History and practice have given them a position unassailable in these days. To carry out their task the committee had to malse a break with tradition, and not the least difficult of their problems was to decide where the cut was to be made. That decision, we think, has not been finally arrived at. The report which the committee presented seems to be but a first instalment, for it opens up the question of a much more far-reaching revision of terms than the mere changing of names among the methods.

In principle we think the commitiee have struck right lines : in detail their report is liable to considerable amendment. The Council could not possibly have discussed it with intelligence and with the care which the subject requires without first seeing it in print, and they took the

## SGIENCE MUSEUM EXHIBIT.

The Hon. Becretary (3r. E. A. Young) reported for the committee enturster with ine orgauisation of the exhibit for the South Kensington science Muscum. He eaid he last yeav suggested that the committee was rather morihund, and be now feared be lad nothing much funtlier to report. The lhearl of the Section, where their small exhibit was, had told him he was still waiting for the rearganisation of the galleries, which would give hin the foor and walt space. Hut the biug meved slowly. With regard fo Mr. Carder's ringing zachine. he (Mr. Young) had it at his own house, and hasd written a descripion, unter Mr'. Carter's instruction, as to how it worked and wras controlked. He thought they might, therefore, now remove from blieve minds the feeling that the machine might eventually hecome somewhat useless because no one was familiat witls jis contrivances (hear, hear). Mr'. Young added that the commiltce laal not mel during the seat, ds lae lad felt if was noti necessary to couvene them.
The Res. © D. P. Davies, in supporing Mr. Young's report, said he did not quite agree that the commitite was moribund; it was nol ihe commitiee, it was more likely the Scieuce Museum. The authorities were ' langing frre': they could not yet give the committee the proper room. Whers they could rlo so, things woutd revive, and the commitice wauld only lee too glat to avail themselves of any opporfunity the Musenm authorities could give them. With regard es Mr. Carter"s manhine, they knew how deeply interesting it was, and le was rery thankful hat it was at present in Mr. Young's care, and that Mu. Toung lat liar opportunity to writh a description of it. As they all kuew, the machine was absolutely unigue, and, therefore, when Mr. Carter was taken from iliem, knowledge of the uachine and low ia wark it, might have died with him. It was of the greatest importance anl value ihat someone should know how to work the machine. He was thanhfal it was in the able hames of someone like Mr. Young (hear, heari).

## METHOD NOMENCLATURE.

The Somenclature Comuittce's report was read by Mr. G. P. BurLon as follows: lu course of time, and by a process of natural selecliou wad development, usage in most cases, sifts and settles by itself, any question of nomenclature. Although in certain departments of change ringiog nomenclature hat consummation lass happily been quite successituly altained, e.g., such terms as "Donbles," "Minor', 'Triples," Major,' oter, the same, safortunately, cminot be said of method names, Without any system to gude the selection of fresh manes, and with in multilude of new methods produced of late veares, a state of almost indescribable confusion lias arisen, especially as regarde Minor, and moje recentiy Major nomenclature. Every would-be method authou has heen a law to himself, there having been, no autharity to decide as: to the names to he adopted. Recently, it is true, the sencelule of mames pulalishen by the Analysis Commiltee in the columns of 'The Ringing Worlaz' of 30tls March, 1923, did something to sot Minor nomenclalare in order, find to remove some of the then existing macertaintics. However, minfortunately, that report assumed the necessity for the contimation of all existing anomalies, and, what was morse siercotyped those floral names to which exeeption las so widely heen inken.
In accordance with the levas of roference (I) 'to review existmg
methol nomenchature, your bomaitee have, thrimg hite year past, cutalugued in tabuiar form, a collection of sout 250 methad names. the elass to which each name loolong being set down. and the authority wi therence, as far as is kyown, being quoted. It appeurs from this athalogue, that as maty ats eleren matmes are used iwice over, five three times over, ald so olt. 'i'he himes Hondon,' by juseli, is applied to four difterent methods. and in combination (f.c., doublehamelled mantes) is used for st least two more, or six times raltogethor. "Cambridge' is likewise employerl lour times; 'Oxford' and "Norwich" three Limes each, aut so oou. Furlhermore, at least 46 names consist of two worts (where one would suffice), 7 of three words, c.g., "St. James" Youtlas" Exereisa" (n plain Ninot metliod), 'Brinsli Scholars' Pleasure' (a Treble liob Minor method).
Much consideration bas been given to mames, which for one reason or anolher, appear unsuitable, and suggestions for alternatives have beco noted in the catalogue. Althougly finnlity luas not yet been reaclien in this firection, reconmendations are made bolow as to stiosfitutes for the flowers. ete.
thaile your committee appreciates fally the vatuc ataching to bislonical conlinuity-a name may be a chapter of history in itself-an!
 is convineed that no satisfactory reformation in nomenclatura can be obtained without some brenk with the pasi. Ta many cases, old names, whel are in themseltes objectionabic, ave either asolescent, or catirely fallen out of nse. Such wames ought yot to be printed in itty furtlior mblications issued by the Conneil.

Your committer make the following recomanendations, in accordance with terms of reference $\{21$ : "Ta stagest a suitable syatem of nomemature for the future

## RECOMMFNDATLONS

(a) That method classification should be simplified, and should in future fall into three main divisions: (1) Plain; (2) Treble Bob: (3) Surprise, Such sub-classification of Treble Bob, as 'Exercise,' '3rd Place Delight,' '4th Place Delight,' 'Pasallatessera,' 'Pasallatria' (as given in the C.C. It was undoubtedy a good belfy 'call,' and they did not want anything better for that pmpose fhan 'tohs ' mud 'singles, but they did not want the term 'hoth nsed anywhere else. Tho cont mitter mainained thes should not thse the same word twiec over, foy introducing il into dfe mamos of methods. They were sorry to set that in the titles of some of the new methotis that lind been recentir

## FIFTY YEARS IN THE MINISTRY

CANTERBURY CAJHEDRAL PRECENTOR'S IUBILEE
Trinity Sunday was a ramorable date in the calendar for Minor Canon F. J. O. Eolmore, Precentor of Canterbury Cuthedral, hs has on that day completed a minsstry of fifty years in the Churel of England. He was orduined in the Fiereford Cathedrul in 1875, and alter acting as Assistajt Vicar Choral at that Cathedral for a short time lie as for fifteen months curate and Irecentor ab Shakespeare's Clurch, Stradford-on-Aron
Mr. Helwore came to Canterbury Cathedral 47 ycars ago-in 1878 -nad the first service he attended in the Cathedral was the panAnglican Congress of that year. Two years later he was appointed Precentor, and for 45 years he has continuously laeld that ottice, dining which time he has Eaken part in Ife enthronement of three Armir bishops-Arelabishops Benson, Tempha and Davidson, and the installation of three Deans-Deans Firrar, Wace and Hell. He was also claplain to the Cauterbury Guardians' Institution from 1882 to 1916, and he las been Rector of Stodmarsh simce 1912.
In the sphere of change ringing, Mr. Helmore Jas achieved na(ional farme, and is among the aldest clerical ringers in the country. For 40 years le has beeu an ractiva and keen campanologist, and in Febunary, 1923, a tablet was unveiled in Canterbury Gathetral belfry to commemorate his 2001 h peal. Ho has been honorary secretary of the Kent County Assacintian of Change Ringers since 1891, and his popularity is euch that, although he has frequently expressed his fesire to be relieved of his office, tho association has resolutely rafused io lear of his resignation. Turther, as a mark of their esteem, the cliange ringers of the county, in 1907 presented Mr. Helmare with a handsome roll-top desk, which the veceived at the hands of the Dean of Rochester.
Mr. Helmore retains his healtin and vigour to a remarkable degree, and lis host of friends, will not ouly congratulate him upen his ministerial jubilee, but express the hope that he may be sparea to serve the great Cainedral with which he has already beat so long associat-ad.- Kentislt Express.'
