## LESSONS OF THE BISHOPWEARMOUTH FATALITY.

The accident in the belfry at Bishopwearmonth, by which Major Robert C. Hudson lost his life, is one of those distressing fatalities which, though rare, are a tragic reminder of the fact that work among bells which are 'up' is always a risky undertaking. Scores of men every week go up among the bells without giving a thought to danger; they move about over the narrow frames and between the beils, which can come 'off, many of them, quite easily; they turn clappers or make other adjustments involving, perhaps, leaning over the bell itself, and never once do they take count of the risk that is being run. Major Hudson was familiar with the belfry at Bishopwearmouth; for years he had been accustomed to going up among the bells, and the tragedy which has overtaken him probably came when he was thinking least of danger. He will be deeply regretted throughout the Exercise. In his own diocese he was known as a competent and accomplished ringer. He was one who made a name for himself when quite young, and he always maintained a keen interest in the art. But not only will his death be mourned by the members of the Durham and Newcastle Association ; his loss to the church and town of Bishopwearmouth is equally lamented. Churchwarden and Sunday School worker, he was also a valued officer of the local Territoriais, one section of which he commanded during the war.

This fatality is the second within less than a year caused by a bell going over, for only last December au eiderly clockmaker was killed while mending the hammer contections at Thetford Church, Norfoik. Can theseaccidents be averted? Obviously it cannot be said at any time that it is really ' safe ' to ${ }^{-g o}$ among bells that are up. There is never room to spare, and in these days of iron frames the available space is even less than in the old days, when the bell cages were made of stout wooden beams. The foothoid is often precarious, and the slightest slip may end in tragedy, as it did in the case of Major Hudson, for it is believed he slipped off the frame, probably on account of some snow caked on his boot. Despite the risks, however, it is often necessary for someone to go among the bells while they are in the 'danger ' position, and the most that can be done is to exercise the greatest care.

At present no 'locking ' device of an effective nature seems to be on the market, otherwise, we imagine, the bell founders would have adopted it. They have introduced many "gadgets,' but this is one which does not vet seem to have been sufficiently explored. Something

simple and efficient is undoubtedly wanted. Failing this, in the case of heavy bells which have a knack of going up with the clapper on the wrong side, there ought to be provided a device for turning the clapper over. There is such a one in existence, and Counders might well be: asked to instal it where a belt habitually goes up the wrong way. Another partial safeguard would be to run a handrail above the frames about the height of the average man's head, so that it might easily be grasped by one hand when a person is making his way anong the bells. And then there is the question of lighting the bell loft. Often, even in daylight, this is a dark apartment, and in many cases there is no artificial illumination, except perhaps a candle. It is almost inviting accident for a man to go amone bells thus equipped, and wherever possible church authorities slond be made to see the importance of proper lighting in this part of the tower.

Anoug the nwarial poals rung oue of the nust noteworliy wns that at Liverpool, where at brndi of Liverpand ringers seoreal at peat of Stedman Cinques, the first in the methoti by a resident band int liverpool since Mareli 25th, 1863-the your in whels Queen Ahsandratanm to lingtand. Sucts a suceess as that seored the oiber day, seerned far distant a weel proviously, bat a quarterpeal rung during the wook uncouraged the band to nuke the attempt, and a sploudid peal at the first attenpt was the yewrard of their efterts.
ln reference to the peal, at St. Clement Danes, in which Mr. Tom Benuey, one of the ofiest and mosis respected members of the Ancient Society of College Youlhs, Look pari, it is interasting to recall, that previous to this poal, Mr. Bentey's late peal of Stedman Caters was rung at St. Duastan's, Stepney, in tho ycar 1878, conducted by the lete Mr. Heury W. Haley.
It will interest members af the lixerciee who are Freemasons 10 know that Mr. John D. Mathews, Master of the Royal Cumberlands, who conducied the haff-mufled peal of Stednan Cinques nt Shoreditch on Saturday, is a nember of the 'Roso of Denmarlk' Lorige, and that this lodge, astablished in 1863, was named after the Pribeess Alosmadra of Denmark.
Anolher illusiration of at way theg lanvo in the Army ' was fortiscoming on Saturday. G.Q.M.S. Gilhert, R.E., rang in a mulled penl in the giternoon aif Guldufoxd, and the bells came round at 5.35 p.m. At 6 o'clock he whs iu Aldershot, tent miles away, ready to stert tor nuthert pata, with his nwu bund, and this also was successful. Some going this! We haven't heard how fast he travelled over the Thog's Back on his motor-cycle.
Master John Rosenmp, som of the enterprising Vicar of St. Nicholas" Wallasey, receutly gate a lectare on chavite ringing to his zchoolfellow's ai Birtenhenal School, in the presence of their Form Masler. The lectare was illustrated by pictures and diagrams, nud was followed with close interest. Thic youthful leaturer is 16 years of age. Ho rings the rreble to Minor methods, and hopes shortly to liegin the inside work.
On Docember ath, 1746, 10,080 Boh Major was rung at Hayrietsiam. Kent, and on the same dey ine 1883, the then record of T1,111 Steminan Caterf at Fulham. Half of tho band that rang in this latter peal are still alive.

For the first time the anniversary of the first peal at St. Paules Caibedrns, rung on Dec. 10th, 1881, will find no survivor of ibat interesting performance, Mr. Ted Howex lawing been the lnst of that company.
A peal of 'Real Douhle Caters wes rung at St. Magnus', Lomdion Bridge, on Dec. 10th, 1770. connposed and conducted be George Gross. At the age of 17 yeass, Rolvert Porter called " 5.040 Holt's Grandsire Trebles' at Kingstow-on-Thumes on December 10th. 1780. This was probably a record in youthful accomplishmeat at that time, for in those days roung men weye not encouraged to rapin progress, and the ari of 'conducting' was made something of a mastery by the man who wres the bob callers, and their knowledge was only grudginglr immarten to athers.

## TRAGIC ACCIDENT IN A BELERY

MAJOR R. C. HUDSON KILLED AT BHSHOPWFARMOUSH.
A terrible fatality oecurred in the belfry of Itishopwearmonth parisht ©harch, Durlium, on Iftursday of last week. Major Rohert Chatljs Hutson, churelwarden, and onc of the ringers, weni to the church to matile tho bells in readiness for the moworial servie for Queen Alexanda, which wats ta be held the next day, and while engaged in the task, apparcatly slipped on the frame, and pulfed the serenth bell over with him, jomming him betwes the bell and the ironwork, and killing him. The tragic discovoly was made by his brothes, Mr. rhamas Fudson, who went, to the tower when Major Hudson failed to reiura. Il was necessary to obtain the sid of police and firemen with block and tackle to release the body. Needless 10 say, the lalality caused deep regret in the town, where Major Hudson was well known and lighly ruspected, and widespread sympatly lass been expressed with the relatives.

The distressing cincumstances were inquired into by the Deputy Coronor on Fridiy. Mr. Thonas Hudson said his brother was a member of his firm, wheh enrried on business ats ironmongers at 314, Figh Street West, Sunderland. Ahout 12.15 a.mo on Thursday be went 10 the belfry to rouffe the bells in preparation for the memorial serrice He went alone, rad was familiar with the work, having done it ous previous occasions. It was his eastom to do it alone. Witness heard the noise of the bells being raised while his brother was up, indiceting that lue was elgaged on the work of mufting. As he seemed a long time in returning witness went ap among the bells, and shw three of them turned up in position ready to be muffied. He foumd his brother lying over the framework between the two heaviest holls, Nos. 7 and 8 . His leed Fas hanging down into the pit, and Whis horty was jammed between No. 7 bell and some of the jronwowk between the hells. He was then quite dead.
The Caroner: What do you think was the cause?
Wifness: I flinis the most likely thing is that he had some show on his boot, which caused him to slip on the framework. I think he would fall against the wheel, aud bring the bell over on to him.
l"urther questioned, the witness said the boll weighed about Il cwl. His brother hat been connected with the belfry ahout 35 teats. Ho saw it was impossiblo to get the body out, and after vinging the bells down for safety he sent to the Ambulance Station for assistanec. block and tacklf had to bo ohtained to get the body released, and it Was taken to his residence close by. Witness did nol fhomk there would have been any advantege if another pesson had heen there; it might have meant double risk. Pliere was no one clse in the church at the time. Drs. P. Fickey and G. Robinson saw the body grove its rentoval from the belfry.
P.C. J. R. Bailes said that at $1.3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. a telephone message was received from headquarters, and he took the ambulance to the clamel tloor. He went up to the belfry with Sergt. Harrison and other officers, and found the deceased man fastened between the wheels of the bells. They endeavoured to relense him, hut withond success. A rlain block and tackle was sent for, and by this means the hell was moved, and the body released. The injuries were about the whest and baek, and there was bleeding from the nose and mouth, indicatind internal injuries
This concluded the cvidence, and the Coroner, in recording las verflict of 'Accidental death, took the opportuaity of expressing lis deep sympathy with the family in their hereavenert. 3y the death of Mr. Hudson thev had lost a fathful brother, The Perish Church end Sunday School a mealous worker, and fhe community a loyal citizen and a patriot. It seemed to htwe been very unfortunatm lifat he should have met his death while performing a volunfary ant to assist in the service of his Church and State, to both of welicin be bat given so much time during his life. It would be some cousolalion to the fanaly to know that they did not grieve alone, but than there were others that mournod his loss, especially on sueli the ocme

poal when 15 years of age. When only 16 , be whs incinded in a bund wheh visited the Midlands, und he raug in two peale-at Leicester and Nontinghant. He took part in the first peal of Royal lay the Asisociation at Neweastle Cathexral in 1892, and the Hirst peat of Maximus by tho Ascociation, which was rung at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, 181894 . In atl he rang some 60 peals, but his activitics outtide his own lower wero curtailed in later years by the claime ol business. It was le and his fafher, the latis Mr. Thomas Hudson, who taught the rudimentis of ringing to the band of St. Ignatins, Sunderland, wher the bells were put in 27 years ago
Major Fudson held several positions ju connection with Bishopwear mouth Jarask Chureh, to which he was devoted, and for the last thee yeart ho had been people's warden. He was a teacher in the Chureh Sutway School, and took is keen interest in the Ghurch's Mission work and in worle among the young meople.
Originally joining the artilery as a private, he afterwards was patamotad to the rank of sergeant, and then transferred to the Royal Arma Servee Corps, where lie received a commission
for many years before the war he had been an officer in the loca Transport Seclion ol tho Royal Army Service Coyps (Territorialah, and when wat buto outi lie was Major in charge of the secticu. In April, 1915, le went to Franee, attached to the 7th D.L.I. Tertitorials, for thr provisioning of which his section was responsible.
