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## BOW BELLS-A GREAT OPPORTUNITY.

The silence of the famous ring' at St. Nary-he-Bow, Cheapside, has caused these bells, better known by repute than probably any other peal in the world, to come into the limelight within the last few days. "The Times, has commented on this silence, and informed the public, that the expenditure of a sum of from $\mathscr{E} 3,000$ to $f 5,000$ is necessary on the bells and tower. It declares that the immediate reason for the stopping of the bells is the development of a crack in the tenor, and goes on to say that now that restoration is inevitable, something on the grand scale is necessary. Whether there is any fracture in the upper part of the bell, as "The Times' asserts, we are unable to say, but such a definte statement must have originated from somewhere, and ringers who know this grand old tenor will await with interest and no litte concern the views of the experts, who will doubtless be called in to make an examination. What we do know is that ringing at Bow was stopped because of the bad "go ' of the tenor, caused by grit getting into the bearings, and it may be that the "breakage ' has grown as the news has spread.

As to the necessary restoration of the fabric, we, of course, know nothing. The ravages of London's atmosphere have doubtless made renovation imperative, and if the bells are to be rung the structure must be made secure. That the belis will be made ringable agatin without unnecessary delay goes without saying while Bow Church has a Rector like Canon Gordon Ponsonby. The point that will interest the Exercise most, however, is whether a patchwork jols will be carried out to satisfy immediate requirements, or whether the churel authorities will enter upon a comprehensive scheme, not only to rehang the bells entirely, but to put in hand other improvements in the tower which would make it at once a model of its kind and a common meeting centre for ringers. Such a proposal is not the dream of a visionary. We believe we are correct in saying that a scheme has been actually submitted to the authorities, who are not unfavotrably disposed towards it, and if it could be carried out it might give the Exercise what it does not at present possess, something in the nature of metropolitan headquarters.

Bow bells have been open for the use of London ringing societies to a greater extent than any other pealSouthwark is the only other comparable tower-and if The scheme for the restoration of the bells at the Cheapside Church could be carried out in its entirety, Bow might be made something more to the Exercise than a happy hunting ground for peal ringers. So far as the restoration is concerned, everything depends on funds.

## BIG RESTORATION SCHEME FOR BOW ?

## FAMOUS TENOR SALD TO BE GRACKED

Concern has baen ocensioned anong ringers by whe amouncenent the 'Times, last week that the fidhous tenor aul Bow Gharch, Cheapside, is broken. The announseurent was contained in the follawing statement: The bells of St. Mary-le-liow, Cheapside, can no longer be rung with sarety and will have to remain sileat until repair work has becn carvied out on the famous Wren tower in whicis they aro housed, and on the bells themselyes, This mork will cost from £ 4,000 to 85,000 , and other essential work to the interior of the clurch and to tho urgan will involve another $\pm 5,000$.
"The immediate reasou for stopping the lell-ringing is that the great tenor bell, whieh weighs 2 tons, is cracked at the point where is attacherl to the woodwork. This can only he romedied by recesting the bell, and at the same time atiention will also have wo be giver to tha frame on which the peal of ten (sic) bells is set. To continue ringing the bells woule have been roost dangerous, since it is stated that in addition to the defects in the bells and their finme, the tower If has ben found to rock slightily.
This further trouble is very largely responsible for the big outlay which hass now become necessary. The tower, 235 ft . 3 igh , whs shifled at low ineles out of the perpendicular some yeyrs ago, when the lirst underground railway was constructed henentil it. It is now suffering, in much the same why as St. Paul's, from the wihnutions of heavy aud routinuous road trafic, aud, like the Houses of Parliament, from Elio rrosive effects of the Iondon atmosplere.'
Wre are unable to get ony combimution as to the tenor being cracked at the cannons. The reason why the bells are not being rung ot tre present is, we are informed, hecause one of the tenar gudgeons scored 'through grithavizg got into the bearing.
The present opportunity may, however, be taken to endeavour to rry out a coritipelaensive scleme of rastoration both in the tower ntil clurich.
The article in the 'Times ' quoted the vestry cienk of Bow as stating that the masonry in some parts is getting into a very wangerous Endition, und it is not thought inpossible by experts that pieces may Il inito the street it repairs are not soon undertaken.
Ihe interior of the church is also bsally in need of restoration aud ralceoration. It has received no attention of this sort since 1907. Recenty thie phaster capsule of one of the pilasters crashed to the floor, and cracks have appeared in the south and west walls. The bells, as well as the churchi, hawo done good service at a comparatively small ost of maintenumes. The tenar, with the six other bells then existing the tower, was recast in 1752, and has given little trouble since.
There is no possililitity of the parishln being able to find the maoney
cessary for this worte. Up to 1875 it possessed very larige trust muls, yielding an income of several whonsands of pounds yeariy. The k of those funds passed to the City of Loudon Parochial Foundain that vear by Aot of Parlianem, which allotted only $£ 130$ a year to the cluurch for repairs to the fabric. Recent attempis to get year allowance jncreased bave been unsuccessful, and the Rector and chwardens, liaving raised what they could in the parist, are about make a wider appeal, This will be addressed to a great many iaterested bodies, ineluding Holy Trinity Church, New York, whicn received a charter from Willian III. giving it thio same facilitics of ennduot by a special vestry ${ }^{\text {ns }}$ were exercised by St. Mary-le-Bow, and which has had many relice from the Londou churoh at various times.
The silencing of 'the great bell of Bow' ' resulted in the appearance of un interesting leading article on 'Bells' in the 'Timess' on
Salurday.

## NOTES BY THE WAY.

## By J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.

We know now more about change ringing in the seventeenth century than Shipway did, and it is impossible that the art could have advanced so much by 1557, as the quotation from Mr. Lukis last week might suggest. In that year the Puritan party were in full power, the monarcliy and the Chutch were abolished, and though it is evident that ringing was still going on, it was not till the Restoration in 1660, when Church and King cane again into their own, that the great advance in ringing, of which Stedman speaks, took place.

Still there is no reasun to doubt that the College Youths did visit Cambridge in 1657 . Stedman was then at the beginning of his work of improving ringing methods. No doubt he did give the Londoners improved ' peals,' which they rang, then at St. Benet's, and afterwards when they got home. In later years further advance made all Stedman's methorls except his Principle obsolete. People then, as often now, imagined that it was the only hing that Stednatn ever dis. Anc! so, when they heard heir predecessors talk about visiting Cambridge and ringing Stedman's methods, they naturally imagined that it was the Irrinciple which was rung.
We shouk like to know what has become of the records which Mr. Lukis saly's he possessed of ringing in Oxford, extending over one hundred and twenty years. 1 l is quite likely they still exist, and some day will come to light. Fortunately we have a vivid account of many of these peals set down by the eighteents century darist, Mr. Riclard Hearne. The ringers were not, as we might hink from Mr. Lukis's references to Andrew Wood, undergraduates or members of the University. They were town tradesmen for the most part, or men employed in various ways in the colleges. Mr. Lukis gives 1) cuotation from the ' L.ife of Andrew Wood,' which refers to his connection with Merton bells. 'He and his mother and two brothers, Robert and Christopher, gave 65 to Merton College in 1656 , towards casting their five bells into eight.' These five were ancient bells, and were put in the tower when it was built in 1421. The tenor was supposed to be the best bell in England, and ' every une,' Anthony Wood says, ' was against the altering it, and were for a treble being put to make six, and old Sergeant Charles Holloway, who was a covetous man, wfiered money to save it , but by the knavery of Thom. Jones, the Subwarden (the Warden being absent) and Hichael Darby, the Bell-founder, they were made eight. John Wilson, Doc. Mus., had a lee from the College to take order about their tuning.

May rath, 1657 , all the eight bells of Mertion Coll. slid begin to ring, and he heard them very well at his approach to Oxon in the evening, after he had taken his rambles all that day about the country to collect monaments. The bells did not at all please the curious and critical hearer. However, he plucked at them often with some of his fellow collegians for recreation sake. They were all afterwards recast.
This recasting was done in 1680 by Christopher Hodson. Michael Darbie, mentioned above, was the East Anglian bellfounder to whom I referred in these notes some months ago. He wandered all over the country, setting up his furnace and recasting bells on the spot. His work is said to be invariably bad.

Oxford was one of the towns where ringing flourished from the earliest times, and though it never produced
a man like Fabian Stedman, as Cambridge did, it must have had some men well versed in method composition as then understood.

The Exercise owes to Oxford two excellent methadsOxford Bob (since Shipway's time called Double Oxford Bob) and Oxford Treble Bob. I do not think that there is any actually direct evidence of either being rung in the city. We have only the names to go on, but it is pretty sure that both were practised there on six bells in the concluding years of the seventeenth century, and that they were extended to eight bells elsewhere and later. Oxford Trehle Bob apparently was not known in London in 1700 , but eighteen years later the Union Scholars rang the first peal of Major at St. Dunstan's-in-the-East.
Grandsire Caters was the methori generally practised Oxford in the eighteenth cendury, and to the accountor the peals rung in it I will come later.
