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## a PRACTICAL SPIRIT OF-BROTHERHOOD

Reference is frequently made to the spirit of brotherhood which exists in the Exercise, and there can be few bodies of men scattered as we are throughout the whole country who, with no tie but their common pursuit, ate more ready to show in their actions the best traits of comradeship. Let a stranger go into the belfry and he is at once made welcome. If he claims to be a ringer, no matter what his capabilities may be, he is at unce offered a rope; and even if it be only rounds that he can ring, he is given the opportunity of having a 'pull.' Doubtless many readers will be able to point to the exceptions that prove the rule, and to say that at this tower or at that visitors are not wanted. But taken as a whole, ringers are ready to welcome the stranger, if he is a ringer, with open arms and make it a point of honour to show him the " courtesies of the belfry.
In the same way a practical spirit of 'brotherhood. is readily evinced when it comes to helping a comrade in distress. In the last few weeks we have had a very fine example of this-another to be added to the many instances which, from time to time, have shown that the comradeship of the belfry extends to something more than formalities in the tower. Ringers throughout the country have rallied to our appeal for help for "Irenæus Pistor, in the affliction which has overtaken him and placed him in distressed circumstances. The useful sum which we have received on his behaff has been the means of tiding him over his pressing needs, and will, we hope, assist in keeping the woif from the door for a further period. How timely was the help given to the family, few will ever know, and no words can ever express the gratitude for that first gift or the appreciation of the kindness shown to Mr. Baker and his family. But for a man condemned to a lifetime of blindness, robbed of his power to follow his means of livelihood, with loved ones still dependent upon him, the sum which has been contributed-generously contributed-up to the present cannot for long lift the load that presses so heavily when the breadwinner falls stricken on the field. The f.go which we have now received will, we feel sure, grow into a greater sum yet, and we hope that every company of ringers will contribute their mite to so good a cause. Our columns remain open to acknowledge donations, and contributions, in accordance with the means of the givers, will, we trust, continue to reach us.
A correspondent, the other day, alluded to the fact that the present case once more illustrated the desirability for a relief fund in the Exercise. This is a matter that has in the past been advocated in these pages, and in some few instances associations have established such funds.

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[^0]But these " local' funds obviously have their limitations. They serve admirably the purpose of assisting in some degree ringers temporarily distressed. but a case such as that of 'Iremaus Pistor' comes in a different category and nothing but a big general fund could hope to provide the help which long-continued disability would require. There are great difficulties in the way of establishing such a source of relief, but it is a matter to which ringers might direct their attention in the hope of evolving a scheme. For instance, something might be possible on the basis of each association contributing one penny per annum for each member. Assuming there are 18,000 affiliated members (we have no means of knowing if this is even an approximate figure) that would provide an income of 675 a year. Little enough, but it might become the foundation of greater things, and the fund used to supplement whatever else was done by the association whose member made a claim upon it. It is a subject worth considering, and it might enable substantial help to be given to many a distressed brother ringer in the years to come.

The cathedral bells could not be rung owing to workmen being engaged in goiting a hugo fag polo through the ringing chamber and bell chamber to the top of the tower. Ringing of the bells was atopped at the last moment, and tho postponemeat of practice could not be notifind. Mr. James Pagett exprosses his apoingies, nud hopes this singular occurvonce will not erobte any doubt ss io fie future regularify of ringing irnetice at tho erfiledral, whieh will lin as himerite.

## HATFIELD CHURCH AND ITS BELLS.

EY HAROLD WALEER.
Aftar beving been aileat for over two years, during which thane they lad been reaist and rehung, the bells of Hatfield Parish church, Yorks, again pealed forth their music on January 7th, allter unving been rededicated by the Lord Bizhop of Sheffield (Dr. Burrows).
Hatfield Church, which ranks as one of the most important of the village churches of South Yorkshire, is built in the Eerpendicular style of architecture. Its proportions are splendia, it theiug more like an abboy church than the parish church of a village. The buiding consists of a chancel, with clanatry chapels, clevestoried nave, transepts, north and south aisles, and a central lantern tower. Pists of a much older chuzch of Early Norman origin have been incorporateu in the present building, the western doorway being the chief of these.
The churck containg many interesting relics of the past, forenost among them being a Norman font, a rood bcreed of great interest, a chained book dated 1569, and an old oak chest known as a Peter's gence box. Hung up in the south chapel is part of a suit of armour reputed to luave been worn by the Black Prince at the Battio of Crecg.
The crowning glory of this beautiful churcla is its noble tower nud the magnificent ring of eight bells which ourich it. The recast bells, Which are now in tune with thomselves and with each other, set a standard far above similar peals in line district, and are similus to the recently recast Tliorne bells, with the exception that they aro heavier and decper in tone.

Before being recast, the bells were a very poor ring, indeed, the individusl bells, especially the tenors, being out of tune with ihemsolves and with exch ether. There was no fousuder's mark on tho tenor bell, but it may have been the work of William Oldifeld, who had the York foundry batween 1601 and 1642, his favourite inscription hoing 'SOLI DEO ©LORIA.'
The 5th, 6th and 7th bells were cast at sthe York foundry by Samuel Smith, whose bells are fairly common in the Doncester distrist, there being two at Arksey, two at Wadworth. Hhee at Fishlake, ind one each at Rossington and Finuingley. Athough the 4th beil bare no founder's mark, its characteristics fed one to assume that it was the worls of James Harrisou, who bad a fondry at Barton-am-Humber. The 3rd bell was added in 1864 to complete the ring of six, sul it is rather curious to learn that the money for this bell was left to the church eearly 250 yeare before the bell was cast. The two trehles wore added and the octave completed in 1874, when the existing lells wore taken down and reluug in an new, onk frame

## COMPLETE RESTORATION

The mort of recesting and rchenging the bells wes entrusted to Messrs. Jobn Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, and it is interesting to learn thnt they were in tho foundry at the same time as the tamoua Great Peter of York.
The bells have been recast and tuned on Taylor's harmoaical system of tuning, which ensures absolute sweetness and purity of tone, all harshness and dissonance being climinated thereby. The peal has been refing witly entirely new fittings of the mest mallern type, Measrs, Taylor having introduced mnay improvements in bell hanging recently which are designed nol only with a view of reducing the lahour required to ring the bells, but also thatithe bells should ropnin in perfect ringing crder wilh the minimum amount of attention required to the fitfings. For instance, the old-fashioned type of hearings required to be luhricated almost evory time the belis were rung, whereas the paterst ball bearings now fitted to the Hatficld beils do not require labrication except once in every ter years or so. Theu, egain, the iron leadstocks now fitted da not require screwing ap and adjusting as did the old wooden lienistocks. The clappers are alsa of a vestly superior type, tho joinis being fitted with lubricators, so that wear is redueed to a minimum. The whole of the hangings are so designed as to reduce to a minimuin the forces oxerted by the swinging of the bells and the stresses thrust on the tower structure. The welght of the aew tenor bell is 18 cwt .2 gr . 18 ll , nud ita note is E natural. The old inscriptions lisue been gaithfally reprotuced on the new bellis with the following nulditions:-

On all the bells, 'RECAST 1927,' and Taylor's foundry mark.

In addition to the work carrich out on the bells themgelver, the old timiner framework ank its supports, which were designed according to, the inleas of the late Lord Gximhorp, bave beer thoroughly stiffened hod tied together, For the comfort of the ringers a new ceiling made of sound-deakening materia, has been pulin the ringing chamber, The helfry steps, which were very much worn down by countless generafons of ringers, have been retreaded.
The whale schema has cost something like 5520 . Of this sum fise was waised prior to the rededication, A further ell was collected on Saturday week. The credit of jaising the suonoy belongs in the main to Mr. nud Mrs. Sydney Allen, of Dunseroft Abbey, who have been untiring in then' efforts for the hells restoration fund. They have, of cuttre, heen ably backed up by the Churd Council. Mr. Allen has 'overseered' tho work from a professional point of wiew, so the people al Hatfield can be assured that they have got the very best value for thoir moncy.

## THE REDEDIGATION

there was a large congregation at the rededication service, anong those present being Messrs. J. Oldiam and J. F. Fider (J. Taylor and Co.h, Mr. F. Clarke (divisional secretary, Yorks Assactation), Mi. C. In. lotter (hon, secretary, Bajnsley and District Socjety), Messis. G. Claske and H. Walker (Ringing Master and hon. secretary, Doncaster and District Society), and a good gathering of ringers, the towers mperesanted being Doncester, Arksey, Ardwick-le-Street, Conishorough, Thekhill, Thorne, Sprotborough, Fisulake, Barusley and York Minster Mt: (\%. H. Hudson, churchwarden, was uniable to be present, lut his duties wero carried out by Mr. Burnelt, one of the sidesmen.
The service commenced by the singing of the hymn, We love the place, 0 God.' Evensong was then sung, the Vienr of Hatfeld (the Thev. J. Haythornthwaile) readisg the prayers. After the third cullect tho Bishop, stanting under the tawer, read several prayers suitable to the orcasian and rededicated the bells with the words: 'In the faith of Josus Cbrist and in the name of Almighty God, we rededicate theso bills to the use of the church and people of Fiatfield.' The Bishop hum tolfed a bell eight times, and afterwards prayed that the lyells "he solemaly sel apart from all profane and unhallowed useg. The ditm,
When mornine galds the skies,' was then sumg. For his sermon the Bishop took as his text, "Come ye and lot us walk in the light of the Tord (Isaiah is. 5). He said that tho fundamentai principlear of the folls were always the same, but periodically the bells reguired recanting to improve the tone and bring them up to modern standards. After recasting, the principles of the bells were sthll the same as before-

So it was wilh the other things of life, The principles of law, of povernment, frado, industry and tho Church were always the sami. but ail these things reguired recasting to conform with modern idean and conditions. The Reformation was only a recasting of che Chircl. The principles of worship as contained iu tho Prayer Hook were always the same and always woutil be the aame, but still tho Prajar Bank needed recasting to improve its tone and make it consistent with present-flay knowledge.

After the Blessinj had been pronouaced, Mrs. Sydney Allen tolled a bell eight times. Then as the recossional byma, 'Now ibank wa at] our God,' was being sung, the bells began to peal out. Firgh ouc, then another joined in until Gnally the whole riar was pealing ferth in one joyous cresecndo of sound.

The Hatield ringers rang the bells for the first time after rededication. Subsequent ringing was done by the risitiog riweers 'The bells were rung at interwals until nine oclock, the methods being Stedman and Grandsire Triples, Bob Major, Keat Treble Bob Major, and Cambridge Surprise Major.
The ringers were entertained to tea by Mr. S. Allen, over thirty giting tiown. \& vote of thanks to Mr. Allen was proposad by Mr. H. Walker, who congratulated the people of Hatfield on having the Eesttoned peal of bells in the district. He also congratulated Messre, Taylor and Co. on their excellent workmanship, and said the bellis left nothing to be desired, the tone and 'go' being splendid. Mr. C. D. Potter seconded the vote, and said he remembered heing prosent at tho dedication of the old bolls over fifty yearg ago. Mr. Allab suitably replicd, and said it was quite a plensure to liave the members of the Doncastor and District Society at Hatfiold, and hoped it would not be long before they came again. The Yicar in a few words welcomed the ringers, and then read a telegrnm from the Rev. Moridyth $13 r o o k e s$, who regratter his absence, and sent greetings to the ringers. After tea, the ringers retnrmed to the belfy and kepl the bells going until a lete hour.

## BELL TUNING.

## To the Edilor.

Dear Sir, I have read Mr. Ladia's lettor with much intarest. He doos not mince bis words. I do mat flerefore intend to minces mine. 1 cennot say myself that I am in love with either Lord Grimutharp's system of casting or Canoa Simpson's tuning, but there are exceptional peals in both ciaspes.
I consider St, Pand's Cathedral bells one of the exaeptions, and if their woight is taken into considoration they ars certainly not a failure. What grounds has Mr. Latin for describing them as such ? They sound their weight. The 62 owt. tenor is 13 自at, old pitch, which is near enough A concert pitch. Tho small bells are also cast jn proportion to tho large ones. Can this be said of the Simpson-Laned belta at Exeter?
Mr. Lafliu states that if St. Paul's bells were in another tower they would have been smapped pear's ago, buti am afrud his opinion will not carry very much weisht in thet direction. If those bells hung in a tower outside of Londion (preferably in Beddington Park) they would be heard to their proper advantage.
E underscand York Minster bella are very voluminous, What would thoy sound like in St. Panl's tower? Would they want scrapping, foo?
Now wo come to Bow bells. 1 might say I lave never hearit such a. degrading alescription given bofore of any bells as Mr. Laflin desaribos How trebles, and it must be pretty obvious to all who know Bow bells that intr, Lafliu zutst havo paid a prolonged visit to the Gog and Magng hefore hearing the bells, This would also account for the glasses having a touch of St. Vitus' danee.
His descripion of the tenor is rather alarming, but for the beneft of Mr. Laflin's blisscul ignorance $[$ would tell him that the belt hangs on a cast-iron stock, the shape of a bridge, and, ia my opinion, tucked up far too much, but the other eleven liang out on the old wooden stocks. Gaadness fnows what in modern Simpson-tumed tetor woud cound like lung under the same conditions;

There is one thing ilr, Lafin admits, and that is he laeard the trebles. 1 hare nerer been fortunate ( $P$ ) mough to hear the trebles of a Simpson-tumed poal of 10 or 12 when ringing. This, perbaps, may be un advantaye, us when heard singly the hells would certamly fit tha deseription that Mr. Laflin applies to Bow trebles.

The only goint upon which I agree with Mr. Laflin is *to improve Simpson tuning, and there is certainly room for improvement. When they gound as though they have body in thern, yet metlow und no howis and mysterious overtones, I shall be the first persan to support Simpson tuning, and I really think that tho tuning anachine will have to do a litite work, and the stejkes play a more important farts
The next time Mr. Laflin comes up to London I shall be only toe pleaned to meef him und show him round to some of the most magnificent peals ir the locality, not Simpson tured; but ho must not get an ghinion that there are not any Simpson-tumed peals yound bere, especially as 1 happen to live within a quarter-of-an-liour'g ride of Gillett and Johnston's.-Yours faithfully,

Dear Sir, -It seems that my worthy cousin of King's Norton would be more convincing if the were a little less one-sided. He might help the discussion on bell tuning if he would take purticular notice of that Arab proverb 60 opportumely quoted by Mr. Jenkins this week. If Percy would give credit to Mr. Young for e point bere and there in his argument, remembering that Mr. Young by no menns discredits entirely the Simpsoc tuming, it would bo different. But no. Percy 0 . seems bent on having every old standard peal recast into a beautivi but characterless lot of Simpson peals, so much alike that there wit soon be no pleasaymble anticipation in going to lear a new peal. It will be like atteuding a flowor show consistiag of all geraniums. Susply, Bow bells ere entitled to 50 per cent. of their alloged fanse; and-nave not St. Prul's been described as "like a big bnad" $p$
There are good and bad peals, both Simpson and old standard. I know some of botl. There are old peals in which you can find $n$ minor feult in every bell if you want to, yat they give great pleasure when running in peal.
Simpson peals there aro that aro more perfectiy in tume, wayme, but with on 'edgo' an their vaices like a nasal baritone singing, that you could slave with ; and same not so. I notiee that Parcy O. seems to disercrlit what Mr. Carter told Mr. Yaung, yet accepts his opinion as regards Erdington bells; fut in general I quite agree that Mr. Carter's heariog prohably did not onable him to give an opinion on tuning with any weight, even hind ho bo dosired.
Further, why give free advertisements to belliounders. This is emmmon to debaters on bell tuning, especinlly Simpsonians. Do they reffect that these same well-advertised knights of the molting pot are perfectly willing and even anxians, being business firms, to melt their own products tup as often as the church authorities can find tho money? I suspect they would recast the tower, loo, if it watld melt. Let them roo their own edvertising. Some of them, at all ovents, have been talked into fane, perliaps against their desire. Wha can tell?

If comerporients prointed out some of tho less successfus johs. would the same feelinw proval betwren fonnders and ringers as at present exists?

## STEDMAN.

## STRUCTURE AND EXTENSION

So far we hape dealt with ine structure and extension of plaill mothods, and we hapo been able to see a theorctical system of extension which is common to them all, but we now come so somathing which is quite different. Stedman Doubles consists of a plain hunting course of tiree bells cembined with a plan hunting course oll wo bells twice repeated, then one of those two fells goes into the thret bell work, and one of the bells in the three-bell work comes ont; the aex plain hunt in front is reversed, and the two hells behind do the same work as in the prepious six. Thess twelve rows four times repeated make what is called the plain course, but it must bo clearly understood that it is a totally diferent kind of plain course from any that we have seen in the plain methods.
Tho extension, fulike any extension we have seen before, leaves tho three-bell work aloae and the fwabell work alone, and adds more two-bell work of exitily the same kind in 6-7, g-9, and 10-11.

This disposes once far all of any attempt to find a theory covering all extension, becruso we camot, wifter all these jears, alter the system of oxtension, wish I proved yeats ago can anly be conc by troating ble slow six as plain and the quich six as a bob-a system of oxtension whicl is very anleresting oe paper, bulf would bes oo very dull in the bolfry

## THE EXTENSION OF METHODS.

## BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE

1 will now give oute or two illustrations of the cyclical movements which make up various methods. The first will be Plain Bob, anni that mut only because it is the simplest of methods, but it is cally the ohndation and typical method. The first cycle is tho humting course - The Plain Principlo-in which all the bells are equally involved.

This will orly give you twice as many rows as thore are 1254 bells. To get more rows, a secondary cycle is made on part only of the bells, and this is done in the sionplest and most obvious position, viz, when the treble (the bell not affected by this secondary cycie) is leading. Here it is. You can easily see that is a complete cycle on the three warking bells, and it moves in the opposite direction to that of the primary cyele,
And these two cycles together involve a third cycle, which is that of the treble or hunt through the caursing order of the extreme ar working bells. The coursing order of the first lead of Minor is 653124 . Throughout the course the extreme bells keep this coursing order, but tho treble in succersive leads passes from between 2 and 3 to between 3 and 5 , then between 5 and 6 , then 6 and 4 , then 4 sud 2 , and, lastly, between 2 and 3 , when the cyclo : 8 complete and the beils come round, this construction of hunt and extreme bells with the hunt's cyclical path in coursing ordor always occurs in overy bit of wort in every method. You get not only the main hunt of a method, which is usually the treble, but of ten the work in the interior of the lead contains humbs and extrente bells.
The second example is Kent Treble Boh Minor. Firsb you have a hunting course on six bells-twelve changes,
Second, after every second change a dodying moverment is inserted onu step backward followed by one step forward:-

In all these illustrations we gutst write out hand strokes as well as buck strokes, or we miss the true construction.
As a third illustration take Donble Court Minor. Here you will find that the tWo places-4th's and 3 Ird's-together have the same eflect uncl give similar cyoles as tho second's place in Bob Minor.
Of arein, to luko a different illustration altogether, examine Folt's Orympal. Resolve it into its P. biocks, its B3, blocks, and its Q . sets. Write down hack and hand stroke rows hs we beve done above, and you will find they are all cycles of movement.
These aro alt fairly simple illustrations. The more complex methods difer only hacause there are more cycles. If my reader is interested in this matier, Let hin turn to Double Costaty Court Major its the new 'Central Council Collection of Methodk.' Let him study the construefion of it as them given and see how it is made up of a combination of simpler ancthods. Then let him turn it izto a Treble Bob method by repeating every two changes.
