HOW THE ASSOCIATIONS HAVE HELPED
Last week we referred in this column to the boom in bcll restoration and to the part which ringers have played in bringing this about. There is also another phase of this very satisfactory indication of progress which must not be overlooked. The various ringers' associatians throughout the country have done a great deal to secure improvement in the condition of rings of bells, and, where funds permit, they give generous and practical help. To begin with, the presence of ringers at district and other meetings, held at towers where the bells go badly, not infrequently results in timely hints being given to the authorities that something ought to be done. On the other hand, ringers from towers where the bells are in an indifferent condition, on going to ring on peals which provide practical illustration of how bells really should 'go,' return to their parishes dissatisfied with the state of things in their own belfry and soon begin to stir for an improvement. In both directions, therefore, the associations have been able to help forward the good work. But they are not mere grumblers at bacl conditions and agitalors for improvements; they give a very practical aid when they are permitted to do so. Most of the associations have one member, or more, qualified to give technical advice with regard to what is needed in the way of restoration, and the help of these experts is always readily placed at the service of church authorities. In several cases, now, the Diocesan Advisory Boards have some one of this kind to whom they always appeal in these matters, and the day is probably not far distant when every such Board will have upon it, or in consultation with it, a man with a practical knowledge of bells and ringing. So that while our organisations do their utmost to urge on restorations, they are able to give valuable assistance in the technical advice which is at the disposal of those who desire it.

But our associations do even more than that; they vote considerable sums out of their funds towards approved restoration or augmentation schenes, and in this way the ringers of the country contribute a substantial amount to bell funds and back up their proposals with their cash1. The Oxford Diocesan Guild has set a wonderful example of helpfulness in these matters, and now the Chester Guild Committee has decided to enlarge its maximum grants by 50 per cent. We should like to see this lead followed by every association which has sufficient reserves to justify it; for there is little use in accumulating money. When once the reserve has placed the organisation at 'safety ' point, there seems little reason why receipts and expenditure need more than balance, and we know of no better way in which the funds of a ringing (Continued on page 130.)

association can be spent than in assisting in the restoration of bells, which are the instruments upon which we rely for the practice of our art. Often the contribution of the ringers helps to open the tower to the association and to interest fresh people in its activities. Judiciously administered, grants of this nature repay the orgatisations over and over again.

## BENINGTON'S FAMOUS BAND

## ANOPHER YETERAN GONE.

The fatis but ond of the famous old Benineton band has passed to tho other side, namely, Mr. Samuel Page, who was in his 80th year He was liad to rent on Saturtey afiernonn last in the old ehurchyard Lhat he had so often trod on his way to the tower and the bells he loved so well, and not many yurds from the restiar place of his old Master'; Squire Lettard Proctor, who was auch it well-kaown figure in the ringing Exercise 70 yerre ago.

Gld Sara, as lie was familiarly called, was a man whose wort was his bond, end, punctuality wes prirt of his life. A promise from him, humanly speaking, was if certainty, and to be late was, in his eyes, a arime. Fimself ade of the vory finest of strikers, and a keen Iistemer a every chanye in tonch or peal, no excuse was alhowed for any man, who called himgelf th ringor, for had atriking. Mr. Page had been tramed in a strict school. The writer can well remomber in his childhood days hearine. Benington bella across the fields, striking with the redutarity of machinery
Phomes Page, Sam's father, had the treining of his son, and Sam hns ofter repested the words of his father to him, vis.: 'If I was poing to he a ringer 1'd be cnc, und these words were carried out to the fitl liv bath.
The old squire wonld often take young Sam to various paris of England far rineing, and he was never tired of telling of his wisits to Birmingham, Werwick, Ipawicit, London, Laverbam, Safron Walden, and many other places, as well as of the places visifed by the whole band together to oper peals, etc. For instance, the band wisited Braughing on the anniversary of the opening (May 10th) far 50 years without is break, and it was seldom that all the standard methods mere not rung during the day. The prowess of the band can be somewhat estirnated by fin newspaper report upon the visif to Galheswood, pissex, for tho opening of the new diturch and bells, which reads: "The opariag of the chtuch was taken advantage of by Mr. Payor, who kindly invited the Roniugtoa band to attead, and, although they had to travel a distanue of nearly 70 miles, they reached Galleywood in timo to ring for morning service, after which they rang ia masterly atyle the following touches in ten fuethods: Grandsire Triples 336, Stedman Triples 420, Rob Major 336, Double London Gourt 336, Double Norwich (loum Major 1,008 , Oxford Treble Bob Major 576, Kent Treble 13ob Major 707, Superlative Surprige 448, Cambridge Surprise 448, Lon don Surprige Mrjor 448. Canducted by Thos. Page. As will be been, the whole amounts to fipeal of 5,060 clanges, and, indeed, a monderful performance which, without a doubt, no other rittage in England could appronel
A few words as to tho history of ringing at Benington will interest anay. The charch stands in a picturesque spot and in a most pic turesgun ald-world village, with ils limbered houges and roakery near by. The old bells were a ring of six. When, in IB3s, Squire Proctos come to reside there at the ald Lordship, two trebles were added, and a pend tablat ic the tower record that the bells were opened on Jas. $29 t h$ 1838, and the next day a peal of Grantisire Triples was rung by tho Joyal Chatherlamd Fouthe, Wru. Lobl ringing in it, and Leonard Proctar ringing the tenor, lise penl being conduched by E. Giles.
The next peal recorded was one of Double Norwich in 1849 , the first in the county of Hertford, rung by yesidents. The aext was in IB55, peai of Superiative, the squire taking pact with a roixed company. Then in 1805 carce tho first peal of Stemman in the county by a resident inand. On December 26th, 1870, from what can be gathered, Sam rang hin firat peal at lome, which was a 6,048 of London Surprise by all residents-truly a remarkable thing for those far-off days and fol a small village. Hefore this daEe, lowever, he had rung in a peal of Stedraen Caters al Hertford upon tho old ten, years before they were burnt down. He was then 21 years of age, and the peal was conducted by John Cox, of tho Gumberluncls. No proper account of the number of penls Mr. Page had rung can be found, bat the number mugt be con siderablo Eur aringer of that time, as, upon the doath of his father the conducting fell upon him, aud Benington was the Meeca of many famous meis. Cox, Halcy, MHler, Loobb, and, itl later days, Washbrook Rev. F. ]. Robingou, Nathan and Frederick Pitstow and many others were visitors, and at the Lordship the old squire kept epel-open doors to ringers. 1t was nothint strange, 45 or 50 years ago, to hear the bells of Benington ringing upon any day of the week, for if a peal was wanted Squire Proctor bad only to call up his men, and visitorat coukd be acconradatod with any method they required
In 1873, an board records of 5,600 of Cambridgo Surprisa rung by residonts, and there must have been many that are not recorded, for the ringing was kept up to a very bigh stenderd right up to the time of Mr. Proctor"s denth, which ocurred in 1895 . Surprise methods were regularly rumg for Sunday gervices, and tho fume of the Bemington mon at that time spread throughout Englaud. Thoagh all men of humble calling, they ware grent at :inging.

And now one more of this band hes left the scene. The bells he loved and bud rumg so often were rung balf-muffed after the funeral servica by fin colleagues, W. FI, Lawrence tuking a rope in the tribnte to an old and respected friend.

Tro-morrow is the 150 th anniversary of a peal of 10,260 Grandsitu Cators, rung at St. Marg's, Nottingham, and conducted by W7. D Orofts.

The first peal of Cambridge Surpise Major by the Yorkshire Assa ciation was rumg at Drighlingtou on Majch 4 th, 1899.
On March 8 th, $1737,12,603$ Grandaire Caters was rung at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich. Considering that this was little more than 20 fears after the first peal in any malhod, this was a great performanco
The first peal of Stedman Gaters, on the faunous bells of Bow Chnapside, was rumg 120 years ago noxt Wednestay. It was composed and eonducted by George Gross, and Wiliam Slipway took part in it
It is forty years on Saturlay ucxt, March 3 drd, when the first peal nf Grandsire 'l'riples was rung on the graud old peal af bells au Laren ham. Hollis' fire-part was conducted by the late Clas. Sillitoe, the hand betng A. Symonds, C. Sillibe, J. Gampin, A. Scolf, Wr. litggy, W. Howell, H. Harper and W. Moors. All have passed away except the froble man, who is a native of Preston, Suffolk.

## THE CURFEW. <br> To the Editor.

Dear Sir-Will not the Rev. F. Lh. Jidwards find out for us somet thing really certain about the murfew? The tale we were told in ant bistories was that William the Conqueror, anong his acts of tymmy ordered the church bell ta be rung at oight a'clock, and that then all lights must be put out; and that this was called the curfer (which is short for "conserfen, or 'cover-fire'). Also that in many phaces lis bell is still rung. It is quite brue thate a bell rumg ab varions homers in different places is called the enafew; but the fact that our oldest bels are mach later than the Concjuest -makes the whole thing yead, to ringers, more like a fairy fale thath sober history. Moreorer, it wand seem probabie that all the different bells that are zurg in diferent places are survivals of thells that were rund for differcat services bofare the Refarmation. When the services were a longer hela, it was found that in certain cases people had gol so acenstomed fra timinar themselves by a bell rung al that time that the ringing of the hell was kept on, although there was no longer any service; or it mas have boen that the sexton was paid for ringing at cerlain times, aml in order to still get his money he went on pibrging the boll.
The last service, at bedtime, was Compline, and it is pretty certaits that when a thell is ruag af bine of ten it is the old Compatime bell. Mr. Jdwards says that ut Seville 'The Curfew' is ramg at ten. What exactly does this mean? Is it called the curfew in Spanish, or are hres and lights then put out, or is it simply an evoning bell?

On Februnry 21st, the tiny parish of Bradetone. Thtrservice was conducted by the Lomd Bishop of Exeter, nat it is believent that this was the first visit which the parish bad received from ils dionesan in the mernory of man. A very large number of people antended in fact, the churgh whs quite full. There were nine gets of ringers from neighbouring patishes, who all had a riug on the bells, which were set going by the Kelly band, who rang two well-struck sixscores of Grandsire Doubles and ane of Boh Minor, in which they were mssisted hy Rev. E. S. Powell, president of the Devon Guili.

The snbject of the Bishop's address was "Co-operation,' and the paty it slould play in our religious life. The effort of supplying fiunds from this undertaking had been carried out by the parishioners, so the Bishop's words were most appropriate to the occasion.
Mcesrs. Mears and Stainhank supplied flat new bell, and also tampi the old rintr, and there was a meneral testimony that the fone of the peal had heen greatly improved. 'lhe wark of fanging hati been skil fusly carried out by Mr. N. Stokes, of Woodbury. By the elus of the day it was fomd that the whale cost of the undertaking had hoen mot.

## THE RIVERSIDE CHURCH BELFRY.

The magnificent new llaptist Church in New York, for which some of the billis, on tiew to-nowrow at the Craydon Bell Fonndry, are rlestined, has leen built on tho most prominent site in the cityRivorside Drive. It siands within a few yards of Grant's tomb, ever-
looking the Hidson River, with an enimmons panorama looking the Hodson River, with in mimmons panorama, extending
hotil if and down the famons waterwar, and with the Pallisado in the fitr sistance.
The building itself is as high al most of the Euthelish catherirals, and is eruwned by a beautifil towar, whieh is puro Gothic, and is nhout is meruwned by a beautifil towne, wheh is puro Gothic, and is nhout
400ft. high. Tlo belis will hang ahout 300ft. above the side walk, in ${ }^{3}$ chamber mersuring approximatels 36 ft . octagonal inside, and 5 ift. Gin. high. The nueleus of the carillon is that previnusly sent from the Croydon Foundry to the Park Avenue Clarch, These are being remaved to the now building, and the umberr of the bells will be brought up to 64 by the hells which are shortly to be shipped from Croydath.
In the tower will be provided the various church offices and also the Sunday Sclool, aud it will be served by two high-speed elevators. At the very top of the tower is a minister's ' look-out' room.

Canon Guy Rogers, who responded, first took the opportunity Lo express on behalf of those who had organised the gathering then great pleasure at seeing their gucsts present from the remotest parts of the country, from north, south, east and west. That was the thirit year" he had heea present, and ho was heginniag to feel that ho had a mumher of fricnds at that Runam? dinner. It was a great pleasure to him to know thant Si. Martin's Guild contimuer to be so strong shit so representative an institution. Referring to the toast, tho said he did not think theye had for a long time been the strain between the Chureh and State that there was it present on account of the revision of the Prayer Book, but he felt surce they would find a way through (hear, hear'), and that in the future a strong Church and State woild bes able to co-operate tor the gool of the Christian religion and for tho goon of this people as a whole (hear, hear). It would a disnstroths thing if there were any real guarrel between them which would disturib tho happy relatiens which had existed so long hetween thent They all desiren that the nation should continus to be a Clutistian nalion, and sliould recognise its Christianity by recognising the Christian Church. Ther hoped that the तifferences which had arisen on the ecclesiastical horizon might presently disappear, and that nothing would distarb the relations between Charch and State whien haci existed so happily for many a generation. Proceeding, Caron Rogers referred to tho strong feliowship and mulual understanding which existed nmong ringers, and spoke of tha need in these deys of maiking lellawship among all bumatily throughout the world a great reality.

Mr. Walter Bryant, an old Birmingham ringer, made an admirablo little spoech in proposing the tonst of the evenigg, 'The memory of the inte Henry .Johnsum. Hu was a jovial old soul, and often used to tell some good stories about the old ringers of his dey. Ho was a man of grent personality-a man who in all his unelertakings was the soul of integrity and a man worthy in crery way of tho trihutes which wero paid to him at that memorial wathering.
The toasi haring been druak in silenee, those present who bad known Henry Jolanson in the flesha were asked to stant up, and out of tho company ithere were only thirteen.

Adderman Pritchett, as usual, submitted the toast of 'Continued prosperity to St. Martia's Guild.' He said be did 60 on this occasion with a sifighly increased tingo of sarluess, in that those who knew Henry Johnson were becoming every year such a diminishing bana, and especially hecanse of the great losses the Guild lat eustajned in those who had passed away from them during the year. They mourned the lass of eiglat of their meathers, Whe first of whom to go gince their last dimmer being Mi: Sidney Smith, the father of their worthy seeretary, Mr. Puddon Smith. "they sympathised with their zecretary in his irreparable loss. The next was Charlos Dickins, one of a worthy pair of brothers, who liad rung many penls for the fiuild. Then Mr. Pryco Taylor, of Loughhorough, and nfterwards Mr. Stanley Bragg, of BoliIull, $\pi$ member of a woll-known tinging fannily, whose death reminded them in a stacting way of the macertainty of human life. He was a staiwart man, whom ove might have expected to live For many yoars, but lie died at an carly age. Then here was another worthy, whorn they all knew well and jememberexl witly affection and esteem. He referred to Mr. Reuben Hall, of Weat Bromwich. The great gathering at lis funeral, at which that Guild was represented, was the best trestimony ta his worth. The next was a notable loss, their former secretary, Mr. Godren, who was in harness up to the last, and passed pencefiliy awny from the sceme of his toil. He need not dwoll on his merits and his services to the Guild. Of late years they did not soe so much of hin! 83 they wished, but he was one of those worthies who helped to bring the Guild to the state of prosperily which it enjoyed at the present diry. The next whose loss they hat to mourn was that dear friend of the Guild, the late Dean Willink, Dean of Norwich, who presided over thase gutherings on geveral ocensions during the tenure of the Rectory of St. Martin's. Ho was a most genial man, and he and his wifo and danghters were real frienis of the Guild. It was with regret that he departed from them to Norwich; it was with still decper rogret they hend of his decense. The last he had to mention was Mr. Arthin Clifis, most sociable member of tite Guld, though not a ringer, who lonk the warmest interest in ihnir doings. This was n long and melancholy list, but they congrabuipted themselves that there were stit] an nany of the old members alive, and apparently in the enjoyment of excellent health. They regrette? the absence Wrough indisposition of Mr, Thamas Miller, but they welcomed Mr. Waghorn, from London, who was now 85 years of age, and they also had withe them M1. Frank Banks, who celchrated lis 80th birtholay on the provious day, and had for the last 24 years been their steeple-Kecner-an officr which he worthily filed (applanse). They also had wilh them Mr: Tron Russam, and Mr. James Genge, who was continuing to add to his peal recorrl, althongla in his 75th year, and had now rung 974 peals. They loped he would get a good wity past his floousand before their next nnoual gatheriug (applatise). A nother pentleman, who, althouph not actually a ringer, was one in spirit, was Mr. Churelıwarden Kendall, who celobrated his 79th birtlidgy an the previons Monday. To him fleo they offered their cangratulations and the earnest wish that bes migat be spared for many yenrs to corte. Fe bad honourahly served in the office of churchwarden for 40 years, and the honed he would serve for many more years to come.

A notable peal was that at Hereford Cathedral em Fastar Monday and he thought thefr Guilit had established a record for penla on cattiedral hells. He only hopen the Guild would he athe to ring the first peal on Worcester Cahlentral belts when they had heen rersst and relang. Tho holls of Worcester Catheifral had been a disgrace for many rears but things were to he put right now, and he hoped their Guild would get the opportunity, of ringing the first peal on them.
