## THE BIG PEAL-RINGERS.

In modern ringing history there have been few names more prominently before the Exercise than that of Mr. James George, whose achievement last Saturday, in completing his one thousand peals, made really a memorable event. The number of ringers who can possibly attain to such a record is obviously extremely limited, and when a man reaches this prodigious total it is a matter whicin calls for more than passing notice. Time was, and that not so very long ago, when the mere suggestion that a man could ring a thousand peals in his lifetime would have been laughed at as the imagining of a visionary; but it has come to pass, like many other seemingly impossible things. A generation or so ago the ringer who could claim to have rung a hundred peals was lookod up to as someone quite out of the ordinary, while a man witl two hundred and fifty to his credit inspired awe among those around him. To-day two hundred and fifty peals is a mere bagatelle; even five lundred coinls as but a moderate total, comparatively. Times have vastly clanged in ringing as in everything else. Half a century ago a peal was an event in a man's ringing career; something to be talked about for years; something which often satisfied ambition for a long period. To-day a pea! is but an incident and relatively counts for little in a lifetime of ringing activity. Nevertheless, everyone recognises that a four figure total is really a wonderful performance, and those who have struggled for their single hundreds can best gauge the merit of it.

There are many who will doubtless ask, "What is the good of it all, in the end?' As well may we ask what is the good of individual effort to excel in any recreation? If it encourages innocent ambition; if it gives a man enthusiasm in a healthful occupation; if it develops his physical and mental qualities, then surely it is worth something. But the men who have rung at thousand pals have every one of them laid the Exercise under a debt. Their activities have inspired others with a keenness which has developed, not always along peal ringing lincs, but for the general advance of the Fxercise; they have all been men who have been doing a great deal for others; assisting the 'lame dog,' encouraging the youngster, and, above all, 'doing their bit' as service ringers. It is the men who are the keenest peal ringers who are, as a rule, the most attentive to their duties in service ringing; who give up more time than most people know, to helping others; and whose successes in the belfry are an example and a pattern to others. The successful peal ringers are by no means selfisly men; they atre always first to lend a land where necessary: and if a man is in (Continucd on page 642. )

A peal hoard is to be placed in St. Nicholas' Chureh, Liverpoul, recording the first peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus in the North of England. The arrangements for the unveiling ceremony wre nuw being made.
Holt's ten-part was rung for the first time on October 18th, 1754, at Shoredifich Chureh.
A pal of 10,272 Kent Treble Bob Mujor was rung at Debomham on October $16 \mathrm{~kb}^{2} 1880$.
The old peal of six at Highclere, Hants, have been rehung in a new iron frame, with modern fittings, and two trebles added to complete the octave, by Messrs. Taylor and Co. They were dedicatel hy the Bishop af Winchester last Saturâay.
The 'Old Brigade, were well to the foro on Saturtay bast at Leicester. In the band who rang the Stedman Caters no less than seven are over 60 years of age. It is to be hoped that tha amual nerchant " will get another chance. He did more than justify lis inclusion in the band. Will the selection committee please note?
With reference to the footrote to the report of the peal at St Mary's, Bury St. Edmunds, in our last issue, to the effect that it was over 20 years since the last peal was rung on these bells, M1: C . Woodstock, of Ipswich, writes that a peal of Grandsire Triples was rung there on June 15th, 1912, conducted by Mr. S. H. Synoonds, Who also writes pointing out this fact.
Mr. J. I'. Ficler, of Messrs. Taylor and Co., achicved something of a record last week-end, when he represeuted the firm at no tower than three bell dedications within 24 hours, one is Hanpshire and two in Essex.

## ' BELLS THROUGH THE AGES.'

Mr. J. R. Nichols' new book, 'Bells through the ages, has yeceived many commendatory press notices, but in the very quarter where we should havo expected some recognition of the bellyinger's work, viz., in the 'Church Times,' we find a review which misdirects the public attention to that side of ringing activity which, so far as the bells themselves are concerned, matters least. There carn, of course, be no objection to saying that quite a large number of men enjoy change ringing and give their Saturdny ofternoous to it. Thal is perfectly true; but the reviewer tolally ignores the fact that the raotive belind linging in these days is the service, voluntarily vendered, to the church on Sundays by thousands of men and woneuBells are usea primarily as a calle to worsbip, and it is to this end wat the ringers of this courtry hava entered the craft.
After this, it is not surprising to read that the village chime can mave us es, let us say, the "tubular bells " of the Imperial Institute certainly cannot" (the Imperial Institute has ove of the heaviest rings of ien in the country), or that citizens of the United States have developed in late years a keen taste for bellringing." We are glad to learn, however, that this writer agrees that Mr. Nichols has presented the public with a 'readable' book. All our readers who are ablo-either iudividually or collectively-to purchaso a copy and peruse it will find it is this and more. Its information is authoritative, and the hook covers a far wider feld than anything given us bofore in one volume an the subject of bells.
In the correspondence columans of the 'Cburch Times' in the fol lowing issue, ' E.D.A.R.' has a timely letter 'ou behalf of those men and-particalnily gince the war-women who give their services in ringing the bells of our churches.' He refers to the lack of cotsideration often showrs to the ringers by the clergy, and quotes froru a recent leading article which appeared on the subject in 'The Ringing World.'
Ringers should apply to the publishers for a prospectus of the book.

## DEATH OF MR. ROBERT WHITING.

A FOUNDATION MEMBER OF THE NORWICH DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.
The members of the Norfols Guild, Bud of the Redenhall District in particular, hatve suffered a loss by the death of Mr. Rohert whit ing, at Pulham St. Mary, who passed awny on Septemher 27h at the age of 78 years.
The funcral took place on Odtoher 1st, and four local ringers were the barers. Five other parish ringers were also prosent, and Messrs. G. Archer, F. Poppy, R. Richards, and Iohn Souter also attended.

Deceased was born in the ecclesiastical parish of Fedenhall, where three of his ancestors had been peal ringers (the first in 1782), and there rang his first peal (Double Norwich) in 1876. He wns an original member of the Norwich Diocesan Association, and took part in its first peal, Superlative rung at Redenlalt, on Novernber 6th, 1877. In all he had rung 89 peals. He was a good ringer, mud his sayings and doings will be remembered by many.

MR JAMES GEORGES GREAT ACFIEVEMENY?
Mr. Jumes Coorge achieved on Saturday a distinction which Las, uip to now, been gained by few men. At Wolverhampton lie rang has one-thousandti peal, and thus clinched his right to a place of fane in the ringing bxercise for all time. Not that his previous perfarmances had not entitled him to such recognition, but to complete a thoneand neals is to reach a dizay cminence io whieit few padeed can even liope to attain. Tho mellievement is the more remarkable when his years are taken into consideration, although age does not seem to count with Mr. George, and he will probaligr tell you, un the 27 th of next month, that he is * geventy-five years foung.' It has taken Mr. George nearly forty years to reach this epochmaking point in his rimgiag carear, but, after all, that is fairly good going. Just think for a moment what a thousand peals means. It ynuans on un average a sucucssful pcal attempl almost once a fort-

aiglat-For forty years? Most people would imegine they had done worably weli if they had averaged a peal a fortnight for one year, but Mr. Georgo has kept it up for a coupie of score of rears. Though his early ringing listory, indeed, he kept his pace with remarkable consistency, except for one burst between 1906 and 1908. But since 1921 he has accelerated his speed, and in these last sevea Fears has rung exactly three fiundred peals. Some people may be inclined to say that the older he gets the worse be gets, We would prefer to put it that years only bring added endhasiasm.
What the raembers of the Excreise have most adnirer? in Mr. Gogrgas ringing career has been the manner in which he has taken on all bells alike, and there is, we venture to say, nolling bung in a bell frame that a manl could ring to a peal that Mr. George would not tackle with a light heart and tackie successfully. Whatever the bell, little or big, ho taines it in his stride, so to speak, and only msks ior more worldg to conquer. Some of his performances in this zeapect we will refer to later on.

Mr. George was born at Pinner, Middlesex, on November 27ı, 1853, and be paok to peal ringing comparatively lata in the duy. What he would have accomplished had he started young, goodness only knows. It was not, however, until the year I889, when he wus 35 yenrs of ago that he rang his first peal. This was fur the sit. James' Society af St. George's Church, Camberwell, and Mr. Frash Dnvey, of Exctor, is the only other survivor of that company. Ihe peal was Holt's Original, and was couducted by that woll-known old London ringer, Dick Frencl, The riugers wore: Henry W. FJower 1, Rehad Erencla 2, Willjam Jones 3, Frank Drvoy 4 , Williana Weatherstoue 5, Joseph Barry 6, William H. George 7, James George
W. H. George was, of course, Mr. James George's brother, mind Josepli Jiarry was his cousin, while it is interesting to note that his fablier, James George, son., sat in the belfyy throughout the peal.

## SOME $13 L G$ JOBS.

In these days Mr. George lived at Coventry, bus later he removed to Tugby, with which place his name was intiantely associated in the minds of all tingers for many gears, until, in fact, he retirud from the service of the old London and North Western Railway Cumpany in 1914, and settled down in Birmingham. So extensive, huwever, have loen bis travels in pursuit of his fuvourite hoblyy that uo city can now lay exclusive claim to him, aud be is faniliarly known to-day as "Jnmes Geurge, of England.' It is probable that no attur ringer fas travelled as turny miles for ringing as Mr feorge has fone. He minds not how many days or nights he spends in the railway train as long as the ultimate reward is a pual. His activities north, west, east and south have only been bounded by the Atantic Ocean, the North Sea, and the English Chamel. Fe has rung pen|s in England, Footland, lreland and Walog, in which countriea lie belongs to almost every ringing associution. He has goughit oat die somulest bells and rung them to peals, is, for instance, the treble at, Lye, in Worcestechire, which weighs golb, and whids he rang in Stedman Triples; and the trethle ab Loughoorough Belb Foundry, weighiug 801b.; whicis he has rung to a peal of Kent Trelle lhoh Royal. Bells like these are a job for Ringers (with a capital R), but, it is at the oiler end of the scate where the spectacular fents are performed, and it is at the beavy and hat Mr. Grorge is in his alement. The heavier the bell the more ho revels in it. Bow tenor

In a thousand peals there have, of course, bean many of special interest and many for special oecasions. It is impossible to refer tu all bese, but on May 2nd, 1914, Mr. Grorge took part in a veterams" peal of Caters at Astor, The inges of the company aggrogated 653 yearg 10 months, and the jonngeat of the party was Mr. Jahn Carter, then just 60. Mr. George was next youngest at 60 years 5 monnths, and the oldest was Mr. Samuel Spittall, who was 77 yemrs 4 montlm, 3r. George is the only survivo of thit company.

The ways in which Mr. George's peais at lirst crept up and lathery have leapt up, since that first peal of his on February 1ath, 1889, may be secn trom the following: 100th peal, November 20th, 1894 ; 200th, Decemher 31st, 1899; 3001h, Jauwary 13Lh, 1906; 400th, Si!ptnritber 22nd, 1908 ; 500:h, October 191h, 1912: 600th, Aluguat 18th, 1917 700us, October 8th, 1921; 800th, August 9th, 2924; 900th, July 3ru, 1926; 1,090th, October 6tb, 1928.

The man of the moment，was himself on the tenor hox，and， ntenkegs to say，he gequitted himself in a manner whicit befitted we necasion．Walverhampton tenar is not everybody＇s job；it fins got a masty knack of＇playisg up＇the ringer in the last hour of a pers， and far younger men than Mr．George have found it their master， tut＇He，of Jngland，＇Ianded it in true Georginn style，and at the ！nin！received the hearty congrahulations of the band．Downstariz a large numher of ringers and many ladies waited to add their felici－ ations，and in chear was raiged as the bero of the hour emerged from the belfry vioor．

As will be seen from the report of the peal，lhe band included two ringers who had alrendy paesed the one thousand mark，wiz．，Nil Widiam Pye，whose $1,596 t l_{\text {peal }}$ this was，and Mr．G．R．Pre，who brought his total up to 1,106 ．Mr．Wiliam Pye and Mr．Gonge have rung nearly 250 peals togethas，and the former las called 155 of therets．

Mr．Alwart Walker，ihe condnctor of the peal，Mr．C．T．Coles，Mr． I．S．Goldsmith（who could cinim to have rung a peal with Mr． Georege hefare any other of that day＇s band），Mr．A．A．Hughes and Mr．Herbert Knirht all adied a tribute to Mr．George＇s achievement． The Iast－named mentioned as theoncidence that Mr．Geopge rang the fosior at Walverhamplon to the one thousandtle peal rang by the Snrinty for the Archdeaconry of Stafiord．

One new non－resident life member was elected，and it was decided to hold the next by－meeting at Tonbridge on Saturday，October $20 t h$ ．

The Rector，in replying to votes of thanks for the use of the bells， for conducting the service，etc．，and to Mrs．Brown for presiding at the organ，expressed the great pleasure it had given hoth of them to meet the members．He said it was the first time that a meeting had been hold at Cowden，but he hoperl it would not be the last．It is quite prolsable that the local band will be reorganised and will re－ join the association in the new yoar．

MIDDLESEX ASSOCIATION'S LOSS.
SUDDEN DEATH OF SOUTE-WEST DISTRICT MASTER,
We deeply regret to announce the death of Mr. Robert Holloway, of Acton, one of the bust-known ringers of West Middlesex. On Wednesday, Oatober 3rd, the decarsed gentlemen, apparently in the best of health, atterted a meeting connected with church affairg. He lelt tile Rectory in the best of spirits, and on his return home went upstairs to see his young suu. He was taken suddenly ill, and betore lie could be renoved to hospital was dead.

Plie funeral service was helii at St. Mary's, the Parish Church of Aclon, on Saturday. It was conducted by the Rector, ihe Rev. Percival Gough, was choral, and was aitended by a large number of people.
Mr. Holloway had for many years idevtified himself with church Lif a St. Mary's, Acton, He held af times many of the offices connected with the parochial organisation, and especially had interested himself in the social life of the parish, of which he was the leader and chief organiser.

Some yearg before the war, when ringing matters at Acton were at a very low ebb, a new band was started under the tuition of Mr. J. R. Meckman. Mr. Holloway was made captain, and under his leadership the bells have been rung continually for Sunday services ever since. For some years he was Master of the South and West District of the Middleses Caunty Association and London Diocesan Gutd, and he reprasented that association on the Central Council. Although ma tastes did not rull very mach towards peal ringing, he scored a good many peals in the standard methods.
The sad nows of his death came to Mr. Hollier, the association gecretary, on Friday. He at once set abouf getting a band to represent the association, and as soon as possible afier the funeral service a peal of Bob Major was rung with the bells half-muffed.
I'wo of the ringers were from Acton, Iliree from Christ Church, Ealing, anci two from St. Mary's, Ealing, the secretary and the treasurer representing the offcers of the association. Mr. Goodfellow, of Hillingdon, and other Acton ringers, also took part in a short touch before the peal.
