## THE COLLEGE YOUTHS.

Those who had the good fortune to attend the annual dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths on Saturday were impressed with the growth of popularity of the event and the way in which the social atmosphere of the occasion has been developed. In numbers the gathering was easily a record one, and once again ringers came from distant parts of the country to do honour to the old society and to enjoy the reunton which the opportunity presents. Wrapt in the mists of the past, the College Youths represent the greatest traditions of ringing. They have always worthily upheld the best standards in our art, and even to-day it is the proudest boast of many members of the Exercise that they belong to this ancient society.

Except, however, to a few privilcged people who have had time and opportunity to delve into the past, the origin and history of the College Youths have been largely a closed book, and there has besu to all outward appearance a kind of studied reticence in regard to its affairs. The Exercise, let alone the general public, has heard but little of its doings and yet it is largely through the College Youths that the art of change ringing has its rools so deeply and securely implanted in the centuries. It is really the parent of all our ringing organisations, and yet we do not hesitate to say that outside a comparatively small circle less is known about it than about any other society in the country. From time to time appeats have been made for a little more of the light of publicity to be let in upon its activities, but up to now little, except the reports of its peais and annual dinner, transpires. And yet there must be many interesting matters discussed and resolutions passed in the meeting room. There was one debate quite recently which, had the particulars been published, would have created a stir, if not a sensation, in the Exercise, so that it cannot be urged that the proceedings are always humdrum and therefore of no interest. Even though the affairs of the society may be held to be no concern of anyone else; the mentbers spread all over the country are, as one speaker put it on Saturday, entitled to know what is going on, and the publication of its proccedings would give them an added interest in their society.

A step towards making more widely known the story of its beginnings and history has been taken by the issue of the booklet, to which we referred last week, and which, we are now informed, is on general sale to metmbers and non-members alike, and there should be n big demand for this brochure which is an interesting addition to ringing literature. Having thus dealt with lhe (Continuel an page 722 .)

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past, we hope the members will further develop this policy by giving a greater publicity to contemporary matters. Publicity is the life blood of modern progress, and if the Ancient Society came out of what another speaker described as its 'cloistered seclusion,' it would doubtless become, to an even greater extent than it is at present, a national society.

## LIVERPOOL RECORDS, 1814-1928.

PEAL BOARDS UNYELED AT ST'. NICHOLAS' CHURCH
Srturday, November 3 rd, 1988, is a date that will live long in tho memory of thase present ai the unique corcmony which was held in tho belfry of St. Nicholas" Church, Liverpool. It was the occasion of the unveliing of a pair of boards, each 10ft. ligh and Jft. wide, on which six peals rung on the bells are recorded. I'he boards are painted black, with gold leftering and contain about 3,000 letters. They are in splendid example of the siguwriter's art, and were exceutad by Mr. Srnest Jones (one of the St. Nicholas? ringers), who is to be congralulated on his excelleni workmanship. One board records that the opening of the new peal of twelve bells, cast by William Dubson, of Dowhlian, Norfolk, Look place ou June 4th, 1814 , and that on May $296 \mathrm{~h}, 1815$, a peal of Gravedire Caters (5,129 clunges) was rung by the Jiverpool College Youths in 3hr. 29 mins. and one of Grandsire Cinques (5,126 clangea) on January 12th, 1821 in 3hrs. 37 mins ., both heing conducted by Willimn Thistlewood. Or January $31 s t_{1}$ 1831, another peal of Grandsire Caters ( 5,219 changes) Was rung in 3 hrs. $26 m i n s$. by the Liverpool Socieby, and condueted by John Heron. The foregoing peals had already been recorded in the tower, but the inscriptions bad become indecipherable through age, and, witl the fuld consent of the Rector aud clarchwardens, it was decided to bave them repainted.
The second haard records a peal of Oxford Treble Boh Maximus (5,088 changes), rung for the firsi time in Liverpool on February 12th, 1927, in 4lirs. 3mins. ; a peal of Camhridge Surprise Royal (5,040 changes) in Shra. 51 mins , which was rang with the hells half-mufled during the actual time the funcrial of the late Bishop of Liverpod (Du. Chavasse) was takiug place at the Gathedral; and, finally, peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus ( 5,280 clanges) on May 5 th 1928, this being the first peal in the method in the North of England Each peal on the second boarl was conducted by E. Jenkins.
The spaciotis ringing, chamber was packed to its capaciby witls rimgers from many parts of Lananshire and Cleshime, when Cauna (presideat of the Lamenshire Association) to St. Nicholas'. He staterl that he foad no need ta introduce Camon Elsee to them, as Lse weil known to all as fin old ringer, but he woult ask him to say few words before the unvoiling of the boards.

Cmon Eisee said that this occusion took their minds back to the very early history of ringing in liverpool. In those days the arl Liverpool was not as advanced as it was to-day, and they had to go to Sheffield, Birminglam, and Ashton-umder-Lyne in order to get baud of sufficient ability to ring their peals. Nowadays, be wis pleased to sry there was no needi to go outaide Liverpool in order get a band to ring any metiod. He felt that these early peals were worth commemornting, as in those days bells did not go as ensily now. Tonors, for instance, were not ' (ucked up' as they were day, and it must have been a feat of endurance as well as of ski to accomplish a peal. They woult nolice that the elevonth and teno were always rung double-linded. Forty years ago, when he first bi came acquainteri with Lancasbire ringing, it was mostly confned t two or three methorls. Grandsire was the most popular, Sifedma was just coming into voguc and also a few Treble Bolv methods wert rung. Sinee then therc had been a momarkable extension in the scope of ringing. There was no doubl that neal ringing in such diff ouli, methods was an indication of the life nod strengila of wite asso ciation, hut it must be rememborerl that was not the primary objec of tho Lancashime Association. Ha lieartily congratulated the bend who rang the peal of Cambridge Surprise Maximus.
The boards wete then atweiled ty Canon Eisee, and a flash light photograph taken, following whicla a service was held in the church, couducter by the. Rov. Canon low, al which an interesting address was given by Archdeacon Howson, Taking as his tex Proverts viii, 4, "Unto you, 0 men, [ call, smil my voice is to the sons of men, he said the rejoicet wilh them that duy in the consmemoralion of tho peals rung in lhat lower. It was a contribution to the graat effort of hishorians amd matiqumians to ensure that i the rush of modern life the great thing of old should not be for gotien. A man whose name was before us very affectionately this Year-John Bunvan-was in his 'utregenerate ilavs a great ringer pleasure in plucking the strings.' In lis new life the ringing of bell became a means of expressing joy, as he wrote in lis Book of tha Holy War.' The bells they hatoled, gait the preaeher, wore an voic which sounded in three ways. Thay were part of the lifo and minis
try of the Clurch. Tlue pal of Cambridea Surnrise Royal was run as a token of deen respect to Llar late Bishop Chavnsse, devoted servant of God, and for 23 yeavs was tha bearl of that dio cose. They thanked Gion for his minishry. In the secand place tho were is call to worship. The only place where a boll was memsane in Lac Sravar Bonk was iu the preface, 'Conerning the service the church." Bollg used to be rung when there was a sormon dusithe the service, and also ai the utrairistration of Holy Communion Ringerg were doing what missionaries did for this country in the day of long ago-they wore semding out a message from the Grent Father. Then, again, the voice of the bells was a rall to service. Bells were Hume ou great national occasions, thas linking up temparal work will spinfinal wark.

An adjourument was afterwards made to the Clureh Instibute， where 4 sumstantial repast lad been prepared，fo which atout 80 persolis sat down，and the mery clatien of knives and forks be－ tukened that the good things provided were being heartily apprechated
Anongst those present，in addition to those aready mentioned， were Messis．J．A．Bertlett and E．S．Licgge（ehurchwardens），Harry Climpmon，W．H．Shuker，W．James，H．W．Wilde，P．Barton，T． Harlow，J．H．Ricing eud W．Bibby．
Canon Eisce，in propasing a vote of thanks to those who had pro－ vided the tea，and those who had waited apon then，said how pleased He was to bo wilh them on that enjoynble nati interesting occasion The last lime he whs in Liverpool was in August，1927，when he gailed for South Africa．He had seen some strange bells since then， and was ylad to be back in the centre of Lancasbine ringing－
Mi＇Clande I．Davies（secratary of the Liverpool Branch of the Linenslire Association）seconded，snying it was quife a loliday fol him to attend $a$ meetiog without having the responsibility of arranging it．
Mi＇。G．R．Newton，in responding，said that the tea had been pro－ vided by the ringers of St．Nicholas＇，who felt that on such an aus－ picious accasion they should＇let themselves go，and he hoped every－ one had enjoyed themselves．He had land apologies for absence from Mr．J．Waghorn，sen．，Mr．Banks（wice－president）．Mr．E．W．．Elwell （sccretary of the Chester Diocesan Guild），and Mr．E．Jenkins．He woutd like to say a few words about Mr．Jenkims in praise of his abilities．Soon after he ceme to that district he was known in Cheshire ns the＂lightning conductor＂，while someone in Liverpool chistemed him＇the live wite．He was a most eapable coaductor， und his chayacteristics cotuld be summed up in Kipling＇s words：－

He＇s litlle，but le＇s wise；
He＇s a terror for bis size（haghter and applause）．
Some interesting reminiscences of＇the good old days＇of ringing in Liverpool werg recounted by Mr．F．W．Moore，Mr．W．G．Mann， and Mr．Hartreaves．A couple of touches an the liandbells concluded this part of the programme，and tho tower was again visited and various ruethods rung．

Mr. 'Dick' Lane, who has hung so many famous bells dor Messrs. Taylor and Do., is to be married on Saturday to Miss Cox, of Loughborough. He and his bride will have the good wishes of all ringerk.
The peal of six at Ambrosien, Oxford, have been inereased eight, and the tenor recast, and will be dedicated on December 7ils. Messis. Taylar and Co. have carried out tha wark.
One of the earliest of ringing organisations was the 'Antient (iuill of St. Stepher's Ringers,' of Bristol, which was granted a Ruyal Cliarter on November 17 th , 1620 , as a result, it is said, of Quten Elifabeth hearing the bells of that church rung in her honour on her visit to Bristol at some time during her reign.
Our reference to the anniversary of the peal of 6,780 Londons Surprise Major at Burton-on-Trent, on November 8th, 1888 , elicits Lhe fact that three of the band are left, via, Messrs. J. Austin, E:. I Stono and J. Griffin. The band that rang this peal also rang the first peal of Lomdon in London. It was at All Saints', Fulhan, an December 8 th, 1888.
It was not urtil 1899 that the first peal of London was rung in the city. This was accomplished by the St. Peter's, Briglaton, company.
The first peal of London ever rung was at St. Andrew's, Norwich, on November 17th, 1835.
Eighty years ago =o-day the lirst peal of Real Double Norwich Canrt Bob Major, that is with bobs made when the treble is belind as well as in front, was ring. It was at Woolwich, where ahoul that time the Banisters were doing much to raise the standard uf method ringing.
The reference last week to the fact that the new bells for' St. Mar tin's, Birminglam, were cast on the same spot as the ring in 1758, is a reminder that the first peal of Graudsirg Gaters on flat ofd ten was ring on November 19th in that same year.
The anniversary of two interesting peals ocours on Tutesday. O November 20th, 1886, the Burtan men rang the first 'silent' peal nf Stedman Triples, and on the same day in 1809 Holt's Original was rung "silent ${ }^{\text {a }}$ at West Bromwich.

## THE ANCIENT SOCIETY OF COLLEGE YOUTHS

A RECORD GATHERING.

Ali previous records in the long history of the Ancient Society of College Youths were broken on Saturday, when the 291st auniverGLIC gathering was ledd. Ringers came from all parts of the country, from Lancashive and Yorkshine, Walcs and Devon, the Eastern Counties and the South, in numbers never even approached before, and thus demonstrated once again how popular among provincial ringers is this great London gailiering. During the afternoon various peals of bells were open for ringing, the chief centre of attraction heing Soulhwark Caihedral; while St. Magnus’, Loudon Bridge, and St. Andrew's, Holhorn, were also well patronised. A special berwice mas again held at the ancient home of the socioty, St. Michace's, Callege Hill, and the seating capacity of the building failed to uccommodate all who attended. Canon Bullock Welster (Rector) ofil ciated, and the choir hoys led the singing, a feature of which was a new 'bell bymn, written hy Mrs. Laule Pentington-Bickford, wife of the Rector of St. Giament Danes, who arranged the mitusic from a nielody by Mr. E. Ales Young, secretsry of tho Central Council. Bell effects are introduced into the air and accompaniment, and the words कтетe singularly appropriate to the occasion. Here are two of the five verses:-

With heart and voice, in one accord,
We ronder Praise to Thec, 0 Lord, That ycar by year as Brethren we In this Thy House may Worship Thee.
For Fonnders, Leaders, all who hore
The name we bear-in days of yore, O God! wa thank Thee, grant that wo

This last line is an ndaptation of ihe society"s motlo, "Viramus Unanimeter " (Let us live together in unity)
The Rep. F. ILI. Edwards (secratary of the Sslisbury Diocesan Guild) was the yreacher, and gave an address based upon the text, - This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it' (Psaln cxviii. 24). He deall, especially with that aspect of ringers' dulies which relates to ringing ons Sundays for divine service. He said preachers at ringers' meelings seldom overlooked the opportunity of raninding them that those who called others to worship should not fail themselves to take jart therein. That was true is far as it went, if they regarded bells simply us a means of reminding the learers of the hour's of divime service, and as a call to worship at such services. Bat beds had a far wider significance than that. One of the main purposes of a pual of bells, at any rato, was to do honour to the Lord's daj-fire great Cluistins festival of rest and worship-and the ringing which they did was not only a call to worship, but also helped to ereate an atmosphere of worginip; incieed, it migbt not inappropriately he called a part of the worship of the Lord on that snered day. The preanher went on to remind his throughout Chrigtendom to tell forth llae praise of God. In the Eastern church, where it was expressly forbidden to have musie in the services except unacompariod volees, bells wore uad to sound forth the prase of God, and very magnificent beils some of then were, too. The first recorded refermen to beils in Milford is in 1553, aud they have twice been recest since the reign of Fidwavi Yl. Three new balls linve now been added to complete the vetave, the ald dive having been recast. 'The restult is a very fire ring of eight (tenol' 12, rwt. in G Major). Thae whale of the work was entrusted to Musis. Tay: Lor and Co., of Lougliborauch, who have carried it out with their usuat excellent workmanship, the mitutest details necessary for tha* ringers comfort in the tower having been inken into account. Each bell can be lieard oqually in the ringing clamber.

A special form of service was used, the lessons iboing read by the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn (Master of the Oxford duitit and Cannm Rraithwaile (patron of the Guilri) respertively, after which tho Alstop, accompanied by the Ficar and churnhwardens, procecded to the ringing chamber, when the ranes wera handed in thas l3ishop witlo the requesi: to dedionle the bells to the glary and praise of forl.
