## PEALS OF DOUBLES.

It scems necessary to call attention once more to the fact that 5040 's of Grancsire Doubles containing ' spliced ' 240 's on Mr. Morris' plan are not recognised as peals by the Central Council, because each six-score is not true in itself. That these six-scores were ruled out by the resolution passed at Hereford was made perfectly plain. The definition of a peal of Doubles was laid down for the first time and was in the following terms: 'That peals of Doubles consist of at least 42 true and complete 120's rung without interval and without rounds or any other row being included or rung more than once in any 120, ...' In Mr. Morris' plan no less than forty changes are repeated in each of the 120 's, so that this method of splicing is debarred from peals. There is no reasan why this arrangement by Mr. Morris should not be rung for practice if a band desires more variety that can otherwise be obtained, but in a peal the highest standard of truth should be aimed at. Anything but trise $7^{20}$ 's has long been ruled out of peals of Minor, and there is no reason why the requirements for a peal of Doubles should be less rigid.

There are a few ringers who argue that if you have, as you must, each change on six bells rung seven times in a peal of Minor, it does not matter how you ring them. This is reducing the standard of peal ringing, instead of elevating it, which should be the object of all ringers in these days when peals are so much 'cheaper' than was once the case. If the principle, put forward by the advocates of the system just referred to, were admitted. six and five bell peals could be reduced to an absurdity. It would be possible, for instance, to ring each lead of a six-score of Bob Doubles forty-two times consecutively, before going on to do the same thing with the next lead, and the result could be claimed as a peal. What we need in these days of advanced ringing is certainly not to make peals easier to get.

As a matter of fact, in regard to Grandsire Doubles, there is a way of calling six-scores, by tringing the changes ' on the 'half-hunt ' or 'observation' bell which will give the conductor just as much variety as any of the 'arrangements' which are now practised, and if applied exclusively throughout a peal will probably give him as much to think about as he will require. These provide him with true six-scores and there is no need, therefore, to go to false ones to make up the necessary 5040 changes. It is probable that those who have rung, since the meeting of the Council at Hereford, 5040's of Grandsire Doubles with spliced 240's of Mr. Morris' arrangement have done so in ignorance of the conditions-

Dear, Sir,-Allow me to congratulate our mutual fricad, 'Minormania,' on liis article in your recent issue, much of which is perfectly true, and might have been written with equal truth anywhen during the past fifteen years.
Our young friend has shown us that ho has some little knowiedge of Fiound Blocks, but in writivg of Cambridge Surprise in coanection with same he has also showa us that he has very litile knowledge concerning the extension of methods.
I am quating from memory, hat $I$ believe it was in August, 1926, when I gave a Single Extension of 'Cambridge' Surprise Minor to Major, Royal and Maximus, in which the Round Block progrossions are porfect, j.e., there are never more than two progressions, 3412 and 4321, to infinity.
Our young friend expects to find the same progrossions hetweer Cambridge Minor e single method, nud 'Cambridgo' Majoe, which is a double method, all hut two single places, belind, when the treble is not in that position. He is expecting the impossible. It he chooses to make an irregular method of Cambridge by adding the two single places on all numbers be will then liave a double irregular method, and the progressions will be as perfect as in the Single Extension previously $m$ nentioned.
I hope 'Minormania' will forgive me for saying that his concluding fuctors are all wrong.
We will take them in th
Lhe diagram or work." If " order lhat he gives them. First factor . Minormania, or anyone who is intereated will write out the first feats of Douhle Dublin from Minor to Max mus inclusive, he, or they, will find that the first factor won't work hecause the diagrans appear to be those of dissimilar methods, and yet Double Dublin is one of the most perfect of existing methods.
'Second factor, the lead-end' (by which he means lead-head) coursing arder, and matiers practical. The fallacy that a method to be the same, must bave the same lead-head to inlinity, has long since been exploded. Double Dublin again comes in as an example to the contrary. Coursing Orter is only an arbitrary definition. as instanced by "Cambridge.' If wa muke ' Cumhridge into a dauble method by aiding lwo single places it becomes an irregular and worthless methoul. Maters practical are surely covered in the diagram alaid work.
T Third factor, false course-ends and compositive considerations. These have no bearing, becausc all Minor methods (Treble Boh or Surprise) must the trur, otherwise they will not produce the extent of the changes. Kent Trable Boh is true as a Minor method, Kem! Major has several false course-ents; while, on the other hard, Kent Royal, like the Minor, is truc.

Fourth factor, scientific reasons for or against.' True, scienc admits of no arbitrary delinitions. There have been so many arbitrary definilions luid down in conmection with ellange ringing that is time we left off calling it a science ant call it an art only. Faet will ulways be a tinet; a fallacy will always be a follacy, mui no amount of arhitrary definitions cin make a fallacy into n fael. [v conclusion, let min nold that any method, principla or system of whieh there is no dioubl at all about the Exteysions to the highen number's being correct can be proved to be so by its Round Blocks They may have more than two progressions, like Single 'Cambridge Miner, and the mothod we ring as "Cambridgs " Major, but the progressions will fee legular na all numbers, whaterer the numbe of bells, provided the Extension is really corvect-Tours faithfull

After the peat at Romsey Abhet ois Satarduy some of the band wore very pletased to bear that this line old ring fre shortly to receive the bellhanger's attention.
On November 23 rd , 1732 , the Sodiety of City Scholars rang a pent of 6,012 Grandsire Caters at St. Giles Cburch, Cripplegule. There were three mon to the tonor. Only four earlier zeals of frandsire Caters are knowll to have been rung.
Tlat old London Society, ilue Jasterm Scholare, rung a peal nt $15,120 \mathrm{Bob}$ Major in 8 lirs. 40 ninins. at Wost Hum on November 25th, 1737.

In the sana tower exactly 170 years aga next Tuesday the Royal Cumberland Youths rang a peal af 5,400 Osfard Treble Boh Royal.

Next Thursday is the anniversary of the death of William Doubla day Crofls, the Notingham solicitat, who was famous ringer. Fr died in the year 1809.

As it is 112 years sime a peal of Oxford Troble Bob Maximas was rung on handbells, it is rot necessary to state that the peal rung a Ipswich on November 15th is the first uver ' rung by the hand and by the Suffolk Guild. The St. Mary-le-Tower Society spetat considerable time in practice before the peal could be accomplished. On two occabions, October 30tL and November 8ti, attempts failed after ncarly two hours ringing. A curions foature about this method on twelve bells is that $9-10$ course each other about the middle of each course.
This peal was rung almost on the anniversary of the previous pend which was accomplished at Sheftield on November 24 th, 1816.

## A RUDHALL RELIC FOR GLOUCESTER MUSEUM.

A ralie of the old Rudinn] foundry at Gloucester has just been presented to the city. At at recent mecting of the City Council the Mayor read a letter ho had reecived from Mr. F. Wr. Duart-Smith, u former Mayor of the city, offering the last bell cast by Rudhall"s Bell Foundry, Gloweester

Mr. Buart-Smith wrote haul he land nequired from the purchaser at the afle of Alderman Jobuston- Fughua's anliques last month that interesting relic of a formor important industry of the city. The hell was mounted on an oak stund, modelied in the form of helfy beams, and was a smatl replich of one of the church bells for which the foundry was celebrated. It was cast in the year 1848, when the foundry linally disappeared. That clate it bore, as well as the namea of two worknen-Edward Charchill and Joln Simpson. In 1829 the bell foundry business, which had been carried on ly the Rudial! family from the year 1684, was sold to Thomas Mears, of Whitechapel, where the business was still carried nn by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, but it was evident that the Gloucester foundry continucd to be used until the year 1848.

The Mayor said that the authonticity of the bell had been investigated by the late Mr. H. Y. f. Taylor, whose report in verification was enclosed with the letter. The Mayor expressed the deep gratitude of the Council to Mr. Duril-Smith for the excellent gift. He did not know what they were going to vio with it, and perhaps it atight be left where it was in the Cuancil Room to be lung to tell members wheu to leave off.
Dr. Bibby: You will wear it out, Mr. Major (laughter).
Subseguently the Mayor explained that it lad been decided to hand over the gift to the Musemm Commiltee for preservation and exhibition. He formally moved that their thanks slould be given to Mr Duarl-Smith, and that the hell should be handed over to the nuseum.-This was agreed to by the Counail.

## THE FIRST PEAL OF 'REAL ' DOUBLE NORWICH

To the Editar.
Dear Sir,-I notice in your' 'Helfry Gossip' in the eurrent issue a statement that the first peal of "Real' Double Norwich was rung eiglity years ago to-day (Nowemher 16th) at Woolwich.

If this is corvect, I have been labouring under a delusion since 1898. On Iune 11th, 1898 , a peal of Real Double Norwieh was rung at Irthlingborough, Northants, composed by Artlur Knights and conducted by Andersan Y. Tylor.

On publishing the figures it was pointed aut by the Rev. F. Bankes James that zome of the calls were singie
Mr. Jemes published a peal in which every call was in paits, and this peal was rung at lrthlinghorough, conducted by the late James Euughton, jun., on December 19th, 1898. The band (which included myself) were told it was the first peal ir the method ever rung with, all calls in pairg, and I helinve it was published in 'The Bell News? as such. ## LITTLE AND ALLIANCE MINOR METHODS,

## SOMETHING NEW IN 'SPLICING

BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.
From the nature of its construction, neither' au 'Alliance ' nor a 'Little' method will give the full extent of the changes, and therefore it scemed that, whatever value they may have on eigit bella atid more, they were useless for Minor. But a few weeks ago I was staying for a short time at Surflect, and there I had the good fortune to meet the Rev. E. Bankes Jimes. We talked-lie, bis brother, and I -about many things pertaining to the new book on six-bell methots, and among other chings he showed rae how to get a true 720 by splicing an 'Alliance' and a, Little' method. I was immensely taken with the idea. I had thought hat the present Miur Collection (with the two or three methorls which were omitted by error) contained ererything worth ringing on six bella, but here was a fresh plan allogether.
It is a delightfully simple plan, and when you come to think of at most of Mr. Baukes James discoveries are the same. Bristol, for instance, and Little Bab, and the seven 720's of Cambridge Mino: You say to yourself, -Why, of course; but how is it I did not thiak You say to yo
of it myself?
The plan is to lake an extent of an Allinuce method and an extent of a Lilfle method with bobs ouly and splice thers together with Singles. There are three Litile methods-Crayford Little Court, Little Bob, and St. Laurence Little Bols ("Hot I'om'). There are three groups of Allinnce methoils (of the right sort), oue of which group will splice with each of the Littlo melbods. When I got home I worked oul the extent of these Alliusce methodr, and the Methods Committee propose to include then in the forthcaming book. We rang a 720 of one of them at lialing, and louches of another, and lacre are the figures:-

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We rang our 720 with two Singles, but wou can ged 720 with many Singles. Every time one is callad the mothon is chateged.

On that occrsion the superintendent of the department handed to Mr. Chapman a magaificent gold wateh, and, for Mrs. Chapman, a eat-glass and silwer biscuit barrel, tokens of the aflection in which he is leld by the employes, to whom he is kfown as *the grand old man.'
Needless to sey, the Pondleton ringers wero not disposed to let their old leader retire without some loken of regard for Mr. Chapman's long service at St. Thomas'. Friklay, the practice night, had been selected for the presentation, it being understood that Mr. Chapman would be preseut. Dae is, "Inasmuch as yo did it urto ane of these, my fitile ones," and the other, "Is it nolhing to YOUP"
