## COMPLETION OF A GREAT TASK.

Lincoln possesses in its Cathedral onc of the most: beautiful buildings in this country, and it has now gained one of the most delightut peals of twelve bells in the world, set in a tower which has been specially adapted, so that they may be heard to the fultest advantage. Lincoln is fikely to become the classic standard for a belfry. The rearrangement of the "internal economy" of the tower was rendered possible by the great schense of restoration which has just been completed. Sone lew years ago St. Hugh's tower was reported to be unsafe and unable to witistand the stresses set up by its eight bells when rung. How unsafe it was was only fully discovered when the worls of strengthening was undertaken. A great disaster was saved by a very narrow margin of time, for it is now revealed that at any monent the lower might have coliapsed in ruin and brought with it a large part, if not the whole, of the glorious west front. As it was, there was an occasion in the curse of the restoration when the men engaged in rempving some af the crumbled stone and corroded iron bars hurriediy threw down their tools and left the building, because a latge proportion of the apparentiy solid walls of the great structure began literally to run out, and the workmen felt convinced that the tower was about to collapse.

With the buiding in such an advanced slate of decay, it is difficult to realise what expencliture of efiont and money has been involved in its restoration. The Cathedral authorities have carried out a magnificent work, national in character, in that the building is one of our national treasures. If Remegius, the founder of the first Cathedral at Lincoln, and other great Bishops who built the present fabric, are remembered for the great work they did in rearing one of the most glorious churches in the land, Dean Frye will go down to posterity for the part he has played in saving a magnificent heritage from ruin. It is a fitting conclusion to a great undertaking that Lincoln should now be in possession aE a worthy peal of bells which, ringing from the very tower that the hand of time had threatened with destruction, will ever be a reminder of the efforts put torward to preserve for centuries yet to come the historic tower of $\$$ Hugh.

Lincolnshire already possesses the lightest ring of ter bells hung in any church tower. It is at Surfleet, the home of the Lincoln Diocesan Guilcl's Master, the Vev. H. Law James. These bells have a considerable reputattion througlout the country, and doubtless the same influence has been a great factor in carrying to maturity the scheme for provicling in the Cathedral what is one of (Continued on page 802.)

Oif a minch nad unassuming disposition, he wns a genaral favourite wilh all the district members.
Mr. Phillips was a carphiter by trade, and retired from business on attaining the age of 70 years. So far as is known to the writer, he bad only rung two poals, one of Doubles, Stedman, Canterbury Pleasure and Grandsire, and one of Bob Minor, both of these being rung at Foy.

## A NOTEWORTHY PEAL AT SAFFRON WALDEN

 HISTORIC PERFORMANCE RECALLED.The opening of the four new treble bells on Saturday at Saftron Walden is a reminder that it was at this tower that the first recorded performanee of Holt's Original, in which the comeduchar ramy in the peal, took place. This was on Chriamas Duy, 1753 , and the pand therefore takes its place as an hisloric event.
John Holt birnself called it fol the first time at St. Margarel'z, Westminster, on July 7 th, 1751 , but he did it from manuseript.
In I753, there wore rival ringing societies ot Saftron Waken, and the following appeared in a newspaper under the headiug, 'Saffon Walden, Janamry 2nd, $1754^{\prime}:$ 'To inform all real Lovers and Professots of the Art of Ringing, that the Society of young ringerg of this town, on Tuesday, the 25ith of December last, heing Christ-masDay, dirl ring the true Peal of Grandsire Triples, eomposed of 148 Boos, with two Singles, which they effected in three houls and twonty minutes, and on Thesday following, heing New Year's Day, they compleated the samo in sight minutes less than before (being tha only times the same has been rung there since there has heen eight bells) to the no small martification of their antagonists, who instead of instruction, give them all the obstruction in theif nower. I'lse ringers which rung the same were: Frederick Sell, Charles Barou (who anlled the bobst, Richar Whitehand, John Braks, willian Barrett, jun., John Bush, jum, Jolm Glark and Joln Salmon."

## LINCOLN CATHEDRAL'S RING OF TWELVE

## A GREAT TOWER HLSTORAPION SCEEME

 LINCOLN GUILD Ol² NN NEW BELLSThle opening of the ring of twelve hells at Lincolt Cathodral on Saturday, was sometbing more thau a mere celelumation of the augmentation af a peal; it was a hanksgiving for a great work of restoration, which has saved from partial ruin the glovious building which crowns the hill above the pastern city. Ouly those who have actually been engaged in the work of rendering the Gathedral safe know how perilously near $\Omega$ total collapse has freen. It is humanly certain, sajs the 'Lincolnshire Echo,' that had the 'epair been mothe longer delayed, one or both of the western towers wnuld have fallen and torn away a great part of the west front with then.

Eappily the work was iaken jul hand just in lime. It has been a gigantic task-and it is only onte patt of the great scheme for the restoration of the Cathedral-litt the Camous Bt. Hughs tower has been saved and remiered safe, it is laped, for conturies to come. Many years ago the danger to mhe tower from ine weight and oscilialion of the bells was realised, aud an attempt was made to obviate this by building out corizels nhout 301 t . up, and from this beigit carrying wp timher piers tas bear the weight of the bell frame. In the course of a shork time, however, the tiabers shrank,
romding country it is beliered the towet will jurove the best belfry in the woild, and it is descrithed as now having the properties of a cyianti negaphone.

As is well known, four new belle bave been added to tho ring, to nake a peal of twelve. Messrs. Taylor and Co., of Loughborourh, recast the old eight in 1913, and thej have uow hdded the tons new bells, the whole comprising a very tine light twelve, the tenur leping a bell of anly 23 cwt. 3 qz .13 jh .
It is believed that there have been bells in existeace at Limeoln Cathedral sime the completion of the first building erethed by Remigins in the elevenib ecntury, and for hundreds of yedrs there have buen what have been known as Lady Bells as woll as Si. Hugh's ring, These, like theil big brother, "Greal Tom of Lincaln," were recast from time to time. In 1834 and 1835 the Lady Beils, which accupien the bentral tower, and "Eyeat Tonn" which also was cracked, were broken up and the metal used for tie new Big "rom and tho mew quarter hells. Ahout the same tane the treble of St. Hugh's old ring wits recast, and it was stated that these bells were in so had an order that they had not been rung for forty years.

In 1913 ai great restoration of the bells was undertaken, and Messis. Traylot and Co. enst for itre Cathedral a beautiful ving of eight. The tenors of the old pual, dated respectively 1593 aud 1606, were rentoved to the norlli-west tower. The renatming six were

with the result that the wooden framework rocked with the hells and hammered the masonry like a batering rim, so binat the danger becarne greater than before. A sted bell firane was installed, and the weight of the bells was lorize on the masenmy front steel girders at a height which, in the then condition of the towet, was not safeThat was the position of affirs when the leells liad perforee to loe silenced four years ago.

The work which has now bect done to the town consists of the reinforced grouting of the masomy after the method enployed in other parta of the Cathedral, and in the construction of great delta brouze rainforced concrete pilasters, anchored to tho walls from the height of 84 ft . to 101 ft . fill. fron ground level, to carcy binuilarly rainforced concrete beams upan which resta the bull fuame. The bells themselves have heen bronght 30rt. lower in the tower, and their weight is carried down by the pilasters another 30ft.

There have heen other very notable improvements which rouder the south-west tower \& helfry which is lolicued to be absolutely unique in its acoustic arrangementa. The ceiling and ref of the tower have been removed and replaced by a lantern rod resting on reinforced concreto piers. "The lower louvres have been elosed, and the sound therefore travels mombermpted lo the top of the tower before escaping. Tlus the sotud of the bells will be moderated in the near vicinity, but carried in full mellowness far across the sur-

## NEW CORNISH RING OF EIGHT <br> GENTEROTS GDTT TO PFILLACK

Cornwall Ias gained a vew ring of eigle bolls by a generous piff to Pbilack Church. In memory of his wife atrd younger son, Capt. Edwin Jenkins bas defrayed the cost of recasting the flaree old bells, which wore dated 1751, and adding five nem oner, the whole peal, supplied by Messrs. John P'mylor and Co., of Loughborough, being hung in modern fittings. The bells swing in ball bearings on a steel frame, and thera is also an Ellecombe chiming apparatus.

The inscription on the tenor bell, which is reproduced on a brotaze pinte in the towor, reads:-
1928. The three largest bells in this peal were recast and five new bells ere added by Edwin Jobking it momory of bis dear wife, Eliza Jenkins, who died the 4th day of March, 1924, faged 73 jears. Aso in proud mamory of his jounger son, Edgar Vermon Jenkins, who laid down bis life in the Groat War, France, on the 19もb April, 1917, aged 34 years. Williag Anthony Wills. M.A., Rector; Thomas Osborne and Zachary Belling Mudge, chnrchwardens.

The inscriptions on tho other bells ara: No. 7, "Ged preserve this parish. We wera cast by Abal Radhall, of Glomeester, 1751.' No. 6, Wato the grave I summon all. Prosperity to the Church of Tage litnd". No. 5, "Honour tha King.' No. 4, "Femr God." No. 3 , 'Jove tho Brotherhood." No. 2, "On earth pace amony men.' No. 1, 'Glory to God in the biglest.'
The new peal was dedieated on Mlurgans of lase week by tho Lord Bishap of Trivo.
The serrice was couducted by the Rector, with the assistanue of Fiev. C. A. Johuson, carate-in-charge of St. Gwithian. Rev. C. L. Beatley, Vicar of Lelant, acted as Bishop's chaplain. Capt. Jenkims was unable to attond, owing to indifferent health, and his son, 3tr. E. Jenkins, formally requested the Bishop to flerlicate the hells. In addition to deaticating the bells, the Sishop dedicated a inew altar in the south chapel.

The Bishop snid they lad no very aid bells in Cormwall. In some parts of Englant there were bells gaing back 600 to 800 years, buts mone, he thought, in Corbwall. That hrought in a bit of history. It told the story of the fimes when Cornwall was in a state of rebalionn, The proaple said they would not have the Fnglish Preyer Book, and thes armed thomselver as best they coulit and went to oppose the King and the Goverment, beenuse they thoupht the Euglish Trayer Book was to be mado compulsory for them. ## LIGHTING THE TOWER

## To the Erithor

Diut Sir, We are amanging to light Uford lower with eleotricity but there does not seem any recogised practice in the matter, and tho lightitg company have had no experience of such jobs. I wonder whether any of your readers who have experienced good and bind arrangements would give us their experiences?

With the help of the ndvice of the company's electricians we are proposing to light as follows: One light langing froms the centro of ilae ceiling of the 12 it . squarc ringing chamber, about 10 t. from tho thor, with a siagle 20 wath bult with an apal shade. ln the clock :hamber ubove, one portable lamp langing about 7 ft . up on one wald. In the bell chamber a portable lamp hanging woll above the hell frames. In the winding staitease three lights. The switch for the topmost of these will be by the clock clumber door, and will also switeh on the bell chanber light. The other two stairense lighls and the clock chamber ligh will be switched on from the foot of the strirs. Any criticism of this arrangement will be welcomed, especinlly if made jromptly.
