## BELLS AND PUBLIC SENTIMENT:

The old year went out with a rush of peals. We have not got the exact statistics before us of the number rung, but December was almost certainly the record month in 1929, as it has been in many previous years. The reason, of course, is not far to seek. The great festival of the Church, which is celebrated during the month, gives the ringers great opportunities. Bells are as much a feature of the Christmas celebrations as are roast beef or plam pudding. The one thing that thousands in the towns and villages look forward to, either at midnight or in the early morning, are the church bells which herald the coming of Christmas. There is thus a tradition and a duty wbich ringers have to maintain. And then the holidays, which offer many chances of peals, and the passing of the old year, which again calls for the use of the bells and gives ringers yet another occasion upon which to exercise their art.

That bells make a wide claim upon the imagination of English people at this time of the year cannot be gainsaid, and it was typical that the feature of the British Broadcasting Corporation's special programme for the passing of the old year was the ringing of bells. Listeners were enabled, through the marvellous achievements of wireless, to follow the coming of the new year as it advanced across a large part of the continent of Europe, and everywhere, where the celebrations were picked up, the bells were heard. They may have been somewhat 'shouted down' by the ships' sirens of Rotterdam, but the clanging of many bells in a German town, an hour before 1930 reached England, was a striking demonstration of the part which bells play on sucb occasions throughout Christendom, and to listening ringers in this country revealed in strong contrast the difference between the clanging of bells on the continent and the rhythmic music which is produced from the towers in our own land, and which was admirably demonstrated by the half-muffed twelve-bell ringing at St. Michael's, Cornhill, before midnight and the open ringing on the twelve at Southwark Cathedral after the hour had struck. For the hundreds of thousands-perhaps millions - of listeners on New Year's Eve, in this land of ours, the bells were not only in evidence-they predominated in the celebration.

And not only over the ether. In every town and village throughout the country where there is a peal of bells, the people were listening for their sounds, either ringing for the watchnight service, or immediately before the witching hour, and again, with even wilder melody, when the new year had come. People talk of church bells becoming out of date and unnecessary in these days of clocks and wire (Continued on page 18.)

A long-felt want has beeu removed by a gift of a set of new ropes for the Parish Church, Hagley, Wores. The generous donor is Mr. Harry Mrson, who has become bighly popular since coming to resile in the village.
It is never too late to-begin peal ringing. Mr. E. W. Hutchinsons tras just rung his first peal at the ago of 73 years, at Penwortham. The first peal of Graudsire Caters was ring at St. Bride's Church, Flect Street, on Javuary 11th, 1716-17, by the London Scholars. In tho Osbone MSS. in the British Museum it is reconded that the first knows performance of the London Scholars was a peal of 5,040 Grandsire Caters, at SL. Bride's in Fleet Streat, Friday, January 11th, 1716-17. The frame put up was taken down and destroyed when the church was repaired in 1796. This was supposed to be the only paal of Caters rung whilst St. Bride's coatained ten bells, and was said to be the first known peal of Caters ever completed by any company in the kingdom; which was probably the case, as no other peal upon tell bells appears upon yecord to precede this performance.
The Ancient Ringiug Society of Redeniall was establisbed on Jantuary $13 t h, 1736$, and the anniversary was eelebpated for a long period of time. We do not know whathor, like Safton Wakden and Lavenham, the day is still commemorated.

James Barbam died on January 14th, 1818, at the age of 93 years. He was buried in the churchyard at Leeds, Kent, aud a headsione recordis something of his ringing prowess.

## CLERGY AND RINGING.

## To the Editor.

Sir,-Ringers, 1 an sure, lave appreciated the tone and maner of the Rev. F. A. Roughton's fetter, and if 1 add one or two renariks, it is not in the spirit of eriticism, but in order to supplement what be say's

In the first place, it is by no means necessary for a clergyman to become an efficient change ringer before he can show an intelligent interest in his band. As soon as he can ring rounds, twe will probibly be at usefa] member of the band, evell if he is not equal toramging the 'tenor behind," while it will not take him nuch longer with a good band to conch him to be able to hunt the trethe.

With such an elementary knowledge of that att, the will br able to appreciate many of the ringers diffectities, and himself avoid so many causes of offence to these, his most finithfil chirchworkers. In fact, it is quite possible that lie may be more thouglt of if has can only ring a little than if he is 'an efficient change ringer." We do not expect a parson to be a solo singer himself, but we to expect him to know enougla about music to avoik giving offence needlessly to Lis choir. In the case of the ringers, such an clementary knowledge is even more urgently required. For while the work of the choir is done hefore evergone, and it is rarely very difficult to get somenne who is sufficiently musical to supplement any defects in the parson, meither of these things applies to the ringers.
Some time ago I went ap into a bulfy, where I was a stranger After some preliminary difficulties, we had just settled down to 1 good touch when the parson, who had seen the go ap, canse in with a number of young fellows-appurenty a Coulirmation class, or part of one. He waited for some minutes, and then went down looking rather annoyed.
It looked as though he had expected us to stop as sooth as ine int rived. He would mot have expected his choir or an orchestra to stop in the riddle of a piece they werc-rehearsimg. What ringers feel, and I think rigletly feel, is that a parson ought not to umiertake work in a church where there are bells until he has leurnt enough about ringing to avoid making such a mistake.
As for preparation before a service, I have found nolling hettor that the gentle and regular exercise of ringing for the borly, ar the skill reguired for easy changes for the mind. If a parson can manage to timf time for it, I an sure he will never consider it timu ili spent, even in a busy day. Peal ringing on Sunday is gute Rnother matter.
