## A LEAD AND A CHALLENGE.

There were many matters discussed at the annual meeting of the Midland Counties Association which made it an important one, but probably the question of most farreaching effect was that which resulted in piacing on the minutes definitions with which all peals must comply in future before they will be acknowledged and recorded by the association. This is at once a lead and a challenge to the Central CounciI. The actual rules laid down differ little from those of the Council, but the differences are important. Into the merits of these differences we do not propose to enter on this occasion, but the Midland Counties Association give a lead to the Council by showing that a settlement of disputed points is desired among ringers and by demonstrating that there is no valid reason why the question should not be determined-not necessarily on purely scientific lines but on lines which meet with the views of the general body of the Excercise. Those views may change later, and, if they do, the rules can be amended accordiggly. The Midland Counties Association knew what they wanted and they have laid down their regulations accordingly. At some other time the members may think it desirable to revise these requirements, and when that time comes they will not, we imagine, besitate to do so. Rules of this kind are not like the laws of the Medes and Persians-unalterable. They should reflect the highest standard which ringers are prepared to recognise. The Central Council could settle their definitions on precisely the same grounds. Last year they got rid of an awkward question on the subject of peals of Minor and Doubles by iuḑefinitely deferring it.

And here comes the challenge. If the Council is not prepared to settle such questions - and it is to promote uniform recognition and acceptance of decisions on points of this kind that is particularly the Council's businessthen the associations are going to settle these matters for themselves, and in doing so they will diminish the authority and prestige of the Council. The Midland Counties Association decided to set up their own definitions of what shall constitute a peal before they will recognise it. These definitions differ in certain particulars from those which now exist in the rales of the Council and if other associations follow suit, there may well be set upa number of varying codes for peal ringing. The difficulty of the Council's position is that, while it has a set of definitions it winks at breaches of its rules, because a section of the Council is not satisfied with the code as it stands. There ought to be only one standard for peals throughout the Exercise, but unless the Council faces the situation, the

action of the Midland Counties Association may be followed by others and much that the Council has stood for in the past may be lost. Every association has a right to say what it will admit as a peal, but the whole aim since the Council was founded, nearly forty years ago, has been to unify these various views. It would be a pity if at this stage the Council let slip their recognised authority because, while waiting to see which way the cat jumps, they decline to tnake up their mind upon the present requirements of the Exercise.

## MUSICAL ASPECTS OF CHANGE RINGING．

FEATURES OF COMPOSITION EXPLATNED TO MUSIGIANS．
＇Some musical aspects of change ringing＇is the titile of an in－ erestina and instructive article by the Rev．F．Ll．Edwards in a recent issue of the＇Masical Slandard．＇After dealing with the dis－ linctive features of bell music and briefly describing the rules and restrictions which govern methods，the writer says：－

But while change ringers make it their object to ring a definite aumber of changes according to the rules of a particular method without ropelition，they are by no means contont to achieve that object without regard to the musical effect．The number of per－ mutalions that can be produced on a given oumber of bells is simply a question of arithmelical pragression．The order in which those changes shall be produced is a matter for the composer，first the composer of the method，then the composer of a touch or peal ac－ cording ta the rules of that method．Great care atid remarkable ingenuity are erercised in composition to obtain the most musical Wfects．Changes ending，for instance，with the Lonic at the bottom of the scale preceded ar followed by the leading note above are avoided as fax as possitble．Indeed a general principle is adopted of avoiding wide intervals，other than the sixth or octave，and keeping the deeper toned bells in juxtapasition，thus maintaining the tradi－ toonl character of ecolesiastical musie．Naturally，when all the permutations obtanable on a giver number of bells ave to the rung， efen the lenst euphonous sequences have．to be included；but it is jusp here that the composer exerts his ingenuity to the utmost，in separating tho less musical changes from one anoiher by considerable intervals，an as to relieve the ear of any succession of unpleasing effects．＇

It is naturally to the practical bellringer that the science of change ringing chicfy，appeals．＂saps Mr．Edwards at the close of his article， －but the musical aspect of it presents so many points of interest， that any muaician，without any such practical experience，might find it quite a fascimatig study to make himself acyuanted with the rules of one or two methods，master the principles of composition， and tinen endeavour to work out peals or＂toucles＂containing the Fnlest proportion of musical effects．A professor of mathematics has are now found the subject of sufficient interest to co－operate with a committee of change ringers in working out some of the technical pachlems involved．It mity well be that the professional musician may likewige find interest in co－operating with the change ringer in the production of melonious sequences，to the mutual satisfaction of hoith．${ }^{1}$

I learat afterwards that I was not bino only unlucky one．Another member of our band，after waiting two hours for pull，had docided to giva it up as a bad job，and was preparing to leave when ono of the local band asked bim where he was going．To this he promptly replied，＂Hame，as it doesn＇t look to be much use staying hero，but he was persuaded to stay，and eventually he got a touch or two after waiting hours．Now，Sir，is there any wonder that youlg members will not attend meelings？I have frequeatly asked our members to go，but they say it is a waste of time and money，and when you can hear of those who do altond not having is pull at all， and athers waiting for hours for it，my only fear is that，if this treafment of learners continues，in twenty years＇time our art wil have ceased to exist．I think this is a mateer that should be care－ fully considered by those responsible for argauising meetings，ete． who should aee that someone is in charge to arrange fin tha game privileges to be meted out to the rearner ats well as the expert，

Several photographs, inoluding a picture of Canon Coleridge, will itlustrate the issue, which will be enlarged for the occasion, and will be one which, as wo have pointed out before, ringers will most certainly desire to keep.

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

Many of our readers will be interested to know that Messrs. Johal Taylor and Ca., of Latughborough, have in hand the recasting af the tenor bell (approximately 20 cwt .) of Limerick Cathedral peat of eight.
A young band is being formed at St. Lawrenee Jewry, where there is the heaviest ring of eight in the City of Loudon. Mr. A. A. Fughes has undertaken to instrust them.
It was at St. Lawrence Jewry that the first recorded peal of Court Bob Major was rung. This was by the Ancient Society of College Youths, and is recorded in their peal buok as a peal of 5,040 Courb Bob, being the first lint was ever done.'

Thurstans famors four-part peal was rung for the lirst time on May 18 th , 1846 . It was the outcome of yorrs of effort to find the parfect peal of Stedmun, and there was the keenest rivalry amang composers of that day to get a peal with two singles only. The honour fell to Thomas Thurstans, of Birmingham, ant Henry Johnson called it for the first time at St. Martin's Church.
On May 18th, 1883, Sam Waod, of Ashton-under-Lyne, called the peal of 16,608 Kent Treble Bob Major at Nottram-in-Longdendele, Cheshire.
The south-west fower and the ring of ten bells at York Minster were destroyed by fire on May $20 t h, 1840$.
Next Wednesday is also the anniversary of the 13,054 Stedman Caters rung at Cheltenham in 1888 , and of the 12,675 Stedman Cinques at St. Saviour's, Southwark, in 1923.
Thursday is the 3 Ist anniversary of the 17,024 Donble Norwich Major, at Kidington, which the late James Washbook called.
A peal of Grandsire Triples, at Grundisburgh, on April 12th, has been reported twice. Only one peal was rung.
Mr. S. Rowsell, of Staple Fitzpaine, has not missed ringing at his tower on Easter Sunday for 52 years.

## BOYS OF THE OLD BRIGADE.

Last week Mr. William Ireland, of Diss, Norfolk, celebrated his 78th birthday by ringing in a peal of Double Norwich Major. Mr. Ireland, who is an original member of the Nowich Diocesan Association (founded 1877), conducted its firgt peals of Bob Major. (Mareh 6th, 1878) and Kont Treble Bob Major (March 19th, 1879). He also called a 7,296 and a 10,272 in the latter method in 1880. which remained the Treblo Bob record for the association until it was surpassed on June 6th, 1892.
Another Diss veteran, Mr. John Souter, took part in Mr. Treland's birthday peal. He is in his 80th year, and is looking forward to laking part in an attempt to raise the association's Double Norwich record, which at present stiands at 11,040 .

## NEW PEAL OF TEN AT BANBURY.

## ROUND TOWER DIFTICULTIES SURMOUNTED.

Messre. J. Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, have just completed che recasting of the bells of Banbury, Oxon, and have turned tho old ring of eight into a lighter peal of teu.
Late in the year 1928 the bells were condemned as unsafe and ringiag had to be stopped. The restoration needed much anxious consideration an the part of the church authorities owing to the unusual construction of the tower, which is circular in plan. Ono of the defects of tho ofd peal was that, in order to get all the bells into a round tower, they had not been properly hung in a complete bell-frame, but were hung upon baulks of timber, some of which abutted directly on the masonry of the walls, on which they exertad a detrimental thrust. It wrs, therefore, decided to adopt the castom, practised in some towers, of hanging the new peal in two tiers. Mr. Ernest Ravenscroft, F.R.I.B.A., one of the diocesan surveyors, who has had an very large caperience of belfries and towers, had been appointed the architect to suporvise the relranging of the Banbury hells, and after he had in-

epected tho tower and the plan of the two-tier lyell frame, he conflemmed the proposals. Although this experlient is quits aceptable in towers the rasanry of which is equally substantial throughout their lieight, the thrust of the upper tier would, it is said, have come in the Banhury lower against a portion where the louvre openings render the masonry weaker.
Tho Church Council had severa! anxious discnssions on the matter. The alternatives wore to replace the present pal of eight, with two bells recnst and such retuning as the varying nnture of a mixed peal would render possible, with a new iron frame and modern fittings; or to recast the present peal with one of the semi-tanes and a new treble bell into a lighter ringing peal of ten bells, all of which could be hung on one level. The latter course was eventually agreed upon by the Council, and Messrs. Taylor produced a plan which the archi-
tect and the Diocesan Adrisory Committes approved. The Chancelloy of the Diocese granted an amiended faculty on November 1ith last and Messrs. Taylol were given instructions to proceed with the work. Although the bells had been with them sinee June, they hat, of coturse, beel unable to move, evel with the preparatory work, as thu Wo schemes under consideration were widely diferent.
Excepting the new treble, the belk have been recast, from tho old metal, and the identity of each bell has, therefore, been preservedt, and the original inecriptions on the individual bells have been retainet. Two bells pattake of a memarial character: Mr. T. H. Boote and Miss Boote hay given tho new tweble bell in memory of the late Mrs. Boote aud the Misses Dorothea and Clarico Boote, and tho oighth ball has been givon in memory of tho labo Mrs. Sarah Carter by Mr. George Carter, her husband, and his family and her sister.

White regarding the standard for peals is not quite correctly given. I should therefore be obliged if you will recuote this again as below, thus avoicling any misuaderstanding that might oceur.-Yours sincerely,

That each poal acknowledged and recorded by the association must comply within the following conditions:-

1. All peals must commence from and fiuish witl rounds.
2. On five beils, a peal must consist of not less than 42 true and complete 120 's, cach commencing from and finsishing with rounds. It may be lengthened by the addition of any number of 120 's, andfor one shorter touch falalling the above conditions.
3. On six bells, a peal must consist of not less than seyen true andi complete 720 's, cach commencing from and nurishing with rounds. It may be lenglitened by the addition of any number of 720's and/or one shorter touch fultaling the above conditions.
4. On seven bolls, a peal must consist of not less than 5,040 brue and complate changes, commenciag from and finishing with rounds. It may be lengthened by the addition of any numher of 5,040's, and for one slorter wouch fulifling the ahove conditions.
5. On eight hells and upwards a peal must consist of not less than 5,000 true and complele changes commencing from and finishing with rounds.
6. Splicing of 5 and 6, 6 and 7,7 and 8,8 and 9 , etc., bell methods will not be recognised in any peal.
IThe proposition was agreed to at the general meeting as well as in enmmittee.

## THE INSURANCE OF CHURCH BELLS. <br> \section*{To the Editor.}

Dear Sir,-In your timely leader on Insuranc: in this week"s issue "The Ringing World ' you say: 'If the bells are specially ineluded, Lhey are much more likely to be insured at their real replacement raiue.' This depends a good deal upon how recently the policy was issued or revised. It must be remembered that the price of everything has risen considerably in the last lew years, and that in the case of tatal loss there are not many things that could be replaced al what they cost twenty years ago.
n zevising the poliey on our cliurcin and its contents here we requested the advice of the bell founders, organ builders, and clock makers; and in each case we found that the sum for which the items insured was little more than late what we should have to pry replacement in the cvent of a total less, though the policy was not very old.
It is ciear that it is not sufficient to have the belis specialiy included in the insurance at their cost price; the policy must be lrought up to date.-Yours faithfully,

GARSTANG PARISH CHURCH BELLS RESTORED.
Thero was a crowded congregetion at St. Helen's Parish Church, Garbeng, Lanes, on Easter Sunday afternoon, when the bells were rededicated by the Lord Bishop of Blackburn.
The bells have been retuned and sandblasted and rehung on ball bearings wilh ali up-to-date fitionge, the work having been carried out by Messrs. Gillett and Jahnston, of Croydon, who were represented at the opening by Mr. J. W. Trappitt, who had hung the bells. The restoration of the bells is only part of an extensive church The towor was erected so far and belfry also undergoing repair. The tower was erected so far back as the 15th century, and from recent investigations it was discevered that some of the massive oak hanng were suffering from the ravages of the death watch bectie, which is causing much havoe to many old and historical buildings in various parts of the country.
On the occasiou when the bells were rehung a hundred years ago they were yung all day by ringers from Preston, Blackrod, Croston, Leyland, Ribchester and Walton, and on Easter Sunday the oid tradition was muintained, the local ringers being assisted by represematives of the Preston Branch of the Lancashire Association. The opening touch was rung by the local ringors, while after the service 720 Kont Treble Bob Minor was rung by members from Penwortham, Leyland St. James', Preston, and Brindle.
Thin service, which was simple and impressive, was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. J. C. F. Hood, while the Bishop gave an inspiring naderess.
Tho ringors present expressed their appreciation of the improvement bath in the tone and ' y 0 ' of the bells.

This allowed a good number to sanuple.' the peal of twelve before service time at 3.30 , when the ringers assemblod in the Morring Clapel. The address was given by the Jev. Canon G. W. Jeadwine, Sub-Dean of Lincoln. Immediately this was over, all those present crossed the oave to the Ringers Chapel, inder the south-west tower, where the Right Rov. E. M. Blackie, Bishop Suffragan of Grantliam, dedicated the memorial tablet erectod to those members of the Guild who lost their lives in the war. About 100 members and friends gathered for tea at the Co-operative Hall.
At the commencoment of the busincss meeting, the Sub-Dean (Canon Jeudwine) was elected president of the Guild and took the chair. The other ofliecrs were re-eletted, namely, the Rer. H. Law James, Master; Mr. F. W. Stokes, hon. secretary; and Mr. T. F. Linley, hon. treasurer. Four representatives on the Gentral Council woro also elected, namely, Rev. H. Law James, Rev. H. T. Parry, Mr. Rupert Richartison and Mr. G. Chester
The President referred to the great lass the Guild liad sustained by the death of their late president, Dean Fry, who had for many years taken a very lively interest in the work of the Guild, and largely through whose influence and help the sugmentation of the Cathedral bells from eight to twelve had beea made possible. Fe recaller to mind the opening of the bells on December 15th, 1928 , when the late Dean, although in a very weak state of health after e serious illness, insisted on attending tho service. The following resolution records the sense of loss felt by the Guild and the esteen ith which the liate Dr. Try was held:

That this Guild places on record its rebpeetful and profound attachneat to its late president, Dean $\mathrm{F}^{\prime} \mathrm{r} \mathrm{y}_{\text {, }}$ and also the humble and personal fecling of loss sustained by each member, as well as by the members as a body. It desires to acknowledge the thoroughness and magnitude of his work, especially in the Cathedual Clureh of the diocese, the augrnencation of whose bolls was largely due to him, and which, with many otler acts of kindness, will be held as persenal tributes to him.'
A vesolation asking for representation on the Diocesan Advisory Commithee was passed unanimously. This was brought forward by members of the Grimsby District in consequence of events in a parish in that district, where a certain amount of perfectly useless work had been flone to the hells.
