## A DIFFICULT PROBLEM.

According to a correspondent, a situation has arisen in an Essex tower, which has occurred from time to time in other places and which requires handling with tact and care. It appears that there are sufficient ringers to ring the bells, but some are change ringers who want to make headway in the art, others are not change ringers and have no desire to learn. The result is a division in the camp which threatens to leave the bells unrung for services. There are not enough change ringers fully to man the bells on Sundays, and the others will have no part in it if for a substantial portion of their time they have to 'sit out' and watch the efforts of the change ringers. Our correspondent invites advice from those competent to give it, and we imagine there will be considerable diversity in the replies which may be expected. Whether, however, there will be as many satisfactory solutions of the problem remains to be seen.

It ought, of course, to be borne in mind, as our correspondent points out, that the essential use of bells is for service ringing and in any step that is taken it should be the aim of everyone to maintain the ringing on Sundays. The question is not an easy one to settle, and it seems to us that in a case of this lind there must be concessions on both sides. The non-change ringers ought to pat no obstacle in the way of their colleagues who want to make headway by practising the art and the change ringers, while making every effort to induce the rest to see the extended interest which can be obtained from change ringing, ought to consider the positions of the old ' stoney' men.

If, prior to the coming of change ringing they have rendered long and loyal service to the Church within the limits of their talent and opportunity, they ought to receive the greatest consideration, which, in the end, would probably well repay itself. If the two sides can meet in good will a compromise ought to be possible. If the ' stoney ' men will definitely not entertain learning change ringing and their past services and present numbers justify it, they ought, in our opinion, to be given facilities to share in the ringing. If it cannot be agreed to share the same periods allotted for ringing, would it not be possible for alternate practices and alternate Sundays to be allotted to the two groups, with the clear understanding that if indivicuals of one side desired to join in the ringing of the other they should be entitled to do so? In this way the conflicting forces might be brought closer together ; in any event there should be sufficient give and take between the ringers to ensure that the bells are fully (Continueti on pago 614.)

## CUDHAM'S LIGHT RING OF TEN.

## FIFE NEW BELLS WFIGH 15 CWT

The lightest peal of ten bells lung for ringing in a church tower this conntry was dedicated on Sunday aflernoon at the Parish Church of Cudham, Kent, and, in addition to the large congregation of parishioners who gathered to take part in the proceedings, a great many ringets assembled to hear and try this unique peal. The grauch, trlich has two aisles of unegual length, and a tower susmourted by a spire, lies on the strmmit of a steep ridge, tha clmoh up fa which, from one side at any rate, is a serere test for tho wind of the pedestrian and the vitals of a motor-car. The hill is long, and in places the gradicat is one in threc, and is frequently the scenc of hill-climbing coatests. One such was in progress on Sunday afternoon when sorae of the visitors artived. flhe church is thus well siluated for a peal of bolls. There are few neighbouring loones, most of the villagers who use the church Iiving in the valley far below, white the most papulous part of the parisi is nearly two miles away nu Biggin Hill. [p to fifty years or so ago, there were four bells in the tower, one, probathly of pre-Roformstion date, inscribed, - Ora Pro Nobis, Suncte Paul, and the others casi by Jobn Hodson in 166\%. Then, it is recorden, some "village icliow" broke the teaor bell in endearoming to celebrate a wedding, and for a lime ouly three sound bells remained.

In 1890 Messrs. Taylor and Co. recast the tenor and relung the four bella in a frame constructed to told siz eventuelly. In 1920 , M-sser, Mears and Staialuarl added a treble, making at ring of five. Abut two years ago there was a desire to fill the vacant pit, and a bull was cost in 1929 at Groydon for tho purpose. Mcanvhile a powninent parishoner, in the person of Mr. Rolle Richards, died, and by a bequest, whicla presumably was to brve turned the older ring of five into an octave, lae left a sum of money for three new hatls and a tower clock witin guarter chimes. The result has been that a further bell has been provided from the bequest, and Gudham nuw has its rery light peal of ten, whose total weight is less than 44 cut.
'flhe work has been carried ont by Messirs. hillett and Johnston, Hotho, in spite of the lack of metal possible in wiew of the weigitis of the existing ring, bave provided some very fine bells, whose notes are clear and powerful. Nothing was done to the other five, whicin, as stated, aro a 'mised' lot, but the result is certainly a pJeasing poul of ten, always, of conse, hearing in mind the weight. Tho four maller bells are carvice in a separate frame over the other six, and he gpace in the ringing room is mather conlined, the towar being onjo aluout 11 ft . squarc. In the ringing room, too, thele is too much notse, as the bells are immediately overhead. It is hoped that something may be doge to mitigate this, otherwise riaging conditions will now be altogether gatisfactory. ## TROUBLES IN THE TOWER."

## DIFFICULT PROBLEM AWATTKNG SOLUTLON.

## To the Editor.

Sir,-In a village near Ipswich there is a peal of eight bells and about twenty men capable of ringing them. Four or five men hava acquired the art of change ringing, naxd the remainder have advanced no further than call changes, amd yet there does not appear to be a regulas band to ring all the hells for the Sunday service. This semars to be a deplorable state of affails, which is certainly truc, and there is not the slightest doubt that things will be much worse before many weeks have passed.
The position is this: Unkil a few monibs ago, there was a regular band of call change ringers, who performed the dulies of Sunday service ringing, and now, after or rest of twenty yeirs or so, the ofo change ringers have stepped in with a view to creating change ringing. One of these gentlemen may be described as 'tauchy,' and will not take part in any call change ringing, which, to my, mind, is perfectly ridiculous. Two or three of the 'Gravestone' ringers are anxious to get on, and the rest do nof wish to bofher about it, and they have discontinued going into fhe tower, explmining that they have to sit out and watch five or six bells being rung to change ring ing, which is not so musical as their own method.
The Rector, who was a regular ringer, and who had great pleasure on joining the call clange ringers, is also among the 'sitiers out,' and, if asked to ring, the touchy one walks out. This kind of thing may lead to the breaking-up of the band.
Every Tucsday evoning a practice is held, which has so far proved successful to a eertain extent, heving heen reinforeed by periodica? visits of ringers from Ipswich and district. Several 720's have been rung with five of the local band taking part, there being four good insiders ' and two treble mern, who appear unable to ring a working bell. This difficulty may probably be overcome in time, bis both parties wish to ring, and there witl shortly be a crash.
The whole business appears ta be childish in one way, but most cerbinly sevious in another, eonsidering that all these men, who are interested in the art, will in all probubility wash their hands entirely of the interests of ringing.
Bearing in mind that change ringing must be given ewery chance, Sunday ringing is most esseniial-a mecessity which ringers must put before their own ideals, and which is really tho origan of bells and bellringers.
A mecting is shortly to be called, anci the ringers will ixe swmmoned to attend to discuss affairs and come to an undersbanding.
I would appreciate guggestions from ringers which may overcome these difficulties, and which [ may put forward at the coming moeting, hoping they may smooth out matters, and once again sef apon ts feet the bigh aame of which this old bower was ouce proud.Yours faitlifully,

The ringers then adjourned lo tho schoolnoom, where they enjuyed the hospitality of the churelwarden (Dr. H. J. Rankin), who had provided a splendid tea
A vote of thanks to the clergy, Dr. Hankin, Mis. Jones and the organist was proposed by Mi. E. Ashman and seconded by Mr. W. Drake.
The Vicar, in reply, welcomed the visitors, nud congratulated th hand which took part in the peal. He hoped that samething else worth recording would be accomplished in the near future.

The Rev. R. O. Wilson expressed his pleasure at being present, and said how he had enjoyed the task, when at Crich, of assisling aise the funds for the reasting of the bells.
The doctor was ohviously pleased with ererything, and the company returned to the tower for further ringing. Although the gathering was not so large as expected (owing, no doubt, to the inclement weather), some good ringing was heard in the following methods: Grandsire and Stedman Triples, Plain. Bab, Double Norwich, Kent and Oxford Treble Bob Major. The peal recorded on the hoard was one of Grandsire Triples, and was mang on January 26th, 1929, by the following: Mresses. G. Asliman, w. $H$. Buston, F. F. Hill, W. A. Prusons, W. E. Drake, J. Joord, F. G. Fretweil and E. Ashman. The board is of oak, with the leftocing neatly executed in gold leaf. It is the first peal board in the bolfry.

## WELDED BELLS.

## A RTSTORATION AT SOUTHFLEET, KENT

The ring of six old bells at Southfleet Church, Kent, hare been heard again afier a silence of, it is said, at least a hundred years. Three of the bolls were cracked and lave been welded.

Tho present church at Southffeel was builb ahout 600 years ago, on tho site of a much older church, which, in burn, was built on the foundations of a pagan templo.
'lhe rededication of the bells was performed in the presence of a large number of villagers by the Rev. Ganon Wheatler, Vicar of Si. Margaref's, Rochester. Mr: Mitchel, of Milion, Gravesend, was in charge of the band of ringers at the dedication service. These hells had not bean rung within living memary because throe of then were badly cracked, but the Rector, the Rev. J. I.I. Jones, who came to Southfleet three or four years ago, mado nin his mind that the peal should be restored. A restoration fund was oponed for the repair of the church, and part of it was earmarked for the work to the bells.
The cracked bells have been restored by a scicntilic welding process operated by Barimar, Ltal, of Landon, aud this portion of the work has proved highly successful. The bells have been relang, and the iron clapper staples, which were believed to be the cause of the cracks, have been removed duting the procoss of repair.
The bells aro a ring of six, tho tomor hawing been cast by Richard Phelps in 1736. He also cast the 3rd in 1705, while one of the others was by 'Withelmas Carter' in 1610.
