## PEALS OF MINOR.

We are very glad to see a member of the Methods Committee publicly discouraging peals of [3ain Alinor rung on the lines of a recent one at Ishan?, which was arranged with two singles only. In this form it may be a novelty, but it cannot be chamed as atvancing the standard of peal ringing; indeed, it is just the reverse, and, in our opinion, a retrograde step. It is exactly antio of the developments which, during the controversy on the Methods Committee's report last year, we pointed out would be led up to by admitting into a peal of Minor anything but true and complete $\boldsymbol{z}^{20}$ 's, or anything but trut and complete 120's in a peal of Doubles. In fact, we quoted an exactly parallel case of Doubles in which, if repetitions are to be admitted before the completion al any extent, $50 \neq$ Grandsire Doubles with only I wo singles would have to be recogrised as a peal.
It is the logical outcone of what we cafled "tampering with truth, and once you break the rule which requires each 720 (or 120) to be complete, however desirable may be the immediate end in view, you cannot decline to recognise any absurdity which a conductor may think fit to call a peal, so long as cach row occurs not more than seven times in a 5040 of Minor or more than 42 times in a 5040 of Doubles. Mr. Troliope may object to the form of the Isham peal for reasons totally difterent to our own-he does not tell us on what grounds he thinks it is undesirable and therefore to be discouragedbut it is a good thing to find a member of the Methods Committee taking the first opportunity strongly to discourage 'freak' arrangements of this kind.

Nothing in the recognised standards of peal ringing is binding upon anybody, but the tendency in these days ought to be to raise them and not to open the door to the lowering of them. There may be some who would argue that the Isham peal is not retrogressive; but if such atrrangements became accepted in general practice, why should not 5040 of Bob Minor be rang with only two singles, and if the one is to be recognised, why should not the other be? The Exercise has spent more than two and a half centuries in trying to btild up a standard; ringing in these days has reached a stage when peals on the higher levels are 'cheap,' and anything. which may tend to lower the qualification for any performance to be given the dignity of a "peal ' should be sternly rejected. There will probably always be people with strange notions of their own as to what they would call a "peal,' but that does not make it necessary that the Exercise should recognise then, and, if the Exercise refuses recognition, such things will quickly cease to be practised.

For these three performanees alone St. Peter Mancroft holds an important piaen in ringing, but many other famons peals have been rung there

In 1775 it was decided to repiace the old peal witlo n new ring af twelve, with a fenor of 4 I cwt, and these were cast by Pudt and Chapman, of Whitechepel. "The now peal af twelve bells was opened an Wednesday, dume 21st, 1775. On that day a Te Deturn and Jubilate was performed in fire Churth with a chorus from the Messiah. The Coronation Anthern was also performed by a bend of about kinirty gentlemen to a genteel and mumerous tudlence. Atter this the bells were opened by the ringers, maty to the admination ot the listemers and admirers of music and rinting. It was al jirst npperencied that the note of the tenor was not deep enough to cover the peal with elignity; but bat anjestie and complacers giving sound seon prociaimed her superiorlty, fad the execution of the whole has refleted honour on the founters, anil on the gentlomen who that these fitmonious bells.
The old tenor, inscribed, "To the King Queen ame ten children this harmonious pand of twelve bells is dediented, was eracked in 1814, and was recast at a weight of about 41 cwh , and, Lypical of tilu spirit, referuct tan lay the Bishop in his sermon, in 1809 a llat sisth bell was atided to make a middle eight, нлd this bears a Lation inscription which may be literally translated: 'I an called Gahriel. ## AN ARTICLF FOR YOUNG CONDUCTORS

## HY J SEGAIt JUN

No conductor likes to say after throe hours' ringing, "This shoutd he sll." He wili alwayg tuy to find a few places in the composition where the ann check tho progross of the ringing and eall 'Stand, something is wrong. Jasper Snowdon deati very fully with the impurlance of this in 'Thonosight' and it his 'Treatise on Treble Rob, where he states that the ablest class of conductars comprises those who know the posilions of the bolls throughout the peal.
So far as Plan Bobs concerned, it is quite easy to know the condring order througliont the touch or peal, ant to worte out mentally tho cffect of a hob before calling it. I am nesumine that the tellors are not parted, ant that the conductor is ringing an obwervation hell. In the plain enurse the bells come lo load in this order, 8.7.5.3.2.4.6. It is sufficient to remember the working bells, 53246. A bob alters the work of three bells, which will he met consecutively. A bob will rearrange but not separate the bells whose woslk is aliered by the eail. A hoh at the first lead (i,e., Wi) catuses (532)46 to hecome (325)46. The first of the three has hacome the lasl of the throe figures in brackels. 336 changes of Bob Major with calls at w could be writen:-

## DEATH OF MR．HARRY WRIGHT．

## 1ASSING OF A GREAT YARMOUTH RINGER．
