## BREAD CAST UPON THE WATERS.

Many a ringer has unselfishly striven, in the face of all kinds of difficulties and disappointments, to do his bit to extend the art by training young ringers, or trying to get older ringers to advance. Often the labour has appeared to be entirely unfruitful and the task, if not given up in disgust, has had to be abandoned because the naterial has been, apparently, unproductive, or because, even if promising, has removed beyond reach. There are ringers who have grown old in the Exercise, who have spent their years in the endeavour to interest and teach others, and who, after all their loyal service to the art and to the Church, can point actually only to one here and there who has really repaid the time and pains spent upon him. And yet one never can tell where any of the seed that is sown may one day germinate and flourish. There are many excellent ringers to-day who, having received their first instruction in some village tower or with some obscure company, and having passed on to another district, have been counted at the time as ' another wasted effort '; but who have afterwards more than made good in their own ringing and in the help they have given to others. Few efforts which seek to spread the art of ringing need, therefore, be counted as definitely lost, even though inmediate results may not be obvious.

On the other hand, however, there are cases where the work of a man has laid a foundation upon which a substantial edifice has been built and he has seen it grow. In such instances there must be intense satisfaction to the individual when he sees such a result of his handiwork. Especially must this be the case when he afterwards becomes separated from the scene of this labours. The story which is told elsewhere in this issue of the achievements at Hazel Grove, Cheshirc, is a case in point. Separated by half the circumference of the earth from the old country, Mr. James S. Wilde, of Dunedin, New Zealand, must have watched with justifiable pride the progress made at the tower where he was the first to put change ringing on its feet, a tower where six-bell ringing achieved the acme of performance and where, on the present eight, Surprise method ringing is being developed by a very able band. When Mr. Wilde left this country many years ago, he could not have anticipated the extent of the progress which would be made at this spot, nor the influence which would radiate through the Exercise as a result of the performances at Hazel Grove, for it is largely the success achieved there in the ringing of multimethod peals that created the interest in this phase of ringing which has since developed. There was no such thing as spliced-method ringing when Mr. Wilde left this (Continued on page 18.)

## ST, MARGARET'S CHURCH, IPSWICH

The first peal on the bells of St. Margaret's, Ipswich, by an entircly local company was rung on Saturday, December 27 th, and all the band were Sunday service ringers at this church. It is particularly interesting to note that the ringer of the treble, Mr. James Smith, is now over 70 years of age and had not rung a peal for $3^{8}$ years.

The church, which is situated on the north side of the town, is built chiefly in the Perpendicular and Decorated styles. It has a very fine roof and is well worth a visit.

In the tower, which was thoroughly restored in 1870 , hangs a goodl peal of eight bells with a tenor weighing $15 \frac{3}{4}$ cwt. Until 1899 there were only six bells, but in 1899

two trebles were added by Mears and Stainbank, and the whole peal rchung in oak frames by Mr. Alfred Bowell, of Ipswich. In 1926 the 4 th becanse cracked and was recast, the treble was also recast, and the 2nd tuned by Mr. A. Bowell. They are now a nice handy ring.

Fumplureys, B.A., B.D.) cano to the parish in 1913, the ringing "ont' and 'in. "has been done in conjunction with a watchnight sorvice, at the conelusion of which the Vical, accompenied by as many of the congregation as call equecze in, holus a stmil service in the belfry aud takes the opportwity of personally thanking the ringers for their serviens. On Whis particular oceasiou lre lad a pleasant task to perform-the dediantion of a peal board on which the thitty-five method peal, rung on Becemher 4th, 1923, has the plate of honour. It has been a long time finding a permanent record for all and sundry to see, but at nast it has been "put on the wall."
Occupying a prominent placis no fibe boad, one is pleased to see Ther particulars of a seven-method jocal rung on November 10th, 1900. It was the frsi in sewon methods on the bells, and for the Stockport and Bowdon Trrameh of the Clester Diocesan Guild, and its accomplishment was chintly through the tuition of that former giant amongst ringers. THE LIW OF Q-SETS.

Before you can understand wery mueh of the problems of composition, you muse know something of the Law of Q-Sets. When we talk about 'law' in this connection, we do not mean some rule that an aththority has laid down, and which you are expected to observe, but what the Oxford Dictionary calls "invariable sequence between cretain conditions and phenomens' -hhat is to say, in mutain circumstances certain things always happen. Just as when we tall: of the law of gravity, we do not mean that once upon a time Parliament passed an Act ordering that all stones which are dropped should fall to the ground, hut that so far as we know all stones which have been dropped in the past, have fallen; and so tar as we are concerned, all stones which will be dropped in the future will fall.

In eurly days of emposition ilsere were the or fwo problems which composers had to face, sud the most intoveating and important of these was: Is it possible to geb a peal or cirandaine 'luples with ardinary bobs only? Gibbard (conductor) 4, C. Challand 5.
The bells were hurg in 1830 by Willian Dobson, of Downlam Murket, Norfolk, and denicated on December 6ith, 1839, the tenor being 15 ewt, The bell frame was made by a Surflect carpenter. Prior to 1830, there wire three bells in the Lower, dated 162. Dobson recast the old metal, and towards the angmentation Mra, Gasswell, of Jippiagale, gave £200. The inscription on the 3rd is 'Long ara Willians the Funtur.
