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
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AXIOMS AND ACCURACY.

There comes a time in every prolonged argument when the lookers-on get tired of the subject, and that is what has happened among many ringers in connection with the discussion which has been carried on by the Rev. Herbert Drake and Mr. C. T. Coles. It has been accentuated, perhaps, by the former's repeated elaboration of the distinction between rows and changes and the latter's persistency in endeavouring to pin the disputation to the form of the motion which the Suffolk Guild is to be asked to adopt. The average ringer looks upon the difference in definition between a row and a change as a somewhat academical question—it does not interfere with his ringing and therefore he does not care a snap of the fingers about it. But a matter which may concern his personal connection with an association is on a different footing. He is entitled, if he is or is likely to become a member of that association, to know where he stands, when a motion is tabled which may conflict with his own views and prejudice his own position.

It is this position which Mr. Coles has been seeking to elucidate with regard to members of the Suffolk Guild and, after all the ink that has been spilled, we are not quite sure that he has even yet succeeded. We still have to learn exactly what is to happen to any member of the Suffolk Guild, who may hold unacceptable views on the subject, if the suggested resolution is passed, that the annual meeting should take steps to remove from the Guild any member who continues to approve of the words ' 17,867 changes' being on the tablet lately fixed in Painswick Church. Mr. Drake has definitely stated that removal from the Guild does not mean expulsion, but that the resolution, if passed, will be made 'quite effective, without anything unpleasant.' If the world could have been told at once what effective measures are intended, the delinquents-if any there be-would long since have known the fate awaiting them and have had the opportunity of repenting; while those who have been looking on might have been spared the boredom which not a few correspondents have confessed to suffering.

But now the Suffolk Guild, in addition to the much discussed resolution, under which 'removal from the Guild' does not mean expulsion, is to be asked to adopt a series of 'axioms.' We agree that it is high time some of the terms connected with ringing and some of the present existing 'axioms' which have been accepted in the past were overhauled, and more careful and accurate definitions provided, but it must be done in a manner which will command acceptance by the whole Exercise. Mr. Drake's nibble at it will serve little purpose unless it can be made the starting point of a revision of the whole question of terms and definitions.

DEATH OF MR. THOMAS RICKETTS, OF SWINDON. A WELL-KNOWN WILTSHIRE RINGER.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Tom Ricketts, many years ago a prominent member of the Swinden Parish Church Guild, who passed suddenly away on January 20th. The secretary was asked to write to the B.B.C. and ask for change ringing to be properly announced, for more broadcasts such as that from Westminster Abbey on New Year's Eve, and for services and ringing from Suffolk churches to be broadcast.

The secretary read out eight ringing axioms on changes and mere rows, which he had compiled for the annual meeting. These were more detailed than the previous proposals, in which the Painswick tablet was mentioned. They were very fully discussed, and unanimously approved. It was suggested that these might be printed in the report each year, also that they might be laid before the Central Council, but these points were left to the annual meeting.

Many towers were represented, and there was much ringing both of the simpler and the more elaborate methods, not only on the tower but also on handbells.

THE RINGING AXIOMS.

(a) Ringing is expressed by rows of numbers, of which the figures follow one another, in the same order as the bells which they represent, sound.

(b) Any one of these rows is either a repetition of, or a change

from, any other row.

(c) Change ringing is that which is represented by writing rows of figures, starting from a certain row (usually 'rounds'), and proceeding without any repetition until the ringing returns to the same

ceeding without any repetition until the ringing returns to the same row (usually 'rounds') again.

(d) The alieration from one row to another is counted as one change, therefore the number of changes is the same as the number of rows, if one counts the row that the ringing starts from and returns to (usually 'rounds') only once.

(e) If, however, there is one or more repetitions, the ringing is safe to be 'false,' and in this case there are more rows than there

are changes.

(f) In such case a claim to have rung the same number of changes as rows is a false statement. Anyone who makes or supports such a claim is not a fit person to be a member of a society or company of scientific change ringers.

(g) No such false statement, claiming that changes have been rung when they have not been rung, should be allowed on the walls

MISLEADING PEAL BOARDS. To the Editor.

Dear Sir,—Rule 6 of the Suffolk Guild, which Mr. C. T. Coles quotes, is confined to the objects and rules, and does not allow the committee to remove a member for any other cause. Nathing either in the original proposals, or as now altered into the form of axioms, has any suggestion that they should be incorporated into the objects, or rules; nor do I see how it could be done. Therefore a member could not be removed under Rule 6 for this matter, and there is no

could not be removed under Rule 6 for this matter, and there is no other way specified for removing him. I think we may, therefore, take it that Mr. Coles' objectious are now satisfactorily met.

With regard to the words 'true changes,' I have said nothing to invalidate such an expression. What I have said is that we cannot use the expression 'false changes' nowadays, because the two words contradict one another. But the words 'true' and 'changes' do not contradict one another. On the contrary they support one another. Therefore there is nothing wrong in using them together. The most one can say is that they are tautological.

With regard to those who are somewhat reasonably impatient with this correspondence, may I point out while the splitting of

With regard to those who are somewhat reasonably impatient with this correspondence, may I point out while the splitting of hairs is tedious, it is sometimes necessary. We have in this country at least two 'peal' boards which we do not want to see repeated. One gives the different methods rung in a 'peal' of Minor, but does not give the time. The reason is that there were 'intervals for refreshment' between the methods. The other 'peal' board does not give the method, the reason being that the rows rung were so-called 'call changes,' which is not change ringing at all.

It may be tedious to prevent the perpetration of such enormities, but it is work that someone has got to do. Moreover, I think I may claim, inasmuch as no one has contradicted me after all these letters, that the alteration of the word 'changes' into 'rows' in the Painswick, or similar, tablets, would remove all objections.

GUILDFORD DIOCESAN GUILD.

THE OXFORD MOVEMENT AND BELFRY REFORM.

A striking address was given at S. Nicolas' Church, Guildford, to members of the Guildford Diocesan Guild, at the annual meeting of the Guildford District on Saturday by the Rev. G. S. Mitchell, curate of Cobham, Surrey, who is himself a ringer. He referred to the lumentable ignorance which existed among the public as to the skill and application necessary before one could become an efficient ringer, and to the prejudice that still existed in some places. He went on to say that the changed conditions which marked the helfries to-day, a change which had been wrought within the memory. fries to-day, a change which had been wrought within the memory of their oldest members, had been brought about by the co-operation and sympathy between the clergy and the ringers themselves, and it grew almost entirely out of the revival stirred up by the Oxford movement. One result of that movement was that the clergy realised to a greater degree than before their responsibility for the care and cleanliness of the church, and when they had finished with the ground floor they turned their attention to the lumber room upstairs, from which valuable parish records had been recovered and preserved. They also joined with the ringers in the reform of the belfry which took place, and he hoped when the Oxford centenary was kept next year that ringers would have their part in the celebration and acknowledge what they owed to the great leaders of that movement by sending a peal from one end of the land to the other, for they owed not a little to the reformers who fought valiantly against the apathy and indifference of their time to the restoring of the churches to beauty and cleanliness. Proceeding, the preacher referred to the need for constant co-operation between the ringers and the church officers, because the latter must of necessity depend on the ringers, not only for the ringing of the bells, but also for ensuring the care of the bells and the interior of the tower. For their information as to what ought to be done they must rely upon the ringers and upon the expert officers appointed by the Diocesan Guilds. Our forefathers, he said, had bequeathed to us a priceless heritage in the towers and bells, and they could only improve that which they held by co-operation and in harmony with the Charlest Councils who although converse the property of the councils who although converse the councils who although converse the council of the councils who although converse the council of the counci Church Councils who, although responsible, might be ignorant of facts which ought to be within their knowledge. It was a common facts which ought to be within their knowledge. It was a common complaint, the preacher continued, that the clergy did not take an interest in the belfry, but he thought this was sometimes due to the fact that the ringers did not evince any interest in the church. He, therefore, urged upon them not only the duty to attend the services, and of becoming regular communicants, but also of taking an active interest in the organised life of the parish. Every parish should have a ringer on its Church Council to represent the interests of such an important body of churchworkers, and to give ndvice, with expert knowledge, on matters relating to the bells and belfry. The surest way to promote the efficiency of the church generally and of their own church in particular in the work to which they gave so much of their time, was first by joining in the fellowship of the congregation, and, secondly, by making their voice heard in the Church Councils.—The service was conducted by the Rector (the Rev. E. de ti. Lucas).

THE LATE MR. JAMES SHAW.

AN EXAMPLE OF FAITHFUL SERVICE.

AN EXAMPLE OF FAITHFUL SERVICE.

As already briefly recorded in 'The Ringing World,' Mr. James Shaw, of Hyde, Cheshire, died on Tuesday, January 5th. He passed away in hespital after having undergone two operations for a complaint which was not considered serious. He recovered from the operations very well, but had a relapse and died in a few hours.

The deceased was 70 years of age and had been a ringer at St. George's Claurch, Hyde, for the long period of nearly 57 years. He commenced to ring when quite a boy, and rang his first peal in January, 1879, and his last peal in May, 1930. The latter was a peal of Double Norwich Court Bob Major, rung at Hyde by an entirely local hand as a compliment to him on the completion of 55 years' service ringing there. A stone tablet has been placed in the tower recording this peal. Mr. Shaw was a member of the Chester Diocesan Guild from its earliest days, and before the advent of the Guild he rang many neals for the old United Counties Association and the Northern Scholars. He never kept a record of his peals, but the number was between one and two hundred, and ranged from the Chester Guild and also in the first peal of Stedman Triples for the Clester Guild and also in the first peal of Stedman Triples for the bells at Ashton-under-Lyne. hells at Ashton-under-Lyne.

Always a first-class striker, he insisted on this being the first consideration when ringing, and often said he did not care what the method was so long as the striking was good. He would always have good rounds before the bells were sent into changes, and if the first good tounds before the bells were sent into changes, and it the first change was not a good one he would call rounds again. He was one of the band of llyde ringers who won the United Counties' Association eight-bell cup outright, and took part in many prize-ringing contests in Cheshire, Lancashire, Yorkshire and Derbyshire in the '80's and '90's of last century. He was also a member of the Hyde bandbell ringers, and took part with them in many contests at Belle Vue, Manchester, and whethere. He regularly attended the meetings of the Chester Guild and the Lancashire Association, and rarely missed a meeting of the local branches. A man of reserved disposition, he was

chieser Gilla and the Lancashiv Association, and farely linesed a meeting of the local branches. A man of reserved disposition, he was esteemed by all who knew him.

The funeral took place on Friday, January 8th. The service was held in St. George's Church, conducted by the Rev. A. T. Beeston, chairman of the local branch of the Chester Diocesan Guild, and a chairman of the local branch of the Chester Diocesan Guild, and a friend of many years standing. He also officiated at the cemetery, where the interment took place. The deceased was carried to his last resting place by six of the local ringers. Many ringers from neighbouring towers attended, and Messys. J. M. Sinnon and A. Bancroft, churchwardens, amongst other parishioners and friends, were present in church. After the interment the bells were rung muffled to various touches, including a quarter-peal of Kent Treble Bob Major by W. Blackhurst I. R. Davies (Didsbury) 2, J. H. Brierley 3, H. Norgrove 4, T. Wilde (conductor) 5, S. Bowker 6, B. Thorpe (Ashtom 7, A. Hough 8. On the following Sunday the bells were rung muffled for both morning and evening services, and the acting Vicar, Dr. T. M. Waltenberg, M.A. made reference to Mr. Shaw's long and faithful service. The hymns, 'Now the labourer's task is o'er,' and the deceased's favourite, 'Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven,' were sung, and after the evening service the organist (Mr. G. W. Oldham) played the Dead March in 'Saul.' A muffled peal was rung to Mr. Shaw's memory on Salurday, January 16th.

So now we beave him, grateful for all he has done for ringing and ringers, and for the faithful service he has rendered to his church. It is pleasing to record that one of his great wishes has been fulfilled, namely, that he would be able to leave a good band of ringers at his houg tower when he set his bell for the last time. May the example of service which he has set he widely followed. R.I.P.

The smile on his face during a well-struck touch was something to behold. His features were far more eloquent than speech, and one need not ask if the ringing suited him; when his head was cocked slightly on one side you had to do your hest. A typical North Cheshire man, he had the homely characteristic of the district. He did not appear to have any ambition to be one of the 'big nobs,' but his presence was a source of strength and his gentle demeanour gained for him that respect which was his due. With his early ringing activities I am not fully conversant. That he had taken part in many prize ringing competitions as a member of the Hyde company is common knowledge among his many friends, and, despite the high standard of striking that that had had attained, he did not belittle the efforts of others. He criticised, certainly, but in a most helpful manner, and any learner who showed keemess found in him a guide and helper. He was not arrogant, neither was he a tyrant in the belfry, but had that happy knack of expressing his opinion without dancing about, although an occasional stamp of the foot added emphasis to his words. Many have rung more peals than he; that he enjoyed a good one goes without saying. One can safely assume that each of his peals was a good one, and, like his life, clean and true.

The death is announced, at the age of 72, of the Rev. Nigel Mackenzie Morgan-Brown, Rector of Bishop's Cleeve, near Cheltenham. Mr. Morgan-Brown became widely known in connection with St. Paul's Cathedral, where for nearly twenty years be held a number of appointments, including those of headmaster of the choir school, Minor Canon and Sub-Dean. He was an accomplished musician and tenor vecalist. In 1904 he accepted the living of St. Giles', Cripplegate, where he remained until 1919. In 1919 he was preferred to the Rectory of Bishop's Cleeve. It was quite an inspiration to hear him sing High Mass. On the Sunday after the funeral, Cripplegate bells were rung, half-muffled, to Grandsire Cinques for service. Previous to the ringing 'De profundis' was recited.
