## SERIOUS DECLINE IN 'FIRST PEALERS.'

A striking and somewhat disturbing featare of the peals analysis for 1932 is the serious falling off in the number of ringers who, in that year, scored their first peal. In other respects it can be said that progress is generally revealed, but a falling off of something like one-third in the number of first peal ringers when the aggregate number of peals has been substantially increased is something that should give cause not only for thought, but for action. The actual number of first peal ringers in 1932 was 430 in 2,202 peals, against 612 in 2,082 peals in 1931. Does it mean that less encouragement has been given to young ringers to take part in peals or that they have shown less desire to do so? Perhaps it is both. It is no excuse to say that other statistics indicate improvement, such as that the numbers who rang peals in a fresh method or on a different number of bells have considerably increased. That may indicate advance in one direction, but without the advent of new blood to the ranks of peal ringers it means that the supply is drying up at the source. Even the numbet who rang their first peal 'inside' shows a decline, and we commend these facts not onfy to the consideration of the associations, but also to the habitual peal ringers themselves.

There may be some of our readers who will want to dash in and tell us again that this state of affairs is due to the ringers whom they class as 'peal grabbers,' but let them not be too hasty in their allocation of blame. To many of those who are so glibly described as peal grabbers ' we owe a great deal for the raising of the standard of peal ringing. If they ring a good many peals, it is only because by constant practice they have raised themselves to a high state of efficiency, and their enterprise and initiative are worthy of emulation. At the same time there is obvious room for extending the usefulness of peal ringing. If it were to become an entirely selfish occupation it would lose a great deal of its value. Peal ringing, like practice meetings, should be used as often as possible for the encouragement of beginners and others on the lower rungs of the ladder. We would deny to none the joy of the perfect peal with the perfect band, but on the face of last year's records it does seem as if the Exercise needs to offer a little more encouragement to the novices. Without the influx of sufficient new blood there must come a time when the higher flights of ringing must suffer - if not in this decade, then in the next. The influence of associations ought to be used to counter the effect of this serious decline of 'frst pealers.' They might seek out the most promising material and arrange peals witla bands suffi(Continucd on page 322.)

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ciently strong to give these novices, one or two at a time, a reasonable chance of achieving what ought to be the early ambition of every ringer, their first peal. While many beginners who are really keen to make progress will seek out their own opportuntics for practice, the case for peal mging is not guite on the same footing. Peals reguire a certain amount of organising, and, while it is easy to say, ' If a man wants a peal let him arrange it,' it is by no means simple for a beginner to clo this. It is here where the associations could step in ame lenal a valuable helping hand.

## ATTEMPT "TO REGULARISE THE POSFTION.

To the Editor.
Dear Sir, -Yaur leading article on what we may Hgree to eall the Mimor conhroversy semps to eall for some comment. In the thst paragraph you say that 'if tho Council find in favont of these who asta that tho old conventions sisall be broken down and fresh standards erected, then they have to decide turther how far heyond the old barriers ikey recommend ringers to draw the new line."
Speaking for myself, and, I belicve, the seconder of the resolutibus over our mamse, I unt say that we are not nsking lor any unventions to be broken down. It is quile obvious to us thal at] the old conventions wore broken down long ago, and, what is of still mone importance, the Council has accepted tho position. From the time when, several years ago, the Bankes James' Cambridge Minor and the Pitman's and Morris' (irandsire Donbles wete first rung, lian Council has each succeeding year nccepterl these purals as fit lo be included in the Council's records. Ii has, further, flone this with full knowledge of the merits (ox demerils) of the peals concermed. Each year these peals have beet inclutud in the Council's analysis, besides which the majority of affiliated assoctiabons have, at some time or ather, published recovds of them in their anmal reports.

In the face of these facts an atiempt to regularise the pasition by bringing the Council's decisions up to date should not be misumderstow. The resolutions are designed to cover peals of Minor and Doubles already rumg and acecpted, and they go no further. In the opinion of the proposer and seconder, they contait sullicient safeguards to aroid any departures from ordinary change-wiging rules being induded. If the Council accepts the resolutions, it is to be hoped that six and live-bell ringers will not ring anything ontside tho new decisious. If the Council rejects the resolutious, it will have to face up to the position thus created. The Cumacil cannot logieally say that it will continue to recognise the peals nlrcady rung and at ilie same thme rule them out for the future. It will have to say what shall be done about the records of the peals already rung, approximately 250 in mamber! When we find a composifion to be false we promplly delete it from all our associntion records, and this is whan we shall have ta do with these peals of Minor and Doubles if the Couacil states its opinion that they are folse.

Beforc Cotucil representatives make ap their minds on this question of falseness will they consider the following: A peal of Triples contains each of the 5,040 rows once only. If there is a repetition of a single row the peat is false, and mo decision of the Council could alter it. A single 720 of Minor is in exactly the same position. But a penl of 5,040 Minor contans each row seyen times. If ane row is rung eight times in a 5,040 , nad noother rung only six times, then the peal would be false. Whilst ench row is rung sevon times (no more and no less) the peal cannot be falsc in the same sense that a peal of Triples with a repecition of rows is false. It is entively a matter of delinition. And if the Councl decides to regularise the position by accepting the resulutions, those ringers $w$ lo fo not wish to ring compasitions they do not like can continue unter the old style. Mr. Liadofis tables this week will show them samething of what they are missing in variety of enlling.

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## THE NEW BELLS AT PORTSMOUTH.

 A SPLENDID P'EALmecting organised to enable all, what desired to do sa to ving ma the new peal of bells at. St. Mary's Church, Forlsea, Pordsmauh hr was had on May lhih, and brouglit together a humerous conipaly, r'he bells, as already descrihed in these columtas, are in product of the Lotaghorangin Bell Foundry, and replace an octave of mixed origin. The restoration was makie possithe by the generosity of the barron Belf Trust, and the work, which has been carried ont is so connilete and thorotugh blat. the cometions both insido and outside the lower are as perfect as human ingenuity can make them
St. Mary's Chureh, itself of almost esthellal-like proportions, with ts tall, pimache-surmounted tower, was onened in 1899, and the beils then installarl werte an octave that consisted of four of a ring of six, cust in 1764 and taiken from the previous chureh, anrl forr now beils. Last year it became nusafo to ratig them, and, in vigw of the oilser noeds of the laree hut poot parish, it seemed as if the restoration might lave to bo jong delayed. Thanks, lowever, to the interest taken by Mr. F. Eopkins, senior trusien of the Batron Fell Fund, the whole cost of the work was provided by the 'Trust, and St. AEsry's Clurch is now it posiession of ote of the finest rings af eight at their weight in exisience. It some respects wo belfeve the bells are of experimental timensions, but if blat be so the experiment has been more than justified. The tenor of $17 \mathrm{cw}^{\mathrm{t}} .7 \mathrm{lt}$. is in F (inetead of the eustonary E), the trebles are more powerful than is often found in rings of this size, and the whole peal is beantifully balanced. In the ringing room every bell is heard to perfection, and outsicle in the husy street the sound is so morialated that it can be no possible source of annoymute to the public. This result has beens brought alnot by similar action to that Laken at Lincoln Cafiedral. Fornerly the bells swung in the louvres in the upper part of the Lower f the new bells tave now heen efected at a level 25 ft . lower, the windows at this stage linying beon made sound ptoof. Another result of the lowering of the lealls las been a great improvement in the convomence of haudling. Prewionsly there was 7aft. of rope betwen the rimgers and the bells. The frime and the fithogs are the last worth in moslenn bell engineering
Baturday's gathering mas, in a sense, an informa] one. It brought. together ringers from Alverstoke, Beckenlam, Brighton, Farelam, Fhabarougin, Gorlanamg, Gosport, North Stoneham, Portsmotith (the Gathedral and St. Wary'sh, Fyde, Titchfeld, Wickham, WinchesLer, Woking, ete., while Mr. J. P. Fifler represented the bell founders, Tho bells were kegt gaing mervily to a variety of methods, from rounds for tho novices nip io Sjpliced Surprise ia four mellods, hough the latter just failed to "stay tho conrse." Courses in at lenst half a dozen Surprise mothods were ring, but there was no neglect of the simpler lhings, mat mader the direction of Ms. F. Wi. Rogres, the Guild secretary and tower conductor, the ringing wants of every one were supplied.
The Gitile's service, conducted by the Viear (Canon G. C. L. Lunt) was hein, a feature of it being the glovious simgag of a fall choir. Canor Lunt's adelress, which was prefaced with at waraz welcone to the ringers, was based upon the words, "And in (that day there shall be upon the bells of the horses Holiness unto the Lord.' "The lessons which tre drew from it were the need in the present day for haliness in work, holiness in worship sut holitess in the home
