

## RINGERS AND BROADCASTING.

Ringers owe it to the public to give of their best when ringing church bells and particularly when ringing for the Sunday services. When they are practising there is some excuse for indifferent ringing, for it is here that the ringer must seck to extend his knowledge and raise the standard of his skiil. It cannot be expected, therefore, that only the best ringing should be heard on practice night; on the other hand, even practice night should not be utilised merely for the occupation of what has been not inaptly termed 'bell banging.' It should be used for its legitimate purpose, namely, improving the standard of ringing, and the opportunity of coaching those who need advice. Every ringing occasion should, of course, find the ringer anxious to improve his striking, but for service, particularly, nothing should be attempted which the band are not thoroughly capable of performing well. Better good rounds than bad change ringing on Sundays is wise advice, and, equally also, it is better to ring a simple method well than a complicated one badly. The public do not know much aloout the art of change ringing, but they can usually distinguish good ringing from bad.

Much more important, however, is it that ringing done in the hearing of the far greater audience of wireless listeners should be as near perfection as possible. The complaint of a correspondent in our last issue of indifferent striking heard on the ether on Sunday evenings is fully justified. We want to educate the public to a greater liking of church bells, but this purpose will not be served by bad ringing or even by bells which ' come over' in such a way that, to the uninitiated listener, they appear a complete jumble of sound. We can quite understand that when a broadcast service is arranged from some church, the local ringers feel they are entitied to what honour there may be attaching to the broadcasting of the bells, and desire to keep this part of the proceedings in their own hands. But in so doing they are not always serving the best interests of the art. Onc or two indifferent strikers, who have no 'ears,' or, having 'ears, are incapable of consistently correcting the inaccuracy of a false-struck' bell, can mar the whole effect of a broadcast, by robbing it of the rhythm which is the foundation of good ringing, and thus creating in those who hear it a sense of irritation instead of pleasurc.

We are afraid the importance of this is not fully appreciated by all ringers. Everyone responsible for a bell broadcast should see that the bells are manned by ringers who can lue depended upon to put up a performance that can be counted as near perfection as possible. The man

who is known to be a defective striker shoukl be ruth－ lessly ruled out of any broadcast performance，and，if necessary，outside assistance should be invited to ensure a good result．The effect of ringing on the local public is important；the effect on the broadcast audience is of infinitely greater importance and we believe that any ringer，except the most atterly selfish，would be pre－ pared to let a better man ring in his place if the matter were properly put to him．We cannot too strongly urge that nothing but the absolute best is good enough for a broadcast programme and no personal consideration ought to be allowed to stand in the way of producing it．If this advice were always acted upon many bell broadcasts would be a good deal better than they are， and the public would have a better appreciation of the ringers＇art．

## TUE SPIRIT OF THANKSGIVING

To appreciato to the fuil the place which churcle bells oceupy in the heurts of Che English people one las to fo to $\bar{a}$ village bell opening. In a lithe country parish lhene are few things which arouse a keener interest than tho restoration of tho bells, which, perhaps, for centuries have been one of the chfet menns of cxpressing tho public joys and sorrows, and have summoned generation after generation of villagers to join in tho Sunday services, or, at least, have served as a reminder of tho Day of Rest and its privileges.
Last Saturday, in the btrakness of a Bovember aflemoon, and througla the firt showstom of the winier, we made our way to
 known and wilourhed ly the busy world beyond. It is reached only by by-roads, so narrow in places that there is lardly roon for two velicles to pass, and one comes upon it suddenly, nestling round the village pond, and trailing away up the hilssido to the ancient church
Upton Grey had for the day, at all evenis, assumod a new importance. Ita bells had been restored and augmented, and the Lord Bishop of the Diocese was coming in person to dedicate them. Every man, woman and child from the village who could leave fome or the fields or farmyaris attended the service, and when wo arrived, after being delaged by the stom, the church was full, and the choir, composed of men and hoys in cican white surplices and girls in theit Sinday best, were assembled at the lych gate for the coming of the procossion of clergy from thia Yicarage, lower down the hill.
And thile we wait we tale in the main features of this somewlat memarkable building. Filuere are traces, surely, of Saxon work, nortions of the fabric are certainly early Nornan., That arch of tho tower which dirides the nave from the chancel is undonbtedly part of the original building; the chancel itself is nearly as old. There is a north aishe, which, built on the hillside, rises in tiers of pews, and at the west end tincre is an open gallery perched on pillars. Once upon a time there was (as we learned afterwaris) a south aisle, but liat lad to bo pulled down because it threatened to collapse. Some diay, perlaaps, the church may be lighted by electricity, for we had seen the now ubiquitous pylons of the mational grid system rearing their heads among the trees near the village, but at present oil tampa their heads among the trees

But now the procession is approaching the south door, headed by the crossbenver. As it reaches ine porch the choir begin lhe lynnn, "We love the place, $O$ God," in which the cougregation wholeheartedly join. The procession passes under the tower to the chancel, where, the choir having taken their places, the clergy advance beyond the eastern arch and open ont to make way for the Bishop. who earries hijs pastoral staf limgelf, to miner the sncrariuno.
The preliminaries to the dedication ceremons are short: The Lord's Prayer and versicles, fine 150 th Psalm, the lesson from Numbers $x$. 1-10, and the Magnifat. Then the Bishop proceeds to the tower where, standing benentit the western arch, lie receives ono of the bellropes, and Lrow Basing, ono of the churchwardens, requests him to dedicate the bells, the new hell frame and the chiming epparatros' to the glory and praise of Godl' Then the Bishop speaks. JTe recites versicles, mhile the congregation reverently respond and afterwards foin in the Lortl's Prayer. And, having asked God's blessing on the work. his Lardship colemnive dedicates the beils "in the faith of Jesus Obrist, to the glorv of God, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Gloost.
A' few blows. Beruck on one of the bells, signified to all within ligarimg that the centarl afle of tho service lad been completed. Pragers followed and arterwards the Bishop adiressed the conprefstion in homely but eloqueut phrases, telline them of the oriminal purposs of church towers and bells, of their influence on listory, architecture and poctry, and of their lessons and their call. Quickis then the service ends with the liynn, 'Praise, my sanl, the King of Henven, a mayer for blessing upon those whose wotk and gitts had made possible the sotting up of the bells, and the Bencriction.
The service was over; it wrs simple; it was impressive; its keynote was one of thanlesgiving. As tho procession of cloir and clergy leave the church the mery little peal strike out overhead, manned by a team of ringers from Basingstoke, who, after some well-struck ronds, ring with equal precision a couple of six-scores of Grandsire Donbles. Slowly the conrregation fisperses, but many remain in the clurelsvard to listen for the first time to the somd of their village bells as a ring of six. and while they Iisten the setiting sun goes down in m blaze of grozv, hathing the oft chureh in its golden light, and seeming to shod its benisou upan the crowning act of the villagers' derotion and generosity.

## HOW RESTORATION WAS DELAYED

It is something like five Fears since the restoration of the bells at Thton Grey was contenplated. Some of them were ancient, and the tenor bal come down from the mre-Reformation period. It was east about 15:0, and inscribed, "O Sancte Blasi Ora Pro Nobis." It is badly cracked in the crown, but on accame of its antiquity the Diocesan Advisory Conmaitice would not allow it to be recast. A generous donor wns, however. found willing to replace the old with a
new bell, but another olbstacle to the restoration was raised. An
"anthority' advised fiwe Diocesan Commatee that the decrepit bell frame was also pre-Reformation, and, despite its derelict condition, thoy refused to allow in ia be roplacen. Quite rizhitly the Church authorities declined to spend money on $i L_{\text {, and so it deadlock ensued- }}$ matil it was discovered that the 'athority ${ }^{7}$ was wrong aud the frame not so old by 200 years as it lind been represented to be. Thut were the antiquarians confounded!
The whole peal now hang in a now fuanc of Euglish oak. Two aln bells, the present 4 th, also cast about tho year 1540 , and the 5 th, east in 1631, have been retuned nud retained, the thind recast, nud treble and second atded, which, together will the new tenor, make up a well-balanced athl merry peal, with a tenow of 9 cwt. 4 lin. in A. The celcbrations did not end with the service in chameh. A barge number of parishioners, wisiting elergy and ringers gathered hu the
Parish Hall and lad tea together, ant dic Jishop came among the prarty and clatied ta mest of them in turn. After toar the Yateley ringers, mith Mr, E.J. Riddell as leadry: ang a course of Grandsire Triples on landbellis and a selection of tanmes, wheh were much appreciated. A parts of villare boys led the 'whoopec, and filled the hall will long and shrill cheers.
The Vicar (the Rev. Hemy Sewath) and parishoners were thanked for their hospitality to the ringers liv Major Sillwell (hon, secretary of the Dasingstake Distriei of the Winchester amd Portsmonth Guidel, who congratinted then on the comsmmation of the selveme which had given them sued ic delightfut preal of bells.
The Vicar, in reply, welcomed the rintora and thanked them for coning to riug tho belis an that oreasion. Fe hoped they would come often and that soon they would have thei own tem of ringers in Tpton Grey. Until then they wand lave to use the ellacombe had helped ius the restoration scheme nind the many ciergy who liad como to join in the service that day.

## THE BELLS AND TOWER.

Throughout the ereuiag touches in whous methods were rung on the beils, which delighted atl who lieawd them. Messers. J. Taylor and Co., of Loughturough, who were represented at the servien by Mr. R. H. Dove, lave carricd out the work in a most admirable manmer. The following are the particulats of the bells:-

The aneient tenor, now in homourable wetiremont, lag found a resting phace in ihe ringing chambor, where for many years twelvo leather five huckels loy neglected. They hare tha inseription, 'Upton Grey. J. 1 TG2K. Two of these have been repaired and cleaned, nud will be prescred as interestine relins. The mitials "J. K." are presument to he those of Tames Kind to whose menory there is m mazble slub inid in tive aisle of the churel. f.

## EIGHTY-AND STILL GOING STRONG

 MR. JAMES GEORGE'S DOUBLE EVENT.- Men may come and men may go, but James George goes on for ever,' if some poet, whose name we can't be bothered to remember, will permit us to adapt one of his most impressive lines to meet the meeds of the moment, For James George came lort before most of us can remenber and will go on-if actions and appearances can be relied upon-long after moste of us have taken our departure.
On Monday, as all our readers are aware, he celebrated his goth birthday; on Saturday, as most readors will learn for the first time, he ramb his 1,200 th peal! What a double event! In this respect he has all previous record holders beaten to a frazzle. At a time of life when most people-if they are not already dead-sit with their feet in tho fendor and dream, or in their waking moments deplore the migleeds of their past, Mr. George is lashung nhoul the country,

taking all bells as they cone and finging them to peals tilf the very gudgeons cry out for rest. What with cooking lis own breakfast, tidying up the drawing room of 44 , Cuckoo Road, and making his own bed, then wavelling all day aud laalf the pight with just suffeient interval to put another peal in his bag, Mr. George has no time for ruminating on the past, unless it is to pour inko an interested ear bonan story of a new world conquerent, and he lias no misleeds-to speak of-ta deplore.

This young man of eighty leads a hectic life and cannot understand why those many years his junior cannot keep up the pace with him. Fe started his peal ringing in 1889 , when he was 35 yeara of age, and since that time has averaged more than ous peal a fortright! Fancy that, over a period of 45 years! This is how his peal ringing las udvanced :-

It is impossible to recount here all the many great perfornameos which Mr. George has put up. It will be ramemberod that not long ago-when much nearer 80 than $70-\mathrm{Mr}$. George rang Pitinswick tenor for 111 hours in that lamentable effort, which was to have been a record, but proved to be false. All the heavy bells that have been open to lim be has rung to peals, among them Bow tenor ( 53 cwt ), Soulliwark ( 50 cwt ), Norwich ( $43 \mathrm{cowt),} .\mathrm{Cornlill} \mathrm{( } 41 \mathrm{cwt}$ ), Slicffield ( 40 cwt .), Slurewsbury ( 40 cwt ) and others litule less in weight the has thmed to peals, some in Maximus and some in Cinques, and those that are heavier he is still prepared to take on if opporthanity offers. On tho eve of completing four score years he rang the trand at Nuneaton to Cambridge Major and the tenor at All Saints', Derby, to Treble T'es. Even on Tuesday "he was oz the box' at St. Martin's, Biruingham, and, at the age of 80 years 1 day, rang tlie 37 cwl. tenor to his birthday peal-at least, we slall be surprised if he didn't, althougli we had not heard tas result of the attempt at the monent of going to press.

Amin all the many porformances of which Mr. Georga may ha proma, there is this to be said without aray possibility of eqtivocation, no man at his age has done tho prodigious jobs at the rope end that 3 Ir . George has accomplished, and no man of his years is so active in peal ringing. Fis total in 2933 is already 50 . He legan ringing in 'old mon's' peals when for whas sixty-he is the only surwivor of that band-and was one of the velerans' company at Hart Street a few weeks ago. That ho will long live to enjoy good jamitht, his youthful outlook on life and to ring many more peals will be the wish of Mr. George's hostg of irdends in every corner of the British Isles.
Gentlemon, the toast is: 'Mr. James George, of England!'

## ANOTHER LEICESTERSHIRE PEAL RESTORED.

## A GINI' BY THE BARRON TRUST.

Saturday, November 18th, was a 'red-lefter' ' day for Hathera, near Loughborough, for it saw the completion of the restoration of the Parish Church bells, which for many years had not been rung. Whea the schame was recontly contemplated, the Bichop's Advisory Committee sant their hon. cousulinut (M1. Ernest Morris, F.R.Fist.S.) to jeport on the condition of tho existing five belle. His acconat as to the shocking conditions in tho bell chanber lad such an effeet on the inthorities liat the Clanncellar of the Diocese gavo permit to take the hells down before the factilty was completed.
Tho oldest bell in the tower is bell Ne. 4 , dated 1618, and the next otdest, bell No. 5 , dated 1620 , both of thense bells laving been cast by Henry Oldficld, whose bellfoundry was at Nottinghan. The tenor Was oest by Edward Arnold in 1792 when the foundry was in Hangman's Lane, Leicestor. It is interesting to note that the first Taylor, hallfounder, viz., Robert Taylor, was arphrenticed to this Edward Arnold, atad undoubtedy musf have had a hand in the moulding end custing of this bell. These three old belis bear the following inseriptions, viz-
No. 4.-Thomins Throne and Thomas Berriugton, 1618.
No. 5.-Thomas Jerrington and J. O. Throne, 1620.
Tenor-FDward Deane and Thomas Harriman, Ohurchnardens. Fdward Arnold Fecit 1792.
Rells Nos. 2 and 3 were cast by G. Fedderley of the Nottingham Foundry, in 1791, but these were so badly out of tume and of such poar tone that it was neeessary to recast them under the present soleme of restoration. The weight of the tenor bell is $9 \mathrm{cwt}$.2 qr . 12 lb . and the penl is in the key of $G$ sharp.
Tho peal now consists of siz bells, having been aurmented to this number by the addition of a new treblo bell generously given by the Farron Bell Trust, who hare also fiefrayed the cost of restoring the five bells.
Tho bells are now lung with the most mp-to-dato fittings, including ball bearings, and the decrepit old framework bas been replaced by au enormonsly strong and massive struetare buift up of castriron sections upon a foundation of heavy rolled steel girders, the whole siructure behng thoroughly braced and tied together.
The new bell and the two recast bells are perfectly tuned on the ' Taylor True-hermonic system of tunimg, and the three largest bells, which have been ratained in the peal, without recasting, have been tuned so that the whole peal is now in perfect accord.
In addition to the nelual work to the bells themselves, other costly improvements have been carried out in the belfry, including the fotting of copper wire guards to exclude the birds, a new belfy door has heen construcled, the tower cloek has been overhauled and the roof of the tower has been stripped, relaid and made stronger. All this of the tower has ben stripped, reiad and made stronger. An whe work, tegethro with whe wecessary stonenason's work, w.
The whole of the bell work has been earried out by kessrs. John 'Taylor and Co., Loughborougls.
The procession ussembled ali the Fillnge Cross and marched to the church headed by the church bamer. It consisted of the choir and clergy, tho Bishop of Leicester, the Deputy Mayor of Loughborougln, the Parochial Church Council, representatives of the Baptist and Methodist Churches and the chairman and clerk of the Parish Council, Mr. E. Denison Taylor (representing the bellfounders), reprecentatives of the Midand Counties Association aud the ringers of Hathern Parish Church. Whent the head of the procession reacherd the church, the hymn, 'We loye tho piace, O God,' was sung. The Rector (the Rev. 1)ouglas Foole) conducted the service, and the lesson wis read by the Rural Dean. During the hymn, "Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven," the Bishop and clergy procceded to tho tower, where the formal deslicntion took place.
Tmmediately after the dedicatory prayers, the following raised the bells in peal and rang a few rounds as the procession teturned to the rast end of the clurch: Ernest Morris treble, Colin Harrison 2, Devid Collins 3, Johm Saddington 4, Johm Tw. Booth 5, Felia Sutton tenor. The Bishop gave an iuspiring address, and the service, which included the bymons, 'Lifted yafe within the sleople' nud 'When morning gilds the skies,' concluded with the Te Deum and the Blessing. Immedintely after the serwice the ringers above mentioned rang the first 720 Bob Minar on the belle.
Tea was eerved to a large congreration in the schoois, after which the bells were kept gring to various methods by ringers from Nottinglam, Cotgrave, Ilkeston, Loughborough, Shepshed, Sutton Bomington and nther phaces. Jveryone was delighted with the 'go' of the hells, and the addition of the new treble now makes a very fine ring of six.

## BELLRINGING LECTURE

At the request of the local branches of Thee H, in lecture on "Bells and Bellringing " was given aty Wimbonne on Wednesday, November 22nd, by the Rev. F. Llewellyn Edwards, secretary of the Salisbury Dincesan Guild. The chait was taken by Sir James Brooke, K.C.B., and there was a large and deeply interested andience. The lecturer's explanations of nethoe ringing were illustrated by the Poole change ringers inder the direction of Mr. F. W. Townsend, and a number of tumes were played by the Rev. C. A. Phillips' party of landbell ringers.

The prosentation took place at a meeting of the branch held at Higher Walton, where thene is a very fine octave of bells by Taylat and Con, with tenor of 163 mwt Among those who athended the meeling werc Mr. T. Duxbury, of Padiham, whose membership oi the asseciation antes from 1880, while the Goosemargb weterstr, Mr. Wmi.
 and Kent Treble Bob. Other methods up to London Surprise were also rung, the bells being in full demand all the aftennoon.

After tea the president (Cayon H. J. Filsco) read a letter of apology from the Vicar of Figher Walton (the Rev. W. H. Cooper') tind phoceeded to make the presentation to Mr. Rigby, referming to the good work he had done during lif nine years' service. The President voiced the sentiments felt by all the membere towaids him, as his unassuming modesty and diligent Inbours were always apparent.
Mr. Righy, who was taten entirely by surprise, briefy acknowleatged the gift, He said that, although he had never sought reward, the pendant was just such a present as he would have desired.

The next meeting was fired for December 16 th at St. Mnrk's, Presionk, at the request of tha anthorities of that church, as they desire the advice of Canon Elsee regarding thir bells, which are hung at the top of a rather slender tower and go none tod well owing to the movement of the struckuce.

Adjourning to the belfry, the president joinod in well-strmek touches of Stedman and Double Norwich, and the bells were kepl busy till 8.30, when a good fall in peal terminated one of the best muertings held in the ristrict fol gome time.

## MANGHESTER BRANCH AT PENDEETON.

A very pleasent meating of the Manchoster Brameh was heid at St. Thomns', Pendleton, on Saturdsy, November 18th. Thouglt not overwhelming in nambers, the gathering was, bevertheless, rephesentative of cuite a few towers and several districts.

E, Fletcher), who, in his address, which would, perhaps, be better described as at talk," nude his congregation feel that thes were as much a part of the Church as wers the organist and choir. Owing to his decease and other circumstances, the band dispersed, and during the last four or five years the visits of the association have provided the only ocensions on which the bells have been rung. As a zesult of this last visit, an effort is to be made to recommence at lenst occasiona! Sunday ringing.
To ensure that the bells were in good order for the meeting, Messrs. J. Humnisett and J. A. Trollope visited the tower beforehand, and their labours in this connection wers much appreciated. It wiss a pity they forgot to take along a vacuum cleaner in their equipment!
The bells were ruug from half-past three until a quarter to five, when shortened evensong was held, conducted by the Rector (the Rev. P. Gough). Ten followed in the Parish Hall, whero the Rector was host. Before leaving, he sad how pleased he was to have the association risit Acton, and trusted he would ses them there agrin in the future. The feelings of the neeting were voiced by the wice-president (Mr. J. A. Trollope), who yeferced to old time associations wilh the tower, and expressed the hope that the bells would be rung mote offen in the future.
It the subsequent business meeting, the hon. secretary (Mr. F. W. Goodfellow) and Mr. Hollier both referved io the passing of Mr. F. W. Ethorington, of Twickenhan, in Seplember. The deceased gentleman had heen at very kecol supporter and an honorary member of the asseciation for sone years.
