## PEALS IN 1934.

A FURTHER FALL 1 N THE NUMBER
Members of the Peals Analysis and Records Committee of the Central Comeil are now in the throes of the most exacting part of their task for the year-compiling the thabisties which ultimately appear in the tables.

But here is some early information which will be of interest to our readers.
The total number of peals reconded for the year 1934 whs $1,783$. This is exactly 50 less than in 1933 aud 419 fewer than in 1932.

The peals rung in 1934 are made up of 12 Maximns (compared with 27 in 1933), 29 Cinques (egaiust 36), 66 Royal (arniust 56), 77 Catars (against 79), 771 Major (against 838), 33] Tuiples (against 361), 362 Minor (against 308), 135 Doubles (against 128). The haudbell peals in 1934 numbered 87; in 1933 there were 99.

## VILLAGE BELLS.

We have received a copy of the second edition of a little book which no doubt is fomiliar to many of out readers. but which deserves to be even betfer known. It is entitied "Village Bells? and is a simple explanation of five six-bell methods and five five-bell methods. The nuthor is the Rev. H. Howes, of Cold Eighem Rectory, Toweester, from whons copies may be obtained.
It is intended for learmers, and as it is provided with a substantial cover, it can be rarried in the pocket and studied at any odd time that presents itself. And that is what the learmer should do. Far too many of them leave everything until they get into the tower and they expect their instructor to tell them things that they ought to find out for theluselves. The excuse is often that they do not know where to look for the necessary infornation. The standand books are too adranced for them and "ssume fhat they already know the fundimentals. It is the rudiments that they want to be inatructed in, and here they will find just what they want.
The work is, of course, no substitute for those in the suowden geries and does mot pretend to be one. Rather it will serve ns au introduction to then, aud the wan who han had his curiosity and interest aroused by this litile honk will the better be able to appreniate and understand the more adwanced publientions. The selection of melhods is excellent, and an average six-bell band than can ring them all need not be ashamed of themselves.

## THE SYDNEY PEAL RECALLED.

A LADT TLLLS HOW SGF MEF THE FNGMSH RINGERS.
In an interesting letter to her hrotier, Mr. John Jagrar, of Warler Birmingham. St Sydney lady, liviug at Manley, one of the charmira suburbs of the city overlooking the harbour, has described hor meetiny with the English ringers while they were there. She wrote:

The days cante and went, and I began to despair of ever seefug al hearing anything of your fricusis. I was tuking two papers is day, so as not to miss nnything, when I gladly saw the enelosed euting (announciug the visit to Sydney). So on the Tueeday, to make sun of seeing Mr. Fussell and party before they started ringing, I went in good time to the city-seven miles from Manley and two trams As I neared St. Mary's R.C. Cathedral I heard the bells in full swing
"They are having a practice," said 1. 1n a couple of minutes was ont of the tram, wan up the Cathedral steps to find the fou front doars shut and locked. I went round the side and saw a priest. No one conld help me. Then 1 saw a door open and hamo men came out. I rushed them. ... I asiked if they would take my carrl ap to Mr. Fussell when the practice was over

PRACCICE! Madam, PRACTICEI lhey have started a wonderful peal, and they won't finizh for three hotrs!!'

My turn-"'rhree hours!!! um-an, you meats to tell me the ringers won't finish for three hours!!! *** Allow me to step iuside before I faint.
' I stepped iuside, sat down and listened and enjoyed the glorions peal. The attendant said, "The ringeps were locked in the tower and the whole church was locked against everybody during the peal-even the St. Mary's ringers were locked ont.'

At long last, the ringers came down. I was introduced to Mr. Fussell, and he introduced me to others. The Rev. Jarmes wis at home, not well. Mr. Fussell told me to tell you they rang a Treble Bob Major.

A dimner was waiting them at a cafe aud no time to be lost. They slipped away-Mr. Fussell aud I walled a few yatds. Then he ent across the park, and I went an to my tram. There was no timo to get inta any conversatian. If should like to have asked what gifts were brought for the Australian riugers and if "The nien who make history" was among then, etc. As they were doung the honours, 1 did not think it wise to forestall them, the situation was a litite delicate. I should like to have seen more of them-it was a arse of "half a loaf." They were only here a few days.

## THE LATE MR. JAMES COTTERFLL.

## AN APPRECIATION

Probably for more than a decade no announcement lias caused mava deep regret to the members of the Yorkshire Association than the news received at tho mmual meeting, held at Doncaster, on January $26 \mathrm{th}_{1}$ of the passing of the highly esteemed treasurer', Mr. James Cotterell, on that date.

Born at Bradford, the deceased was lefi an orphan fat an ebrly age, and was brought up by a kindly uncle and aunt ui Bradford. He showed in early life a keen interest in ringing, to which art ho was introduced by his old friencl. Mr. W. Cundele, of Bradford. Thero was at that timo an excellent band, under the leadership of the lato Mr. J. H. Hardeastie, who were famed for their striking, and, as was common in those days, talked of aud rang nothing elec but Treble Boh, for ringing of which method the county becane so famous. Mr. Cotterel! mpidly became one of tide best known ringers in the county, both as an excellent melhod ringer and if fine striker.
Business called him to Halifax, and there he remained until 1981 , When he rgain took up desidenco in Bradford, where le became the mainstay of tho Catheural band. He rane 239 peals for the Yorkshire Association, his last peal being a haudbell peal of Bab Major, conducted by Mrs. Cotterell, on Tuesday, January 15kl.

In 1906 Mr. Colterell succeaded the late Mr. W. Staintloorpe us treasurer of the Youshive Association, an office he retained until his death. He was presented with a gold watch by the members as a mark of esteem on completing 25 years in that office.
Visiting ringers will loldg remember the liospitable reception nccorded to them by Mr, and Mrs. Cotterell, and his long and sustained interest in the affairs of the Yorkshine Association will ever remain a grateful memory with his fellow-officers, while his kindy manner with learners, his sincerity ths a friond, lis devotion as husband, and as a gifted adviser, will long be remembered by all who were privileged to meet him.
This short appreciation is is slight ncknowledguent of much advice and kindly interest extended to the writer in a period of thearly 40 years, and the living friendship las been broken in the only possible way. R.I.I.

Foundeतt by the late Mr．W．E．Garrard in 1896，St．Mary Abbat＇s Guild，Keusington，continues to fourish，and the bells at this celebrated church are regularly rung for the Sunday services．Although the conditions which have sprung up round the charch have made even uccasional peals ont of the guestion in recent years，the Guild spinit las been maintaimed，and，numericallyr，it contimues as strong as ever， moder the leadership of Mr．W．H．Judd，who was one of Mr finrard＇s earliest pupils，and succeeded lim as captair of the company． St．Mary Abhot＇s original peal of bells was a ring of eight，cast in 1772 by Thomas Janawt，whose bell fouldry in Clelsea，carried on from about 1763 to 1785 ，began and anded with him．In 1869 the old charch was pulled down and with it the steeple．The present milding was completed in 1879，when the bells were increaged to ten by the addition of a treble and tenor and the recasting of two of the old bells by Wamer and Go．Tho first peal－Bols Major－on the old bells was rund in 1773 by the Cumberland Youths，who also rang the last peal in tho old tower in 1869 and the firstis the netw steepto in 1882，the latter Weing a pen］of Stedman Oaters conducter by Johu Cox．Numerons peal boards in the tower record past performances， including a peal of Grandsire गriples by the Lrondon Society in 1774. ＇tho［irst whole peal rang on these hells，and the 60 conrse ends of Oxford Treble Bob Major（ 6,720 clanges）by the College Yonths in 1791，canducted by Tames Barllett．

Johnson Fiem, of Furworth-on-Tees.
