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## UNITY IN THE BELFRY.

Speaking upon experience gained in four different parts of the country, the Rector of Haslemere, Surrey, referred in a sermon the other day to a lack of unity which he had found among bellringers. Canon Jones seems to have had a rather unhappy experience, but it is not safe to generalise upon a few isolated examples. At the same time it is just as well, perhaps, that we should be reminded of shortcomings which other people see in us. It cannot be denied that most of us know of a band here, and another there, in which the spirit of true brotherhood fails to find lodgment. We believe that in the majority of bellringing companies there is to be found as much unity as is apparent in any other body of people drawn together for a common purpose or pursuit. you find any organisation in which, in the course of time, differences will not appear-differences which, dealt with openly and honestly, probably lead to good in the end.

The differences which eventually lead to disunity in a band of ringers often spring from petty jealousies or some sense of grievance—and they usually occur in those places where the leader is tactless, autocratic, and probably impatient. There is no gainsaying the fact that ringers as a body are difficult to handle. Why is it? Frankly we do not know, but we suspect it is partly the spirit of indifference which characterises so many of them—indifference to progress, indifference to punctuality, indifference to the convenience or the sacrifices of others. When men profess to be part of an organisation which, more than most, depends upon successful team work, it is not a matter of inconsequence if one or two of a company are unpunctual by habit, indolent in their actions, and careless of their colleagues' time or patience. These are usually the men who show most resentment if their attitude to ringing is called into question; and here again may be the source of discord.

'If we don't hang together we shall hang separately,' once said a notorious rebel to his fellow-revolutionaries. If we do not pull together in ringing, we cannot pull separately—with gratifying results, at any rate. Canon Jones' appeal, therefore, is not out of place, and even in those belfries where all is for the best in the best of all possible worlds, it is just as well occasionally to be warned of the dangers that may arise from selfishness, indifference and sloth. Many bells are silent and many bands short-handed to-day from one or all of these reasons. Human nature being what it is, it is too much to hope that all such failings may be eradicated from all our belfries. But there are leaders who might well ask themselves if their tactics are right—whether that dictatorial

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manner which sometimes gives offence; that endeavour to make someone look small in the presence of others; that monopoly of the conducting, when some other member is anxious to learn to call, are, after all, in the best interests of the band and of the art of ringing. And there are ringers who could with advantage think more of what they owe to the other members of their bandthat earlier start on Sunday morning; that new method that should be looked up for practice night; that little bit of extra keenness that would make all the difference to the interest and progress of the whole company. These are the things that would make for greater unity in many

## CENTRAL COUNCIL PUBLICATIONS

To the Editor.

Dear Sir,—Mr. Trollope's use of the word 'impertinence' would be excusable—if merited. His generalised charge of 'misstatements' is inexcusable—unless proven. I apologise to you for having repeated something which Mr. Trollope says is untrue. While I must have misunderstood what William Fye meant to convey, I am not alone in a clear recollection of what passed. Apart from expressed opinions, to which I have every right to adhere, and a figure of speech, there is not one 'statement' in my letter which is not literally true Mr. Trollope dares to generalise, but not to specify.

By way of contrast I specify, item by item, flat contradictions to inaccuracies in his letter: 'Mr. Joyce' never mentioned 'stuff and nonsense.' The 6-5's page does not 'accurately' serve any purpose at all. It does not convey 'warnings regarding Standard Callings' (they are treated elsewhere, and it is headed 'Peals of Treble Bob'). There are not '262 methods' in the book. There is not 'a list' of the 6-5's (there are two, each distinct from the other). The errors on that page are more than the six given. The degree of necessity to 'warn against Northumberland' is not equal to that of Whitley (neals without 6-5's are possible in one and not the other). I did (peals without 6-5's are possible in one and not the other). I did not 'bring in' Mr. Turner's name (it has 'especial' reference in tho Preface, and is the only one there which bears no definite limit to

Two facts emerge from this unhappy correspondence, which receive emphasis in two sentences of Mr. Trollope's letter. He says, about the 6-5's: '... Had we known at the time ...' And about 'Mr. Joyce's proof': '... I know nothing about it....' The facts are these: The committee, like all other humans, are prone to err. And, in spite of Mr. W. G. Wilson's assertion, do not take kindly to criticism and outside assistance. criticism and outside assistance.

This committee has the responsibility of recommending the use of public money to finance publications for the general use of the Exerrise. I state, most emphatically, that the best and sufficient outside help, toward the compilation of these works, is not sought. Mr. Powell spoke of this at the Central Council meeting this year. Every Powell spoke of this at the Central Council meeting this year. Every time I have met Mr. Trollope, in years, I have made myself a nuisance to him in the matter of one remerkable man's unrivalled knowledge of the Minor in all its phases. Within a few hours after receiving the book, Mr. A. G. Driver warned me against the mistukes. Here are those I remember: The statement that the book contains all Alliance Methods which can be spliced with Little Methods is untrue. They can be spliced otherwise than as stated. Five false methods were included, and other true methods omitted. Two false extents. Two lists of methods producing 6-5s, one inaccurate and the other incomplete. These would never have creat in curate and the other incomplete. These would never have crept in had Mr. Driver seen the draft. I have told Mr. Trollope so. He has told you that the 6-5's list will stand, for reprint, in spite of its errors. This attitude toward the Exercise in general would, in myself, a non-member of the Council, be something more than 'impertinent '1

pertinent'!

I asked that the committee consider a system of proof, even if they turn it down. You are told that the book is written and no material alterations will be made. A Mr. W. G. Wilson is privileged to read the draft. I gauge this gentleman's capacity for constructive criticism by his description of the system's capabilities, viz.:

... any surprise method. .' (The emphasis is his.) Fancy a system capable of dealing only with one method. Fancy any system capable of dealing only with Surprise methods!

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## FOR BEGINNERS.

HUNTING DOWN.

When we inaugurated this column we asked beginners to let us When we inaugurated this column we asked beginners to let us know some of their difficulties, and we promised that, as far as we were able, we would help them. Very few beginners have taken advantage of this offer, so we suppose that beginners have no difficulties, or are too sly to write to us. We hope, however, that some at least have gained knowledge by these notes.

Here, however, is a letter, not from a beginner, but from a teacher, and it leads to a question which should interest all learners. The writer is the Rev. H. Drake. He says:—

Unfortunately, your article 'For Beginners' on 'Rope Sight' stopped just where I needed it most. All that you wrote is exactly what I do myself, and what I teach beginners to do.

Where the difficulty comes (and I think this does more to choke off promising beginners than anything) is in getting the necessary

Where the difficulty comes (and I think this does more to choke off promising beginners than anything) is in getting the necessary rope sight to start hunting down with six or more bells.

I am quite convinced that the soundest, best and quickest way of teaching both rope sight and good striking is by beginning with Minimus. With only three other bells to look for, the beginner can easily pick out the right ropes, and the right sounds. If it is not (a) the bell just dealt with, there are only two others, (b) and (c), that he has to look for, and it is not usually difficult to tell in an instant which of these two he wants.

There is no difficulty in going on from this to Grandsire Doubles, as if he counts the treble and the hell in the hunt, in his mind's eye, as one bell, the ringing is exactly the same as Plain Minimus.

WHERE THE DIFFICULTY BEGINS.

From this to Plain Doubles is a decided step, but not a difficult one. The difficulty comes in with Minor, and much more so with Triples and Major. It is easy to learn how to hunt up, but when

one. The difficulty comes in with Minor, and much more so with Triples and Major. It is easy to learn how to hunt up, but when he has rung his first blow behind, how is he to find out which bell he rings his second blow over? His next blow, and perhaps the next to that, will be even more suzzling, but by the time he gets to three blows from the lead, what he has learnt about counting his place in Doubles and Minimus will come to his aid. I find it quite beyond me to count myself, say seventh, in Major ringing, by seeing that six ropes have gone before me (though there is not the same difficulty on handbells). What I do, myself, is to keep note of the coursing order. of the coursing order.

It does not seem safe to allow a beginner to depend on what he may or may not have been able to see of the coursing order, and, besides, it makes it almost impossible to learn new methods. If you are only able with confidence to get up behind, in a new method, and begin to flounder as soon as you have to count your place down,

you cannot get very far.

Is there no good way of teaching beginners to get over this obstacle?

BEGIN ON FIVE BELLS.

This letter is a very fair statement of one of the difficulties which instructors have in teaching the elemental steps in change ringing to the beginner. Hunting down is by no means as simple as hunting up. As we explained in the article referred to, there is less time for the learner to pick out the bell he wants, and that bell is more obscure because it is, as it were, hidden by two other bells until the moment

when the beginner has to strike over it.

Those who read our article on 'rope sight' will, we think, have gathered that we realised the difficulties of the situation for the be-It is because of these difficulties that we believe it is best

ginner. It is because of these difficulties that we believe it is best to start the young ringer in changes on not more than five bells. We know there are some towers where the instructor does not hesitate to put a youngster straight on to Triples or Major, but, in our view, time is lost rather than gained by it.

It is far better, we think, to take the thing by easy stages—the easier the better. If a schoolmaster endeavours to teach a child how to solve some simple mathematical problem, he does not begin with a complicated example. He does not argue that if the child can do the complicated calculation, the simpler problems will be all the easier to him. In the same way it is a mistake to endeavour to put a beginner to ring on seven or eight bells on the ground that when he has mastered this, ringing on five and six hells will be easy for him. We are convinced that the way to teach a beginner to find his way in hunting down is to keep him on five, or certainly not more than six, bells until he has thoroughly grasped it. Patience expended at this stage will be well repaid.

this stage will be well repaid.

While, unquestionably, it is too much to ask the majority of learners to try to remember coursing order, it ought not to be long before the beginner can be expected to remember in each lead the bell that

the beginner can be expected to remember in each lead the bell that takes him off at lead, and the bell he turns from behind.

If he knows the former, he knows which to look for when he begins to hunt down; if he knows the latter, he knows which to lead after, and it serves as some sort of guide as he hunts to lead.

If he knows these two bells, he has only two others to look for in Doubles. In Minor there are three others to look for, but, knowing the first that he wants and knowing also that the next caunot be his source that he is also as of which to all of the what he trivial is below. course bell, his choice of which to pull after when he strikes his blow in 5th's is simplified, because the two others are, by comparison, more or less out of reach.

The funeral took place on September 17th, the Rev. E. Powell (assistant curate) officiating. The tower was represented by Messrs. E. Lathall. H. C. Beard, J. Clare, and F. C. Tomkius, a former member of the band. Among the floral tributes were those from the tower, North Bucks Branch, sidesmen and Parochial Church Council, and clergy and churchwardens.

The ring of eight bells, tenor 15 cwt., of Melbourne Church, Derbyshire, is to be rehung and restored at the expense of citizens of Melbourne, Australia. This is parallel to the restoration of Boston (Stump' bells, which was paid for by the citizens of Boston, Mass. Melbourne Church is one of the most perfect examples of Norman architecture which have been handed down to us, and is one of the

rare examples in which the ringers stand on the church floor to ring, under the central tower, some of the ringers having to stand in the choir stalls for the purpose. There is a great draught of rope from the church floor to the first floor, and there are two sets of salley guides to steady the ropes.

The work is being carried out by John Taylor and Co.

## A CORNISH RESTORATION,

Whilst the procession returned to the chancel a few rounds were rung by the local company.
