## THE NEXT COUNCIL.

The time is rapidly approaching when ringing organisations throughout the country, if they have not already done so, will have to choose representatives for the Central Council, which begins its new triennial period next year, and under which the new rules, adopted two years ago, come into full operation. For many of the affiliated societies there will be no change in the existing arrangements; they have all along been entitled to elect the maximum number of four members and have always done so; but for some of the rest a review of their position will be necessary. The new rules more closely define the basis of affiliation, notably for territorial and diocesan associations that their representation shall be based upon the actual number of annual subscribing honorary and ringing members and resident life members, and affiliation fees have to be paid upon this basis whether the full number of representatives is elected or not. There are some societies very near the numerical border lines which determine the amount of representation to which they are entitled, and a count of heads may be necessary before they can settle the number of Council members they are entitled to elect. In some cases they may have qualified for increased representation; in others it may happen that figures will show they are not entitled to as many representatives as they have hitherto elected.
In the past, in an endeavour to secure the representation of all societies, there have been just a few cases in which representation has been given to organisations which strictly, perhaps, were not entitled to elect a member; but, be that as it may, the representation for the future is plainly laid down. A society must have at least 75 members, as previously specified, before it can find a place on the Council; 450 members before it can have two representatives ; 300 before it is entitled to three; and 450 before it can send four members. This may affect some of the smaller organisations, and we are calling attention to the new requirements at this early stage so that the committees and officials may be reminded of the new position and not find themselves up against any unexpected position when they come to elect, or have elected, representatives to the Council. It is going to be a little difficult, perhaps, for some societies to know exactly where they stand. There is an association, for instance, with a territorial name, which charges one sum on admission and no annual subscription. In such a case it is going to be somewhat troublesome to arrive at the qualifying strength, for losses from death and removals from the area must, in the course of years, have complicated things not a little. ## CABLING THE BEJALS ROUND.

It is a very useful thing to know how to enll Inells ranad, particularly if they lave golts wroug in it iouch or it is Lonud meessury for auy reason to shorten it.

If you are siaging th tonch of Grandsinc Triples, fin whela 6.7 are kept logether, that is, in then proper conrsug order, its fa tho many tomeles whiclt we have death with recently, there ate various ways in whicl the bells can be got hoane witheut mach frouble.
One way is to get the that into the hant at the eariest moment, aud eall it out we lead after the 6 llo comen lefure. If it doesn't bring up rounds, the 6th In and Ont cither once, or twice, will pat the bells in the plait course.
Or, get the 5 th into comsiug onder after the 7 thi. It athere is ane bell between the 7th and 5th, call the 5 thi Before, then, if the 2ad is not in the lamf, call the lince belis, 5.6.7, at Fome, until rounds is reached. If the and is in the lant, of course, the bells, with 5.6.7 at Home, must come round, unless there has been a ghift course. If the Jrd is is the lunt, the 7th called In and Out will put the bells into the plain course; if the 4 th is in the lunt, a hob witla the 7 th at 'Hone' will bring them round.
We speak of "putting the bells into the plais course," hecause there may be a Iead ta run after the last boh before the hells come round.
If you want to bring the bells round when 6 and 7 are not in conrsing order, the usual thing to do is to get them there as soon as possible. If their coursing order is 6.7 with one bell between them and there is time to du it, wall tho Tht Before, ollerwise exll ilie first one available into the hunt. Then, if the 7 th is in the hunt, call the 6th Before, or if the 6eh is in the lumt, call a bob whe lead after the 7th has been Before. You then proceed to 'collect ' ille other bells as described above.

Or you can begin the other way, and if you have 6 coursing 4, get the 7th into posilion by treating it as the 5th is treated above; or if the 5th is coursing 7, bring the 6ilh into p-nsitien as the 4th is, in the earlier parasraph. A little study with peneil antil fraper will help the beginmer a lot, and he wili pick up anary himis from this, as well as from practice in the tower.
But before wo leave the subject, we must say somelhimg about the Elemative way of bringing belis round, anmely, at haudstroke, whicly sometimes ean be quicker done than gefting them round at backstroke. The bells come round at backstroke if the 2 nd is in the buut and the other belis are coursing in the cycle 4.6.7.5.5. The betls come ronnd ad hand if the 3rd is in the lnum and the other bells are in the: reverse coursing cycle of 5.7.6.4.2. Now this cycle cannot be ohtained unless the bels ire out-of-course, and in order to put them out-ofcourse, either yun must have had an ond mumer of singles of two bells must have ' clanged course
In order to get the bells rourd you do it on the plan explained above by treatily 6 for 7 and 7 for 6,5 for 4 and 4 for 5 . If you want deliberately to bring them round at hand when they are 'incourse, call a single wibh 6.7 on the front, sending the 7th into the hout, and out next lead with a bob. If 4.6 are coursing, you can, if rou like, turn this pair over insleat. Then you must put the 7 th in front of the 6th 1 by calling it 'In,' and 'Ont' after the 6ih Jlas come Beforc.
Just one thing to be on your guard against. Do not ain at getting the bells round at hand with a bois. If you do, you will find yau have rung at least the first lead of rour tonch over again, but beckwards. You want to produce the lead-end 357264, either plain orhobbed, and come into rounds the next fiume the treble gets down to lead.
Here are one or two short fouches, revewing 6.7 aud coming round at hand-the change immediately before 325476 :-

## STOURBRIDGE BELL RESTORATION. <br> ANONYMOUS DONOR'S GENEROUS GIFT.

By the generosity of an anonymous dowor, as a thankoffering for the first 25 years of the King's beveficent reigrn, the bells of Swourbridge larislı Clurch have beon restored by Massrs, 'Paylor atud Co. who recast four of them and have reluag the whole eight. Ithe betls werg origiually east in 1759 by Lester and Pack, and tho eeventh recast in 1901. The restoration now carried out lisa effected t erreat inprovement. Alerations liave becn also made to the louve windows of the tower to moderate the sound in the vicinity of the church and to give the bells greater carrying power. The tenor is about 19 owt .

The tolls were rededicated at a largely attended service, the Arobdeacon of Dudley (the Ven. A. 1'. Shepherd) performing the ceremony. He gave a striking address, in the course of which be snid thre it rimger bad to be perfeet in his work, und mat let down ollher tingers or the whole tean. Fe needed obedichee, and must be an man who was patient and would take fime to learn, and that was why in these times of attractions and amugements it was difficult to find men who were prepared to spend the timo or undertake the disciplino required. There bad to be discipline, fund a mas bad to be unselins/ı and geod tempered; in other words, he had to be well tuned. The spenker referred ta the appropriateness of the redediention of tha volls on the day before they hegan the dedication festival of that church, sud added that the 'metal' of our characters in life must be flawless as in the case of i he metal of bells, and that we matust let God run us in Fis mould, to shape us. Ous inupulse must come from within, and it was througl the infuence of God that we were hramsformonl, shaped and moulded, and made to sound to His glory und His service.
After the monbere of the local band lad rung the bells, visiting ringers tried them and were very gratilied with the improvemeni effected. Aiterwards the clergy, ringers, members of the choir and others had tea in the Chureli Hall. Amony those present were the Vicar, the Revs. R. C. Rarrett and E. G. Klee, Messra. A. W. Furr aud W. A. Howne (warden), ©. W. Cooper (secretary of tlie ringers), A. l.. Whatmore (leader). J. T. Fider (representing Messus. Joha Thylor and Co.). Mr. F. Musuls and others.
The Vicar said they were slelighted to sce the visitors, riugers and the representative of Messis. Taylor and Cas, and he would like to oxpress gratituate 10 the firm low the way in whinh they had done their work so expedidiously and satisfactorily (applause). They were hicre than gratefnl to the generons ananymons friend who hat horme the whole cost (applanse). They owed a great debt to some of the ringers, who had put in hours of work in the belfry in the improvements which had heen made, and he knew it had been a fahour of lore. It had savod a lot of money. IIe thonght. thate thas pinging chumber would compare with nuy in the diocese, indeed in lingland, and that was laryely wring to we care and dovoted labouts of some of the ringers.

## MODIFICATJOS OT SOUND.

Mr. Pidler, who was invited ta speak, thanked the Vicar for the words of rppreciation, and satid the sound of the bells fith the churchyard had been wodified, and to hear the full beaty of the bells one had to get a mile away. "The modilication of solnd near to the churcla would cnt away the riound for complaint by some people. The Stourbrigge mingers secmed to act 1 wether as a tean jn the way spoken of by the Avchdeacom, anri such team spirit was fairls typical of ringers

Mr. H. Hason (Harluy) spoke of his interest in the scheme for tho restoration of tha bells, and of the pratitude that must be felt by the generous gift of the cost. Hr said he whe sure that the ribsers were pleased widr the somut of hut lells, and he lad lieard them that afternoons from a good many nurles. Stourbritare was fortunate in the food worte which tat been dine, ant he was sure all woult be per fertly satjisfied. In conclusion, he leferred to lis ringing asperrence of over 50 years.
Mr. Cooper thanked the V'iear and Miss Newland for the provision of the lea, nthl the Vicar thanked the laties who lad prepared
arr'. Farley said the heauty of the bells eould not be heard in the ringing elantion so well as previously, and Mb. Fidler, in reply, said Ho thought thate lessening of sound would he an adwantage wher the ringerts pal used to it. ass they would he less distracted and would he ahle to follow the sound of their own boll better. If thonght necessing later on, a tabe could be faxad to bring move soumd from the hell clanifur the ringing chamber.

Mr. A. T. Skelding pointed out that the shance of the bells, whring tho time that they had bern away for restoration, must have lyem noticed, when pogjly realised that the clock quarterg and foomes land not been sonnded, in the absence of the bells on which they werv situck. Ho was surce their old friend Hr. Pagett would have bera delimhterd to see the renovation of the bells. In conclusion, he expressed salisfaction with the work of Messres. Taylor nand wishted the ringers success in their service.

## ‘ LEGENDS O’ THE BELLS

A NEW BOOK ON BFLY SUPERSTIMIONS AND CUSIOMS.
Mr. Ernest Morris, [C.R.Hist.S., of Leicester, hou. secretary of the Midund Counties Association, has made another valuable contribution to the bibliograpliy of bells. There lias been publishod this week by Messrs. Sampson Low, Marston and Co., 'Legends o' the Bells,' Which Mr. Morris has writen, aud it covers a gay in the story of bells and ringing which was left after the publication of flose two other volumes, "Bells Throughs the Ages,' by Mr. J. R. Nieholls, of Stamford, and Mr, Morris' 'History and Arts of Clange Ringing.

The legends comedbed with bells are imumerable and of great Fariety, sud Mr. Morris las brought together in lis buek a singularly interesting collection, which admirably illustrates the strange superstitions attached to bells and the even stranger supermatural powers credited to them in almost every pant of the world. Few of the jegends find credence in these days, but there are apparentir still to be found in the world peopie with beliefs in the witchery of hells.
As most rimers know, bells have bad many uses, quaint and peculiar, in addition to the main purpose for which they are rums in Christian churches, namely, the calling of people to worship, or as a reminder that a service is in progress. Many of these uses are purely local castoms, which lave had their origin deep in the past, and Mr . Morris, in his book, quotes legends, traditions and, often, more authenticated stories, which shed much light on the quaine ringing custome, not only in this conntry, but in forcigu lands as well. He hes obriously been al great pains to coltect his muterial, and he has given it to the public in an interesting style.
From very earliest times, as Mr. Morris points out, much superstitious foelingr hung wround bells, and many pretty and curious legends are known respecting tilem. A number of them points to their power of punishing wrongdoers; many of the legends al'e connected with water ; others speak of their power of driving away evil epirits, thunder amd lightning; while others tell of their ringing unaided in tines of gyeat disaster or repoicings.
Of their power of driving wway ovil spirits, for example, Wr. Morris quotes from Latimer, who, jir the days of the Reformation, exposed it as 'foolery.' 'If ' whe looy bells,' he wrote, 'would serve against the dovil, or that he might be put away by their sound, no doubt we Fould soon banish him out of all Jingland ; far I think that if all the bells in England should be rung together at a certain hour, there Fould be almost no place but some bells might be lacard there, and so the devil should have no abiding place in England.' Showing, at muy rate, 如at even in those far of days England was well supplied with church bells.
Mr. Morris Las done his work well and adequately, and he has given us a book which will be of interest not only to riugers, but to the general public. The publisluers, troo, have issued it it it very tastefully got up manuer. Its price is I5s.
Thers are a number of artisticaly produced illustrations, among those who have contributed pictures being Messrs. J. Thylor and Co., Messrs, Mears and Stainbank and Mr. F. E. Dawe.
