BOURNEMOUTH

There are a number of notable events in the bell-ringers' calendar. Such reunions that take place at the Central Council meeting, the Henry Johnson commemoration dinner and the annual assembly of the Ancient Society of College Youths play a significant part in promoting that fellowship which is a characteristic of the ringing fraternity. Bournemouth ringers have ambitions; they plan to introduce as an annual event the Bournemouth Rally. The first gathering last Saturday was very enjoyable and attracted a company of 126, visitors coming from as far afield as the Midlands and South Wales. The date was not happily chosen; the Basingstoke District was holding its annual meeting the same day, and there were other annual events which drew many of the would-be patrons elsewhere.

In their initial effort Mr. Arthur V. Davis and those associated with him secured a full measure of co-operation from the Church and the civic authority. The Archdeacon of Winchester, who is shortly to be installed as Dean of Hereford, is a great friend of ringers. Before receiving archidiaconal dignity he was Vicar of St. Peter's, Bournemouth, and proved to be a stout champion of the right of the Church to use its bells. He brought to the Bournemouth rally that friendly intimacy that spelt success for the gathering and proved an ideal chairman. Other clergy were present and were equally co-operative, and there is no question that such a gathering will receive the blessing of the Church.

An ex-Mayor and Rotary president gave the civic welcome. The cultivation of an understanding between ringers and those entrusted with local government is an avenue which should not be neglected. In many of our ancient boroughs on Mayor's Sunday there is special ringing, and it is well that those in charge of civic arrangements should be informed of the fact; so much is taken for granted, that civic officials at times need to be educated as to the true place bells occupy in expressing the sentiments of the people. At Bournemouth the ringers have friends in high places—public men who are prepared to speak in defence of bells and ringing, and with such friendship a festival, particularly if its date does not clash with the main season, is welcomed.

A dinner is not the only attraction to spell success for such a festival. Ringing facilities must be adequate to cope with the influx of visitors. Apart from the 12 bells at Christchurch Priory, where Mr. G. Preston has nearly completed sixty years as a ringer, there is a ten and two eights in Bournemouth, while the surrounding countryside offers other opportunities. The stage seems admirably set for including Bournemouth in the ringers' calendar, and if the organising committee choose their dates carefully the 126 who supported the first gathering will increase materially. Bournemouth has, in addition to its ringing, other charms which have placed it in the forefront of English watering places. The visitor is always welcome, whether in town or belfry, and with such a friendly atmosphere ringers from all over the country will be associating Bournemouth in their holiday plans. 'The Ringing World' has no desire to praise one holiday resort in preference to another, but naturally commends those towns which find a special niche in their plans of welcome for the Church bellringer.

BOURNEMOUTH RALLY AND DINNER

CHURCH AND CIVIC AUTHORITY'S DEFENCE OF RINGING VETERAN MASTER TELLS OF PROGRESS ... A PERMANENT FIXTURE IN THE RINGERS' CALENDAR

Bournemouth ringers and their friends started last Saturday what they hope will be a permanent feature in the calendar of the Exercise—the Bournemouth rally and dinner. Both the Church and the civic authorities combined in their welcome, and despite the wintry aspect, so exceptional for Bournemouth, the

festival proved most enjoyable.

The Archdeacon of Winchester (the Ven. The Archdeacon of Winchester (the Ven. Hedley R. Burrows) presided at the dinner, held in St. Peters Hall, which was attended by a company of 126. Supporting him were Ald. Harry C. Brown, former Mayor of Bournemouth; Mr. George Williams, Master of the Winchester Guild; Mr. F. W. Rogers, secretary of the Winchester Guild; Mr. A. F. Martin Stewart, past master, Salisbury Guild; the Rev. R. P. Price, Vicar of Christ Church; and Mr. Arthur V. Davis, who was hon. secretary to the organising committee, Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Marsnallsay.

Informality was a keynote in the proceedings. After the chairman had proposed the loyal toast, in which he referred to the great adventure of the Royal Family in their journey to South Africa, he expressed the sincerc regret of the Bishop of Winchester at his inability to be present owing to pressure of other duties. He had a word of special greeting to Mr. George Williams, who he said had made a life study of their art and had given wonderful and devoted service to

the craft of bellringing.

The Archdeacon commented upon the frequency with which he heard the words 'surprise,' 'amazed,' 'horrified' and 'disgusted' used, and he admitted that he had heard all these expressions used in connection with bell-

During the war years the Archdeacon was at St. Peter's, Bournemouth, and he recalled when war broke out ringing continued for a time. Some people wrote to him and said they were 'surprised' that the bells were still being rung. Quite a number of people said a little later they were 'amazed' ca they thought the bells might attract the bombs, and then from time to time he used to have anonymous rings on the telephone and voices would declare that they were 'horrified,' aud occasionally the expression went so far as being 'disgusted.'

He always thought that the members of the bellringers' guilds had two objects in view. One was not to disappoint the Rector and the other was not to annoy the neighbours. Those two principles they must keep firmly in mind two principles they must keep firmly in mind the whole time. As he looked back on his past experiences he could honestly say that some of his happiest times had been with bellringers—when as a curate learning to ring rounds at Petersfield and his friendships afterwards. Bellringers had never disappointed him and as for as anyoning their neighbours. him, and as far as annoying their neighbours—well, he had always been prepared to deal with them! (laughter).

THREE POINTS FOR RINGERS.

There were three things which he thought ringers should bear in mind and which he thought expressed the truth about their craft. When he visited Hereford recently the verger described the Cathedral 'as very reticent.' He knew what he meant; one did not see it all at first glance. The craft of ringing was very reticent; there was a mystery about it; no one had really mastered it without ob-serving the principle of restraint. The second was that it was a great fellowshin, and lastly it was the ante-chamber to the throne room of worshin. The bells summoned the recolle to church—how hard a task it was in these days! This rally was intended to sustain and stimu-

late the mysteries of their art to strengthen the fellowship among ringers and to make them aware and determined that as they prepared the people for worship they took part in that worship themselves. From the chair pared the people to worship they in that worship themselves. From the chair he thanked Arthur Davis for his courage, vision and enthusiasm in arranging the rally. He expressed his belief that the ringing guilds

in this country were going under God to play a great part in the conversion of England. Ald. Harry C. Brown, past Mayor and president of the Rotary C. ub, spoke with gratitude of how he heard St. Peter's bella in September, 1917, after being bombed on the East Coast. For 20 years he lived almost opposite the church and he loved the bells. On many occa gions people had said to him, 'I do wish those bells would not ring.' He had politely quarrelled with the complainants and rejoined, 'If you are so neurotic that you can't stick a beautiful peal of bel's for one week, I don't think I want you as a visitor and I don't think Bournemouth wants you.' These bells signified something they could not give, and he paid that tribute to the bellringers of St. Peter's.

STARTED CHANGE RINGING IN 1880. Next to greet the assembly was Mr. George Williams, who in a reminiscent vein recalled that he had been ringing since 12 years of age, but he did not start change ringing until 1880. When he started ringing in earnest one had to scarify the diocese to get a band for Grandsire Triples; now they could get a band from any one tower. That was 60 years ago and before the Guild was founded in 1879. He congratulated Mr. Davis on his work.

Mr. T. W. White brought to the rally the good wishes of the Central Council. In a reference to 'The Ringing World.' he mentioned that they had had 700 new subscribers since the allocation of additional paper, and they could take another 600 under present arrangements. The vigour of the Exercise was most encouraging, particularly the influx of youth. The large number of voung ringers was not to be found merely at Bourmemouth, but practically every guild could report similar progress.

Mr. A. F. Martin Stewart referred to the continuous support to bellringing which had

been forthcoming from the chairman, particularly when he was Vicar of St. Peter's. He thanked the incumbents for the use of bells

for the rally.

In a word of welcome to the visitors, Mr. Martin Stewart mentioned that the following Martin Stewart mentioned that the following Guilds were represented St. Martin's Bristol, the Worcestershire and Districts, the Llandaff and Monmouth, the Bath and We'ls, Sussex County, Salishury, Hereford, Middlesex, Oxford, and Guildford. He voiced the congratulations of the assembly to Mr. Preston, of Christ Church Priory, who in March will celebrate 60 years as a service river.

brate 60 years as a service ringer.

The Rev. R. T. Price assured the company that no thanks were due to the incumbents; it was the incumbents who should thank the ringers for carrying the voice of the Church over the trees and fields of England. At Christchurch he did not find that the people were amazed, horrified or disgusted by the

bells.

Mr. Bell (churchwarden of St. Peter's) expressed appreciation of the splendid band at St. Peter's, ably led by Mr Davis. It was encouraging to see so many young people carrying on the tradition.

FUTURE PLANS. The Chairman called on Mr. Arthur Davis for a speech, and he modestly declared that he was not the only one who had been working for the success of the raily. In regard to the training of ringers, theirs was not the only tower in Bournemouth; much hard work

was done at St. John's and other local towers. Bournemouth was well provided with rings of bells, with a twelve, a ten, two eights, and a ten at Wimborne. As to future rallies, they hoped to arrange for them in April and looked

forward to we coming those present in 1948.

Dear Sir,-I was not surprised to read the letter from Richard Post supporting the view that to him bells are in no way connected with religious services, and the fact that they are housed in church towers and not secular

places is merely a coincidence.

I came into contact with many such ringers during my 'tours' of the country in H.M.
Forces, ringers who proudly support scores
of peals behind their names in their respective ringing reports and yet fail to recognise the fact that the Church provides the bells at great expense for their selfish pleasure.

I grew accustomed to the looks of surprise from the resident ringers when I asked my way from the resident ringers when I asked my way into the church from the belfry, and only once can I remember one of a local hand taking part in the service with me. The fault, I believe, lies with the c'ergy for failing to demand that ringers, the same as any other church workers, should be regular worshippers. The answer, of course, is. 'Very few bells would be rung' if this condition was imposed. Who would be the losers? In my own tower four members are choirmen and the remembers. four members are choirmen and the remainder, who include the parish clerk and a sidesman, occupy regularly the ringers' pew.

It has been said many times that peals assist in the development of the art of cam-

panology. But how does campanology further the work of the Church if its members do not belong to it? That is the only question that matters, and in the light of that question all the glorious peals—record or otherwise—are hollow and worthless unless they serve the purpose of holding together in the Church's work men willing to devote their time and knowledge for the good of the Church and not for themselves alone.
