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## READING'S BELLS

From the recently published Part X. of 'The Church Bells of Berkshire,' by Mr. Frederick Sharpe, can be pieced together the romance of 'Harry ' or 'Kelsall,' the tenor of the ring of 12 at St. Laurence's, Reading. For five centuries no expense has been spared either to keep these bells in ringing order or to make alterations to the ring in accordance with the fashion of the time.

While it is known that there were three bells in this church in 1433, 'Harry' was consecrated in 1499. The first recasting was in 1567, but its weight was such that additional metal was required for the bells. In 1579 a ring of five was provided, the fourth and tenor being recast, the latter bell having a weight of 34 cwt .1 qr .

The bells of St. Laurence's were frequently cracking, caused through 'clocking' (tying a rope to the clapper and pulling the latter against the side of the bell), so much so that the following resolution was adopted at the vestry meeting of 1593: 'Whereas there was through the slothfulness of the Sextine in times paft, a kind of toling ye bell by ye clapper rope: yt was now fforbedden and taken awaye : \& that the bell should be toled: as in tymes paft: and not in anie fuch Idle forte.' 'Kelsall' was recast by Joseph Carter, the celebrated bell founder, who was then churchwarden in 1594-5. In 1646, Joseph Carter's 'lowd' tenor became cracked, whether or not on this occasion through the slothfulness of the sexton, we are not told, and was recast in the following year.

An important step forward was the decision of the Vestry in 1662 to recast the five bells into eight tuneable bells, using the same metal. The two largest bells were again cracked in 1703, and eventually recast, and it was on these bells that the first recorded peal in Berkshire was rung-Grandsire Triples in 1734. A ring of ten was introduced in 1748 by recasting the eight and adding two lighter bells. The tenor by now had been reduced in weight to 23 cwt .; four of these bells are in the present ring of 12.

History of these famous bells in modern times tells of how the Rev. C. Kerry in 1881 found them in a deplorable condition and that they had not been rung for several years. Three of the bells, including the tenor, were recast and the dedication and reopening ceremony was on February 21st, 1882. The augmentation to 12 was as recent as 1929, when the ring underwent a thorough restoration. It was through the enthusiasm of the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn and-Mr. R. T. Hibbert that
the $£ 180$ was collected for the two new bells within the space of two months, and Mr. R. T. Hibbert conducted the first twelve-bell peal in Berkshire on April 21st, 1930. Has any tenor been recast more times in the history of bellringing?

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## N.E. YORKSHIRE AND S. DURHAM TOUR

A week's ringing tour in N.E. Yorkshire and South Durham, which concluded on Sept. 6 th, produce 10 peas out of 14 attempts. One taiiure was due to a rope silpping the wheel at Northallerton, and the other three losses could be put down to physical strain due to lack of reserves. Ten ringers accepted Mr. J. E. Cawser's invitation to take purt in this tour, but il was regretted that Mr. W. L. Critchley, of Duncaster, couid only be present part time, thus a heavy strain was put upon the remaining nine ringers.
The party met at Thirsk at $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. on Satus day, August 30th and commenced by scoring a good peal of Yorkshire Major on the oid belis there, most of which were cast in the 15 th century.

After lunch a move was made by road to Northallerton, where an attempt for London was made. It soon became obvious that the band had to be fully awake to the job they had in hand; for not only were there one or two bad going bells here, but the 5th had a tendency to slip wheel occasionally even though rung with a tight rope, and once the treble ringer had to retrieve his rope from off the top of the clock case behind him. Despite these sdverse conditions, a good beat was maintained, but with the end well in sight after $2 \frac{1}{2}$ hours' ringing, the 5 th rope slipped again and the bell set at back-stroke. This put an end to what may have been considered the best performance of the tour. After a very fine tea at a nearby cafe, the party moved on to Middiesbrough, where they made their head quarters for the following three days at the Corporation Hotel.
On Sunday morning the party was cordially welcomed in the tower of St. Hilda's, Middles brough, by the Vicar and local ringers. After a course of Bristol, a touch of Stedman Triples was rung with two of the local band standing in. In the afternoon the party went to Ormesby, some three miles out of town, and scored a good peal of London on the delightfu? Tayior eight there. A good touch of Stedman was then rung for Evensong with the local towerkeeper standing in.

Monday proved the most strenuous day of the week, for peals of Bristol and London were brought round on two heavy rings of of Bristo! was rung, three of the party put in a good hour's work on the ropes before the peal could be attempted. Eventually a start was made only to come to grief after 40 minutes owing to a change course, but the band seemed so determined to score a peal on this fine eight that a fresh start was promptly made and a good peal was brought round in 3 hours and 36 minutes.

At Saltburn the party were cordially greeted by the Vicar, even though they were then two hours behind their scheduled time. This very fine eight, although a littie too noisy in the ringing chamber, were soon set going to London, but a fresh start had to be made after two courses owing to the tenor rope breaking beneath the sally. This was soon remedied by our ex-R.N. friend, who proved that his ser vices in the Navy had not been entirely wasted. It was perhaps fortunate that Mr. J. C. E Simpson had been asked to call this peal, for no other voice present could have penetrated the noise of these bells, but at least he did have the satisfaction of silencing his critics by ca!ling a peal of London from a working bell

Tuesday morning found a rather tired band attempting a peal of Pudsey Major at Middlesbrough. After two or three false starts the party adjourned for lunch and made a fresh start at 1 p.m. After a short interview with the local Press, when a couple of photographs of the part were taken, \& start was made and eventually a peal was brought round. In the evening a peal of Lomdon was lost at Thornaby owing to a change course.

On Wednesday morning an early start was made for West Hertlepool, where the band
had the satisfaction of scoring a peal of Yorkshire Royal, being the first peal in the method by all the band except the conductor. In most cases it was the first touch in the method. An attempt for London in the afternoon was lost at St. Aiden's. West Hartlepool, a light but musical eight, after an hour's ringing. It was at this point where it became nuticeable that the strain due to lack of reserves was telling its tale. There were many very sore hands which called for careful treatment, such as yards of Elastoplast and handkerchiefs woven into the rope ends.

The Imperial Hotel, Darlington, was chosen as our headquarters for the remaining three days of the tour, and the party duly moved in on Wednesday evening. The next day found the ringers at Sheldon, where they did not find any difficulty in obtaining a beat on this pleasant ring of eight, temor 16 cwt , by Taylors. Here a good peal of Bristol was scored, but once again the afternoon attempt failed. this time Norfolk at Bishop Auckland after an hour. Even after three losses in three days the band still considered they were equal to Spliced Surprise. This they rang in masterly style on the old ring of eight at Richmond, the writer having the pieasure of listening to every blow. Again it fell to Mr Simpson's lot to call A. J. Pitman's most recent and difficult composition for the third time within two months, no other composit:on being available at the time. This proved a particularly pleasing performance, for three members of the band earned 'stars' for their first peal of Spliced Surprise.

At this juncture Mr. Simpson had to leave for home, which left the band seven strong, Mr. J. L. Millhouse also having left for a prior appointment. This gave the remaining party the opportunity to assist Miss Kilingiey, of Richmond, to score her first peal at first attempt-Bob Major-at Catterick, ably conducted by Mr. Leonard Trevor
To wind up the tour a peal of Norfolk was decided upon at St. Cuthbert's, Darlington This was successful on this fine new ring of eight by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, 1937 , G. F. Newton for standing in at short notice.

Sincere thanks are extended to the many ringers who met. and welcomed the visiting ringers at the various towers also the clergg and towerkeepers for placing the bells at their disposal. In particular most sincere thanks are extended to Mr. Addison, of Middlesbrough, for the Yorkshire arrangements, and to Mr W. N. Park for the Durham arrangements The touring band wish to accord Mr. J. F Cawser their most sincere thanks for the arrangements he made for their help and comfurt during the whole week. He organised everything to the last detail, and they feel that they ought not really to have lost those three peals, as he left them nothing to do bu

It is useless for anyone to deny that the placemaking is not the same on 8,10 and 12 bells so far as the first ten changes are concerned, and if we want to make a double method of the Royal, all we have to do is to reverse the place-making of the first ten changes as shown, and the Maximus then follows naturally.

In Bristol Surprise Major the bells are in proper coursing order in front and behind, and ther are also in Roval and Maximus.

Mr. Bramble's so-called extension to Roya? does not conform to that rule.

## WHITLEY BAY 'OPEN DAY'

More than 60 people attended an open day' at St. Paul's, Whitley Bay, Northumberland, on September 20th, visiting the belfry and seeing something of the art of change ringing.

## BEOLEY BELLS TO BE REHUNG

Nir.-Readers of 'The Ringing World ' may be interested to know that the 14th century tower of Beoley Parish Church, which has been unsafe for a considerable period, is to be repaired, and at the same time the bells are to be rehung in a modern cast-iron frame by Messrs. Gi'lett and Johnston. The ring consists of six bells and was broadcast at Christmas 1943.
The details are as follows: No. 1, founded by R. Sanders, 1708 ; No. 2, H. O'dfield, in 1622 (this is the only Oldfie'd bell left in Worcestershire); No. 3, R. Sanders, 1709; No. 4, Newcombe. 1611: No. 5, Rudhall, 1789 ; No. 6, Nugh Watts. 1601
The church is famous for its association with the illustrious family of Sheldon, who introduced the art of tapestry weaving into England in the 16 th century. Many of this family are buried in the ahurch, and their names are on three of the belis.
The work of rehanging the bells and reparring the tower witt cost $£ 1.450$, and we are advised to aim at raising a further $£ 150$ as a contingency sum.

This parish of 770 people has raised $£ 1.400$ in $n$ vear. and the Appeal Committee now hope that lovers of the art of bellringing may feel disposed to help us. Mr. W. Jackson, Keswick, Birmingham Road, Bordeslev. Redditch. is the treasurer of the Appeal Fund. Yours sincerely,
