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
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

Our attention has been drawn to an historical error in a recent issue. The Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria's accession to the Throne was in 1887.- Mr. C. H. Webb, of Coventry, recalls attending a village feast on that day.

Kipling's 'it's best foot first' is recalled by the experience of two members of the Salisbury Guild, who attended the meeting at Wimborne and missed the last bus for Salisbury at Cranborne. They decided to walk the remaining 18 miles, setting out at 9.40 p.m. and arriving at Salisbury at 3.35 a.m., weary, languid and sore distressed. The recently relung ring of six bells at Terringion St. John, Norfolk, was dedicated on November 29th by Canon Mowbray Smith, the address being given by the Rev. J. P. Pelloe, Vicar of Wisbech, a well-known ringer. Previously the bells were hung in a very slight and cramped oak frame, with the treble 'hoisted,' the frame being badly decayed. Owing to their high position, they set up a very heavy movement in the tall slender tower which affected the 'go' to a large extent. They are now lung in a massive iron frame in two tiers of three, the base of the frame being some 14 feet lower in the tower. Hung on ball bearings with completely new fittings, the bells now 'go' as well as one could wish, and the movement in the tower is greatly reduced. reduced.

The bells, which were originally cast by Thomas Osborn, of Downham Market, have been retuned, and the treble and fifth recast, making a very satisfactory job indeed. The work has been carried out by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, who were represented at the dedication by Mr. A. A. Hughes.

DOWNHAM BELLS

A moving ceremony took place at St. Margaret's Church, Downham, Essex, on November 22nd.

The Bishop of Chelmsford dedicated the new ring of six bells. The old four bells in this tower have been recast and a new tenor and treble added, and the ring hung in a new frame with new fittings by Messrs. 
