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MEMORIES OF 1947

WITH all the grandeur and solemnity of half-muffled ringing we in Guildford heard the passing of 1947 last Wednesday night. To many 1947 will be remembered as the year of calamity, with blizzard and flood at home and the world's economic position disturbed to such an extent that 'men's hearts sank within them.' Unprecedented almost describes the position; even 'The Ringing World' had its sequence of publication broken, and for three weeks the Government forbade publication.

When the background is most unpromising, history has repeatedly a story of advancement to tell. Bells and ringing have more than held their own in public esteem, and the bell-founding firms have been working to capacity. Important installations have been those of Wakefield and Lichfield Cathedrals in this country and Adelaide in Australia. Peal ringing has been on the increase, and there have been some outstanding performances. Record lengths of Bob Royal (9,000) and London Surprise (14,112) have been established, and the peal of Minor of 105 methods in hand was another achievement worthy of congratulation. To those who find their delight in five-bell ringing, the peal in 25 methods of Doubles at Old Marston reached a new pinnacle.

The social side of the Exercise has not been forgotten. Festivals at Bournemouth and Leicester brought together enthusiasts from all parts of the country. The Society of Royal Cumberland Youths celebrated their bi-centenary in a fitting manner, and there were the usual fixtures in the ringers' calendar of the Henry Johnson commemoration dinner, the Central Council (at Exeter) and the 310th anniversary of the Ancient Society of College Youths. Two jubilees were also held—the Middlesex Association, which after 50 years had nine original members still with them, and the Chester Guild, now 60 years old, who met at Macclesfield.

And 1947 also left gaps within our ranks. There were two with a long association with Surfleet in Mr. Rupert Richardson and the Rev. E. Banks James. As historian, writer and an expert in method construction, Mr. J. Armiger Trollope held a unique position among bell-ringers and justified his selection to be the second editor of this journal. Frequently taking the opposite viewpoint to Mr. Trollope was the Rev. E. S. Powell, whose 'Ringers' Handbook' holds a special place in the instructional literature of bellringing. Another honoured name in the Exercise was Mr. E. Denison Taylor, the head of the well-known Loughborough firm. In that select circle of those who had rung 1,000 peals was Mr.

Keith Hart, of Brighton. Other names to mind are Messrs. E. A. Pitstow, W. H. Johnson, James Hemming, F. B. Tompkins, James Pagett, Fred Rigby, C. Potheary, Robert Matthews, J. H. Wilkins, James Houldsworth and Walter Chibnall. Their memories will always be associated with 1947.

'Man Bites Dog...'

WHAT CONSTITUTES RINGING NEWS?

Dear Sir,—I do not think that I could agree more fully with most of what is written by Mr. Malings in the issue of December 12th, especially with the suggestion for printing peal records. Not that I would advocate it for all time. I can well remember opening my first ringing journal nearly 40 years ago, and recollect thinking how well the peal columns looked—worthy records of most worthy jobs—and I have seldom had reason to think otherwise, until now.

The present restricted paper supply creates the necessity of cuts, and I believe that peal records should bear the proportion of space restriction that they undoubtedly deserve. I am reminded of the story of the cub reporter who asked his News Editor to define back-page 'copy' and front-page 'news.' The great man replied, 'A story, "Dog bites man," would be back page copy; a story, "Man bites dog," would be front page news.'

Recently I read in Belfry Gossip that Mr. H. J. Poole had called a peal of Cambridge Maximus in hand, and I unashamedly confess that I was agog to see the set-up of the band who rang this peal—'Man bites dog' with a vengeance; on the other hand, the peal columns of November 28th and the following week were headed by peals of Maximus, again conducted by Mr. H. J. Poole, the equivalent of four inches (or so) of column space filled with 'Dog bites man' copy. I support Mr. Malings' suggestion that peals be printed in 'the form now used for quarter-peals, returning to their present prominence immediately the need for restriction has passed.

I am afraid I cannot travel all the way with Mr. Malings' remarks about reports of meetings. I believe the 'dreary recitals' he mentions are mainly the outcome of past policy. Just recently, in committee of the Essex Association, we called for a forthright statement of present-day policy, and were met by the reply that the fault lies mainly with the reports sent in (which we can well believe). The result you will find in three-quarters of a column on

November 14th, devoted to the doings of the 'Crusaders' of the S.W. Division of our Association, published as submitted. I do not suggest, for one moment, that this was a 'Dog bites man' story. I am, however, suggesting that it was properly written by someone well versed in précis writing, able to condense facts into a readable story of modest length, which any self-respecting Editor would pass for publication with a minimum of trouble.

Where Mr. Malings calls for more correspondence, it matters not so much as to whether writing is merely a personal viewpoint (how many, do you imagine, are in a position to write on behalf of a majority?), but as to whether the subject matter is wide or narrow. By all means let us encourage correspondence. The Editor cannot be expected to write the whole of the matter; nor should he attempt to dictate the actual styles so long as they are reasonable; but let the letters be impersonal, well expressed views on matters of general interest.

Constructively, then, in this time of restriction, I would suggest that the editorial, one day in the near future, should offer us some guidance on the subject of reports and correspondence; and, if I were writing it, these points would receive prominence: (a) That, obviously, the larger meetings and functions should receive more prominent notice; (b) that, so far as is possible, all detail submitted would be stated, where they appear to be of value; (c) that correspondents should try to model their reports on the style to be found in the journal itself, thus to save the Editor as much re-writing as may be; (d) that the drafts submitted be fairly widely spaced and not cramped unduly, to enable the Editor to blue pencil clearly where necessary; (e) that, wherever possible, the reports should be typewritten, or, at least, very clearly handwritten (I should hate any Editor to have to read mine!); (f) and, finally, that editorial alterations be accepted as being made by the expert who has the whole picture of his paper's requirement before his eye.

OBITUARY

MR. GEORGE DRAKE.

Mr. George Drake (71), a treble ringer at Brighthouse St. Martin's for the past 52 years and conductor for over 40 years, died at his home after a brief illness on December 21st, and was interred on Christmas Eve to the sound of his beloved bells being as well struck as he always insisted they should be, half-muffled in Kent Treble Bob, his favourite method. He had rung on every royal and national celebration, commencing with a peal for the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria in 1897, and took part in a Royal Wedding touch last month. C.F.S.

MR. C. J. ELLIS.

Master of the St. Nicholas' band of ringers, Harwich, Mr. Charles James Ellis died at his home, Victoria Villas, Garland Road, Parkerton, on December 12th, aged 68.

For over 56 years he had been a ringer, and apart from his valued work at Harwich he had been Master of the North-Eastern Division of the Essex Association for the past three years.

Mr. Ellis had an association of 49 years with the railway and drove the first Flushing boat train from Liverpool Street to Harwich in 1926. The funeral service was at St. Paul's, Parkerton, on December 16th. The Rev. J. S. Hole, Vicar of Harwich, in a moving tribute, recalled how on many celebrated occasions during the last 50 years Mr. Ellis had rung the bells of St. Nicholas' Church, and sent out the pealing message thousands of times. 'Our ringers miss him very much,' the Vicar said. 'Tonight those bells which he rang so often are

muffled. As they are rung they will send forth a sad tone as if they too were missing the master hand which had rung them for so many years.'

The handbells were rung over the open grave by Messrs S. Jennings, E. Scarfe, G. Moss and W. Felgate.

MR. THOMAS WARD.

Bishop's Stortford belfry has lost a valued member and their vice-president by the sudden death on December 16th of Mr. Thomas Ward. Although not a peal ringer, he enjoyed many quarter-peals and took a great interest in ringers' functions. As a service ringer he was most regular.

Civic-minded, Mr. Ward was chairman of Bishop's Stortford Urban Council from 1936-1939 and from 1941-46. He was chairman of the Guardians Committee from 1943 until his death. The Rhodes Birthplace Memorial was opened during his chairmanship of the Council.

The funeral service was at St. Michael's Church and he was laid to rest in the new cemetery on December 19th. In the evening, with the bells half-muffled, a quarter-peal of Grandsire Triples (1,260 changes) was rung: Miss D. Wacey 1, W. T. Prior 2, W. Prior 3, F. Springham 4, H. Bull 5, H. M. White 6, F. Bird (conductor) 7, W. Bird 8. F. B.

Aids to Teaching

A SOMERSET METHOD.

Dear Sir,—I have read with interest letters by 'Adsum' and 'Mentor.' I cannot agree with 'Mentor' that learners are pushed on far too quickly. I have often found they are not pushed along fast enough, and lose interest. My first experience at teaching change ringing (some 40 years ago) was when I agreed to teach a stoney band. By the time I had taught them one method I was convinced that rounds and/or call changes were not of any use in learning change ringing. Both styles of ringing are as far apart as the two poles. I should be better understood, perhaps, if I classify rounds, etc., as 'stationary' ringing and change ringing 'movement.'

Before starting to teach pupils it is well to remember that they have been taught a more direct method of approach to subjects in our schools to-day than they were years ago.

Striking is the principal thing in ringing, and before I take pupils up in a tower I satisfy myself that they have a good ear. If I have any doubt I ask the other ringers to ring a plain Doubles method with tenor covering. I then go outside with them and ask them to pick out the treble and tell me the positions she strikes in. Not until they can do this do I arrange a dumb practice.

When they can handle their rope right, and balance their bell with ease at both strokes, I take another bell, a heavier one for preference, and ring this one myself, the same as if I were ringing changes, starting with dodging, place making and hunting, finishing up with a course of the method they are first going to ring open. In this two bell practice I always insist that they should pull the same time as myself and not follow me. In this way they get the exact timing required for change ringing.

During these practices I take the opportunity of teaching them the first method they will ring open, also give them as much single-handed handbell practice as possible in this method. By using this way of training I have seen a learner ring several plain courses of Bob Minor the first time he has rung open, and within a month he has rung a 720 on an inside bell without any assistance. In the case of another learner, from the time he first handled a bell until he could ring Grandsire inside was six weeks.

As regards the first method to teach a youngster, I think that is immaterial. You would not expect a 10 or 12 bell tower to start with Doubles or Bob Minor, or do the same as I have seen in a six-bell tower, put a learner on the tenor to Bob Minor. From one end of the country to the other there are hundreds of instructors who are always willing to help the individual or band. Contact the nearest to you, follow his or her instructions, and I am sure you will soon make good.

There are plenty of text books, all of which are good. One of the most helpful is 'Hints to Instructors and Beginners.'—Yours faithfully,

HEDON BELLS DESCRIBED.

One of the finest of the many old churches in the North of England is St. Augustine's, Hedon, which was built during the 12th century. The edifice was known as the 'King of Holderness'—a title in every sense appropriate to its fine and majestic appearance, as its magnificent, tall, square, turreted tower can be seen from a great distance. This tower was commenced about 1427 and took some 10 years to complete.

The bells are a fine musical ring of eight (tenor 17 cwt.). From the 18th century there were only six bells, but in 1929 these were recast and at the same time, by the generous gift of the late Col. and Mrs. Lambert White, two new bells were added. The inscriptions on the bells are as follows:—

1.—Eustace Roper, Richard Gibson, Churchwardens, 1776.

2.—Wind them and bringe them and I will ring for them. 1687.

3, 4 and 5.—William and Philip Wightman made me, 1686. The gift of Charles Duncomb to the Corporation of Hedon, in Yorkshire.

6.—The gift of Charles Duncomb to the Corporation of Hedon, in Yorkshire. 1687. S. S. Ebor.

7.—Cast by Taylors, Loughborough. William Lambert White, 1929.

8.—Cast by Taylors, Loughborough. Elizabeth White, 1929.

The initials S.S. ending the inscription on the sixth bell are those of Samuel Smith, a bellfounder of York. William and Philip Wightman were bellfounders in London in 1682-1702. Sir Charles Duncomb was elected in 1685 to represent the Borough of Hedon in Parliament, at which time Hedon had two M.P.s.

The Beverley Society visited this tower on December 13th and received a very warm welcome from the Vicar (the Rev. E. C. Dann), who conducted the service and wished the Society success in bringing about a revival in ringing. There was an attendance of over 30, representing 14 towers, at the splendid tea in the Church Institute.

Mr. G. F. Williams (president) presided at the business meeting, supported by Mr. F. Dale (vice-president), Mr. L. Rodmell (Ringing Master) and Mr. A. E. Sellers (hon. secretary).

Open nights for general practice were announced at the following towers: Last Monday in the month, Holy Trinity, Hull; first Tuesday after monthly meeting, Beverley Minster; first Wednesday, Market Weighton; last Wednesday, Coltingham; first Thursday in the month, Hessle.
