There are lherefore (wila There are, therefore (writes Mr. Dukes), only a few lowers in Dublin vicinity, but opportunity may be taken to arrange fwo or three tours for, peal ringing, one for towers in south alld say one or two ' up north.'

Apart from ringing, the delegales may like to know something about Dublin and its surroundings. In Dublin they would, no doubt, lse interested in all or sone of the following: St. Patrick's and Chrin! Churcla Cathedrals, Trinity College, Dublin Castle and Guinness Brewery! South of Dublin there is Killiney (Ireland's Bay of Naples), Dublin Hills, Bray and Co. Wicklow, known as the Garden of Ireland, with Glendalough and the Vale of Oroca. At Arklow, J. W. Wash, brook rang his peals, with two tower-be'ls ' in hand.' North of Dublin there is the Hill of Howth with its excellent view of Dublin Bay and Ireland's Eye. The Boyne Valley, where King William of Orange defeated King James, extends inland from Drogheda.

Dubiin is well served with hotels, which are compelled to maintain a certain standard and must be registered with the Irish Tourisa Board. Perhaps those who propose recommending the visit would consider making a week or two's holiday of the Council meeting visit.
A sub-committee has been formed by the Irish Association to consider preliminary details, which they hope to have completed by the time of our annual meeting, and it is hoped to have some further information within a short time of Easter Monday the date of our meeting. "We hope, however, that the matter will he given every reasonable conside:ation and that the Council will honour Ireland with its first meeting out of Great Britain in 1949,' cancludes Mr. Dukes.

A new handbell record of Major with a peal of 13,664 Double Norwich Court Bob Major has been claimed by Mr. Ernest C. S. Turner. This was rung at the Royal Masonic Junior School, Bushey, on Feb. $29 t h$, by E. A. Barnett, C. W. Woolley, H. G. Cashmore and E. C. S. Turner (conductor). The feat was accomplished in 6 hours and 4 minutes. Congratulations to all concerned.

Twenty-five years have elapsed since the last peal at Chobhan, Su:rey. This peal was the first to include members of the local band.

At Evesham, Worcestershire, big things are being planned, including the recasting of the beils.

Mr. Enlis J. Fills has broken a 30 years' absence from the peal columns by a peal at Rochester, Kent. This was the first peal on St. Margaret's bells for 20 yeârs.

Sixteen-year-old Miss Rhoda Brown is the first of her sex to call a peal in the Fastern Branch of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild. We doubt whether any other lady of 16 has called the Rev. E. Bankes James' peal of Cambridge Surprise.

The title of the Surprise peal rung at Frodsliam on January 27th should be Cheshire Surprise and not Chester Surprise as published in 'The Ringing World' of February 27 th. The error is regretted.
Owing to the bells going badly, a peal attempt failed at Bispham, Lines, on Feh. 28 th , in honour of the golden wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Shuker.

There was, however, 1,260 Grandsire Triples rung at Christ Church, Manchester, in honour of the happy occasion on Fehruarv 22nd by $R$. Benson 1, A. Caims 2, Miss M. Walshaw 3, A. Frost 4, R. Aviey 5, B. Walshaw 6, H. Reynolds (cond.) 7, J. Clegg 8.

Our overseas letter bag iucludes a letter from Mr . George w. Williams, of Charleston, South Carolina, telling of 889 clanges rung at St. Michael's, Charleston, on New Year's morning. 'Our midnight "peal" was well received by those who could hear it above the accumulated noise of ships' whistles and automobile horns, and we, are aiming next year for a true quarter-peal."

An interesting point about the peal of Double Norwich at Portsmouth. Cathedral on February 14th was that it contained 92 singles and no bobs.
Eightv-three-year-o.d Frank V. Sinkins rang in his birthday peal at Stoke Poges on Feb. 141 h.

By ringing the treble and tenor respectively to a peal of Bob Major at St. Michael's, Basingstoke, Messrs. C. W. Munday and E. P. Austin Thave each 'circled' the tower.
The half-muffled peal at Marlow was to the memory of Mr. W. H. Badger, who was associated with the church for 78 years, either as churister, bellringer or organist. It was rung on the first anniversary of his funeral.

From Mr. A. R. Wilson, of Holy Trinity, Hobart, a letter tells of their Royal Wedding ringinf. We had a great evening ringing a "peal" of Doubles 10 times ( $120 \times 10=1.200$ ). # HENRY JOHNSON DIAMOND JUBILEE DINNER 

The Continued Prosprrity of St. Martin's Guild...... Record Number of Peals A Farewell to a Beloved Rector ...... Unusual Secretarial Record

$\mathbf{N}^{0}$0 signs of austerity marked the Diamond Jubilee gathering at the Henry Johnson commemoration dinner at the Imperial Hotel, Birmingham, last Saturday. The Food Office regarded the occasion as ome meriting the relaxation of the 100 maximum rule, and a company truly representative of the Exercise, numbering 160 , was present.
In the chair was Canon T. Guy Rogers for the last time, his retirement after 23 years as Rector of St. Martin's taking place this year. The past 12 months were memorable in the history of the Guild, having been a vintage year with a record number of peals and some of exceptianal merit. Those present included
two ringers $-\mathbf{G}$. T. Mitcheson and Charles Wiolliams-who knew Henry Johnson in the flesh. To them was accorded a special round of applause.
Mention was made during the proceedings that Mr. W. H. Reeves had entered his 20 th year as secretary of St. Martin's. His predecessor. Cclr. A. Paddon Snith, held office
before him for 20 vears, and before him for 20 years was Mr. W. H. Godden as secretary. Will tradition prevail over experience? That is the question.

## ECONOMIC RECOVERY PEALS

The Lond Mayor, in his reply, expressed regret at the resignation of the Rector. On the theme of the toast he gave this. dictum : The State is the servant of the people and
the people not the servant of the State. If the people not the servant of the State. If
they kept that principle in the forefront, then prosperity would come their way.
As to ringing, it was his sincere wish that it would not be long before they would be
celebrate econamic recovery, bringing with it a knowledge that they were living in a more peaceful world and that they would then be free to carry forward the great social reforms they wanted to see, particularly housing.
The Chairman reminded the company that he must have responded nearly 20 times to the toast. He recalled the past work of the Church as a social agency and said that a great deal of what was done by the Church in the past was now done by the State. It was very important that the voluntary spirit in the Church should be preserved and that the Church should remind people that there was a higher authority than the State.
In conclusion, Canon Rogers said: I have been here 23 years and I would like to testify to the lappy relationship that has existed between me and the ringers. Whenever it las been necessary for me to issue a special appeai there has always been a contribution from the bellringers; their relationship has been economic as well as courteons. It is now time that a more nimble rector should climb the steps of St. Martin's tower.

## FOR HENRY JOHNSON'S NVSPECTION.

 The toast of the evening, ' The Memory of the late Henry Johnson,' was entrusted to Mr. J. F. Smallwood. Many of them, he said, had heard that toast proposed by men who had known and rung with Henry Johnson. Year by year they had seen the number of those who knew him sadis dininishing, and to-day there were very few who could tell them much about him.Henry Johnson was a great character and there was no doubt that he left his mark on the ringing of Birminglam as was evident by the strength of St. Martin's Guild. How interesting it would be if Henry Johnson could step back out of the past and survey ringing step thay knew it today. One of the things that would have given him a great deal of pleasure as it had done to them was the enormous amount of restoration work in Birmingham, primarily, as the result of the activities of 'St. Martin's Guild. There was no doubt that the influence of this Guild had stretched far and wide, and more restoration work had been undertaken in this city than in any other city of its size. There were still one or two backward districts in the city.
Another thing Henry Johnson would have noted with pleasure was the work of the Central Council. which had been in the forefront in spreading the knowledge of ringng and helping youngsters. He would also be pleased to know that ringers themselves owned their own newspaper. They could control its policy and that would have pleased him very much. He would have rejoiced that two of Birmingham's most promising 'youngsters,' Armert Walker and George $S$ wan , had recently rung their 500th peal together.

THE MASTER'S REVIEW
Continued prosperity to St. Martin's Guild was honoured on the call of the Master, Cclr. A. Paddon Smith, who said if there were only two backward districts in Birmingham thes would be very glad. He took it that Mr. Smallwod referred to bells, and one of thost was Handsworth Old Church, whose bells should be recast. Five of them were very old From the toast they would observe that St. Martin's Guild had achieved prosperity. It had heen handed down to them. St. Martin's was the headquarters of the Guild in the earliest days and still was. The records of their Guild went back to 1755 and they were one of the oldest guilds or societies of any kind in the City of Birmingham. That was not the beginning because in 1647 he believed a man named Billingsly left a croft of land in a man named Btoad Street to provide bell ropes for $\mathbb{S}$.

Martin's Guild in perpetuity. That 17nd had appreciated in value, and it might he said that St. Martin's had never lost a peal through a rope breaking.
A record number of peals had been rung by this Guild and some of them were exceedingly important in the Exercise. One was Stedman Cinques at Exeter Cathedral on April 12th. It was a Birmingham band that rang the first peal of Cinques at Exeter, and he was a member of that band. Another was the peal of Cinques at St. Martin's to commemorate Mr. Albert Walker's 50thl year of membership. It was 5,050 changes-most appropriate.
The Master had a special word of congratulation to the Lincoln Guild on their record peal of London Surprise Major at Hevdour and welcomed four members of that band pre-sent-Messrs. J. L. Millhouse, C. McGuinness, J. A. Freeman and Joho Freeman. By their performance the St. Martin's Guild lost their record of London Surprise Major rung at King's Norton on May 11th, 1903, of 14,103 changes. That peal occupied 8 hours and 40 minutes and the Heydour peal 8 hours and 25 minutes. An interesting feature was that both those peals were heard by Mr. Harry Withers as umpire.

MR. JAMFS GEORGE'S RECORD.
The Master had also a special word for the handbeil peal at Bournemouth. in which Mr. James George rang the tenors on his 94th birthday. It was a moost extraordinary performance and cortainly had never been done berere he said he would live to 120 . In those days he was the proud possessor of a large handsome black beard, but when he started talking about 120 his beard started to grow grey. He promptly shaved it off. Then his moustacle tuthed grey and he disposed of that. They all wished him the best of luck. (During the proceedings the good wishes of Mr. George were conveyed to the company.)
Altogether 71 peals were rung for the Guild in the past 12 months, the largest number in that period. To paraphrase the saying of a famous statesman: Never have so many peals in the history of this Guild been rung by so few in so short a time.
Mr. T. H. Reeves, the secretary, prefaced his reply by reading a telegram from the Master of the College Youths conveying best wishes for a successful evening, also one from John Taylor and Co. On a persanal note Mr. Reeves mentioned that he had the honour of ringing in both Exeter peals. Cclr. Paddon Smith was 20 years secretary of the Guild, and his predecessor also held the office for 20 years. This was his 20 th year and they would be looking in due course for another secretary of St. Martin's Guild. He hoped his sucressor would receive the same generous support as had been accoorded to him.
Mr. W. C. Dowding proposed what the characterised as the happiest toast of the evening, 'Kindred Ringing Societies and "The Ringing World."' There was a very strong fellowship amang bellringers which was not found among other organisations. If that same feeling of fellowship prevailed among individuals and nations they would be living in a happier world to-dav.
Mrs. Deal replied for kindred societies and said for the first time St. Martin's Guild had invited a woman to reply to that toast, which she characterised as a gallant gesture. It was always a pleasure to come there; 23 years ago she was delighted to be there when she rang in a non-conducted peal of Stedman Triples. The kindred societies owed a great deal to societies like St. Martin's Guild. They were the rocks on which they built their ringing

## SCHOOL RINGING GUILDS

Dear Sir, -I note with very great interest that Mr. T. S. Williams, of Shewsbury, and Mr. F. C. W. Knight, of Ornington, are doing some very good work in forming ringers' guild s in their schools.

I am a schoolmaster and teach in a school containing approximately 250 boys, whose ages rance from 11 to 16 years of age.
Three and a half years ago I approached the headmaster ind asked his permission to form a school ringing guild. Nerdless to say, he was very interested and helpful. A 'arce classtoom was put at my disposal for 45 minutes of a lunch time break, and notice was given of a ta!k on "The art of change ringing* I proposed to give. The room was packed ten minutes before the commencement of the talk.
I feel sure that the boys and girls who attended found the 45 minutes of their time spent in listening well worth while. I wa afterwards able to recruit some beginners, and we decided to meet for practice twice a week during the lunch break using some handbells barrowed from our Cathedral.

In 18 months I had a band ringing doublehanded Bob Major and Grandsire Caters. The boys visited their local church towers and were naturaly given all help possible by the local ringers.
Two vears ago four of these boys were given an audition at the B.B.C. I was in the engineer's box and witnessed tle verformance, which consisted of three courses of Bob Minor and a plain course of Grandsire Trinles exceilently struck. The average age of the boys at the time was $14 \frac{1}{2}$ vears.

Unfortunately, and to the disappointment of the bors, the B.B.C. have not made use of the recording laken.
These boys, and others, have now left school and are active ringing members and condictors of our Association-at least two boys have since conducted their first peal.
Since the formation of our ringers' guild I have given a talk on "The art of ohange ringing, at least once a year and have had bumper attendances.

In support of Mr. Knight and Mr. Williams. I am sure that any campanologist schoolmasters who embark upon a similar venture would find it very interesting mind useful to the Fxercise.-Yours trulv,
