## YORKSHIRE'S MESSAGE

THE message the Yorkshire Association gave to the Exercise at its annual meeting at St. Michael's, Headingley, Leeds, on May 8 th, was one of encouragement. Statistics from the report show that membership now stood at 1,421 , as against 1,357 at the beginning of the year. New members elected were 114, against an offset of 14 who had died and 36 who had lapsed. Peal ringing had not been backward with 102 rung at 64 churches and two handbell centres. First peals were rung by 34 members and conducting had been shared between 38 different conductors, three of whom had called their first peal.
The balance sheet showed a loss on the year's working of $£ 98 \mathrm{~s} .4 \mathrm{~d}$. largely due to the considerable increase in the cost of printing. A warning note was added by Mr. S. F. Paimer, the hon. treasurer, in drawing attention to the upward trend in administrative costs, and he suggested that should it continue it might be necessary to take steps to bring the annual income of the Association into line with expenditure. The Association is, however, healthy, with assets totaliing £401.
The Rev. C. O. Ellison, who was presiding at his first annual meeting as president, was re-elected on the proposition of Mr. P. J. Johnson, and in acknowledging the honour referred to the help and loyalty of the officers, adding that he would, so long as it was his privilege to serve, do his best to uphold the best traditions of the Association. Mention should also be made that Canon C. C. Marshall, who served with such distinction as president for 35 years, is to be presented with a silver salver, in addition to the gold signet ring he has received, as a memento of the members' affection.
In regard to the re-election of officers, a special word is due to the hon. peal secretary, Mr. W. Barton, Mr. L. W. G. Morris, the general secretary, in moving his re-election, referred to the able manner in which he had fulfilled the office for so long a time and pointed out that there were few who possessed the necessary qualifications and fewer who were fired with the inclination to tackle the job, which called for skill and close attention to detail. In accepting office for another year, Mr. Barton desired the Association to look for a successor.

Of general interest was the president's announcement that the committee felt that the time had come when an attempt should be made to revive the Snowdon Dinner, which had been in abeyance since the outbreak of war in 1939. Largely as a venture of faith the committee had made preliminary plans to hold it at Bradford on Saturday, October 2nd. The cost to members attending would be greater than before the war, but in view of the great social value of this old established function they had every confidence that the members would support its revival. Thus a new date was added to the Ringing Calendar tor 1948
The meeting was preceded by divine service at St, Michael's, attended by a large gathering representative of all districts. The Vicar, Canon R. J. Wood, conducted the service. This was followed by an excellent tea in the Bennett Road Institute.
Circulated with the report is a message from Canon Marshall thanking the members not only for the two parting presents, but 'for all your great kindness shown to me in the long years of our working together. . . S The Canon's homily is well worth repetition: "Our value to any great movement is not what we can get out of that movement, but what we can give to it; and how true this is of our Ringing Associations! They only can exist by virtue of the vast. amount of voluntary work which lies behind them; very few people realise the full amount of voluntary and self-sacrificing work which lies at the back of the life of the Association as a whole the work of all our officers and, side by side with that, the contribution which every individual member brings to it. No one must ever think. for instance, that the regularity with which they pay their subscriptions is not a matter of great importance to the whole Association; nor must anyone think that it is only things like the paying of subscriptions which matter-it is the individual character which really matters; the good of the whole depends, after all, on the goodness and dependability of each individual person.'

## MEMORTAL BELL TO MR. RUPERT

 RICHARDSON DEDICATED.The annual meeting on April 24 th attracted what may have been a record number of members and visifors, among the latter being friends from London, Birmingham, Leicester and other centres. Ringing commenced at two o'clock until service time, when large numbers attended evensong at the Cathedral.
At the close of this service, the choir and congregation proceeded to the west end of the nave for the dedication of the 'Flat 6th' bell which has been added to the Cathedral ring of twelve in memory of the late Master, Mr. Rupert Richardson. The Bishop nf Grimsby performed the dedication, the bell being chimed by him by means of a rope brought down through the intervening floors. Tea was at the Wesley Schoolroom, Clasketgate. Immediately after this the Leicester handbell ringers gave a selection of tunes, under the direction of Mr. S. Harrison.
Canon A. M. Cook, Sub-Dean of the Cathedral, presided at the business meeting and said he was delighted to welcome such a large gathering of ringers. Referring to the dedication service, he said he thought this was both dignified and beautiful, and he was very pleased to know that Mrs. Richardson was able o be with them.
The Dean of Lincoln was again elected president and Mr, J. A. Freeman Master. After acting for 27 vears as hon. secretary and treasurer, Mr. F. W. Stokes did not offer himself for re-election, and Mr. Jack Bray was unanimously elected to these offices. Messrs. J. A. Freeman, J. Freeman, Jack Bray and George E. Feirn were elected representatives on the Central Council for the ensuing three years.
The Master reported that 111 peals had been rung during the past vear-not a record as to actual number, but surelv a record as regards auality. Three records had been set up: (1) The peal of Spliced Surorise Major in 16 methods at Harmston: (2) the handbell neal of Minor in 105 methods: and (3) the peal of 14,144 London Surprise Major at Heydour. All of these had been rung by resident members. Among other peals in the higher methods were 10 London Surprise Major. 2 Bristol, 4 Cam-
bridge, 2 Superlative, 1 Yorkshire, 1 Spliced Surprise Major in siz methods, also the first peal of Erin Caters by the Guild. He specially mentioned two of the Guild's young lady ringers, namely, Miss Rhoda Brown, who had rung a peal in 20 Surprise Minor methods, and Miss Betty Brown, who, ringing her first peal in March at the age of 14, had accomplished 20 peals during the year from Minor to Londou Surprise Major.
The Master then read a statement of the financial position of the Rupert Richardson Memorial Fund, showing that with money already received and definite promises, a total of $£ 206$ had been reached, leaving a balance of about $£ 116$ still to be found. This includes the cost of the memorial tablet to be erected in Surfleet Church, the late Master's 'home' tower. He thanked the Dean and Chapter, on behalf of the Guild, for their ready permission to carry out the scheme of adding the new bell to the Cathedral peal, for their generosity in providing the memorial tablet in the Ringers' Chapel, which had been dedicated at the same time as the new bell, and for the assistance given by the Cathedral staff to the bellhangers. He also thanked Mr . R. S. Godfrey, the Cathedral Clerk of Works, for his co-operation and help, and Messrs. Taylor and Co. for the way the work had been carried out.
He then went on to say that the year 1949 would be the jubilee of the Guild, and that suggestions had been made that this event should be celebrated in a worthy fashion. The view of the committee was that a full day meeting should be arranged on the actual anniversary, April 25 th next. with a lunch and tea. A good deal of discussion ensued, several speakers holding that such an event would he best celebrated br a dinner. It was finallv decided that a full day meetino should be held on the actual anniversary. Anril 25th. and that later in the autumn a dinner should he held, to which would be invited hoth dincesan and civic dignitaries. A small committee was appointed to deal with local arrangements.
Before ringing commenced generallv, $n^{t}$ the Cathedral, two courses of Stedman Triples were rung on the light eight by officers of the Guild, with Mrs. Richardson ringing the new bell.

## SALISBURY DIOCESAN GUILD

The Guild festival at Mere on May 1st attracted a very large attendance. The Master (the Rev. C. C. Cox) presided at the annual meeting, when the executive officers were reelected. Mr. S. Hector and Mr. E. F. White were appointed vice-presidents, and the Rev. F. L1. Edwards, Messrs. W. C. West, G. H. Harding and F. Preecy elected Central Council representatives. Mr. Legg was elected a life member.
A congregation of about 250 attended the festival service at the Parish Church, conducted by the Vicar (the Rev. N. E. Johnson). The address was given by the Master and a course of Grandsire Caters rung on handbells.
The arrangements for providing the large company with tea were efficiently carried out by the ringers of Mere and a committee of ladies, to whom thanks were heartily accorded.

## GREAT WAKERING BELLS

The Bishop of Chelmsford rededicated the five bells and dedicated a new treble bell at St. Nicholas', Great Wakering, Essex, on May 1st. The work on this light ring of six, tenor 8 cwt ., has been carried out bv Messrs. Mears and Stainbank. The 'going' was excellent except for the new ropes and long draught.
